Main British Blow Is Yet To Fall In Egypt, Says Cairo

U. S. Pilots Credited With Good Desert Fighting, 1,450 Axis Prisoners Taken

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27. (AP)—Two new bombing raids on Japanese installations, including a submarine base on the Ryukyu Islands in the Philippines, were reported today by the Navy. The mention of the submarine base was the first reference to such installation in island chain reaching westward from Alaska.

Both bombing assaults were made by Army planes. No report of the damage inflicted was given. The Navy said anti-aircraft fire in both raids but no aerial resistance was encountered.

A Cairo dispatch today said the main blow from the British eighth army is yet to fall in the Egyptian struggle. British troops are moving cautiously.

American pilots over the desert were credited with doing an "excellent job". Behind the lines, the first batch of 1,450 Axis prisoners, including 600 Germans, were moved to the rear for internment.

An earlier dispatch reported German Field Marshal Rommel's frantic efforts to rush reinforcements and supplies across the Mediterranean coast. He had heavy losses as Allied planes shot down four Junkers-52 troop-carrying planes and damaged several more, and blew up a munitions ship near Tobruk.

Tanks made in the United States, and Britain, and British, Indian, Australian, South African, New Zealand, Greek and Fighting Force units are being moved to the front by air. The turning point of the war will be reached on the El Alamein line in Egypt, and on the Stalingrad and Tsupone fronts in Russia.

Our tanks, following the infantry spearheads, are a force of Rommel's panzers which fled after a sharp duel, leaving many blazing tanks on the field, according to a dispatch from United Press correspondent, Richard D. McMillan. The clash was in a gap held by British and Australian troops. The main tank battle are yet to be joined, however, as Rommel so far has risked only groups of "mediums."

Taxi Ordinance Passed By City Commissioners

Requirements Of Cab Drivers Altered Slightly In Bill

Following considerable discussion during past meetings, the City Commission at their meeting last evening, passed an ordinance regulating the operation of taxicabs and fares charged within the City of Sanford. The city clerk revealed today.

It is required that all persons operating taxicabs within the City must obtain a written permit at the City clerk's office within the next 30 days in order to operate. The penalty for violation of this law, it is stated, is a fine of up to \$200 or imprisonment up to 90 days.

The ordinance also provides for the following: laborer, taxicab driver, electrician, janitor, lead painter, plumber, operator of gas lines, distributing system, electrician, mechanic, pipefitter, office helper, men and women interested in employment will be required to fill out civil service Form 56 if they are tradesman and Form 57 if they are clerical workers.

West Point Football Team Compared With Commandos

WEST POINT, N. Y., Oct. 27.—High up here on the hills above the curving Hudson, there's an army task force that has taken its objectives this fall with speed, thoroughness and a minimum expenditure of ammunition.

It's a small squad of some thirty bluish-grey uniformed men whose victims say they strike with the suddenness and fierceness of Commando raiders. It's the gridiron detail of the United States Military Academy, strong, fast, talented youngsters who have an assignment mapped out for them every afternoon this fall.

In this war year military authorities say Army should have that know-no-rival it can't whip. That's the kind of football team it appears Earl (Red) Blaik has welded at The Point.

It has driven through one-third of its schedule without danger, without having to expend its forces and without having to reveal battle strategy formulated for more crucial engagements.

These Kaylets, the best to represent the Military Academy in some years, have beaten Lafayette, Cornell and Columbia. It's a fast striking unit that gets the jump on its foes, piles up an early advantage and then stands ready to lay more on if it is needed. It scored in three minutes against Cornell, six minutes against Columbia. It banged out a first-quarter touchdown lead over both foes.

It came on with a quick thrust that shakes a sprinting, halfback loose and on the touch-down trail before its foes suspect disaster is at hand. It led Lafayette by shooting mercury-footed Ralph Hill through and opening for a 72-yard scoring dash. It twice astounded Columbia by suddenly shacking the Lion defenders while Captain Hank Masur bounded downfield on a 65 and 70 yard sprint.

This is an alert task force, well-trained in anti-aircraft warfare. It faced Columbia's Paul Gorman, with college football's best pitching average, and replied almost at once with a club that threw, racing one back 40 yards for a touchdown. Gorman completed 10 of 28 against them, but none were in the scoring zone, and six were bagged.

(Special)—The Florida Gators, seemingly irked by the 28-12 defeat handed them by Mississippi State at Saturday's homecoming, began determined preparations Monday for their next grid battle of the season Saturday afternoon at Washington, D. C., with the University of Maryland Terps.
