Leesburg walloped five Sanford pitchers for 20 hits and 20 runs last night as every hurler on the staff was used in the game, and Charlie Girk and Rick Gillespie took their turn in throwing the ball across.

Fifty of hits and plenty of errors featured the longest ball game of the season with the Seminoles bobbling seven infield and outfield balls. Though scoring 20 runs the Anglers rated only 15 earned runs as the errors accounted for the remainder.

Only happy light on the Sanford horizon was a triple hit by Pete McRaney in the sixth inning with bases loaded that drove in three of the locals' runs.

Leesburg scored in every inning except the first, sixth, seventh and ninth and had eleven batters come up in the fourth. Second baseman Rick Gillespie started pitching in the seventh inning and held the opposition to only one hit and one run in his two and one-half frames of hurrying.

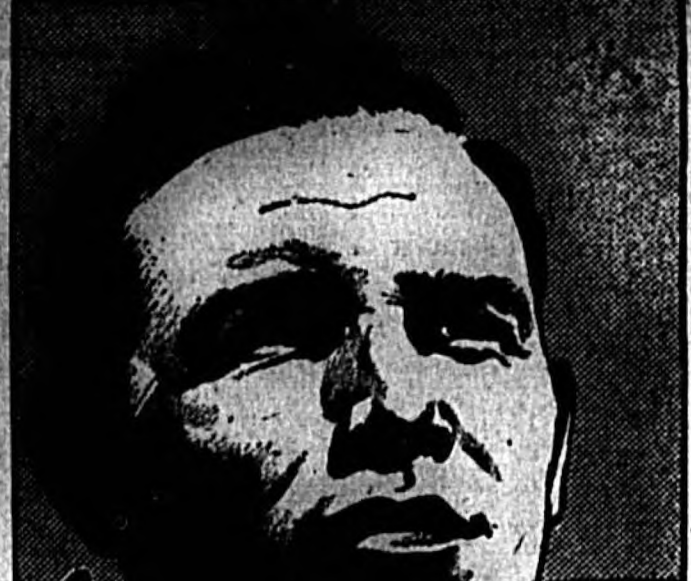

"Darby" Classic To Be Run In Spite Of War

NEWMARKET, England, June 3—Here, far from London where Charles II started horse racing in the 16th century, the stage is being set for the daddy of races, the "darby."

Originally scheduled June 6 at Newbury, the classic was switched here by the Jockey club and the date changed to June 18. It was run here last year.

Despite the war, excitement is running high. This green town's beautiful heaths are coming to life again. Thousands are expected to attend.

Some critics—not Newmarketers—are advocating calling off the darby, but this is highly unlikely.

Much of the color of the classic, traditionally run at Epsom Downs, is expected to be retained. All talk of the probable winner gets around eventually to Sun Castle, handled by the gentleman trainer, Capt. Cecil Boyd-Rockfort.

Boyd-Rockfort probably is the best known British trainer to American fans because of the many American-owned horses he has trained for events on this side.

In the 14 years prior to the present war Boyd-Rockfort's horses won purses totaling \$4,424,10.

Draft Gets Mercer Gridman As School May Suspend Tilt

MACON, Ga., June 3—(AP)—Unless freshmen football players are made eligible for varsity duty this fall, Mercer University may be forced to abandon intercollegiate competition for one year.

Faced with the loss of several of their star varsity performers to the U. S. armed forces, including seat-back Scooter Yancey, it has become increasingly evident in recent weeks that Coach Bobby Hooks will be faced with a serious problem.

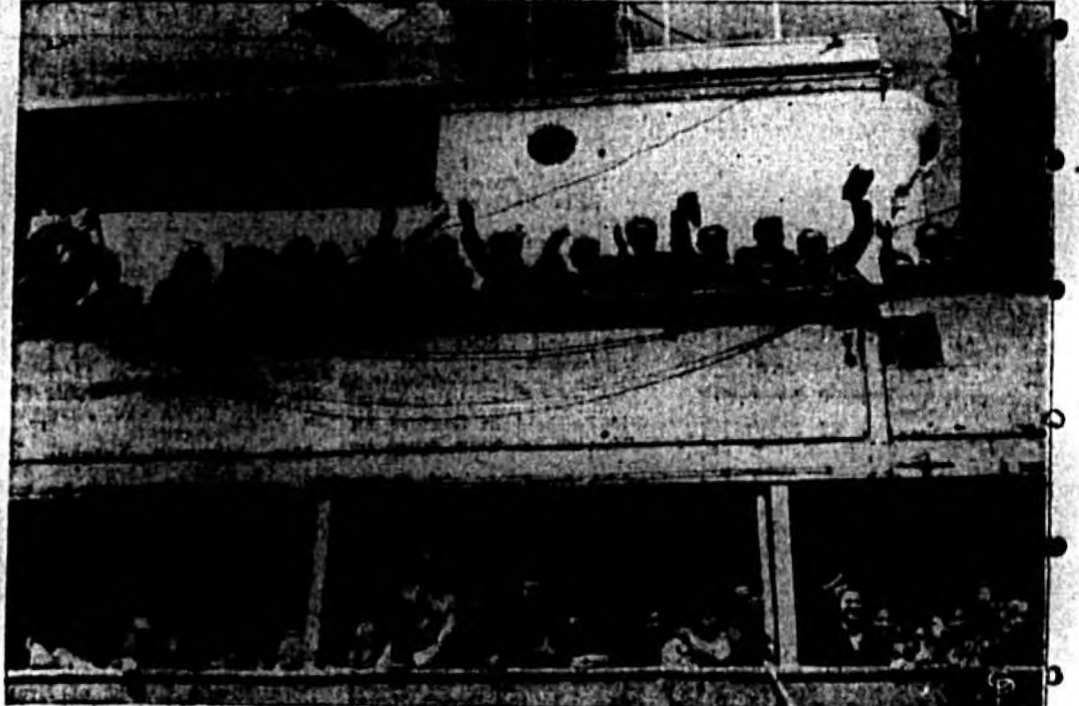

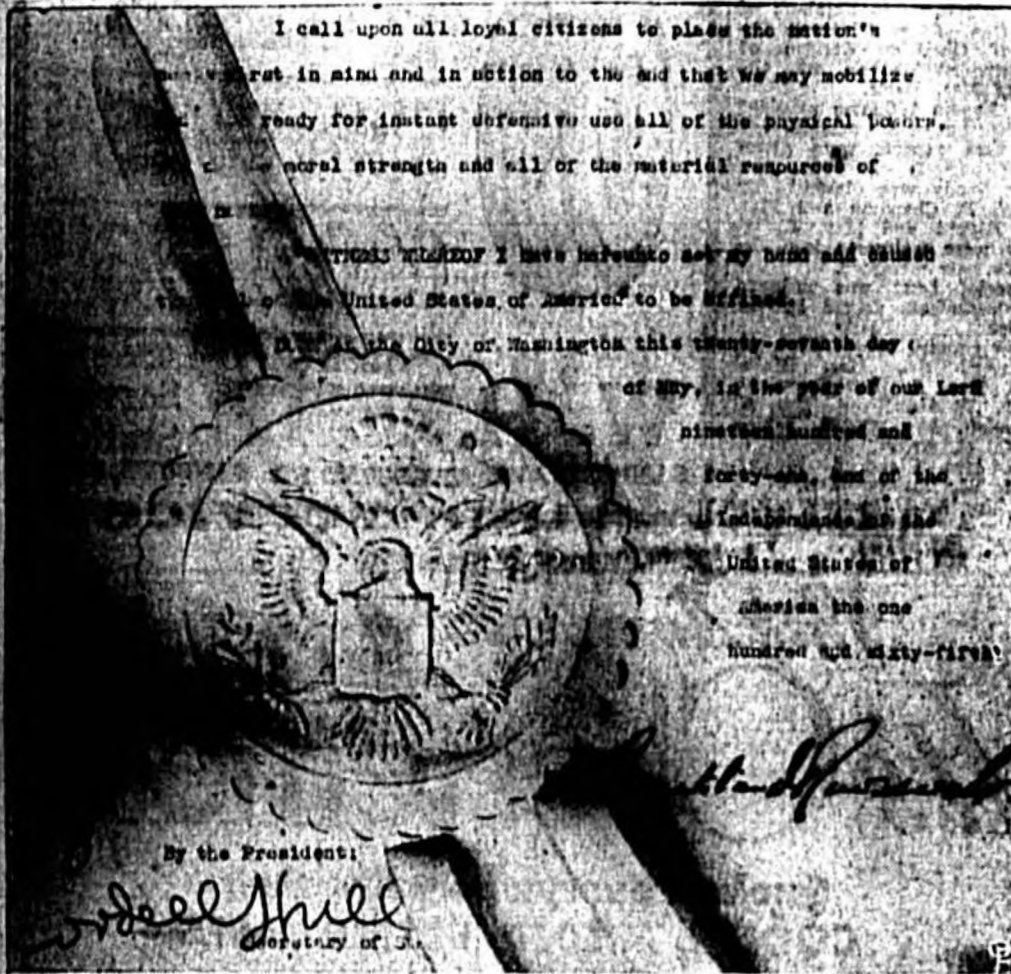

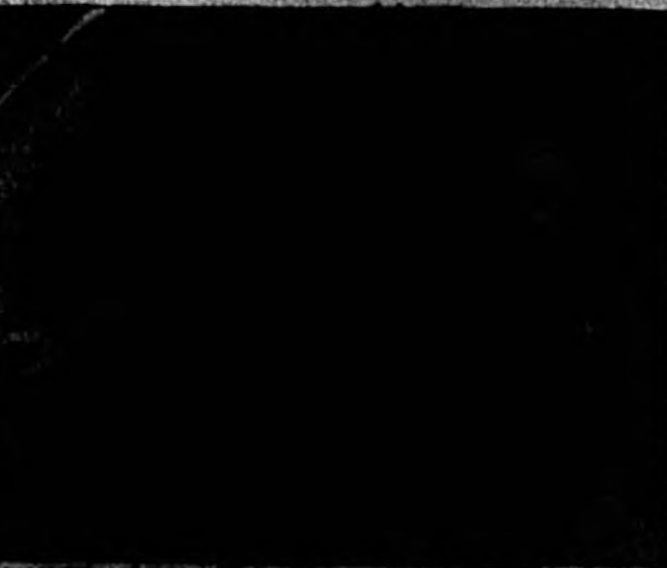

Rubber Industry Will Free Ships For British Use

AKRON, O. June 4.—(Special)—In a letter to Goodyear dealers all over America today P. W. Hinchfield, chairman of the company's board, called upon the rubber industry to inaugurate a program which will free additional ships for the use of Great Britain and conserve available supplies of rubber for essential purposes. His letter follows: "While not actually at war, America is proceeding rapidly to place her affairs on a war footing. This means sharp readjustments in all phases of domestic activities. Particularly important will be the adjustments we must make in the use of strategic materials and

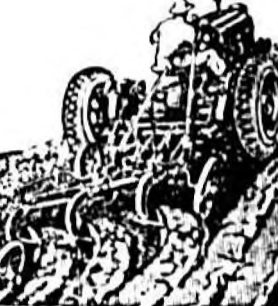

Facilities and, of course, this includes rubber. "As I have stressed in previous messages, rubber is a basic requirement in America's peace time economy. In time of national crisis it becomes increasingly important. "We have today a six months supply of rubber. Half this is in the hands of manufacturers and dealers while the other half is government-owned and subject to use only as national emergency needs may dictate. Our major source of supply lies half way around the globe where plantations of the British and Dutch East Indies produce approximately 95% of all of the rubber required by the whole world. "Currently these estates are producing rubber in sufficient quantity to meet all possible needs. "Production of crude rubber is not now and is not likely to be a problem—the problem which we will be called upon to face in the months near by is that of getting rubber from the East Indies to America. We need not look beyond today's newspapers to learn that the shipping situation is complicated by two major factors: "First British ships are being destroyed more rapidly than they are being replaced. "Second, to replace losses and to meet the need for almost limitless supplies of munitions and food, England must import all manner of goods in larger quantities than ever before. "This means that more and more ships must be taken out of normal service and utilized for vital defense needs. For example, if some of the bottoms now used in transporting rubber to America can be released for Britain's pressing requirements, they undoubtedly will be so transferred. "This will mean that non-essential uses of rubber at home will be sharply curtailed or completely stopped. If a white sidewall tire requires an additional two pounds of rubber as compared with a standard black tire, and it actually does, then the white sidewall may be spotted as one of the things the American public can do without. "My objective is to encourage a middle ground view. We have a supply of crude rubber on hand—we know how to make synthetic rubber, although many months would be required to provide sufficient productive capacity—we have large reservoirs of scrap from which reclaim may be made. We can, so far as it is possible

WASHINGTON, June 4.—(AP)—President Roosevelt last night reportedly informed legislative leaders that he is willing to accept any "reasonable modification" of the proposed "draft property law" which had plunged Congress into one of the hottest fights of the session. The bill which would empower the President to suspend "any kind of 'drafting' of property for a temporary period on property which is not being used primarily for the war effort" was submitted to the lawmakers prematurely Monday by the war department.

It was understood the President passed the word to the Capitol yesterday that he had not finally approved the bill, that he was amenable to some of the War Department's actions, and that he was amenable to softening the harsh provisions of the law in certain respects.
