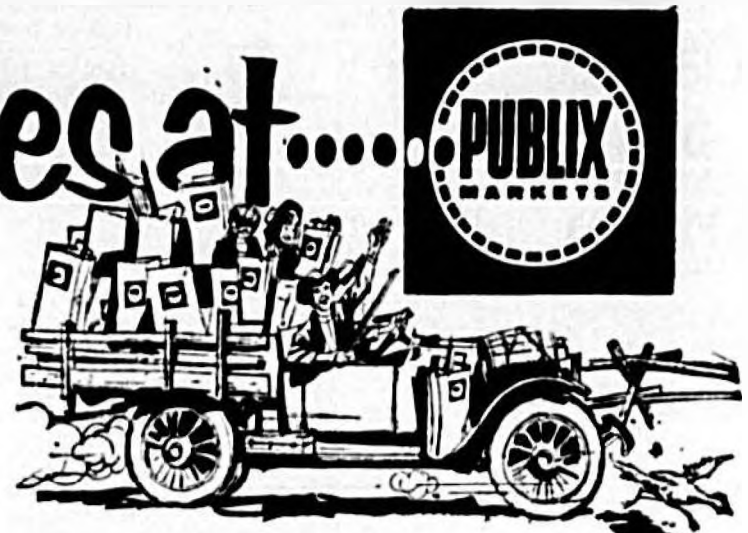

Wilson issued the following statement at noon today: "Having been a member of the City Commission since May 1956, I am proud of the progress we have made during that period and in qualifying today for re-election for another term am very much interested in the continued orderly growth of our City.

## Building Of 31 Subs Delayed By Bad Work

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy disclosed today that completion of 31 nuclear-powered submarines had been delayed and said poor workmanship in government and private shipyards was partly to blame.

Officials said the delays affected 21 Polaris missile subs and 10 torpedoes armed types designed to combat enemy submarines and surface shipping.

A "significant part" of the construction delay was attributed to stringent new safety precautions undertaken after the Thresher submarine disaster which took 129 lives last April 10.

Skeletal details on the holding in construction were given in answer to questions by newsmen, but only after several days of consultation at top Navy and Defense Department levels.

The Navy said it could not estimate the length of delays and did not discuss the possible effect on fleet combat readiness.

Flora Racing Toward Cold Death At Sea

MIAMI (UPI) — Hurricane Flora, with an estimated death toll of nearly 1,000 and other thousands unaccounted for in the Caribbean, churned toward its death today in the Atlantic Ocean.

Forecasters said the storm's 110 mile per hour peak winds posed a threat to land but would send gale waves into the Gulf of Mexico.

Devastated regions of Haiti and Cuba struggled through debris and mud to try to bury its dead. Contaminated water raised the threat of an epidemic.

Deaths in Cuba were reported to be 1,000. In Haiti, 2,000 were reported to be dead.

The Cuban government told the people to ignore "unfounded rumors about the casualty toll." There were reports from Oriente Province that 1,000 student workers were missing in the mountainous eastern region.

Flora left nearly \$500 million in damages in its nine-day rampage across the Caribbean. Haiti's property loss alone was estimated at \$100 million.

## Conservative Chief Still Prime Minister

BLACKPOOL, England — (UPI) — Prime Minister Harold Macmillan today surrendered leadership of the ruling Conservative party for the coming general elections and said he could not hope to be prime minister "for any extended period."

He did not resign as prime minister, although that action was indicated for the future. In a letter issued from his bed in a London hospital where he underwent a successful prostate gland operation this morning, Macmillan urged the Conservative party to choose a new leader.

Macmillan's decision was contained in a letter to Foreign Secretary Lord Home. It was read to the 4,200 delegates to the annual Conservative party meeting. They were stunned by the announcement.

Macmillan's letter said that even if the operation proved successful, "it is clear that I will need a considerable period of convalescence." "I would not be able to face all that is involved in a long electoral campaign," he said. "Nor could I hope to fulfill the tasks of prime minister for any extended period, and I have so informed the queen."

A Buckingham Palace spokesman said: "He has not resigned as premier."

The effect of his action appeared to be that he was turning over the reins of government to Deputy Prime Minister R. A. (Rab) Butler.

## Crisis Builds Up In Birmingham

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI) — Birmingham's troubled racial situation moved toward the crisis stage again today with the rejection of Negro desegregation demands by city officials.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and other Negro leaders had given the city two weeks to hire 25 Negro policemen and begin talks aimed at more and better city jobs for Negroes or face a resumption of racial demonstrations.

Mayor Albert Boutwell and the city Council Wednesday night turned thumbs down on the ultimatum, presented in a registered letter from Rev. Fred Shuttlesworth, councilman John Golden said.

Boutwell said "I have never dignified any of these ranting messages and demands with a reply or answer."

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## Red Grain Sale Gets Bipartisan Backing

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy's political exposure approval of a "one shot" \$200 million U. S. wheat sale to Russia won a measure of bipartisan backing today in Congress.

But some Republicans, including House GOP leader Charles A. Halleck of Indiana, questioned the wisdom of the move announced by the President at his news conference Wednesday. Sen. Barry Goldwater, (R-Ariz.), had urged that the sale be made conditional on withdrawal of Soviet troops and military equipment from Cuba.

Kennedy said the sale of 1 million tons about 150 million bushels of surplus U. S. wheat — the largest Soviet-American transaction since the multi-billion-dollar lend-lease deals of World War II — was a "hopeful sign" that progress toward peace is possible. He promised a special report to Congress on the matter today.

## Wheat Farmers Have Doubts

By United Press International Wheat belt farmers today greeted President Kennedy's decision allowing the sale of wheat to the Soviet Communist bloc in Europe as a "big money" move that will mean money in their pockets.

But, at the same time, many farmers expressed concern about providing even a cold war enemy with such a strategic material as food.

It may mean a few dollars for us, but I don't think it's worth the price we may have to pay someday in national security," said Walter Pierce of Manhattan, Kan., president of the Farm Bureau in the nation's largest wheat producing state, Kansas.

"A lot of the farmers have misgivings on what the outcome of this sale will be," the president of the Kansas Farmers Union, Martin Byrne of Topeka, said he was opposed to the sale earlier but would now support the President's decision "to the utmost."

"This could develop into a vehicle to ease world tensions in the cold war," he said. "And, most important, it could become a move toward peace."

## All 12 Aboard Copters Dead

BANGOR, South Viet Nam (UPI) — All 12 men aboard two U. S. Marine Corps helicopters which crashed in Communist-held jungle highlands north of Saigon late Tuesday were killed, a U. S. military spokesman said today.

The spokesman said the bodies of nine Marines and three U. S. Navy men killed in the crash of the helicopter were being ferried back to the advance air base to meet north of the spot where they were killed.

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## Crash Destroys City Pump House

Pump house and equipment of the city's No. 5 well on Highway 14-92 south were destroyed when hit by an automobile at 8 p.m. Wednesday. City Manager W. E. Knowles estimated damage to the pump house at well over \$1,000.

Constable Bob Carroll, who investigated, said that Richard S. Patrick, Sanford, was forced off the highway near the Drive-In theater, jumped the guard rail protruding the median and crashed into the pump house.

Justice of the Peace Hugh Duncan said Patrick was cited for a Tuesday hearing to answer to charges of failure to have his vehicle under control.

## Doctors Fight To Save 10

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — Doctors fought through the use of a resuscitator today to prevent the death toll from a suspected outbreak of hantavirus from rising above seven.

The persons were being treated in hospitals here and Nashville for the deadly food poisoning, believed contracted through packaged, smoked whitefish. None of the patients were improved enough to be held in satisfactory or fair condition.

But doctors at Vanderbilt Hospital in Nashville said George R. Brown, 21, was showing increasing difficulties with his breathing. They said he probably would be placed in a tank-type respirator.

The toll from the suspected outbreak rose to seven Wednesday night with the announcement that a man believed to have died of cerebral hemorrhage last Saturday at Nashville actually succumbed to hantavirus.

Supplies of the rare and expensive anti-toxin were flown here from Canada and Denmark to supplement the United States supply.

## Pilot's 'Log' Is Big Gator

JACKSONVILLE, (UPI) — Pilot W. J. McMillan Jr. thought he spotted a log rolling slowly across a runway at Herling Field near here Wednesday.

But when he landed his small aircraft just over the "log" it turned out to be an eight-foot alligator.

Flying at the field was held up while attendants roped the snaky gator and dragged him out to a nearby creek.

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## Castro Warns

MIAMI (UPI) — While of unites searched for bodies in the sea and rained-led beams of eastern Cuba, the Fidel Castro government warned Wednesday that any rebel attack on the hurricane-torn island would be wiped out "from the first to the last" man.

Castro said the government would not tolerate any further attacks on the island.

HOPE SPRINGS, Va. (UPI) — The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and state police have converged on the push Homestead Resort Hotel to investigate the disappearance of about \$200,000 in jewels from a hotel room.

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## Pact In Force

MOSCOW (UPI) — The treaty outlawing nuclear tests in space, in the atmosphere and under water became effective at 2 p. m. (6 a. m. EST) today when the United States and Britain delivered ratified copies of the pact to the Russians.

### Additional Lands For Recreation Urged By Reed

Urgent need for acquiring additional lands for recreational purposes, as provided for in a constitutional amendment in the Nov. 5 election, was stressed by Jim Reed, Ocala, district information officer of the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, before the Sanford Kiwanis Club Wednesday.

Reed emphasized that the \$50 million bond issue would not call for an additional burden on the taxpayer as it would be repaid with the \$2.5 million a year receipts from the five percent wholesale tax now in effect on certain sporting goods and fees from the use of the recreational lands.

Continuing growth in the population of the state makes it essential to act now as the number of areas available is constantly decreasing, he said. Water control and the problem of pollution will be a part of the overall outdoor recreation program and committees are being set up to work out solutions.

He also reviewed the history of game and fish laws since Florida became a state and told of the conflicting pressures put on the commission by groups and individuals.

Reed was introduced by Judge Vernon Mize, program chairman for the meeting. Legion of Honor awards were made to long time members.

## Area Politicians Bow To Pioneer

The peaceful setting of a tiny cottage snuggled under majestic live oaks on the south shore of Lake Brantley belies the dynamic personality of its resident, Mrs. Inez Meredith, one of the county's most colorful and controversial figures.

At 70, Mrs. Meredith still enthusiastically extols the beauties of Meredith Manor, her Lake Brantley development and optimistically plans for the future. Her mother, Mrs. Susie Newton, a spry and spunky 94 years old, also makes her home nearby.

Mrs. Meredith having lost her husband in World War I, came to Orlando from California in 1919 to visit with her parents and decided to settle here. She and her father purchased the old Carlos Cushing homestead on the south end of Lake Brantley, known as "Brantley Hall."

The two-story home, which was built in the 1870s as part of the same English settlement that built homes in Altamonte Springs, still stands. Many of the old settlers were forced to abandon their homesteads and groves after they lost everything in the "Big freeze" of 1895.

Mrs. Meredith comes from hardy pioneer stock and was born in a sod house on the plains of Nebraska on July 4, 1893. She learned to ride horseback before she could walk and went to school in a sodhouse.

This same pioneer spirit prompted her to settle in such an isolated spot with her small son and build Meredith Manor nursery and bulb farm, raising three acres of caladiums, amaryllis, callas and ornamentals under shed.

She also operated a saw mill

and woodyard, raised horses and cows, and rented boats and sold bait to fishermen.

While her son, Eugene, was in the Air Corps during World War II, she had to work as a woman to keep things going, so when he returned after the war he announced that it was time for her to take off her blue denim, put on a dress and start living like a lady.

"Unfortunately, he was later killed in an accident and she was forced to resume the full responsibility once more.

She has increased her original acreage to 350 acres and in more recent years the emphasis has been on the sale of lots. She has spent \$136,000 in improving lots in the sections which she has had platted. A woman of strong convictions, not afraid to fight for her beliefs, she had made quite a few political enemies along the way and once told County Commissioners — "I was paying taxes in Seminole

The date has been set each year since 1922 in observance of the great Chicago fire on Oct. 9, 1917, killing 250 persons and destroying 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168 million.

Sanford is no exception and Chief Mack Cleveland Sr. has released the following figures for the year 1962:

Losses from fires amounted to \$69,356 with property valued at \$810,941 involved. A total of 631 man hours were put in by the firemen fighting fires.

There were a total of 188 fires in the city and firemen also answered 18 false alarms and 52 emergency calls for such things as children locked in bathrooms, gas leaks, and a boy stuck up in a tree.

Major causes for fires in Sanford during 1962 were careless burning of trash, children playing with matches, defective wiring, faulty stoves and heaters, and smoking in bed.

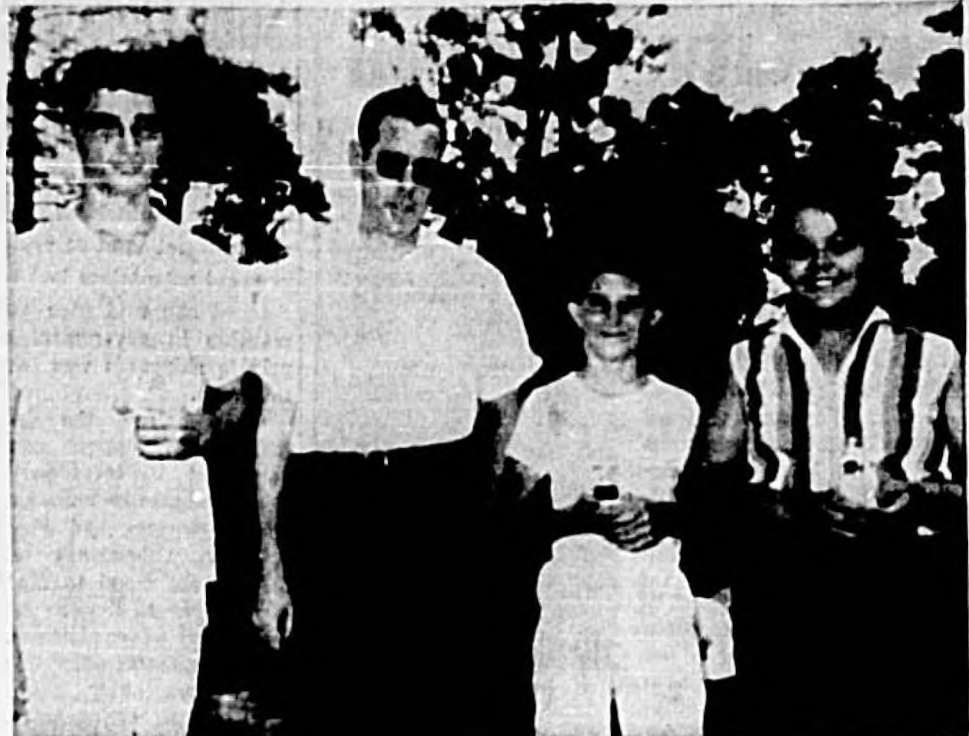

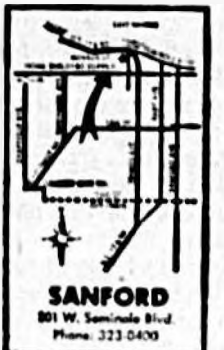

Several days ago The Herald carried a photo of President George Hughes and Secretary Hugh Duncan of the Sanford Lions Club with Leon District Governor John Minor.

The first glance rang a bell. Finally it dawned that this was the southpaw so many of "bird dog" baseball fans in these parts will remember as Tico Minor.

To recall Minor you've got to go back to the mid-thirties when Sanford was a member of the old semi-pro circuit, the Central Florida League.

The hoop took in Daytona Beach, Cocoa, Orlando, Winter Park at one time or another an additional club or so.

These were the days when the long-gone Celo Bottling Company sponsored a Sanford team composed of fellows like Cal Dennis, Dusty Rhodes, Jack Peters, Roy Harrison, Pete Schirard and forgive me if I can't recall the names of some of the others. But, there was one ball player you could never forget, Red Martin, the center fielder and always one of the big Sanford stickmen.

Those were the days when Sanford's stores closed on Wednesday afternoon only so people could go to the ball park. Games were played only on Wednesdays and Sundays.

How well we remember the old City Island Park in Daytona Beach when it had no fence and a drive between outfielders wound up in the Halifax River. Daytona Beach had a unforgettable battery—the Hutto brothers. The pitching half was Olin—a smart southpaw—who whipped the Celery Feds, as Sanford's club was then known, more times than local fans care to remember.

Sanford had its brother battery, too—the Chapman boys. Bert was the catching half of the duet—and in our books any local ball club from that day to this never had a smarter receiver behind the plate.

There's been a lot of ball played in Sanford since those days but little was any better—even though these fellows were semipro.

Salary? The going rate was twenty-one fifty—twenty-one meals and 50 cents a week.

Back to Minor, Tico did most of his pitching for Winter Park. In those days the Parkers played at Shepherd Field. We drove by there the other day but couldn't find the place.

We've saved a couple of names—the best for the last. There's an old Coast Line engineer who still gets around town every now and then. They call him Joe Barnes. Joe managed the Feds and was known as "Ironhead"—sometimes affectionally—sometimes not. Joe played first base and even he will admit today he did a pretty good job around the sack and could keep pace with the others at the plate.

The other of bird dog we remember also managed the locals a few seasons—Sid Rive. Sid, an old pro, was a receiver. For many years Sid owned and operated the Rive Garage in the same building in which The Herald is now located.

On Sundays and Wednesdays the players used to gather in front of Sid's garage when out-of-town games were on tap. There'd be the transportation—a flat bed truck with orange crates as seats for the passengers.

It was just a few weeks ago we read of the funeral of a Cocoa resident named Early Joiner. Remember him?—a portly gent who was a pretty good hurler in his day, and not bad at the plate.

One of the league's most colorful characters was a second baseman for Cocoa. His first name was Johnny. We can't remember his last—but we can remember that black cat emblem on the back of his uniform, and his voice. No ball player ever performed in the old Municipal Park with a yell like his. We can still hear it, but we can't describe it.

And who needed a public address system when old Doc Huntley was in the stands. If you don't remember Doc Huntley you missed something. If you do remember him, nothing more needs to be said.

The big upset of the day will occur in Madison, where Purdue's Boilermakers will hammer out a hard-won 17-14 triumph over Wisconsin—harrumph!

## Idioms Stump Computer

WASHINGTON (UPI) — As a drowning man will grasp at a straw, I never lose an opportunity to seize upon something that human beings can still do better than machines.

Recently, I have been reading quite a bit about the development of translation machines.

These are electronic computers that are multi-lingual and can make rapid translations from one language to another. The big show-off!

I was gratified to note, however, that the machines

are having trouble with spelling, pronouns and idioms, even as you and I.

In fact, they can't begin to handle idioms as well as human translators, as witness the following two examples:

1. A human interpreter employed by the United Nations to translate English into Spanish ran up against the phrase "once in a blue moon."

A literal translation would not have meant much in Spanish, so he changed it to "every time a bishop dies."

2. A translation machine was given the expression "out

of sight, out of mind" to convert to Japanese. It came up with the Japanese characters for "invisible, insane."

This was a clear cut victory for the human race. Such victories are rare these days and we should cherish them while we can.

At a recent hearing by a house education subcommittee, examples were shown of a computer's handiwork in translating Russian and Chinese into English.

In places, the poor thing's spelling was atrocious. It rendered "rapacity" both as "capacity" and "capacity!" before finally settling down to eight letters.

But what amused me the most was the way it flubbed the pronouns. Being unable to decide which pronoun was correct, it would occasionally list all the alternatives.

Thus, when a pronoun was encountered, the machine would print "him-his-his" or "her-it-hers-hers," which, of course, is the coward's way out.

I have often wished that I could handle "who-whom" in that manner, but we humans are not permitted to escape that easily. We have to go ahead and pick the wrong one.

Among the material translated by the machine was an article originally printed in Red China. One of the key paragraphs came out like this:

"Soviet Union successfully launch artificial cosmos stellar body but American imperialism then many times failure."

Ugh. Computer speak with forked tongue.

## Worry Clinic

By use of the "me, here, now" yardstick of "human interest," Ellen can compare newspaper features fairly accurately, even without the more expensive survey methods outlined below. But polls of newspaper readership are one of the latest fields of Applied Psychology.

**CASE Q-470:** Ellen B., aged 20, is a journalism student.

"Dr. Crane," she began, "what are the ways by which to test the popularity of different newspaper features?"

"For example, how does your column compare with other syndicated newspaper features?"

"And how were the ratings for your column obtained?"

One of the most ingenious and probably the truest test of "full page" reading habits was devised by Dr. Charles Allen, of our Northwestern University Journalism School.

He let a graduate student ride the elevated trains from Evanston to Chicago day after day.

This student would sit down behind any person holding a newspaper and as soon as that man or woman opened the paper, the graduate student would "clock" the time the reader spent on each page.

For he was equipped with a stopwatch and a notebook in which he diligently recorded the names of the Chicago newspaper, the date, the number of seconds devoted to each page.

Obviously, this was a "space test" instead of a specific "feature test" since the student couldn't tell exactly what the reader was looking at on any given page.

But he did find, for example, that the editorial page of one of our Chicago newspapers held the interest of the ordinary reader over 100 per cent longer than did the editorial page of any of the other

three newspapers of the city. To gain more specific data on individual features, a group of specially trained interviewers go forth to ask housewives and their husbands exactly what they have looked at in today's paper.

On this standard type of personal poll, my column has always taken first place among editorial features, if it has been run with equal frequency with any other feature. Comics obviously poll the largest vote of all.

A third type of rating system involves watching the amount of mail that is pulled by one feature versus another. Sometimes, moreover, newspaper editors will list their various features and then invite readers to rate them on the basis of their interest therein.

This is a postcard type of survey and is fairly accurate. Again, newspapers have offered prizes for letters of 50 words which describe "My favorite feature in this newspaper."

All of these methods give indirect evidences of reader habits and merit serious consideration.

The most exact kind of poll, though not feasible for usual newspaper readership surveys, is the "eye camera" invented by Dr. Herman Brandt, a prominent Applied Psychologist.

It photographs the reader's eye movements even without his realizing it, and shows exactly where his eyes rove over a newspaper page and how many times, as well as exactly how long he focuses on any features.

Advertisers use this camera to compare the effectiveness of headlines and print copy vs. illustrations in their ads.

It would be a superb way to test features except that it is too costly since it requires too

much time and equipment. But if you employ the human interest "me, here, now" yardstick, you can compare features fairly accurately, even without costly polls or surveys.

## Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — It has taken Congress the full nine months-plus to give birth to its first two important decisions of the year—the test ban treaty in the Senate and the tax bill in the House.

In this period Congress has been able to give fewer than 100 of President Kennedy's 250 legislative recommendations any consideration at all. Two thirds of the administration program hasn't even been taken up in committee for hearings.

In addition, more than 8,500 bills have been introduced in the House and more than 2,100 in the Senate. Of these 11,000 measures originating with congressmen, fewer than 100—one per cent of the total—have been enacted into law.

Only five new laws passed this year are considered of major importance.

These facts and figures emphasize the need for reorganization of Congress better than all the words in the 17,000 pages of Congressional Record proceedings.

Congress isn't exactly on strike against the rest of the government. Both Senate and House are working longer and harder this year than in any Congress since World War II.

But the end result is a slow-down and an inability to make decisions that is more crippling than a strike.

What Congress really needs is the same kind of action it took in the railroad labor crisis to prevent a strike.

If Congress can't modernize its own work rules to eliminate legislative featherbedding, it should turn the job over to arbitrators to make a deal to bring in a binding decision.

But the chances for any such action this year are slim. Under bipartisan sponsorship of Senators Joe Clark, D-Ia., Clifford Case, R-N.J., and 30 others, the Senate Rules Committee has finally cleared a resolution to set up a Joint Committee on the Organization of Congress.

Similar resolutions have been introduced in the House by Rep. John V. Lindsay, R-N.Y., Henry Reuss, D-Wis.

But nobody outside of Congress is pushing this project. And what it needs more than anything else is a public lobby to demand reform.

It has even been suggested that President Kennedy could well show a little more interest in this project, since he has been the principal victim of congressional lethargy.

While the President keeps up a front of not wanting to interfere with Congressional procedures, he certainly interfered on reorganization of the

House Rules Committee.

Assuming that the Clark-Case resolution can be sieved through the crowded congressional "colander" this late in the year, the Joint Committee would be authorized to make recommendations to improve organization, simplify operations and attain better relations with other branches of government.

Three other resolutions approved by the Rules Committee would permit study of specific reforms:

—Set aside four hours of each session for debate pertinent to legislation under consideration and nothing else.

—Allow committees to meet without obtaining special permission while only routine business is being considered.

—Authorize Congress to handle matters pertaining to the budget more efficiently and expeditiously.

But reform of Senate and House rules which are responsible for many of the delaying tactics used by congressmen opposed to a pending measure during floor debate would again be excluded from consideration by the new Joint Committee.

Senator Clark and others are of the opinion that no real streamlining of Congress can be effected until its antiquated work rules are brought up to date.

Senator Case is spokesman for another group which believes the power of committee chairmen must be curbed.

Any action Congress might take on reforms approved by the Senate Rules or House Administration committees could not be made effective before Jan. 1, 1965.

That means the 1964 session will have to plod along under existing traditions which encourage inaction.

## Don'ts For Better Dryer Service

By Myrtle Wilson, RD Agent  
Clothes dryers are a boon to busy homemakers, but there are some things you should not do when using one.

"Topping the list of 'don'ts' is a reminder not to overload the dryer. This slows the drying process and puts a strain on the motor. But don't underload it, either. You'll need at least half a load to prevent scorching and burning. A full load is eight to nine pounds in most models.

Also, don't dry things that have been cleaned with flammable dry cleaning fluid. The heat in the dryer may be enough to cause it to ignite.

Don't dry non-fast colors with other articles. And don't load starched clothes with unstarched ones. Unstarched clothing will take on the starch.

Don't dry clothes until they are "bone dry." Overdrying may damage the fibers, make fabrics limp, less absorbent and more difficult to handle.

Don't dry knitted wools in the dryer because the motion will cause them to shrink. Be careful about the plastic buttons you put in the dryer. Some types may become soft from the high temperatures.

Some college rooms and dormitories can be mighty drab, especially for the co-ed away from home for the first time. One way to brighten the room, and reduce homesickness, is to give the student an arrangement of cut flowers or a homey green plant.

Promptness is appreciated. Consider how you would feel if kept waiting by someone.

## Tips On Cleaning Aluminum

Pitting (or small black dots) is caused by tiny quantities of mineral salts left in contact with aluminum. These small marks, or pits, do not hurt the pan, but daily scouring, washing without soaking, helps prevent them. Highly seasoned foods should not be left standing in aluminum pans for, while this is not injurious to the food, it may pit the utensil.

Often a harmless lime deposit forms when water is left standing in a tea kettle. This can be lessened if the kettle is emptied each night and dried for a minute over low heat. These deposits can sometimes be removed by placing the empty kettle over low heat until the deposit completely dries and cracks. Then tap bottom of the kettle with a wooden spoon to loosen the coating.

If just a light coating of lime has formed, it may, in some cases, be removed by boiling a strong solution of vinegar in the utensil for about ten minutes. Then rinse thoroughly and dry.

**TUNA MOUSSE**  
 1 envelope gelatin  
 1/4 cup cold water  
 1/4 cups boiling water  
 1/4 cup mayonnaise  
 2 tbsps. lemon juice  
 6 pimiento olives sliced  
 1 can tuna  
 1/2 cup chopped celery  
 1 tsp. salt  
 Soften gelatin in cold water—add hot water—cool. Add mayonnaise and other ingredients and chill until partially set. Add tuna and celery. Serve with slice of hard boiled egg, olives and radishes.

**CHICKEN AND VEGETABLE CASSEROLE**  
 (Electric Skillet)  
 3 (7 oz.) cans boned chicken or 1 1/2 lbs. cooked chicken  
 1/2 cup Minute Rice, uncooked  
 1 pkg. frozen peas and carrots  
 1 can frozen potato soup  
 1/2 cup milk  
 Combine: Chicken, rice, peas and carrots in electric skillet. Add milk to soup in saucepan. Heat thoroughly on medium heat. Pour over ingredients in skillet.
