

30,000 YANKEES TO VISIT FRANCE FOR CONVENTION

Thousands Of Ex-Doughboys Will Be Accompanied By Wives Who Plan To Take Paris For Annual Session

INDIANAPOLIS, April 26-(INS)- Approximately 30,000 Americans, ex-soldiers mostly accompanied by their wives, fathers, mothers and other relatives will swoop down on France next Sep-tember for the annual convention of the American Legion, reports at the National headquarters here indicate.

At least, that is the estimate of James F. Barton, national adjutant, who says reservations have been made to accommodate the voung army when it arrives in Paris for the meeting scheduled to start September 19. The conven-tion will officially close in September 23.

But there are many things planned for the "second invasion" of France. The Legion convention France. The Legion convention will be only a minor part of the trip. Those going will be given an opportunity to visit all the battle-fields, do a little globe trotting, and in the case of some, look up friends made during the sojourn of 1917-18-19.

Elaborate Plans

A committee, known among Legionaries as the "Paris Conven-tion Committee," has made elaborate and detailed plans to handle

the young army. Seven of the trans-Atlantic steamship lines have been induced to designate certain ships re "Le-gion boats" for the voyage across. These snips will start from New York, Montreal, Hampton Roads, Boston, Charleston, Jacksonville,

Galveston and New Orleans. Americans going to Paris on the Legion ships will be given the entire run of the boats, irrespective of classes, under the present arrangements, with a possible ex-ception of the Levintion, flagship of the crusade.

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




