Not they fall to reveal the facts that the public should know. Newspapers that are dedicated to the progress and success of the community they trys are self-censored when it comes to minating from its columns information that is controlled by statute.

We do not have a "SECRET" government cluttered with classified files that keep from citizens vital infomation which NOT at the grass roots level-at least.

Due difficulty a reporter or newspaper water often has, when covering local happarings and government news, is persuadng officials that he does'nt want information just for his newspaper's own selfish purposes, but rather for the information of people-and after all, it's their government! They're paying the bill.

Some officials just can't seem to understand this. They may not say so outright, but they seem to think that what happens in their office or under their jurisdiction is their business, and that the newspaper has a lot of nerve asking them what's going

And, what is even more unfortunate. there are citizens who, on first impulse at least, support the official. This is particularly, true if they think news shouldn't be released because of security reasons.

And of course, as any newspaperman will agree, there is some information that REALLY SHOULD RE CLASSIFIED. But not nearly as much as is.
