

Sanford's Only Hope Faces Art Ruffin In Mayfair Meet Powell Loses, 5-3

The off-debated advantage "age over youth" was illustrated on the links again yesterday when Clarence E. Phillips, 40-year-old Sanford track line operator, mesmerized another Orlando teenage sensation, Frank Boynton, 3-2, in the quarterfinals of the Fourth Annual Men's Amateur Invitational golf tournament at the Mayfair Inn Seminoles Country Club.

The thrilling hot Phillips who rolled over 17-year-old Austin Jones yesterday ended the match on the 16th green with a sub-par score while his worthy 17-year-old opponent just wasn't that good. Phillips is Sanford's only hope now since Sonny Powell lost out to Art Ruffin, 5-3 yesterday. The 22-year-old Wilson, N. C. star, Ruffin was scheduled to tee-off against Phillips in this morning's semi-final match at 11:05 a.m.

Defending champion Ralph Bogart of Washington, D. C. kept in the running by eliminating Joe Eulanks, 17-year-old Daytona Beach prep flash, 3-2.

In the other quarter-final match a little-known Orlando linkman, E. H. "Goat" Fleming, who entered the tourney at the last minute after being coaxed by his friends, fought 19 holes before winning 1-up from veteran Washington, D. C. golfer Eddie Bean.

The dark horse Fleming was slated to square off with the 1952 Maryland state and Mayfair tourney winner, Ralph Bogart, in today's semi-final opener at 11:00 a.m.

Today's semi-final round for the championship flight and five others, plus the four consolation brackets will bring 40 golfers together out of the original record field of 86.

Dykes Burns Over New Rule Banning ump Questioning

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. — Jimmy Dykes is burning about the new American League ruling that says an umpire's judgment must not be questioned by a player, manager or coach.

The manager of the Philadelphia A's ended his brief armistice with the ump's after reading the new rule from the office of Will H. Hulse, American League president.

"We're going to have to educate the public to pay more attention," said Dykes with a straight face. "Mickey Mantle and those other fellows don't mean a 7-7-7."

"It's only the umpires the people pay to see. Now they're putting the four umpires on a pedestal. If they want colorless games, it's their own fault. I'll let my players the first to get tossed out of a game for questioning an umpire's judgment. I'll get a fine from me. If that's the way they want it, they can have it."

Dykes loosened this blast as he reread the rules in the A's clubhouse.

The rule on ump's read like this: "Effective with the opening of the American League season, any decision involving the accuracy of an umpire's judgment may not be questioned by a manager, player or coach."

"No manager, player or coach shall be permitted to leave the bench or his position on the field to question an umpire's decision on calling of balls and strikes or on calling of balls and strikes of the so-called 'half strike'."

"For violation of this rule, a manager, player or coach will be removed from the game."

General Manager Art Ebers of the A's backed up Dykes' blast. "They want to take all the color out of baseball," said Ebers. "What do they want the players to do sit around like mummies? No thing they'll have the electric eye or the photo that they use at race tracks."

"If the umpires do get the quiet treatment from Dykes, they won't be sure they're in the right ball park."

"Every man who plays next fall will have to be ready to go 60 minutes," Gustafson said. "Our big job during spring practice will be to find the men on the squad who can play both ways."





**Bank Of Melbourne
Reports Large Gain**

NEW YORK (Special) — The Bank of Melbourne, which reported deposits of \$4,177,216 on Dec. 31, gained 1,130 places in its standing among the 2,500 largest banks in the United States during 1952 and now ranks as the 2,290th largest in size compared with 3,850th place at the end of 1951.

This was revealed in the 1953 annual roll call of the larger banks in the U. S. published by the Daily American Banker of New York which is the trade newspaper of the banking business. There are 14,000 banks in the U. S.

**Sabre Jets Knock
Down Three More
Soviet-Built MIGs**

SEOUL, S. — U. S. Sabre jets bagged three more Russian-built MIGs today and ran their two-day toll of Red warplanes to six, the Fifth Air Force announced.

The sleek, swift Sabres, flying protective cover for marauding fighter-bombers, also damaged a MIG in the air battles deep in North Korea.

Yesterday's score was three MIGs destroyed, one probably destroyed and one damaged. One of the kills was by Col. Royal N. Baker, McKinney, Tex., whose record is 11 Red jets and one prop-

driven plane destroyed. His 11 MIGs destroyed ties the mark of Maj. George Davis, Lubbock, Tex., who has been missing, presumed lost, more than a year.

There was no major action along the ground, but opposing infantrymen clashed in bitter pre-dawn patrol fights.

American Thunderjet fighter bombers smashed two rail bridges and cut rails in three spots on the main supply line above the Western Front.

Naval planes from two carriers attacked Red targets along Korea's east coast in coordinated strikes. Farther north, the U. S. battleship Missouri shelled Communist bridges and tunnels.

Eleven B29 Superforts roared to within 40 miles of the Manchurian border last night and bombed a supply center in MIG Alley on the west coast. Red fighters circled

the Superforts but stayed just out of gun range.

Four Red ground attacks before daylight were smashed back in the Sniper Ridge area on the Central Front today. Another was repulsed west of Heartbreak Ridge on the Eastern Front.



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

Mr. McCaslin praised the Teachers Association highly for taking over the leadership of this month's drive. The mobile blood unit will be at McKinley Hall in the First Methodist Church on Thursday, Mar. 19, between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. for taking donations.

Stewart Gabel, president of the county teachers association, has appointed Mrs. Escar Price as the chairman of the blood drive for the teachers.

In explaining the blood drive, Mr. McCaslin pointed out that blood donations have two important functions.

"In the first place this blood we give from Seminole County goes to Pennsylvania to be transformed into plasma which is turned over to the Defense department for shipment to the Korean war theater," he pointed out.

"In the second place the by-product of this blood is used to make gamma globulin, which is important in preventing paralysis in polio attacks. The government is going to turn this gamma globulin back to the Red Cross for

Banks of flowers entwined in palm leaves and evergreens. They are so big and heavy no single person can support them. Sometimes two, sometimes three people carry them along.

The wreath bearers—at least 150 of them—turn right before the tomb and divide into two lines. They put the wreaths against the base of the tomb. In just a few minutes the building is banked high with flowers.

There is a long, white cloth covered platform before the tomb. There is nothing on it. The silk cloth flaps in the wind.

Now I look to the left. Here I see Marshal Semenov. Budyenny walks very slowly in time to the music. Before him he carries a red silk pillow. On it lies a medallion of Stalin's.

Two abreast behind Budyenny march other military leaders. Each has a pillow in his hand before him. On it is pinned a medal of the fallen leader.

Just behind them comes a single soldier on a black horse.

Behind him, eight horses—just as black—pull a gun carriage. On it lies the coffin of Stalin.

The coffin is covered in crimson cloth but through a rounded section of glass you can see the features of the fallen leader.

Just behind the gun carriage and its coffin walk Stalin's closest friends and companions.

You can recognize them all, those familiar faces. Just behind the gun carriage is one row—Georgi Malenkov, dressed in a black coat with grey fur, walks in the center. On his right is Lavrenti Beria. On his left Chou En-Lai.

Behind the Soviet and party leaders come the foreign guests, and the leaders of Moscow's diplomatic missions.

The procession halts before the white cloth covered platform. Gently—ever so gently—Stalin's companions lift his coffin off the gun carriage. They handle it so tenderly, very, very slowly they set it down.

By now, there is movement at the foot of the tomb.

The party and government leaders are going up the flight of marble stairs leading to the funeral altar.

From where I stand you can get a very good view of them and their faces. They look like men heavy with grief. Their faces are sad and set.

At 10:38 an announcer introduces Georgi Malenkov. He has a vibrant voice. He speaks without hesitating in clear strong tones. Loud speakers bring his every word to the thousands in Red Square and the millions in Moscow.

The radio takes his voice to every corner of this broad land, and by short wave to the countries of the world.

Malenkov is followed by Beria and Molotov, and then the announcer says that the funeral orations have finished.

Malenkov leads the procession back down the marble steps and in front of the tomb to the platform where Stalin's coffin stands.

His comrades gather around him. They move over and take the coffin in their hands and lift it ever so slowly.

They take it up and move off toward the wide-open metal doors of the tomb.

At 11:38 The first gun roars over in the Kremlin—the beginning of the salute. The bands begin to play again the funeral march of Chopin. The chimes on Spassy ring out high noon.

Softly at first and then louder and louder go the whistles of the factories of Moscow, and the whistles on boats in the nearby Moskva River, moving through channels cut in the ice.

The cannons firing their fiery volleys into the March sky. The clock rings out the last strokes of 12.

The whistles are very much louder. The chimes, Chopin, roaring guns and whistles—Stalin's return.

Then the first note of the Soviet hymn. The troops stand even more rigidly than before, if that is possible.

Hats come off. The party and government leaders come to salute.

With the last notes of the hymn, I look back over my shoulder at the Kremlin. The red flag of state which has stood at half staff since

Among those graduated was Frederick N. Rosseter, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Kent Rosseter Sr., of Sanford, Fla. These new officers will join other OCS graduates already serving on every type of combatant and non-combatant ship in the fleet.

Many will go to specialist schools where they will be trained further as pilots, aviation ground officers, beach masters, under-water demolition team officers or "frog men" and some will serve with the Marines in Korea as company liaison officers.

These men, in four months of intensive study and training, have covered the same Naval subjects that college NROTC students do in four years. Foremost in their study was gunnery, navigation, seamanship, engineering, damage control and operations.

Tito Is Enroute To London To Discuss Economic Matters

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)—President Tito, accompanied by military, economic and political aides, was enroute today to Britain, presumably by sea.

A brief government announcement issued shortly after midnight said only that the Yugoslav government chief had left. The time of his departure and method of travel was secret.

The British Foreign Office had announced in London last week that Tito would arrive for his five-day visit with government leaders March 16, one week earlier than had been expected previously.

Chief speculation had been that the presidential party would fly to the Adriatic coast to board a ship at either Split or Dubrovnik. The ship would go through the Adriatic—past hostile, Soviet-dominated Albania—to Malta, whence the party would be picked up by a British cruiser for the rest of the trip.

However, a British Admiralty announcement yesterday in London said Tito was expected to make the voyage in primitive and oriental society. The party will be illustrated with slides. He will play some of the rare and unusual instruments of his collection.

This is the first trip outside the country for Tito since 1947. They received a hero's welcome on a goodwill mission to neighboring Bulgaria, Hungary and Romania. A few months later he fell out with Russia and the satellite countries.

practice for a labor organization to cause or attempt to cause an employer to pay or deliver or agree to pay or deliver any money or other thing of value, in the nature of an exaction, for services which are not performed or not to be performed."

The case came to the Supreme Court after the U. S. Circuit Court in Chicago held Taft-Hartley is not an exaction, for services which are not performed or not to be performed.

That decision was appealed to the high tribunal by the American Newspaper Publishers Association, Elisha Hanson, counsel for the association, said the International Typographical Union (ITU) compelled publishers to agree to the "typos" practice.

The National Labor Relations Board defended the unions' demands, contending the Taft-Hartley ban was aimed at the payment of wages for work not actually performed.

Burton said the issue before the high court was not what policy should be adopted toward the continuance "of this and other forms of featherbedding."

"The issue here," said Burton, "is solely one of statutory interpretation; has Congress made setting 'typos' an unfair labor practice?"

Burton continued:

"However desirable the elimination of all industrial featherbedding practices may have appeared to Congress the legislative history of the Taft-Hartley Act demonstrates that when the legislation was put in final form, Congress decided to limit the practice but little by little."

The Taft-Hartley Act now limits its condemnation of featherbedding to instances where a labor organization or its agents exact pay from an employer in return for services not performed or not to be performed. Thus, where work is done by an employee with the employer's consent, a labor organization's demand that the employee be compensated for time spent in doing the disputed work does not become an unfair labor practice."

Spouse Of Jet Ace Wishes Him To Be Careful, Come Back

MCKINNEY, Tex. (AP)—The wife of the nation's top jet ace doesn't have any more advice for Col. Royal N. Baker of McKinney, Tex., who shot down his 11th Communist jet fighter yesterday.

"I just wish he would be careful and come home," said Mrs. Sarah Baker.

Baker brought down the R-1 jet at 37,000 feet over Northwest Korea to equal the MIG destroying record of Maj. George A. Davis Jr., the Lubbock, Tex. Sabre pilot who holds the overall record of 11 MIGs and three Communist light bombers, destroyed. Davis was shot down and believed killed Feb. 10, 1952, on his 20th combat mission. He is listed as missing in action.

Baker has only five Red star medals beneath the cockpit of his Sabre because Sarah has advised him not to be a "hero."

"Oh, it's okay," Mrs. Baker said last night of her husband's record, and she indicated the victory string didn't carry too much weight with the couples' four children.

"They're more interested in playing cowboys and Indians."

Baker is commander of the 4th Fighter Interceptor Group. He has flown 125 combat missions and has about six more to fly before he is due for rotation home at the end of this month.

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
