

Tom Sharkey Says Police Kept Him From Winning Heavyweight Title; Mack, Barrow Differ On Infields

NEW YORK, June 16.—Sailor Tom Sharkey says the police kept him from winning the world heavyweight boxing championship fight with Jim Corbett in San Francisco, June 28, 1905, while he was still in the Navy, and in New York in 1908. Each time the match was stopped by the police "I was the unluckiest man in the world with Corbett," reminisces Sharkey. "I could have been champion in 1905 except for the police. The first time I fought him was in the old Mechanics Pavilion in San Francisco. I floored him in the first round. He was a clutch one. He'd hold me in a clinch and say to the referee, 'Why don't you make this man quit hitting?' The referee jumped into the ring and stopped it in the fourth round. It was called a draw and there I was, way out in front on points.

"In New York, the police stopped it in the ninth round. Honest John Kelly, the referee, gave me the decision on a foul and called all bets off. Corbett wasn't champ then.

"In 1907, when Corbett lost the

title to Fitzsimmons at Carson City, Nev., I put up \$10,000 to fight the winner but got the run around. I had won from Fitz on a 7th round foul the year before, 1909, when I also boxed Sullivan a three-round exhibition.

Sailor Tom had 54 official fights from 1893 to 1904 and lost to only four men, twice to Jeffries, twice to Gus Ruhlin, whom he knocked once in 27 seconds of the first round; once to Fitzsimmons and to Pete Everett. He was never knocked out but was stopped twice, by Fitzsimmons and Ruhlin. He won his first 18 bouts by knockouts, 11 of them in the first round.

Sharkey laughs now over the only match he lost on a foul—to Pete Everett, a miner and local favorite in Cripple Creek. He knocked out Pete with one punch on the bout opened. The referee turned away. "I rushed over to him and said why don't you count that man out?" Pete wins on a foul," he said. "Like I do, I hit him on the jaw," I said.

"The referee pulled out a .44 gun and said, 'I said Pete wins on a foul.' I looked

at the gun and said O.K. 'You win.'"

Sharkey, now living in San Francisco, is hale and hearty as he approaches his seventieth birthday. He is a government patrolman at the San Francisco Port of Embarkation.

NEARLY 30 years after he broke up his famous \$100,000 infield, Connie Mack still regards that quartet as just about the best in baseball history.

"It was the best infield I ever had," Connie says when conversation turns to the combination of Stuffy McInnis at first base, Eddie Collins at second, Jack Barry at short and Frank Baker at third. "There were two outstanding infields" the sage of Shibe Park declares. "The other was the Chicago Cubs' Chance, Evers, Tinker and Steinfield. There has been a lot of discussion over which was better."

The infield that cost Mack "practically nothing" gained the \$100,000 label after their antics on the diamond had brought the A's four championships and two world series triumphs during the 1910-1914 era. If the foursome had played a decade later, in Babe Ruth's day, it probably would have been known as the million dollar infield.

Connie explained to our Philadelphia operative, Ted Meier, that he was able to get the four for practically nothing because there

Daring Football Expected; Anything Can Happen, Says Bible

AUSTIN, Tex.—There will be no danger of over-coaching in college football next season. So says Dana T. Bible, the veteran University of Texas mentor, who takes the view that the boys will not have much time for athletics and "we certainly will not go through long drills on fundamentals."

"There is a big question as to whether the military groups will have time to take part in inter-collegiate athletics," he said. "If they do have some free time, we certainly should not use all of it in hard grind. We shall have our practice short, snappy and as interesting as possible."

But he thinks the same will have a lot of color. "You can't just expect anything to happen," Bible commented. "In other words, it will be more or less wide open—rather daring."

He also anticipates good attendance at games played in the thickly populated areas.

"There is plenty of money in

circulation and I think these games will be well-attended," he explained. "But there is not going to be the intense interest of other years, and with the people wanting to co-operate in regard to travel and with rationing of gasoline, time, etc., I don't believe people from a distance will come to the games."

He thinks attendance will hold up at Austin, Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth but says "I would imagine places like College Station (where Texas A. and M. is located) and Fayetteville, Ark. (site of the University of Arkansas) would be pretty hard hit."

Bible definitely believes football should be carried on in wartime. "I just don't believe there is any training with the exception of military tactics that prepares a boy more perfectly for the armed forces than a vigorous competitive program," he asserted. "Commenting on the prospect of the use of squads next fall, he

said the schools will get their players from army and navy groups sent back for special courses, from reservists not called to active service, and from other sources.

An announcement recently from Capt. John L. London, commandant of naval unit at the university, indicated that V-12 trainees will be able to participate in football—even on road trips. Capt. London said these trainees may take short out-of-town trips and that leaves may be extended in emergencies or on special conditions.

The Southwest Conference has passed rules permitting trainees to participate in intercollegiate athletics.

A.E.F. Gasoline Is Released To Ease Crisis

100,000 Barrels Distributed But Little Effect Is Noticed

NEW YORK CITY, June 16.—(AP) One hundred thousand barrels of the gasoline stored in New York for the use of the armed forces were released for civilian use during the last week in an effort to alleviate the serious shortage in this area, it was disclosed yesterday at the New York regional office of the Petroleum Administration for War.

The release gasoline, which was taken from reserve stocks that could be replenished before ships had arrived to transport it overseas, was apportioned to a number of large gasoline distributors so that it would go through the regular trade channels. Nearly all of it had been moved by yesterday.

Although the 100,000 barrels or 4,200,000 gallons, represents nearly one-third of the daily allotment in June for the entire seven-state Eastern area, it had apparently had little effect up to today upon the retail gasoline supply in New York.

Louis Kimmel, business manager of the Gasoline Merchants of Brooklyn & Queens, Inc., 4710 Clarendon Road, Brooklyn, said that three-quarters of the association's member stations were closed Saturday, and would remain closed over the week-end.

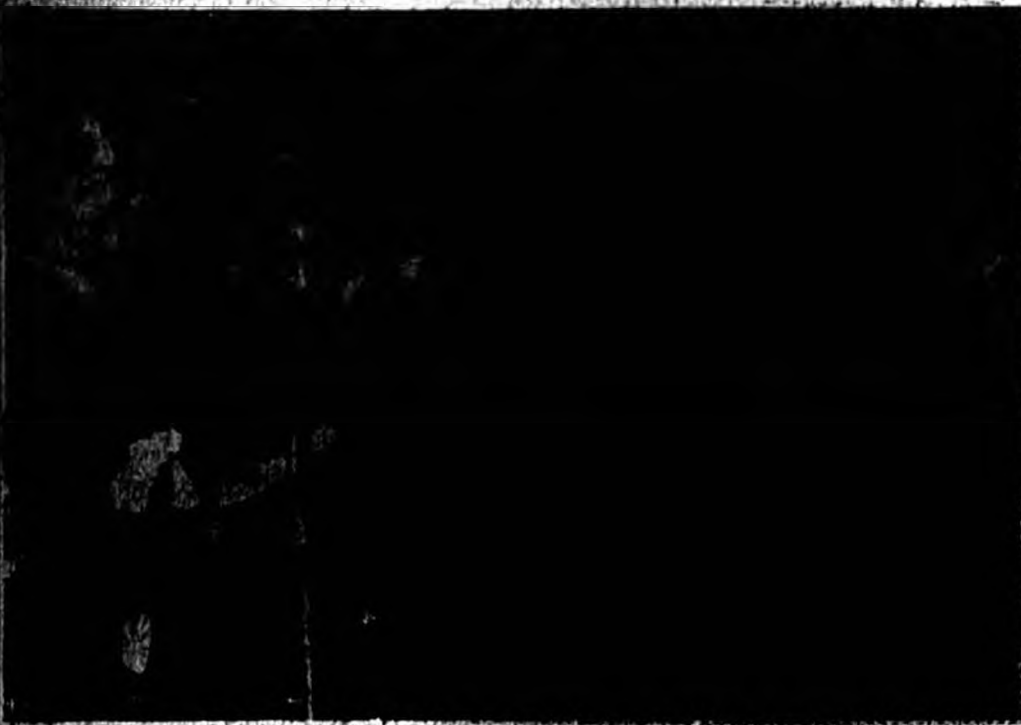

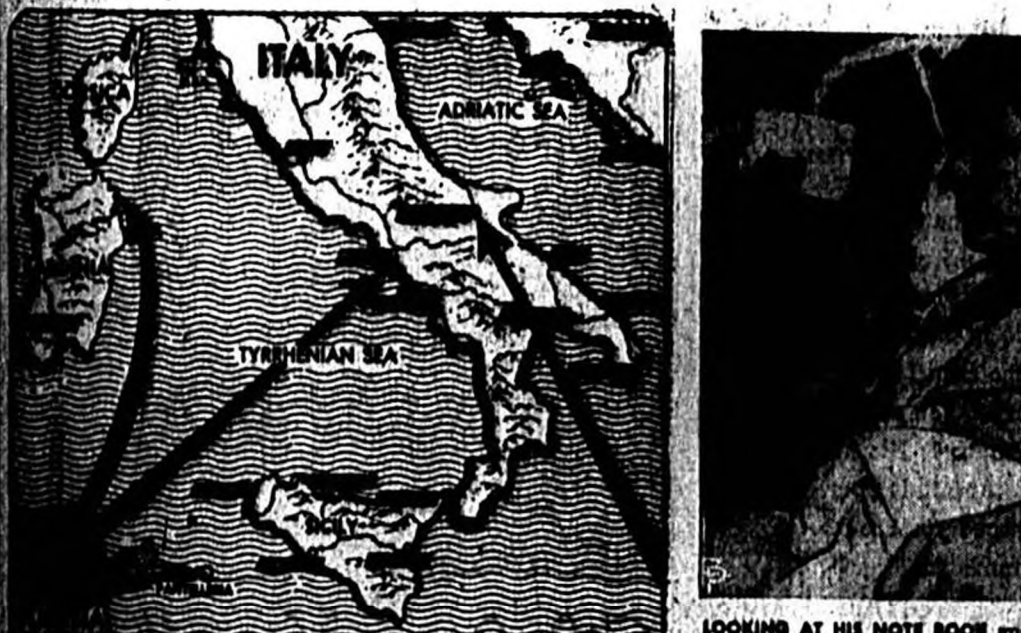

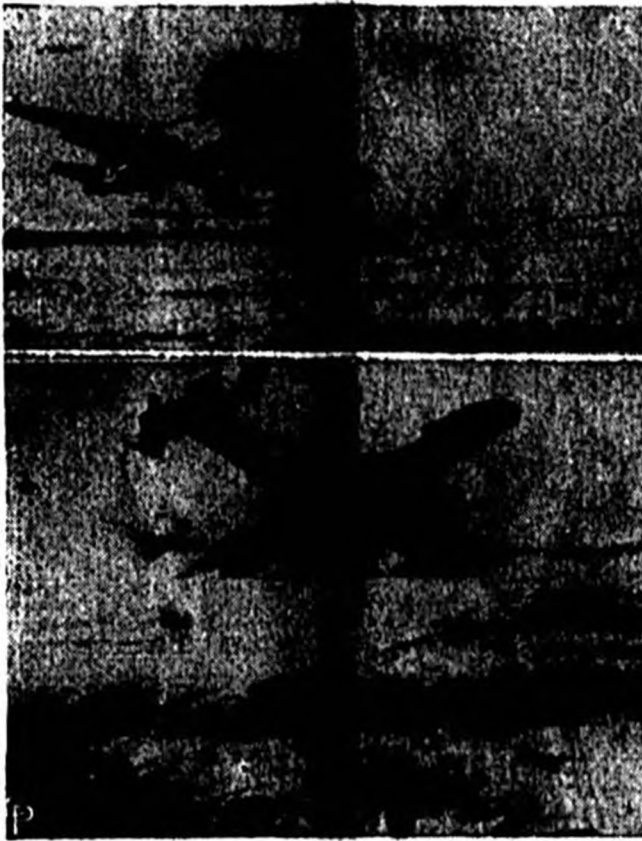
