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OLD AGE REVOLVING PENSION LEADER VISITS FLORIDA, PREDICTS SUCCESS

When I learned that Dr. F. E. Townsend, father of the famous Townsend Old Age Revolving Pension Plan was to address a gathering in Clearwater I made up my mind to interview the old doctor and find out how the plan was getting along.

The proposition of the government pensioning everyone over the age of 60 years, giving them a total of \$200 each month seemed on the face of it, but I wanted to hear the plan from the lips of the man who advocated it.

I arrived in Clearwater to find the report of finding them all did folk I was surprised to find as many young people as the old. The proposition of the Townsend Plan is a direct appeal to young folk as well as old folk. It provides for the retirement of the aged from gainful occupations in order that younger people may have an opportunity to find employment.

Between three and four thousand people assembled at the city auditorium to hear Dr. Townsend speak. They filled the hall to overflowing.

The doctor's speech was both interesting and inspiring and he carried his audience from the start with his easy manner, his infectious smile and the sincerity of his appeal. He spoke of the need for a plan to solve the problem of the aged in a land of plenty.

Under the Townsend Plan everyone over 60 years of age would draw a pension of \$200 each month which would be obligated to spend within the confines of the United States during the month.

The doctor contended that this distribution of millions of dollars into this distribution would tend to immediately stimulate business activity, give employment to millions of people who would be needed to supply the demand for goods, materials and services that would be created.

Furthermore, the Townsend Plan would tend to spread the work over the age of 60 from employment rolls and thus make room for younger men and women who now have no work.

Then when we heard that the doctor was to have taken a tour of the state in connection with his plan, I was interested to hear that he was to visit Florida.

Following the presentation of the plan, Dr. Townsend was asked to give his opinion on the plan and he said that he was to visit Florida.
