France Denies Ultimatum On War Shipping

Japanese Agree That "Warning" Against Sales To Chinese Was Not Ultimatum

Japs Proclaim Blockade Rights

Material Aid To China Would Be Hostile Act, Japanese Say

PARIS, Nov. 18.—(AP)—French Foreign Office and the Japanese Embassy formally denied today that France had received an ultimatum from Japan to cease transporting war materials to China over the French-owned railroad from Indo-China to Yunnan. Nevertheless Senator Harry Berenger, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, who declared in a speech that Japan had "warned" France, still insisted his statement held good since he had not used the word "ultimatum."

In Brussels it was said Japan would regard as a hostile act by the countries concerned any decision by the Brussels conference to accede to China's appeal for material aid in the Far Eastern conflict.

If the Brussels conference of 19 countries decides upon aid to China, as asked by Dr. V. K. Wellington Koo, Chinese ambassador to France and conference delegate, Japanese circles said, Japan would have to consider the situation "very seriously."

Bishop Of Puerto Rico Preaches Here Soon

The Rt. Rev. Charles Blayney Coleman, Bishop of Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, will preach at the Holy Cross Episcopal Church here Sunday, according to the Rev. Martin J. Bean, pastor of the church.

The Rev. Coleman has served as Bishop in the mission work for 24 years and has had considerable experience even prior to that time. In 1905 he went to Cuba to become the Dean of the Trinity Cathedral in Havana and has served in that field since that time.

High Explosives Alleged Center Found Cached In Of Lottery Ring Paris "Fortress" Raided Yesterday

Hooded Terrorists Organization Suspected Of Revolution

PARIS, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Discovery of enough high explosives to blow up one-fourth of Paris and secret "forgeries" crammed with machine guns and hand grenades last night spurred a nationwide roundup of France's "hooded men" allegedly organizing for a rightist revolution.

Authorities charged that the hooded terrorists, known as "Les Casagouards," received support from the Spanish rebels and other fascist regimes.

Col. Francois de la Roque, leader of the outlawed Croix de Feu (cross of fire), also was suspected of having some connection with the "hooded men." One of the five persons arrested last night was Rene Anceaux, former president of the Dieppe division of the Croix de Feu.

Police announced they had uncovered a bomb-proof "post of command" with an elaborate system of sliding walls and secret passages.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—(AP)—A near-agreement in the Senate Agriculture Committee on farm control legislation brought a promise today of a break in the endless debate which has dominated the special congressional session.

Senator Bailey, North Carolina Democrat, carried on the southern filibuster against the anti-teaching legislation in the Senate. But Chairman Smith, South Carolina Democrat, said yesterday the "near" agreement was a "very" important step toward the legislation.

Appeal Is Made For Adherence To Principles Of Fathers

The Constitution of the United States represents the most democratic principles of government since the beginning of history. Judge Millard P. Smith told his audience at their weekly luncheon in the Y.M.C.A. hotel yesterday, urging those present to continue their respect for the document.

P. E. Campbell, chairman of the program committee, introduced the speaker who stated his opposition to use of high pressure methods to obtain an end.

Judge Smith mentioned the CIO as an organization using these methods to enforce their terms through "sit down" strikes, and censured propagandists who are attempting to bring about fundamental changes through statements which are too often untrue and not based on facts.

Such propaganda is often circulated to bring about confusion which in many instances are undesirable. Judge Smith pointed out adding that the people read and study in order that they may distinguish between statements of facts and propaganda.

The greatest amount of independence should prevail for all government agencies in order that the system of checks and balances set up in the Constitution might continue to operate, he said.

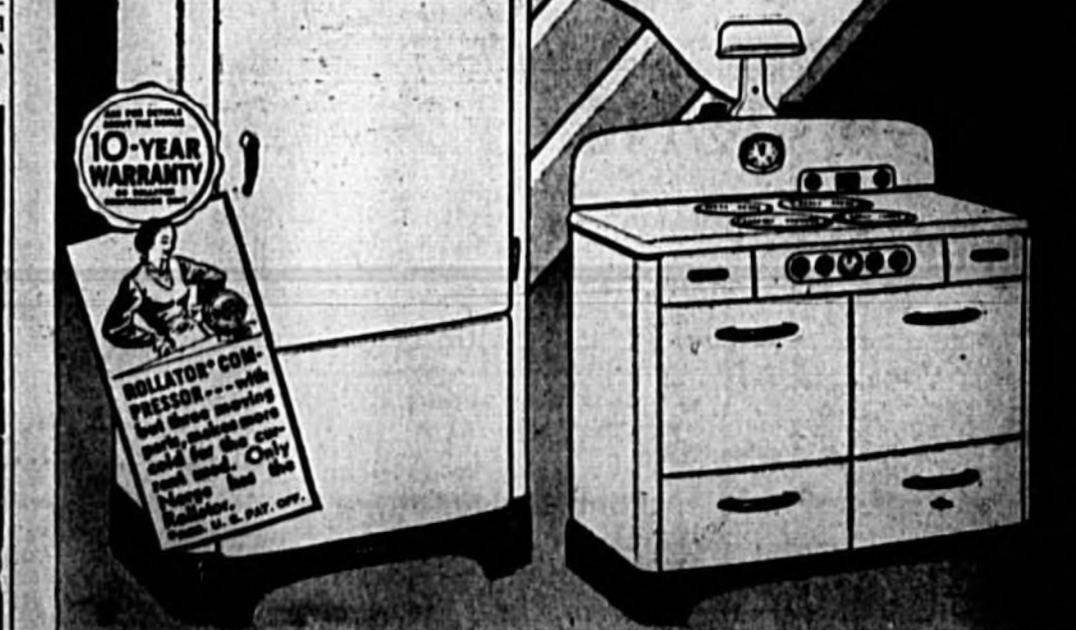

Japanese Capture Gate Of Kashing, Keystone Of Line

Thousands Flee Cities As Jap Warnings Predict New Air Raids

SHANGHAI, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Japanese army spokesmen announced tonight that Japanese troops trying to break through China's "Hundred-mile Line" between Shanghai and Nanking had captured one gate on the walled city of Kashing, the southern bastion of the line.

Both the Chinese and Japanese reported heavy fighting in the area around Kashing, 20 miles southwest of Shanghai and 20 miles south of Soochow, the main point of the Chinese defenses.

The Chinese told of spirited engagements at the Seven Star bridge, four miles northeast of Kashing. The Japanese said they were unable to state officially what their forces had captured in the city.

Reports of the Japanese push against the southern wing of the defenses stretching from the Yangtze River to Hangchow Bay came a few hours after an official government warning that several mass migrations of civilians from Nanking.

For 48 hours the Chinese had held their own along the length of the defenses to which they retreated after Shanghai fell into hands on Nov. 8.

Continued From Page One chambers and that evidence seized there would lead to more arrests within 24 hours.

The terrorists were said by police to have been recruited from impatient partisans of several rightist organizations, but as the evidence was studied at the sur-realist national last night author-ities suddenly ordered a veil of silence thrown over the entire affair.

Proof of the continued existence and plotting of the "hooded men" despite a roundup of their members six weeks ago follow-ing the bombings of two employ-ers' syndicate buildings fell un-expectedly into the hands of police Tuesday night. They captured a truck load of arms and ammu-nition outside a house undergoing a perfunctory search on the Rue Ribera.

The driver, unaware of the raid, drove up while it was in progress. The five arrests fol-lowed swiftly.

The bomb proof shelters and arms caches were brought to light and Anceaux was said to have surrendered plans showing that he constructed "military works."

Jean Vasselie, another rightist, was arrested and charged with helping to build the bomb-proof shelters, one of which was found in the cellar of a garage owned by Robert de la Motte de Saint Pierre, a royalist whom po-lice quoted as saying the place formerly had been stocked with arms.

Special detachments of mobile guards surrounded several im-portant ministries last night, sup-portedly as result of the discov-eries of arms, arsenals and con-crete shelters in the very heart of Paris.

Guards at the entrance to the ministry of interior and ministry of posts and telegraphs were strengthened.

It was understood that the gov-ernment is taking "a most serious view" of the situation after un-covering two tons of weapons, munitions and explosives.

The explosives were credit-able of the most powerful known. The cache on the Rue Ribera produced more than 100,000 cart-ridges, many of which were for anti-aircraft use, 500 machine guns and six cases of hand grenades.

Throughout Tuesday night po-lice battered down walls of the building and discovered secret chambers and a concrete "cham-ber of command" such as for-tresses have.

The chamber contained tele-phones, loud speakers and micro-phones connected with other parts of the building and protected by an armored door requiring 30 men to lift. The cheddite was found in a concrete chamber, wrapped in asbestos.

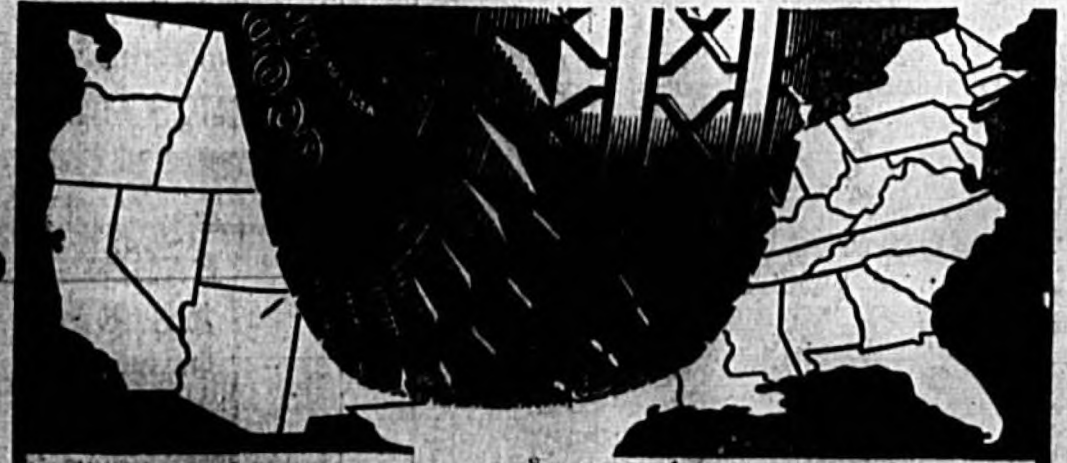

Dust Is Studied For Use As Fuel

ELRING, Germany, Nov. 13. (AP)—Dust and powdered grasshoppers soon may serve the Fatherland as motor fuel.

German scientists and engineers wrestling with the problem of using dust, waste, residues and even ground insects in motors have just received word that experiments of Dr. E. Wahl, of the Schichau shipyards, with dust combustion engines are nearing success.

One of the main obstacles of dust as fuel—the heavy wear and tear on the motor by grinding ashes—has been successfully overcome, declares Dr. Wahl. He says the Schichau company has developed a metal alloy which is harder than any known steel and therefore suitable for a motor designed to run on dust.

Previous attempts with dust combustion motors failed, explains Dr. Wahl, because usually after 50 hours trial run the cylinders and pistons were worn to pieces by the grinding effects of the extremely hard residue of burnt dust.

The new metal alloy, however, withstands the hardest grinding, he says, citing that only 1-700 of a millimeter was ground off the cylinder walls of a motor made of the new metal during a test of 150 hours.

The experiments are part of the nation's four-year plan to achieve economic self-sufficiency.

Dr. Wahl says his "dust motor" is not much bigger than an ordinary motorcycle engine, but declines to divulge further details, except to say that it runs on almost every kind of properly powdered dust, such as that of brown coal, hard coal, saw dust, remnants of grain, beech nuts, copra, cocoa powder, rice, hay and even ground grasshoppers.

Thousands Are Idle As Result 'Of Sitdowns'

3 Goodyear Plants With 12,000 Workers Shut Down Following 'Sit-Down' Strike

General Motors, Fisher Body Hit

Few Hundred Sitdown Strikers In Pontiac Lose Work For 14,721

AKRON, Ohio, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Twelve thousand Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company employes were idle today as the result of a "sit-down" precipitated by a scheduled layoff of 1,000 workers.

Operations were suspended in three plants of the largest of Akron's big three rubber companies.

John House, president of the Goodyear local, United Rubber Workers of America, called a union meeting for Sunday to consider the "sitdowns." He said the strike started at midnight, without union authorization.

A few hundred men whose sit-down strike in the Fisher plant in Pontiac closed two automotive factories employing 34,721, held their ground today and neither General Motors Corporation nor the United Automobile Workers of America professed to know of plans for peace negotiations.

Company officials said that neither the Fisher plant nor the Pontiac Motor Company plant would reopen before Monday.

E. P. Fisher, general manager of the Fisher plant, said that General Motors, attributed the strike to "radical misinterpretation" and described it as a "flagrant and lawless violation of the agreement between General Motors Corporation and the U. A. W."

The strike was the third in a General Motors plant since U. A. W. delegates last Sunday rejected a proposed new agreement with the corporation.

Richard T. Frankenstein, assistant president of the international union, said that "General Motors could have prevented all of this trouble by offering the union a sufficiently decent contract."

Corcoran, five years prominent in Northwest labor circles, was shot once behind the left ear Wednesday night, apparently while making a desperate effort to escape his assassin.

His body was found early yesterday under a blanket of snow near his home in an exclusive residential district.

Before his body was discovered the telephone rang in the home of S. J. Justen, wife of the business agent for the laundry, linen and dry cleaners' St. Paul local. Mrs. Justen answered.

"Two more are to go," the voice on the telephone said. "There's going to be a mopping up of some other leaders. It's going to be a cleaning up of some of these dictators."

Eril Martin, district organizer for the international association of bridge, structural and ornamental iron workers, A. F. of L. affiliate, also was called to the telephone at about the same time.

"After you read today's papers you will know we mean business," a man at the other end of the line told him. The informant hung up immediately. Martin said he had received a (Continued on page two)

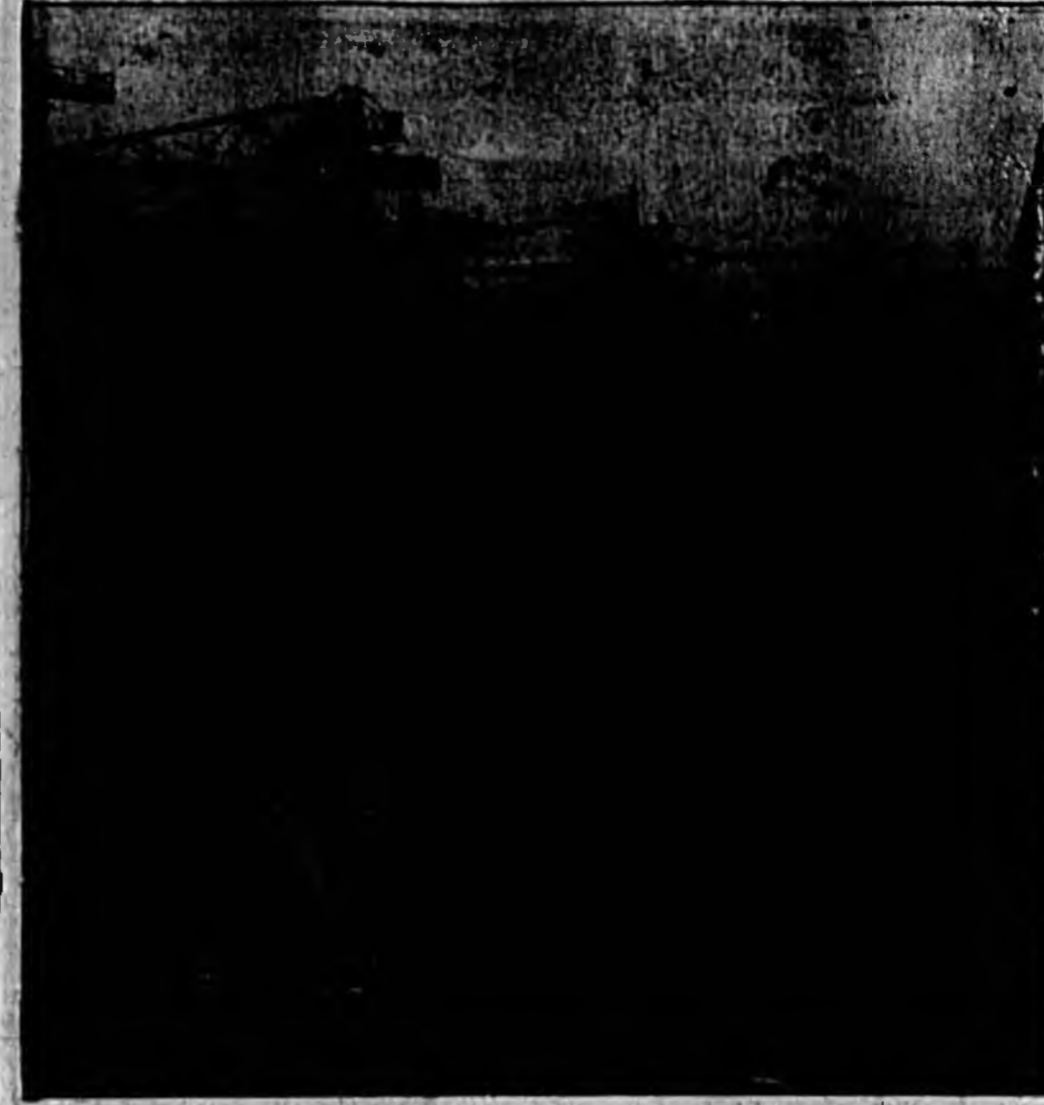
