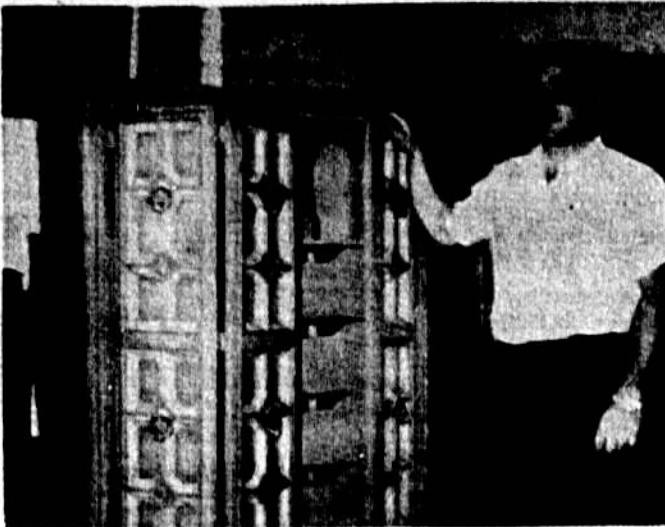

Safety Helmets Required For Motorcyclists

A motorcyclist wearing a safety helmet reduces his risk of being killed in an accident 59 per cent, according to a study by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Motorcycle registrations in Florida rose from 21,442 in 1965 to 46,772 in 1966 for a gain of 47 per cent, while fatalities from two-wheeled vehicles increased almost 100 per cent — 30 deaths in 1965 and 56 in 1966, most of them in the 16-24 age group.

In 1966, an estimated 2,000 persons across the country died in motorcycle accidents. Motorcycle accidents in relation to the number of motorcycles in the country is twice as high as the comparable rate for autos. Approximately two million motorcycles are registered in the United States.

Music Booms Into Big Business

NEW YORK (AP) — A lot more than the hills are alive with the sound of music in the United States.

The echo is being heard from the mountains, to the prairies, to the oceans, accompanied by a louder and louder tune on the cash registers of the music industry.

In 1950, there were 12 million amateur musicians banging, tooting and strumming away in the United States, according to the American Music Conference.

But by the beginning of this year, the ranks of the music men, women and children had swollen to more than 41 million. About 15 million of these range from 4 to 21, and the other 26 million are over 21.

"Amateur musicians in the United States increased by an average of approximately a million annually from 1950 to 1961," says the conference, which describes itself as an educational organization supported by major segments of the music industry.

"From 1952 to 1966, however, the average annual increase exceeded 1.8 million with dramatic increases of 2.3 million in 1965 and again in 1966.

"There is a higher level of education in the country and a greater need for individual creativity," says Martin Egbert, the conference's educational director. "This combination is part of the great atmosphere that exists for music making."

Egbert also cites new teaching techniques which make learning music fun and not a chore—plinking out the "Swanee Waltz" on the piano every day for a month is out—and the "growing awareness generally in education that things like music and art are needed to balance their programs. Almost every school today has a music program."

Or, as the member of a youth folk rock 'n' roll group puts it, musical instruments are a way for young people to express themselves.

A total of 1,430,000 guitars was sold in 1966, says the conference, and more than 4,600,000 guitars have been purchased during the past four years.

Courthouse Suit Set Tomorrow

The long-awaited courthouse injunction suit will come to trial tomorrow morning starting at 9:30 before Judge Roger Dykes with a host of witnesses expected to be called.

Attorney for the plaintiffs, Harlan Tuck, reported today he plans to call Circuit Court Clerk Arthur Beckwith Jr. as well as County Commission Chairman John Alexander. County Attorney Harold Johnson said he doesn't plan to call "any special" witnesses. However, there is a possibility he may call Architect John Burton IV. Most of the county's testimony already has been presented in the form of minutes for County Commission meetings.

City of Sanford entered the case to show it is the permanent county seat. City Attorney William Hutchison reported he will call appraiser A. R. Peterson Jr. and Sanford City Manager W. F. Knowles.

On Aug. 18 Judge Dykes denied a motion by the attorney for the two South Seminoles residents who filed the suit for summary judgment on account of the complaint which alleges no notice of the county's intent to consider building a courthouse was published.

Hunt On For Three New School Sites

School officials will start hunting for three possible elementary school sites south of the Piercefield School, Weathersford and Lake Howell areas immediately to handle overcrowded conditions in the county.

Under normal growth within the next five years school population is expected to jump to 21,000. It is now at 12,000. However, indications are with the new Florida Technical University and Disney World complex, school officials estimate population could hit the 25,000 figure.

An informal meeting Wednesday night Sept. 27, Mayor William Phillips urged the board to start checking sites "now" and not wait until it is too late and property owners way out of proportion.

The most critical areas will be in the Sunland Estates area, Lake Howell including Tanglewood, Eastbrook and Weathersford.

At the present time Pine Crest Elementary School enrollment is over 1,000.

An elementary school 1.5 miles east of the Interstate 4 on the south side of Paola Road and elementary schools in the Sunland Estates area and possibly three miles east of the Lake Mary School.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — The first classroom showdown in Florida's educational spending problems developed today as Pinellas County teachers' union opened the state's fifth largest, opening the new school year with half of its 3,500 teachers preparing to resign before class.

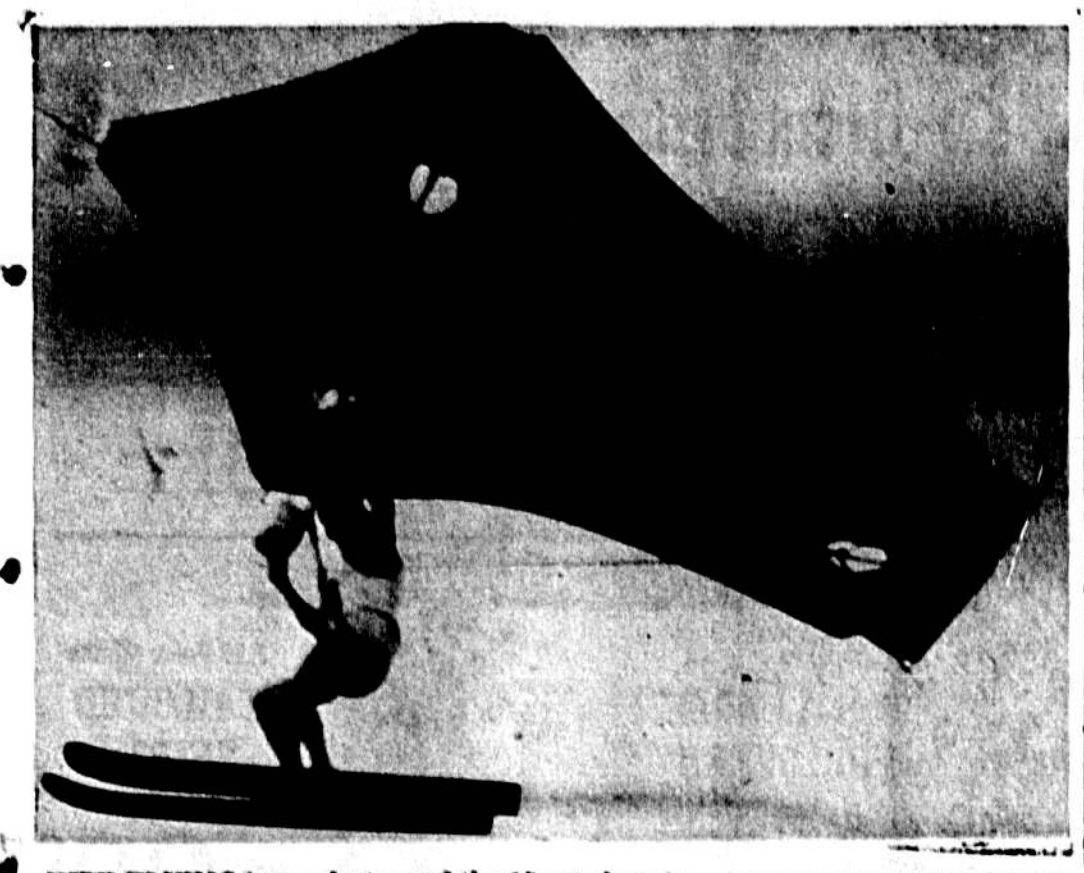

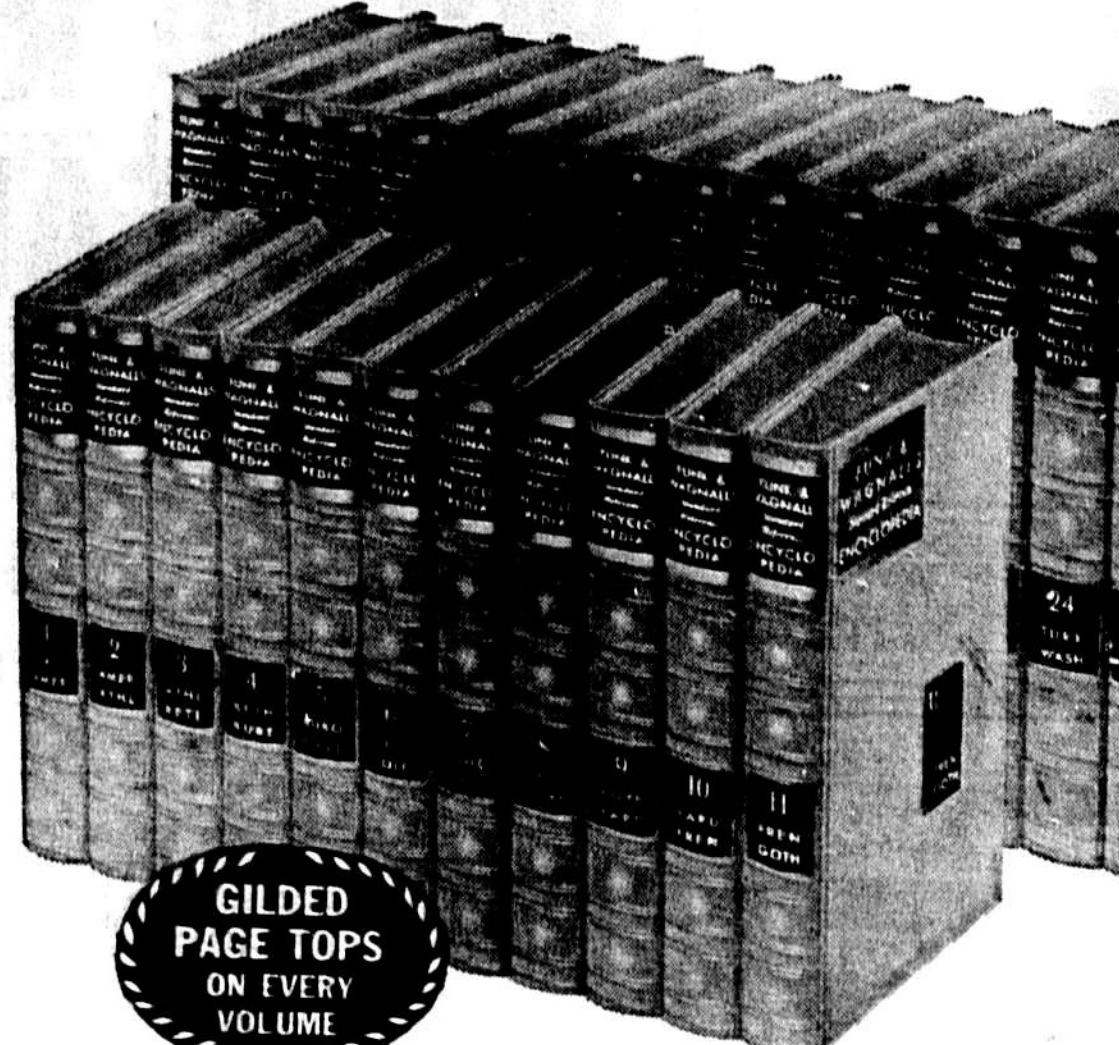

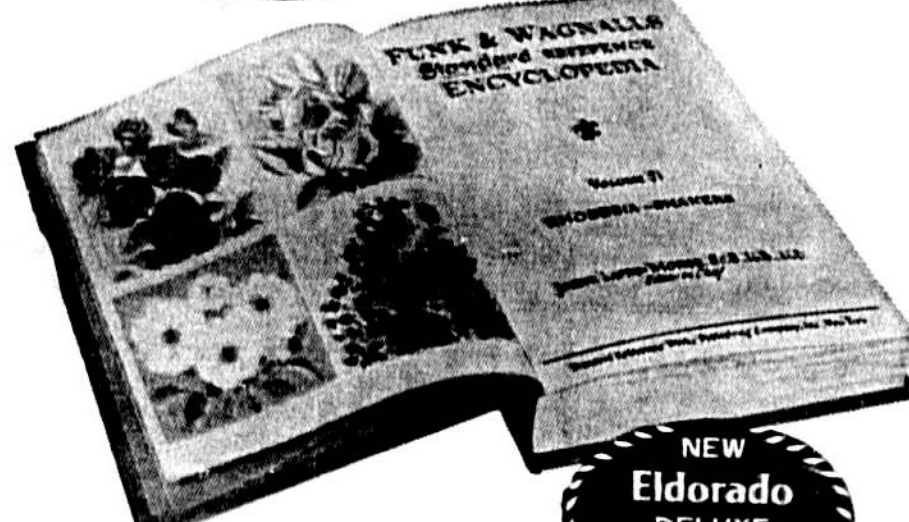
