German scientiate and engineers streeting with the problem of sing dust, waste, residues and even ground insects in motors have just received word that experiments of Dr. El. Wahl, of the Schichau shipyards, with dust combustion engines are nearing

omoustion engines are nearing success.

One of the main obstacles of last as fuel—the heavy wear and lear on the motor by grinding sahes—has been successfully overcome, declares Dr. Wahl. He mays the Schichau company has leveloped a metal alloy which is larder than any known steel and herefore suitable for a motor designed to run on dust.

Previous attempts with dust combustion motors failed, explaine Dr. Wahl, because usually after 50 hours trial tun the cylinders and pistons were worn to pieces of the grinding effects of the extremely hard residue of hurnt fust.

The new metal alloy, however, sithstands, the hardest grinding, in says, eiting that only 1-700 of a millimeter was ground off the ylinder walls of a motor made the new metal during a test of 180 hours.

The experiments are part of the nation's four-year plan to achieve conomic self-sufficiency.

Dr. Dahl says his "dust eater" is not much bigger than an orditary motorcycle engine, but delines to divulge further details, except to say that it runs on almost every kind of properly powderized dust, such as that of brown coal, hard coal, saw dust, comnants of grain, beech nuts, opra, cocos powder, rice, hay and wen ground grasshoppers.


