

Survivors Foundered Tanker Saved

earch Continues For 8 Shipmates Still Missing In Angry Waters Of Atlantic

NORFOLK, Va. wh-Two more survivors of the hurricane-smashed tanker Foundation Star were picked up today by a Navy trans port, the USS Hollis.

Nineteen other survivors were en route to New Lork as search continued for eight shipmates stil missing in the rough Atlantic wa ters off Charleston, S. C. The USS Hollis radioed the Coast

Guard in Norfolk it rescued two of the Foundation Star's men 40 miles south of Cape Hatteras. The mea sage was very brief, and there was no indication as to whether the survivors were found in a life boat or were clinging to the smanhed tanker's wreckage.

The other 19 survivors were aboard the vessel which rescued them, the Norweglan Emu, which was bound for New York instead of for Norfolk as originally The master of the Emu informed

the Coast Guard he had decided to proceed to New York instead of entering the Virginia capes. The Emu rescued the 19 men after the Honduran Foundatior Star broke in two Saturday. The Coast Guard cutter Cherokee reached the side of the Emu about twas planned to transfer the survivora from the Emu to the Cherokee, but sea condition were unfavorable for attempting

the transfer. Some survivors were reported to be in need of medical attention.
One seaman—the ship's cook—is known to have died in the wreck



JACKSONVILLE, (Special)— Florida's Indians are definitely NOT in the "vanishing American" category, having scored a nearly

J. Nixon Hadley, chief statistician for the Federal Bureau of Indian Affairs branch of health, has notified Florida's State Health Officer Wilson T. Sonday, the last Officer Wilson T. Sowder that the state's Indian population has elimbed from 690 counted during the 1940 census to 1,011 listed in 1950. That was a population in-trease of 46.5 per cent as con-tracted with 56.1 per cent for the state as a whole. The bureau oper-

state as a whole. The bureau operates under the direction of the U. S. Department of the Interior. More than half the state's Indian population is located in four counties in the Southern part of the peninsula, Nixon informed Dr. Sowder. The counties include Broward, 147; Collier, 175; Glades, 184, and Hendry, 125; a total of 181. The remaining 430 were scattered throughout the state at the time the census was compiled. The Seminole is the predeminant tribe in Florida, but how many of the present population is Seminole and how many are of other tribes "is not determinable" from census records, Hadley stated.



FARMERS WILL DO WELL TO PLANT MORE LUPINE

ACREAGE THIS SEASON Soon it will be time for northern Plorida farmers to begin planting liplus cover crops, and it is hoped that they will plant even more acreage to these crops than

more acreage to those crops than they planted in the fall of 195%.

The Florida Agricultural Outlook Committee has auggested a planting goal of 163,000 acres for the coming fall season, or slightly more than the planting of fall 1951, and farmers will find it well worthwhile to meet or exceed this goal.

Most farmers who have planted inpines are "sold" on them, for they have found them to be excellent cover for their land during the winter when it is not planted to cash crops and they also have been convinced of their fertilizer value. Not only have they seen research plots and records of the Florida Agricultural Experiment on their own farms. They have harvested much larger yields of corn and other crops from land on which luping was grown and

on which luping was grown and turned under previously than from land on which the cover crop was not grown before the cash crop was planted.

These legumes, which were tested and introduced by the Experiment Stations, only a few years ago, have saved farmers thousands of dollars that would have been spent for fertilizer if they had not been planted. Hundreds fo farmers who have been spited from such savings and have increased their crop yields plant lupine cover crops as a routine fall procedure now, but there are some farmers who do not yet use lupines or do not use them as extensively as they could in their farming programs. Teaching Unionism

Labor unions have become a permanently important part of the American economic scene. Yet few people understand labor unions, what they are and how they work. Kermit Eby, a professor at the University of Chicago and former director of education for the CIO, recently suggested that schools in this country should begin correcting this educational deficiency.

Mr. Eby pointed out that children now are taught principles of banking and how to compute interest rates. By the same token, he contended, in a recent talk, that schools should teach about the problems of workers, the meaning of unions, and the human relations involved in labor-management problems. "We must teach social issues that apply to the lives of high school students realistically and sympathetically," he urged. "Autocratic unions are products of the kind of families and schools that produced them. Autocrats and dictators do not teach democracy.'

The merits of the proposal are obvious. Too often people join unions, sometimes under compulsion, pay dues and participate in union elections without knowing anything more about unionism than the news stories in the papers. Because they do not understand the operations and functions of unions, they are inclined to leave the direction of the union in the hands of a few. They strike when told to strike, attend meetings when told to, but know nothing about the government of the union itself and care less. This naturally leads to abuses in those unions where the leaders have usurped control for their own gains. This situation could be remedied in large measure if, as Mr. Eby suggested, the schools would teach unionism to their students. It is not an easy subject, but without some knowledge of it no one can understand the modern American scene.

CAIRO, Egypt O- Mai Gen Mohammed Naguib told Egypt's political parties today they have 30 days to purge themselves of corruption. If they fail to do so, they face the prospect of banish ment from the nation's political.

The word was handed down by Fathi Radwan, minister of state for Nagmb's new government. He spoke to a news conference after the day-old Cabinet had approved measures for cutting up the na-

The new legislation will become effective after publication in the government's official iournal, expected this week. It provides specific regulations governing the conduct of political partles.


