U. S. WILL NOT HAVE STRINGS TIED ON DEBTS

Won't Accept Amount Due With Reservation It Be Credited As Capital Payment

(By The Associated Press)
Consideration of America's latest note explaining that the President and his cabinet have no authority to postpone debt installments due Thursday occupied the attention today of the British and French governments.

The issue must come before them tomorrow or Wednesday. There is a report in London, that England will pay the \$95,000,000 due Thursday with reservations that it be credited as a capital payment despite the clear assertion that the United States is not prepared to receive it as such.

In Paris Premier Herriot said he will not make his final decision of policy until he knew what England is going to do. Addressing the Chamber of Deputies, Herriot said the debt moratorium which Hoover declared last year was the cause of all present troubles in which America's debtors are involved.

Within less than six hours the American reply, drafted by Stimson and Secretary Mellon, with the telegraphic co-operation of President Hoover, was in the hands of the British ambassador.

"I must call your attention to the fact that the secretary of the treasury has no authority to accept payment from your government," Stimson said, "except as provided under the terms of the funding agreement."

FREUD DEFENDS HIS SCIENTIFIC STATUS IN BOOK

VIENNA, Dec. 12.—Sigmund Freud, world famous psychologist, in a new book appearing in Vienna this week vigorously defends the scientific status of psychoanalysis.

He raps the knuckles of novelists and conversationalists who wisecrack about the study, and asserts the opinion that the scientific world will soon be compelled to take mental telepathy and thought transference more seriously.

While warning his reader that he is not yet ready to say that mental telepathy has been proved or that his himself is entirely convinced of its validity, Dr. Freud cites abundant material drawn from psychoanalysis which he contends, to substantiate theories of thought transference and telepathy.

The volume is entitled "A New Series of Introductory Lectures on Psychoanalysis." It contains seven chapters written in lecture form, but never intended to be delivered from a rostrum.

The book opens as though Dr. Freud were standing before those who heard his introductory lectures in May, 1917.

In 256 pages he discusses revision of the dream theory, dream analysis, the overall dissection of psychic personality, fear, femininity, applications of psychoanalysis and, in the final chapter, religious and intellectual nihilism and nihilism.

Dr. Freud analyzes the present economic crisis as the price the world is paying for the latest tremendous conquest over nature, namely, aviation.

The World War became possible, the eminent psychologist explained, when Blount flew over the English Channel, and became inevitable when Germany developed a Zeppelin capable of flying over Britain.

The psychologist said, in the interim, that he views the Soviet regime as a gigantically daring attempt to remake the social order. He added however that he fears the future may show that this attempt was made too soon.

WOMEN DRY TESTIFY UPON LIQUOR EVILS

Appear Before House Committee Charging Beer Would Decrease Revenues

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(AP)—A dozen women brought to the House Ways and Means Committee today testified that beer would decrease the source of taxable wealth by reducing the productivity of citizens. Led by Mrs. Henry Peabody, the women opened up a modification of the Volstead Act testified that beer is intoxicating that even a small amount of alcohol tended to slow down the laborer and the efficiency of the government as a result of the diminished output of the laborer.

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U. S. AFFIRMS ITS DESIRE TO AID ARMS CUT

Hopes Without Delay To Work Out Plan Which Will Effect Substantial Slash

GENEVA, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The United States, in a document the chief of her arms delegation, Norman H. Davis, signed yesterday, declared its resolve to cooperate in the disarmament conference with a view to seeking substantial arms reduction.

The United States and four other nations, the statement reads, hope without delay to work out a conventional reduction and a limitation of armaments with the program for a ten per cent reduction in arms.

With America in the determination to Great Britain, France, Germany, and Italy, entirely what Mr. Davis said he hoped for the head of the American delegation and he considers that other peoples now feel there is a normal commitment to the task of disarmament at the Christmas holidays.

There is a real war convention, the statement says, already made and it is to be presented to the world before Christmas.

The American said, however, that he is satisfied that the disarmament conference will be a success.

The big step in the agreement is that Germany has signed her willingness to resume her arms production.

Mrs. Morse also reported that probably half of these families have been assured some sort of Christmas cheer through the generosity of several church groups which have promised to assume the responsibility but that there is an urgent need that other groups or individuals come forward quickly, so that every family will be reached.

The urgent persons or groups who are planning to lend a hand on Christmas Day to report their intention to her or the following members of a Special Christmas fund committee: Mrs. W. L. Moore, Mrs. Allan H. Stone, Mrs. W. H. Trafford and Mrs. H. M. W. Smith. These women, Mrs. Morse said, will create a large fund of their own during the next few days and will devote the interest of the fund to the care of the needy.

WINTRY BLAST LEAVES DEATH TRAIL IN WAKE

Most Of Nation Hit By Low Temperatures, Snow, Rain, or Sleet; Cold In California

Winter struck at the nation prematurely again today with sub-zero temperatures, snow, rain, and sleet leaving a trail of death.

Slippery streets accounted for most of the deaths in traffic accidents. Pennsylvania alone reported 13 persons killed while nine lost their lives in California.

The heaviest snow of the season fell in Pennsylvania, while the East generally experienced snow or rain with fog extending to the South.

Sub-zero temperatures were reported in the Far West. Rocky Mountain states and portions of the Mid-West. San Francisco, with 27 degrees, was the coldest in 62 years and the cold wave with snow extended as far south as San Diego.

In the South, temperatures ranged from sub-freezing in Virginia, which also reported snow, to balmy weather in Louisiana. Torrential rains fell in North Carolina.

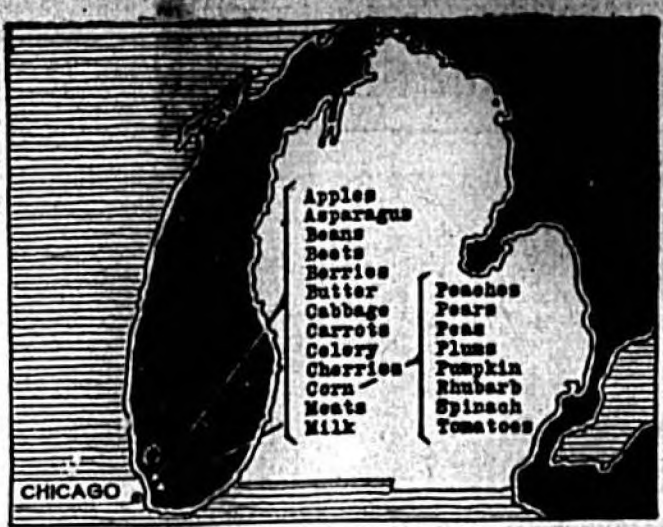
