





Only Selected ROTC Students Are Subject To Deferment. Draft Boards Told

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6-(P)-The Senate today defeated 77 to 14 in an attempt to limit to three years the service terms of all volunteets for the armed forces.

Senator Morse (R-Ore) proposed it as an amendment to the broad Universial Military Training and Service bill. He contended the Air Force, Navy and Marines had "high-pressured" thousands of young men to enlist for four years. 'to avoid being drafted into the infantry."

At present the Army has a minimum of three years for volunteers. The Air Force, Navy and Marines require me to sign up for at least four years.

The measure before the Senate would extend the draft to 18-yearolds. It also would provide machinery for Universal Military Training, but a group of senators, let by Taft and Bricker, Ohio Republicans, and Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo), want to knock that section out of the bill.

At the same time Selective Service advised draft boards that only selected students in Reserve Officers Training Corps programs are eligible for deferment from the draft.

our very right to exist as a sovereign people and a nation. Our men are fighting a war. We are trying to prevent that war from spreading into a great world struggle, trying to establish secure peace and justice in the world. We are trying to strengthen and encourage our friends, and to make

They call for concentration of effort and purpose at least equal to that required for total war.
