### Bomb Explosion Blasts Hopes Of European Jews

Jews can be admitted. Yesterday's bomb explosion indicated that peace in Palestine may be a long way off. Police in Jerusalem put the responsibility on Jewish terrorists, and it was by far the worst in the long series of anti-British activities.

American and British experts in London are studying the recommendations of the Anglo-American commission on Palestine, including the proposal that 100,000 Jews be admitted to the Holy Land without delay. Britain has said all along that she cannot support that recommendation.

strengthened the position of the Arabs. They have claimed that their safety is threatened by Jewish immigration into Palestine.

The Jewish agency in London says that at least four prominent Jewish government officials were killed in the hotel blast.

The agency identifies the dead as Julius Jacobs, head of the war supply board, Victor Levi, assistant financial secretary, Leo Baum, assistant to the Palestine post-master general, and Zvi Shimski, recently named to the government secretariat.

The agency also says that an American named E. Sperling was injured. He is described as having served in the Jewish legion of the British army in the first world war.

The blasted hotel was used as the headquarters of the British army and the secretariat of the Palestine government. Palestine civil service workers have scheduled a 15-minute memorial of at-

tribute today for the workers killed in the explosion. The Jewish community council ordered a work stoppage from 3:00 P. M. until tonight as a sign mourning for the victims of the explosion. Arab shops also have closed, and have places of entertainment. A curfew imposed after the blast has been lifted, but the tension continues throughout Palestine.

Fifty persons are missing—among them 12 senior British officers of the government secretariat.

## Reds Reject U.S. Plan For Atom Control

### Gromyko Tells U. N. Atom Energy Committee American Plan Unacceptable

NEW YORK, July 24. (AP)—The American plan for international control of atomic energy collided today head-on with a stone wall of Russian resistance. At a meeting of atomic energy committee number two in New York today, Soviet delegate Andrei Gromyko flatly rejected the major provisions of the American plan.

Referring to a memorandum prepared by Bernard Baruch summing up the American proposals, Gromyko said his government rejected it in whole or in part. Specifically, he turned down the proposal for the establishment of an international atomic development authority and the American demand that veto power over atomic matters be eliminated.

### ABOARD THE USS MOUNT MCKINLEY, July 24. (AP)—A crewman aboard the atomic flag ship Mount McKinley died today and six others are seriously ill from what officers believed were the effects of drinking wood alcohol.

The skipper of the Mount McKinley—Capt. Wayne Gamet—said a preliminary investigation showed that a crewman had obtained fuel used for duplicating machines. The fuel contained methyl alcohol and was in a container marked poison.

Investigators were unable to determine immediately how the others obtained the poisonous liquid. But Gamet said he suspected there was no intention on the part of anyone to poison shipmates.

Ship's officers identified the dead man as Norman First Class Richard Ragan, of Kansas, New York.

The seriously ill were identified as Chief Gunner's Mate Floyd Dale of Wabha, N. C.; Chief Commissary Steward Will Robinson of Wilmington, Calif.; Boat-swain's Mate First Class Russell Ramsey, Jr. of St. Louis; Radioman Second Class Donald Van Mill of Rosholt, S. D.; Radioman Second Class Henry Doll of Rockford, Ill.; and Photographer's Mate Third Class Robert Simpson of San Fernando, Calif.

MOSCOW, July 24. (AP)—A writer in Pravda has made a furious attack on the American FBI for its role in the spy charges made against Russian agent Nikolai Rogov. The writer, David Zaslavsky, called J. Edgar Hoover a bandit, and described Federal Bureau of Investigation agents as Hoover's secret police.

Zaslavsky charged that the FBI had plotted to disrupt friendly relations between the United States and the Soviet Union. He said that this friendship continues despite what he termed American pro-Fascist reaction.

Zaslavsky further described the case as "A filthy provocation by the American secret police." He declared that Rogov's arrest in Oregon in March provided the signal for a wild anti-Soviet campaign.

## University Limits Students To Aug. 15

Due to the large number of applications anticipated for enrollment for the fall semester at the University of Florida, admission will be restricted to those who apply on or before Aug. 15, according to a letter received today by County Supt. T. W. Lawton from University President John J. Tigert.

The University is faced with an unprecedented enrollment, wrote Dr. Tigert, who stated that they were going to admit every qualified Florida student, whether he be a recent high school graduate or an ex-service man.

The housing situation in Gainesville is reported to be acute for married students but every unmarried student who meets requirements, can be admitted, Dr. Tigert wrote.

## MORE SUGAR

WASHINGTON, July 24. (AP)—Agriculture Secretary Clayton Anderson has come back from Havana with good news for American consumers. The Secretary says there'll be more sugar in grocery stores early next year. He would not say, however, how much longer he expects sugar to be rationed.

Mr. Anderson called at the White House to report on the negotiations just concluded with the Cuban sugar growers. Under the contract, the United States will purchase the sugar crops of 1946 and 1947.

## British Issue White Paper On Palestine

### Jewish Agency Said To Have Agreed To 1 Act of Violence To Raise Morale

LONDON, July 24. (AP)—The British government today issued a white paper outlining the evidence on which it based its recent mass arrests of Palestine Jews. The statement said the fact behind the roundup had been gleaned from intercepted communications between Jewish groups in London and Jerusalem.

On the basis of those telegrams the British accuse the Jewish Agency of being involved in recent violence in Palestine. It named specifically Moshe Shertok, head of the agency's political department, and said it had agreed to one act of violence in the Holy Land in order to raise the morale of the Jewish community.

The British statement also asserted that leaders of the agency expressed underground forces to commit acts of violence. Prominent agency officials such as Bernard Joseph, David Ben Gurion and others were said to be linked with armed attacks by these Jewish organizations described in the white paper. The group named were the Haganah, the Stern gang and the Irgun Zvai Leumi.

The Irgun admitted responsibility for the terrorist attack on the King David Hotel in Jerusalem. According to the white paper, the Haganah too ordered from the Jewish Agency in turn the Irgun and Stern gang cooperated with the Haganah in what was termed a fully planned movement of sabotage and violence under the guise of the Jewish resistance movement.

The first of the telegrams which the white paper based on, was dated July 1945. It was a radio message from the Haganah to the British government in London. It called for a Jewish revolt against the British in Palestine. The British government said it had received this message and decided to cause one serious incident in order to influence that policy.

A spokesman for the Jewish Agency in London said the organization had no comment on the white paper.

The health official said that this year's outbreaks may well level off before they reach anything like the explosive outbreaks which occurred in a few states two years ago. Eight states, including Alabama and Florida, have reported more than one hundred cases so far this year. Texas has been worst affected with a total of 391 cases up to July 13.

The Public Health Service classes the disease as epidemic in certain areas of Florida and Alabama. Meanwhile, at Jackson, Miss., Dr. H. I. Case of the State Board of Health says the disease is nearing the epidemic stage in that state. Thirty-three cases have been reported since July 5 and 81 since the first of the year.

Up to July 13, Florida had reported 338 cases, whereas the state had 30 cases up to the same date a year ago. In Alabama, 136 cases have been reported this year, compared with 73 for 1945.

## Two Billion Dollar Public Works Bill Affecting Rivers Is Signed By President

WASHINGTON, July 24. (AP)—It's highly probable that by tomorrow how President Truman feels about the OPA revival bill. White House Press Secretary Charles Ross has announced that Mr. Truman will not very promptly as 3,000 as Congress sends him the measure.

Ross would not forecast whether the Chief Executive will veto or approve the bill which the Senate is expected to pass today. But in any event, he'll send Congress a message or a memo on the subject perhaps tomorrow, says Ross. Administration leaders have predicted that the President will sign the watered-down OPA legislation.

By the stroke of the pen, President Truman today put into effect a large program of public works. He signed two measures authorizing flood control, navigation, hydroelectric power and other projects which will eventually cost 2.5 billion dollars, and which every major river basin in the country will benefit. The bill must be passed by the House before work can actually be started. But the President said that he will not sign any "fancy" bill next session.

At the White House, the White House has been asked to help the Senate War Investigation Committee in its inquiry into a midwest munitions combine. The senators have asked the President who was the committee's first chairman when he was a senator to help them get the income tax records of unindicted key figures in the combine starting operations.

The committee also asked the War Department for full reports on defective shells which killed American soldiers during the war. The shells came from an unidentified source.

The War Department's investigation means that the budget of \$50,000 in new funds to widen the exposure of wartime frauds. Senator Owen Brewster of Maine today described the current inquiry as "only a peek under the hood" of the committee's plans to continue what he called the "biggest scheme of corruption since the Civil War."

We were pleased to see in the Sunday Sentinel a quotation from Police Chief Roy Larsen that Bible study definitely helps in alleviating juvenile delinquency. We have long been of the opinion that the greatest weakness in the modern method of rearing children has been the neglect of the Bible by parents, school teachers and practically all others who are concerned with the education and training of children. In our father's time, even in our own time, studying the Bible was as much a part of our daily lives as breakfast, dinner or supper, and we would no more have thought of going to bed at night without reading our prayers than without reading our Bible. Not many youngsters are brought up that way any more. We don't quite know why. But parents will find the problems in control, discipline and character development will be greatly mitigated if they read their Bible to their children.

Letting in the Light

In every community are persons who are sightless, and who endure their handicap as best they may. Some are resigned, some support their affliction with fortitude, and to some it acts as a challenge, under which they accomplish wonders.

Much has been done to help and to teach the blind and in recent years a technique has been developed which gives sight to some of them. This is the transplanting of corneal tissue from a healthy eye to a blind one. This small cube of clear tissue is obtained from eyes which must be removed because of injury or accident, and occasionally from the dead.

The transplanting operation must be performed within 24 hours after the tissue is removed from the good eye. The cornea is immersed in a salt solution and rushed to the blind person, who is ready for the operation. New York City has an "eye bank" which is a bureau through which are cleared the supply of tissue and the needy cases.

Only a very few of the blind can be helped in this way, but to those few is granted a miracle in every sense of the word.

Fire in the Woods

A reader who summers in Canada writes that she hopes we will keep on trying to make people careful about fire.

"We had just a little fire yesterday, but an eye-opener as to the dangers. We have several small outhouses around the main cabin. There is the inevitable orchard-plumbing and a washbasin. Further from the house, in a depression away from trees is the large box we call the 'gas-station', which holds the coal-oil can and gasoline for the outdoor motor. The latest development is half an icehouse which the handy man started to construct of rags and bobbins of old cedar boards left from broken docks or beach debris.

"We arrived at dusk and, hurrying to make beds, I heard a crackling outside. Thinking it a tourist with a dog, I stepped out to see. Heat assailed me and dull-fog. The wood-burner house was a tower of flame. There was no wind at the moment, no green trees adjoined; it and the birches were wet from an afternoon's rain. But our desperate sense of helplessness and terror lest sparks reach the green bush was a thing we hope never to have again.

"Husband grabbed the available pails of water and I dashed for the car. I was back from the village in record time with a carload of men with pails, and two other cars pulled in behind me. The blaze was soon out and at intervals we went out with pails to make sure no smoldering embers were left. But as I was driving back my heart sank—fifteen minutes was so long and fire in green bush is so swift! It leaps from tree to tree and the hundreds of acres of beautiful forest all around might be black, gaunt devastation to the water's edge.

"Some casual tourist, pursuing, dropped the cigarette and left it not quite out. What a close shave from losing everything of our own and the community's great beauty and asset—its evergreen forest!"

The Glass Flowers

Agnes Taaffe, in a column in The Mimeo-pis Tribune, tells of a visit to the Peabody museum of Harvard University. She says, quite rightly, that "exhibits in the museum are worth a trip across the country any time." She is impressed by those telling stories of days when dinosaurs roamed the earth, stories of the life of Indians, Eskimoes, and of natives of various parts of South America.

Then Miss Taaffe discovered the glass flowers. She says: "No student of botany ever made more wonderful displays than those shown at Harvard. Flowers of every variety and description have been classified and analyzed and their life history recorded on slides that hold the interest of the onlooker for hours—especially if the onlooker has a flair for the scientific. Most of the flowers have been multiplied many times in size and reproduced in glass that looks as natural as the original."

These beautiful exhibits have been famous for many a day and year. Visitors to Boston have often been told, "No matter what else you see, be sure to look at the glass flowers at Harvard." There was a time when some Harvard people were a little worried by this specific fame—they feared lest all Harvard's other glories might be dimmed by it in the public mind. This did not happen, but the glass flowers remain one of the most beautiful exhibits anywhere.

Not all universities can boast treasures so remarkable. Some communities lack universities. But there is hardly a community in the land without some individual point of beauty and interest well worth seeing. Can the reader name offhand the finest thing in his town or region? How often has he been to see it or taken his children to enjoy it with him?

Palestine Violence Blasts Hopes of Jews in Europe

By Associated Press... much as though the Jew is through with Europe. You are likely to please a lot of people when you say that, but the reasons for the statement are a little different than they think.

Even though the United Nations won, the Jews lost. Their battle is being fought now. History has shown that they are hardy souls. And because of their heritage, many of them continue to fight back despite the odds and the frightful losses which the Jews of Europe have suffered.

Thousands of Jews now are wandering through Europe—especially from the eastern zone. They surge over the ruined roads, across the mine-strewn fields, and through the skeletonized towns. But it is not an aimless wandering. There is a purpose. There is leadership, and there is a plan for these remnants of Poland and the Nazi concentration camps.

They hope to go to Palestine, those who have no way of getting to America or perhaps Australia. These wandering Jews see through borders. Many of them are attacked and looted of what few belongings they have left—as in Poland; but the movement continues. The Allied commission has closed the displaced persons camps in the north, but the crowds surge on. UNRRA camps take them in, clothe, feed, and clean them. For many, the immediate goal is southern Italy. Along the Adriatic coast there are coastwise vessels and tramp steamers. These are what they want. Under trained leadership, and financed by what they can sell and some aid from abroad, they buy or charter vessels.

At last they are off to Palestine. Not gaily, not with music and hunting, but with hope and those ships are intercepted by the British and the passengers are herded into detention camps in Palestine. But none of the wanderers will believe that modern arms can keep them out. It is doubly tragic, therefore, that their hope and prayer—refuge in Palestine—may be frustrated by the violence of misguided extremists.

Unfortunately, this heightens the problem of the Jew in Europe. There are believed to be less than one and-a-half million of the six million Jews who were in what is called non-Russian Europe before the war. The soft ones were exterminated. Most of those left are tough and aggressive. They know what they want—and what they want is to get away from their oppressors.

One of the allegations of anti-Semitic Europeans—and there are millions of them—is that the Jews are the brains and backbone of the black market in the old country. Certainly, there are Jews in the black market. But the charge is ridiculously overdrawn, for the black market works wherever there is greed and the Jews obviously have no monopoly on cupidity.

Australia In Jam. But What Can It Do?

MELBOURNE. (AP)—The U. S. shortage of tinplate may delay for months the canning of the bulk of Australian Jam and meat this season.

Melbourne can makers have warned that if supplies of tinplate do not improve, the food processing industry will face a crisis. The average quarterly allotment of tinplate from the U. S., Australia's biggest supplier, was said to have dropped from 55,000 to 27,000 tons. The commonwealth government has resumed control over tinplate.
