# County Seeks Private Funds For CD Poll

## Commission Cancels Surplus Aid To Needy Program

### Shipping Costs, Federal Controls Cited By Avery

The County Commission canceled its commodity surplus aid to the needy program on the suggestion of Commissioner James P. Avery who earlier this year championed the program and worked toward its adoption.

"You all know how much I wanted it here," Avery said Tuesday afternoon.

Avery stressed that Seminole County would have to bear the cost of shipping the food stuff from Jacksonville to Sanford. "It would cost about \$700 every other month," he explained.

Avery was also upset about the regulating powers of the federal government. "We won't have anything to say on who will benefit from the program... it will strictly be up to the federal government."

The commission had already agreed to use the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad warehouse on W. First St. to conduct the program.

In other business, at the lengthy meeting which ran well over five hours, the commission accepted the new franchise directive and agreed to make copies available to interested citizens to look over in the zoning office.

A south Seminole developer, Mrs. Meredith complained to the board that interested persons should have a chance to look over the directive before it is put on the books.

The commission also overruled a zoning board decision and agreed to rezon an area on Cameron Ave. from C1 to M1 for use as a possible salvage yard.

Despite objections from adjacent property owners, Commissioner John Fitzpatrick said, "We have got to provide areas for business and get away from agriculture."

Heard a report from the committee studying the feasibility of moving the county agent and home demonstration agent's office from the courthouse to the road department camp at the county home facility. Both Commissioners Vernon Dunn and Ted Williams said the move was feasible.

The board also agreed that a meeting between the county attorney and zoning board attorney was a "must" in an effort to start some form of legal action to move an abandoned house at Lake Brantley.

### Hurricane Aid Rushed Belize

MERIDA, Mexico (UPI)—Aid was rushed from several points by sea and air today to Belize, a sleepy British Honduras seaport reduced to a shambles by the onslaught of Hurricane Hattie.

Reports filtering in from the shattered area indicated that Belize, which was rebuilt after being destroyed by a hurricane in 1931, once again was a victim of near-total devastation.

## West Berlin Tightens Border Curbs On Reds

BERLIN (UPI)—West Berlin police today began demanding identity papers of all Russians in civilian dress trying to enter the Western sector of the city.

The action apparently was approved by the United States, Britain and France in retaliation against attempts by East German Communist police to restrict the movements of Allied officials in East Berlin.

### Seminole-Volusia Deputy Appointed

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Deputy attorney Joseph A. Scarlett will take over immediately as deputy for the State Industrial Commission handling workmen's compensation claims in six counties.

Scarlett, 32, and Gilchrist County Judge Elson M. Atkins, 34, were named deputy commissioners Tuesday by Industrial Commission Chairman A. Worley Brown.

Atkins will handle claims in 22 North and Central Florida counties. Scarlett will work in Lake, Orange, Osceola, Brevard, Seminole and Volusia counties.

Avery called for the informal meeting for the purpose of "getting the facts."

In other business, the board was told by Attorney Mack Cleveland Jr. that the Ocala Air Base will be turned over to them Nov. 14.

Commissioner Vernon Dunn suggested some sort of policy regarding the base but the rest of the board favored a "wait and see" policy.

Avery said that right now "I've been offered twice what we paid for it."

In other business, the board authorized County Engineer Carlton Bliss to write the State Road Department to initiate "action" on drainage rights-of-way at the shopping center on Hwy. 17-92 and SR 436.

Two property owners have refused to grant a right-of-way and Avery suggested state action because the right-of-way was on a state road.

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### Fidel Seeking Overthrow Of Latin Regimes

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States charged today that the Cuban regime of Fidel Castro is "seeking to subvert and overthrow the constitutional governments of the Americas."

U. S. Ambassador to the Organization of American States de- Lesseps S. Morrison made the charge in a note distributed to the OAS delegations.

The note also charged that the Castro regime is "intimately associated with the aims of purposes of the Sino-Soviet bloc."

Attached to the note were copies of joint communiques issued by Cuban and Communist leaders. One of the communiques was issued jointly Sept. 20 by the Soviet and Cuban governments. The other was issued Oct. 2 by the Chinese and Cubans.

Through these statements, the United States said, the Castro regime has made Cuba "an appendage of the Sino-Soviet bloc."

In an accompanying letter to OAS Secretary General Jose A. Mora, Morrison said:

"These communiques show that the Castro regime is neither ideologically an adherent of the inter-American system nor a part of the non-aligned world."

"Even more important to the states of this hemisphere... is the emphasis which these Communiques place on the Castro regime as an example... for people seeking to subvert and overthrow the constitutional governments of the Americas."

James M. Simmerson of the Orlando firm, Simmerson and Associates, will explain how the area will benefit through a franchise covering the newly developed Country Club Heights and some 500 additional acres in and around the community.

Water and sewage systems for the area, as well as fire hydrants for additive fire protection in the community will be discussed by the engineer according to Al Case, president of the C. C.

### County Elects Attorney By Secret Vote

The County Commission Tuesday afternoon, by a secret ballot, elected Harold Johnson to replace Mack Cleveland Jr. as county attorney at a starting salary of \$3,600 a year.

Board Chairman J. C. Hutchison called for the secret ballot and in a matter of seconds, Hutchison said that Johnson is the new county attorney. The result of the balloting was thrown in a waste basket.

After the meeting, Hutchison suggested to a Herald reporter that he not look in the basket to see how each commissioner voted.

Before the action was taken, Hutchison said that Attorney Kenneth Leffler withdrew his name as a candidate and that S. J. Davis advised him that he didn't have the time.

The only other attorney in the running was Wallace Albritten who insiders predicted had the best chance for the post.

Johnson is associated with the Cleveland law firm, Cleveland, who is also state representative, had been county attorney for seven years. He announced his resignation because of an increased business load.

Johnson will take over the job as county attorney starting today.

### Moslems Battle French; 30 Die

ALGIERS, Algeria (UPI)—Moslem crowds poured into the streets and battled French police across Algeria today in demonstrations marking the seventh anniversary of the start of the Algerian war.

County Commissioner John Fitzpatrick today starts the long, hazardous, burdensome task of "rounding up some private capital" to conduct a straw poll regarding a proposed 3-mill levy for a half-million dollar civil defense program next year.

County Attorney Mack Cleveland Jr. told the commission Tuesday afternoon that the state attorney ruled that the use of county funds for that purpose was not authorized.

Chairman J. C. Hutchison suggested the possibility of using the Sanford Herald poll on Civil Defense (now being conducted) but Fitzpatrick said "let's defer action and maybe I can round up some private money to finance the vote."

(The Herald will make public its impartial poll Friday. Thus far it has received well over 1,000 ballots.)

County Commissioner Vernon Dunn asked the board to look into the possible use of LST's for a key disaster operation center (suggested in the Herald two weeks ago) and both Fitzpatrick and James P. Avery said the plan had a lot of merit.

However, Avery said he talked with "experts" and the cost per month would exceed \$1,200 in paint alone.

The board took no action on Dunn's proposal.

### West Preparing New Autobahn Test

BERLIN (UPI)—The West was prepared today for a possible new test of Allied rights of access to Berlin on the Autobahn from Helmstedt through East Germany.

Company A of the 20th Engineer Battalion, newly arrived in Europe from the United States, is scheduled to take the 110-mile superhighway trip sometime this week.

It will replace Company D of the 17th Engineer Battalion.

Army officials declined to state exactly when the troops will arrive in West Berlin. But their passage through the Communist zones could pose another test of access rights.

The Russians Sunday interfered with these rights by stopping three U. S. military patrols from going onto the highway from West Berlin.

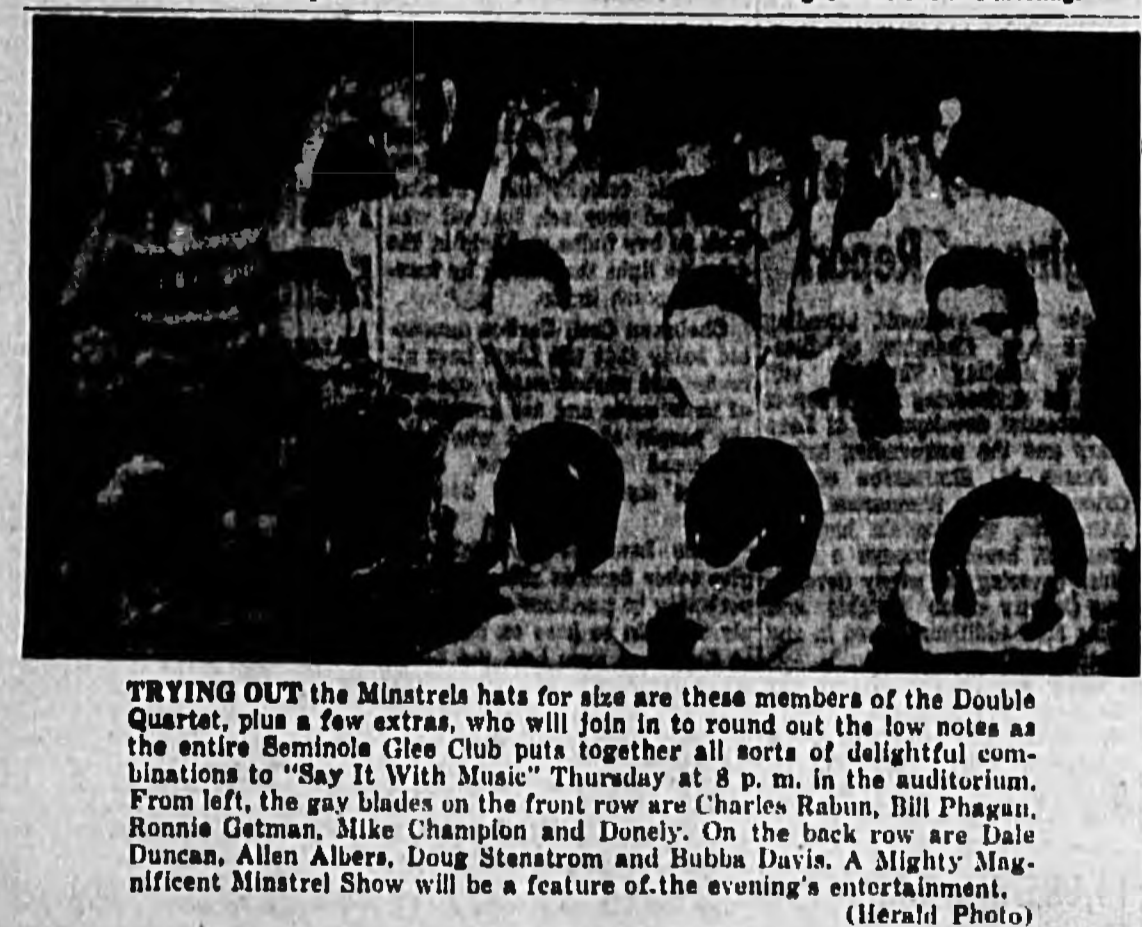

# Army Adopts Hands Off To Van Fleet

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Gen. James A. Van Fleet's remarks that UN Ambassador Adlai Stevenson should be fired and the United States should not fight for Berlin were made as a private citizen, according to the Army. In disassociating itself from the statements, the Army said Tuesday that Van Fleet will act as a consultant on its guerrilla warfare program for only 90 days during the coming year, and will get no pay.

President Kennedy made no mention of these limitations when he announced Van Fleet's recall from retirement.

The Army said that when he is not acting as a consultant, the general's remarks are made in his capacity as a private citizen.

"To date he has performed no official duties as special consultant to the secretary of the Army."

The 68-year-old general was a hero in the Normandy landings of World War II and later in Greece and Korea.

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# Halloween Parade Ends In Tragedy

ANOKA, Minn. (UPI) — A gay Halloween parade of costumed school children turned into a nightmare of horror late Tuesday when a runaway car with a dead man at the wheel roared through the rear of the marchers and plowed into spectators.

Children, many of them masked and wearing spook and goblin costumes, were tossed into the air. Older adults and youths were knocked down "like a bunch of teapins."

Two elderly women were killed. Twenty-three others, including 18 children, were injured.

Ironically, a town fire engine scheduled to follow the marchers and protect them from traffic was called out on a run as the parade started.

Police identified the dead as Otto Erickson, 74, driver of the 13-year-old car which caused the tragedy: Mrs. Harry Laird, 60, Coon Rapids, Minn., and Mrs. George Dowdell, 79, Anoka.

Erickson was dead of an apparent heart attack seconds before the accident. Mrs. Laird died at the scene and Mrs. Dowdell died a short time later in a hospital.

Two children and an adult were in critical condition.

The accident was all the more tragic in that the annual parade in this self-proclaimed "Halloween capital of the world" was set up in 1920 to turn youngsters away from the usual holiday pranks and give them a safe, enjoyable Halloween.

# Seminoles Prep For Wildwood

After last Friday's victorious but nevertheless confidence-shaking 20-6 gridiron bout with the Leesburg Yellow Jackets, the still undefeated Seminole High School Seminoles are once again fired up with team spirit and anticipation of more pigskin competition. Quietly resolved to the unalterable fact that the Seminole High School goal line has finally been tread upon, the Seminoles set about with even greater enthusiasm in preparation for this week's gridiron clash with Wildwood.

A lot of concentration is being given in the Seminoles' (stopping power of the Seminoles, with special emphasis given to the ability of the Sanford players to move quickly into a given crucial area of the field to intercept

an opponent's pass or successfully prevent completion of the pass to the receiver.

The mighty Seminoles are still in possession of their Fourth-in-the-State Sportsman rankings in Jacksonville and also in Tampa. In a Miami Sportswriters' Poll the Seminoles have advanced from eighth place to claim a Miami rating of Sixth-in-the-State, almost within striking distance of Coral Gables High, Jacksonville's Lee, and Miami's Senior High and Miami Edison.

The individual and team scoring and statistic records which the Seminoles have been piling up this season, are continuing to move steadily. (stacking bit) Davis, still the scoring scourge of the Seminoles, leads the top scorers of the Seminole backfield with a total of eight touchdowns for 48 points, contributing

an average eight points to each game.

Sanford's Butch Riser, the top scorer of last week's Seminole victory over the Yellow Jackets with two touchdowns plays, edged ahead of fullback Bill Flagan by five points for second place on the top-scoring listings with a total of 25 points and four touchdowns in six games. Riser's scoring average per game is 4.2 points.

Before the Leesburg game, Gary Davidson and Bill Flagan were tied for second place among the top scorers with Riser only in fourth place. Davidson now holds the number three spot in scoring with two touchdowns and one interception point for a total of 22 points and a game average of 3.7 points.

In the Seminoles' unprecedented 1,000 average for their six games this season, there comes to light

a factor which has previously drawn only a little attention—penalties. A six game total of only 306 yards in penalties have been levied against the Seminoles with an average of 51.00 yards per game. The Leesburg game saw the Seminoles with one of their lowest penalty records of 40 yards.

Rushing yards for the six Seminole games comes to a total of 1,400 yards, with an average of 233.33 yards per game. Bubba Davis and Butch Riser are among the backfield players who are out front in individual records set in rushing yards.

In passing attack where the main Seminole weakness lies, 200 yards through the air in the six game record with an average per game of 33.33 yards. Seminole passing ability seems to improve with each game as the season wears on.

# Shop Warm Here - - It's Cold Up North

## Shelter: Low Cost And Very Low Ceiling

CHICAGO (UPI)—The government is coming to the aid of home owners who want to build their own fallout shelters at a minimum cost.

Paul Visser, director of technical operations for the Defense Department, said Wednesday designs for a crawl-in shelter which would keep a family of three or four alive will be released by the government in a few weeks.

Visser told the National Shelter Association 12 designs will be released in late November or early December.

The shelters consist of a galvanized pipe four feet in diameter to be buried underground with an entrance supported by sandbags; a dome-like structure to be mounted on the ceiling of a home basement, or a plywood frame concrete box to be buried underground.

Visser admitted that the three shelters he described would be "slightly uncomfortable."

But, he added, "you can get just as much protection in a small shelter as in a big one." He said many times in history people have lived for several weeks with less than two square feet per person.

The first major cold wave of the season struck savagely in the North today, dropping temperatures as much as 40 degrees and turning roads into ribbons of ice. Weathermen posted cold wave warnings for a seven-state area, as the wintery blast swept down from Canada and hit Montana with its worst snowstorm of the fall.

Paradoxically, the cold wave caused unseasonably mild and moist air to drift from the upper Mississippi Valley, across the central plains to the Gulf of Mexico. Light rains fell from Texas to Minnesota, with nighttime temperatures in the 60s recorded as far north as Iowa and Illinois.

The mild rainy weather ahead of the storm was expected to move eastward today. Fair to partly cloudy weather was in

store for most of the East and West coasts, and showers were predicted over much of drought-stricken Dixie.

Meanwhile, back in the north wind-driven snow and frigid temperatures were in store for Nebraska, northwest Iowa, north-central Kansas, Minnesota, the Dakotas and Montana east of the continental divide.

The storm strangled transportation in parts of Montana. Slush on the highways turned to ice, with conditions worst in the Rocky Mountain area. Huge trucks jackknifed or were stranded along U. S. 2 and 91 as visibility suddenly dropped to near zero. Travel within 35 miles of Helena was discouraged. Cut Bank, Mont., had a reading of 8 degrees above zero.

Snow fell over the mountain states during the night as far south as New Mexico and Arizona. Efforts to find two hunters in northern New Mexico and another near Kaycee, Wyo., failed and were to resume today, although more snow was predicted.

UPI newsmen Lee Winfrey was the first U. S. reporter on the scene in Belize in the wake of Hurricane Hattie.

BELIZE, British Honduras (UPI) Litter, muck and debris—all the words you normally used to describe a mess—none of them will do to describe Belize.

Imagine block after block of roofless houses, fallen walls, felled trees, twisted sheets of tin, dangling wires, car tires, broken chairs. Slime it all over with stinking gray mud and mat it with ropes of grass and seaweed, and you have a picture of Belize.

Items:  
The town's biggest sawmill was wrecked. The roof was blown off the high school. The wall at the front of the lunatic asylum was flattened. Nobody seemed to know or care where the lunatics were. The general hospital was evacuated and the prison wrecked. Prisoners were released "under daily parole."

A film storage plant was blown away. Skins of film wound along the road like giant snake skins. The wind blew a small automobile through the concrete wall at the back of a airport. It blew all the windows out of another nearby.

In the native quarter bordering the ocean, the hardest-hit area, rubble littered the ground so thick you could see no dirt around the houses. Children climbed the heaps of broken furniture looking for buried toys.

## Kennedy Statement On Bomb Tests Due

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy plans a statement on nuclear testing today following his meeting with the National Security Council, the White House announced.

The Security Council convened at 10:15 a. m. and 30 minutes later Kennedy sent for former President Harry S. Truman to join the deliberations in the crowded Cabinet room.

Adlai E. Stevenson, who heads the U. S. delegation to the United Nations, also sat in on the meeting and arranged to fly with Kennedy to New York in the early afternoon.

The chief executive will meet in New York with Arthur Dean, chief U. S. negotiator for a nuclear test ban.

Kennedy apparently had his statement in mind when the NSC convened and then discussed it with the members and an unusually large group of advisers present today.

## U. S. Intervenes In Castro's Behalf

MIAMI (UPI)—The U. S. State Department went to court here Wednesday to block harassment of Fidel Castro's Cuban government by advertising man Erwin Harris.

The State Department, at the request of the Cuban government, filed a petition in Circuit Court to intervene in the case in which Harris seized two Cuban crop dusting planes which were flown to Florida by persons who asked for political asylum.
