He then issued a detailed statement giving his version of the kidnaping.

Apartment Houses Now Stand On Site Of Chicago's Disastrous Blaze

CHICAGO, Sept. 16.—(AP)—The apartment houses now being erected where the great Chicago fire reached its limit in 1887 were then almost open country along the lake. By chance, the site of the latest new skyscraper has served to bring to light one of the most curious incidents connected with the history of Chicago and yet reaching back centuries ago across the Atlantic.

In the middle of what is Roslyn Place, a charming bit of land at the edge of Lincoln Park, within a few hundred feet of Chicago's tallest apartment house, is the precise point at which a great fire burnt itself out. And just here that the story begins for the present street scene of Roslyn Place was at the time of the fire the lot line between the suburban homes of two Chicagoans who had ancestral associations with the neighborhood of Roslyn Castle in Scotland. One of these Chicago Scots was William C. Gavily, General Counsel of Chicago & Northwestern Railroad, and the other was David Goodwillie, a leading manufacturer of this city.

Neither of these hardheaded practical Chicagoans was much

given to poetry, but the fact remains that when years after the big fire the two men came to agree on the name of the new street which was to take the place of their lot line they selected the name of the castle referred to in Sir Walter Scott's famous "Ballad of Lady Rosalind." The ballad narrates the "wondrous blaze" that "glared on Roslyn's castle rock" and especially on the "chapel proud" that contained "twenty of Roslyn's barons hold." The "lovely line of high Saint Clair." This celebrated medieval chapel is the one in which is the beautiful "Apprentice Pillar" differing from all other chapel pillars and richly carved in secret by an apprentice. Who the apprentice was that carved the pillar is to this day unknown, but the fame of Roslyn Castle is remembered here thousands of miles from Scotland and irrevocably has become linked with one of the biggest of all events in the history of Chicago.

Chicago Will Spend Millions On Plan To Convert It Into A 'City Beautiful'

CHICAGO, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Virtually every city in the land with a civic urge has a civic center planned or building.

Chicago, the sprawling midwestern metropolis, is no exception. Its civic center plan is linked with a city beautiful movement, probably the most pretentious in the world.

Millions of dollars already have been expended in a beauty and utility program and the subject is one so vast and far reaching that an entire book devoted to it has been used in the schools here for years.

But while many features of the "Chicago plan" have been completed or are under way, the civic center is still a hazy dream of the future. In the original plans the civic center was planned about a huge open plaza west of the Chicago river, this center to be the focal point of all the recent developments.

The area selected is in a diamond-shaped section, crowded with cramped tenements, small manufacturing plants, and "flap houses." But

while this civic center plan still looms in the offing a new center of public and semi-public activity is building just west of the river.

Here on a wide new boulevard, replacing old Canal street, has been erected the huge developments associated with the new union station.

On the same street a couple of blocks away is another great railroad terminal, that of the Chicago and Northwestern, while efforts are being made to place the new Chicago post office on territory between the two.

Chicago buildings usually associated with a civic center plan are now widely scattered. The combined city hall and county building, an immense granite structure in the Roman style, is in the heart of the loop. The postoffice, which Chicago outgrew before it was finished, is a half mile away. The art institute is over on Michigan boulevard, and the new Field museum a mile distant in Grant park. The Cook county jail is beyond the north branch of the Chicago river.

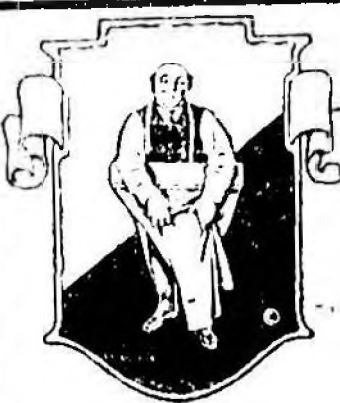

Day Draws Crowds View Performances Of The Walter L. Main Show

Parade Goes Through
Section; Streets
With People Eager
To See Clowns, Animals

Main Arrives
From Ocala Visit

In Record
Aid of Big Ele-
Shows Scheduled

The parade was held for more than two hours today for the street parade of the Walter L. Main circus. The parade was not disappointed. The noise of trumpets told of the approach of the parade at 11:30 o'clock. The show trains were seen as arriving here this morning from Ocala, where the circus exhibited yesterday. The first train arrived shortly after 9 o'clock, via the Atlantic Coast Line.

The parade wound its way through the principal downtown streets, which were lined with automobiles and spectators who stationed themselves at advantageous places.

Tooting calliope, blaring bands, the marshalled tread of the mounted cavalcade, the restless pacing of wild animals in open dens, the allegorical floats, the massive, hand-carved wagons and many other novelties were in the procession. Circus equestrians, clowns and "foreign looking people" in their native dress attracted the attention of the spectators.

The menagerie was opened early in the afternoon at the circus grounds, First Street and Mellonville Avenue. The afternoon performance started shortly after 2 o'clock. The menagerie will be opened again at 7 o'clock and the night performance will begin at 8 o'clock.

This is the first visit of the Walter L. Main show to Sanford. The big red wagons rumbled down the steel runways from the circus grounds to a siding of the railroad tracks at First street with little delay after the train arrived.

The big top poles were raised in position with the aid of elephants. The dining room was the first to be put up. More than 700 employees were fed here.

The grooms worked on the horses; the wardrobe chief and her assistants put the wardrobe in readiness; the long tiers of circus seats were erected; the grounds seemed like a bee hive of working men.

Long after the noon hour, the equestrian director blew his whistle and a responding bugle call from the dressing rooms announced the first call for the parade. The circus equestrians, the clowns, the grooms and others who take part in this daily feature started preparing and 20 minutes later a second call was made. The parade was ready.

The show has trained horses, bands of elephants, trapeze artists, barback riders, clowns, gymnasts, dogs, ponies, monkeys, peanut vendors and everything else that could be expected of the circus.

GASOLINE GIVES OUT TO COMPEL AIRMAN TO JUMP

Charles Lindbergh Finds
Way to Wreckage Pulls Out
Mail Bags and Arranges
For Their Trip to Chicago

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—(AP)—A fuel supply exhausted by hours of flying above a fog last night conquered three other pilots, and forced Charles A. Lindbergh to abandon his St. Louis-Chicago airmail plane nearly a mile from Wedron, Ill., and drop by parachute.

Within an hour he had groped across country to where the wrecked plane lay, two miles away, dug out the three pouched mail and arranged their journey for the remaining 60 miles to their Chicago destination.

Lindbergh left his ship after cruising for more than two hours above the Chicago airmail terminal, from which powerful search lights sought to pierce the fog. The drone of the motor was heard plainly by officials.

Fuel Supply Runs Low
The pilot, flying for the Robertson Aircraft Company of St. Louis, finally abandoned hope of finding the field, from which three other flyers turned back for forced landings when fuel supplies began to run low.

Circling westward, Lindbergh reached Ottawa before it was necessary to cut in the emergency gasoline tank.
He said the altimeter read 5,000 feet when he saw that the last drop of the emergency fuel was gone, and he realized he would have to "go over the side" for the third time in his experience. He was still hidden from the earth by fog.

Lands Without Mishap
Lindbergh dropped through the fog blanket, which he estimated at 1,000 feet in thickness, and landed without a mishap, but during the early part of his descent he was in constant danger from the falling mist. Whirling about the pilot, the wings occasionally came within a few hundred feet of his body.

The first plane forced down by the fog was that of the National Air Transport's route, from Dallas, Tex., to Chicago. An hour later the mail from the Twin Cities came down at Spring Valley.

Pilot Jack Milatz flew the 160 miles from Bryan, Ohio, to Chicago in an hour, only to find Chicago entirely hidden by the fog and retraced the route. He landed at Bryan with less than half a gallon of gasoline.

Broadcasting Experiments Short Wave Lengths Are Conducted By Experts

At Washington State College, Orin E. Hollingberry takes the place of A. A. Exendine, resigned. Hollingberry coached the San Francisco Olympic Club eleven which last year administered the first defeat to California. Exendine signed to coach at Occidental College in southern California this season.

Charles Erb, quarterback on the University of California "wonder team" under Smith, replaces Robert Mathews at the University of Idaho. Mathews resigned to accept a similar position at St. Louis University.

The gridiron destinies of Oregon two former West Pointers, Captain and Montana are in the hands of Sam John McEwan, last year's coach at Army, has taken charge at the Webber camp while Major Henry Milburn, succeed Charles Clark at Montana.

Teams Hard Hit
Glen Warner remains at Stanford, Enoch Bugshaw at Washington Paul Schuster at Oregon Agricultural College and Howard Jones at the University of Southern California.

The missing roll of football stars this year includes Ernest Nevers, Stanford's great fullback, and George Wilson, spectacular half back of the Washington Huskies, both of whom won places on most of the mythical All-American eleven in 1925.

Graduation took eleven members of the California team while Stanford bids goodbye to three regulars and seven varsity substitutes.

Washington, 1925 champion, lost many of its outstanding players but enters the seasonal battle for honors with the psychological advantage, which comes from a victorious season.

The "big game" between the traditional rivals—California and Stanford takes place in the former's stadium on November 20. This contest attracted the largest attendance in football history a few years ago when nearly 100,000 persons filled the huge bowl and the surrounding hillsides.

DATE IS SELECTED FOR HEARING ON CANAL PROJECT

District Engineer Gives Out Notice of Meeting That Is To Be Held at Titusville On the Second of October

A public hearing on the application of the Upper St. Johns River Navigation District for the approval of plans for the construction of a canal connecting the Indian River and the St. Johns River will be held Oct. 2 at the county courthouse at Titusville. The notice of the hearing was received here today from Lieutenant Colonel Mark Brooke, district engineer, with headquarters at Jacksonville.

Navigation interests and officials of any county, city, town or local association whose interests may be affected by construction of the proposed canal are invited to attend the hearing.

Oral statements will be heard, according to Lieutenant Colonel Brooke, but all important facts and arguments should be submitted in writing. The records of the hearing will be forwarded for consideration by the War Department.

The plans submitted by the navigation district engineers provide for the construction of a navigable channel of eight-foot depth at mean low water and 100-foot bottom width from Sanford on Lake Monroe up the St. Johns River to Salt Run, thence through Lakes Luffman, Shad and Salt to the Indian River near Titusville, according to Lieutenant Colonel Brooke.

Additional plans provide for construction of a navigable channel of five-foot depth and 60-foot width from the mouth of Salt Run up the St. Johns River to Lake Pointsett.

A lock and dam is proposed in the St. Johns River near the mouth of Salt Run to raise the mean low water plane south of the site approximately seven feet. GERMANY AND FRANCE REACH AN AGREEMENT

Accord Between Two Nations On All Problems in Which They Are Mutually Interested is Reached on Friday

Stresemann Lunches With Minister Briand

General Solution Of All Outstanding Problems Arrived At, Says Report to Berlin

BERLIN, Sept. 18. (AP)—France and Germany through their foreign ministers have reached a preliminary agreement for an accord between the two countries on all problems in which they may be mutually interested.

The accord, which must be placed before the respective governments for acceptance, is considered as meaning much for the political and especially the economic development of Europe.

It was reached yesterday by Foreign Minister Briand of France and Foreign Minister Stresemann of Germany, during a luncheon at Thoiry, just across the Swiss border in France.

Although nothing officially is known of the questions discussed the belief prevails that gradual reduction of the French forces of occupation in Germany and a possible pooling of the economic and financial interests, based on the theory that what Europe needs is economic prosperity, were among them. European debts to the United States are said to have been discussed.

"Since then there has been nothing but trouble. When Kenneth sent his letters to the District Attorney we were hurt, for in them our son confessed a wrong, but we believed them. Now we cannot. There is too much on the other side. He must come forward and tell the truth, clear up this mess which has kept us in constant misery since his name was first brought into the investigation."
