

Schools Are Scratching

Will the Seminole County School Board take money from the school contingency fund to implement a pay raise for school teachers, now that tax equalization money earmarked for funding the raise will not be coming to the county school system as first believed when the pay increase was granted by the school board?

That is the question the board must answer following yesterday's discussion of the situation, which was created after the county failed to qualify for the half million dollars in equalization funds when a state auditor determined that Seminoles is over-represented at 41 per cent of total property value instead of the 33 per cent state average which would have qualified the county to receive the equalization money.

Lyman Hi

Facing Double Session

Lyman High School may be placed back on double sessions until a new high school can be constructed in South Seminole County, probably in two years or by the opening of the 1973-74 school year.

This was disclosed to The Herald yesterday by Supt. John Angel, when questioned about reports that Milwe Middle School parents are unhappy over the prospects of moving into an all portable school for the next three years to release the present middle school facilities to Lyman High in order to take that facility off double sessions with the rest of the county high schools beginning with the 1971-72 school year.

Milwe parents reportedly are complaining over the portables, which would have been placed in the Prairie Lakes area on property not yet acquired, and they want the portables on Lyman property for use by that school's ninth graders, thus leaving Milwe to continue its present 6-8 grade operation.

However, there are indications that rather than resort to portables at all, the school board may vote to keep Lyman in double sessions until a new high school is finished in two years to take some of the overflow from Lyman.

This matter will be debated at the next school board meeting scheduled for Lyman High School at 7:30 p.m. Jan. 26, according to Mrs. Edna Nickols, of Longwood, spokeswoman for a parents group unhappy over putting Milwe students into the portable school.

Lyman High is double sessioned for the next two years, this would have no effect on plans by the board to put the regular school hours back at Seminoles High in Sanford for the 1971-72 school year.

A new addition will be completed at the Sanford school by that time and with all ninth graders assigned to Croona School, there will be sufficient space to accommodate Seminoles' entire student body in one session.

Commission Aide Named By County

Martin Gainer assumed his duties as administrative assistant to the Seminole County Commission today. Gainer comes to Seminole County after serving as planning and urban renewal director for the city of Daytona Beach. His appointment was made official at yesterday's meeting of the County Commissioners.

County Planner David Farr informed the Commissioners that the Planning and Zoning Department's draftsman resigned, effective Jan. 22. Farr recommended to the commissioners that the salary scale be increased for the position so that a better qualified draftsman could be employed or possibly create a new position of planning technician.

Farr told the commissioners that he believes a better qualified man would be a savings to the county in that he would be able to handle his present duties and not be forced to contract out some of their work as they have previously had to do. He told them that there would be \$3,000 that was budgeted for consulting fees that he did not currently anticipate using, that could be used to make up for the difference in the salaries.

Commissioner Ed Yarbrough stated that he believes it would be best to wait for the new fiscal year before the county considers creating a new position in the Planning and Zoning Department.

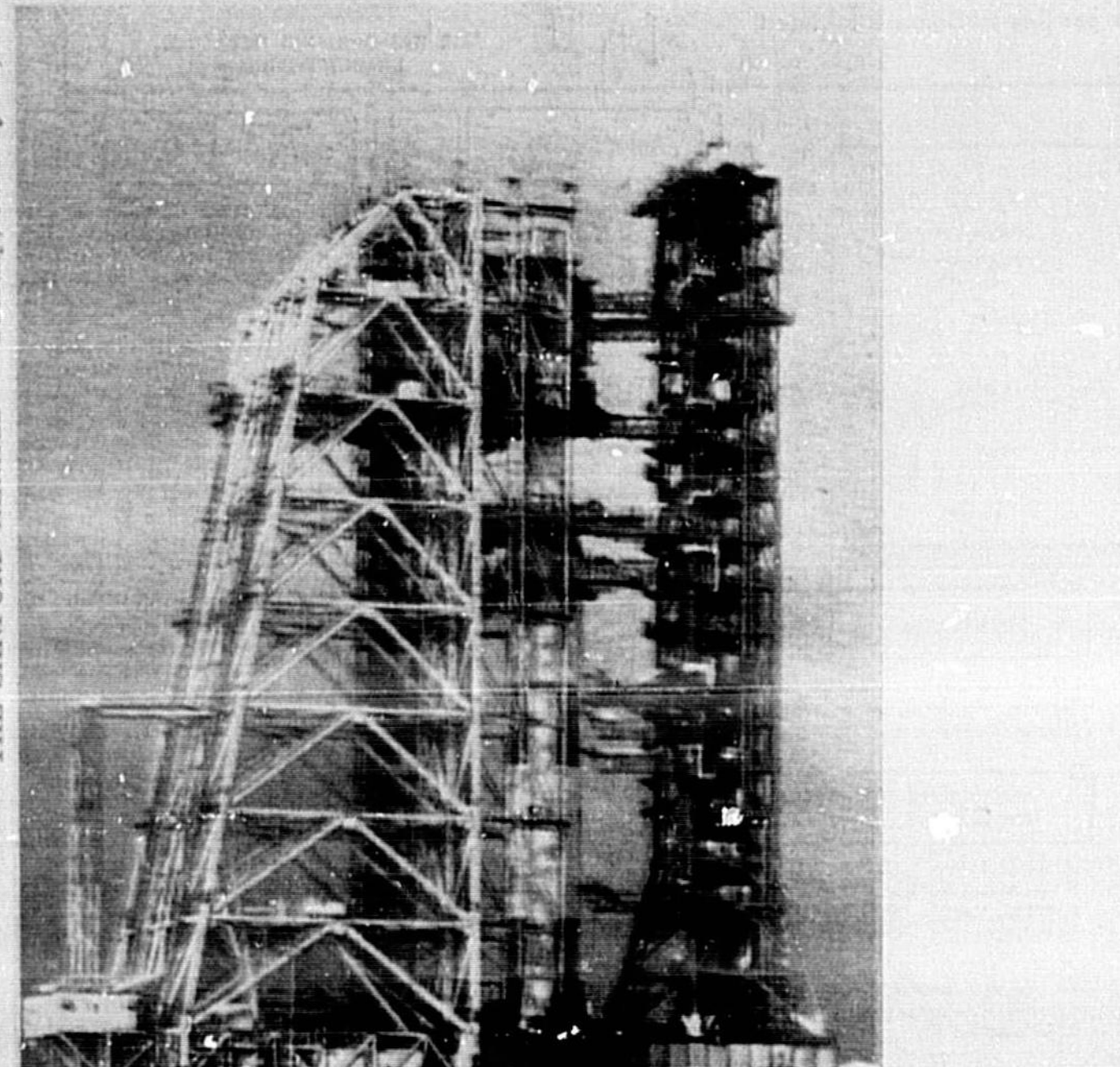

VIP Tour Of The Space Center Is 'Unforgettable'

Thirty-nine days and counting. That's how it stands before Apollo 13 streaks away from the gravitational pull of Mother Earth and heads into space toward the Moon. That Moon shot will be extra special to seven Seminole County residents, this writer included.

Duane Harrell, chief deputy at the Seminole County sheriff's department, his two sons, Gary and Greg, V. M. Bryan, a national prison chaplain, Ken Eynon, a deputy in the civil department, Peter Ragdale, chief chemist for the crime lab, and I beat the sun up last Wednesday morning and departed for Kennedy Space Center for a day that will not soon be forgotten.

The tour our group received would be fit for any dignitary, including the President of the United States. Quite an exhibition of rockets, missiles and photographs greeted us as we arrived at the Information Center, the gateway to the space center. From there we boarded a bus, and later a limousine, for our tour. Sherman Evans, of NASA Security, was the guide for the tour, along with security Sgt. Robert Stevenson, also a reserve deputy with the Seminole County sheriff's department.

First stop on the tour was the Kennedy Space Office. We soon found out that everything at the space center has three letters abbreviated name. In the KSC office we visited the security office and learned a little about how it functions. Some 30,000 active clearances are on hand at the office, and the figure is rising to around 50,000 as the moon shot nears.

Then came the hot rule around WSC and Cape Kennedy. One of the points of interest was the Air Force Museum where several rockets and missiles of the 1950s and '60s were on display.

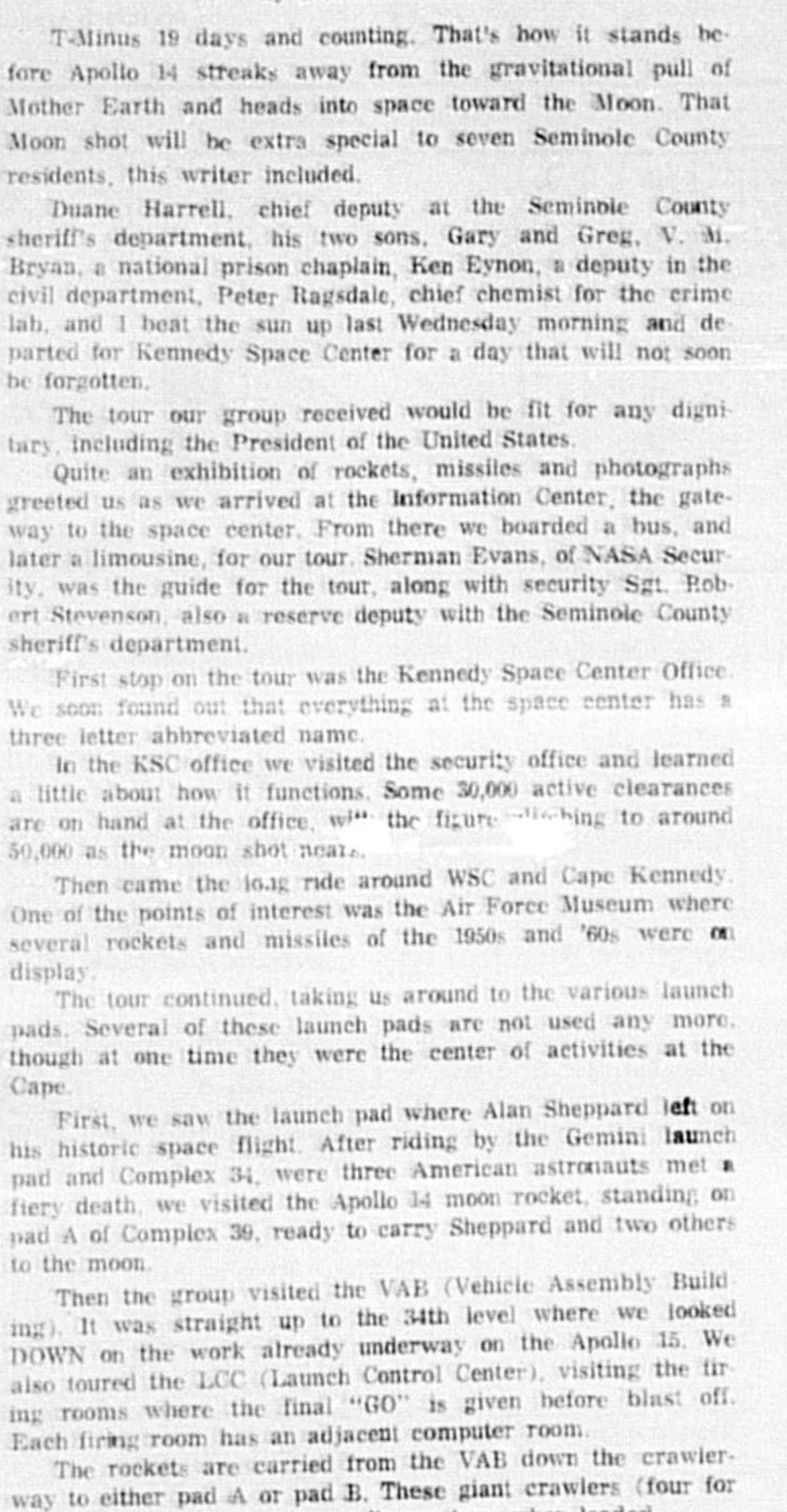
The tour continued, taking us around the various launch pads. Several of these launch pads are not used any more, though at one time they were the center of activities at the Cape.

First, we saw the launch pad where Alan Shepard left on his historic space flight. After riding by the Gemini launch pad and Complex 34, were three American astronauts met a fiery death, we visited the Apollo 13 moon rocket, standing on 59,000 as the moon shot nears.

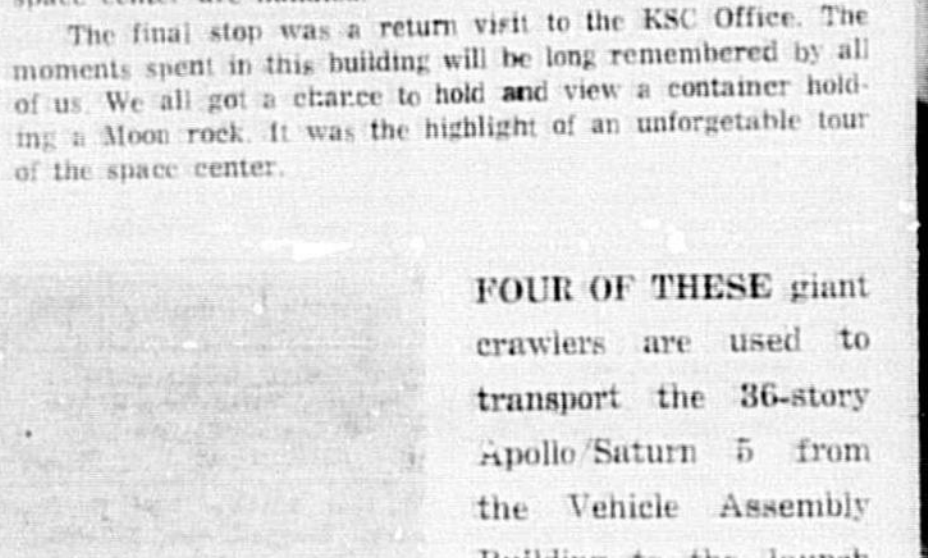
Then the group visited the VAB (Vehicle Assembly Building). It was straight up to the 342 level where we looked DOWN on the work already underway on the Apollo 15. We also toured the LCC (Launch Control Center), visiting the firing rooms where the final "GO" is given before blast off. Each firing room has an adjacent computer room.

The rockets are carried from the VAB down the crawler-way to either pad A or pad B. These giant crawlers (four for each rocket) travel only one mile per hour when loaded.

Then it was on to the KSC Security headquarters, which is commingled with our police department or sheriff's office. Here we were shown a little about how the security operations at the space center are handled.



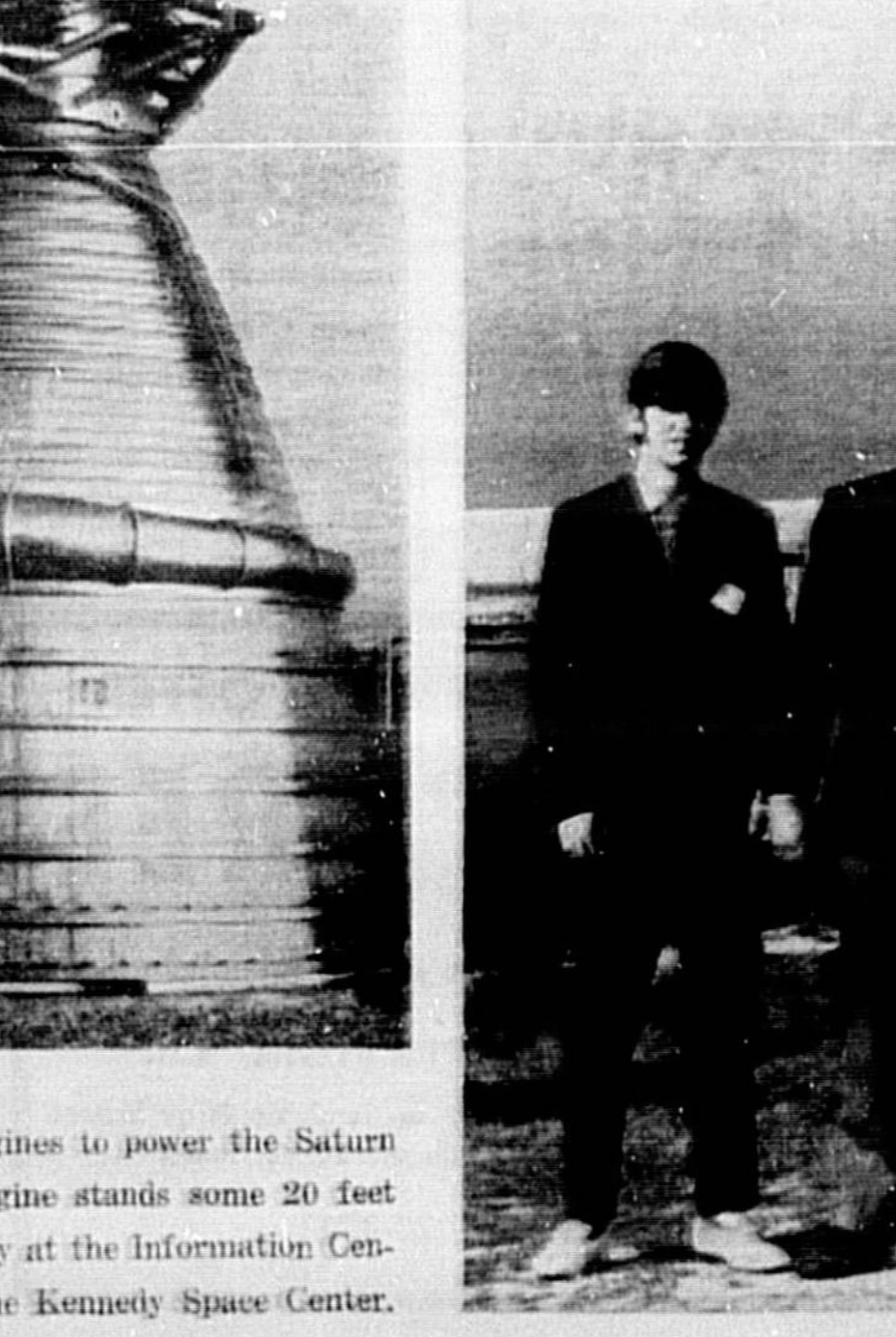
MEMBERS OF THE Sanford group look over a model of the Apollo 13 moon rocket before beginning their tour of the Kennedy Space Center.

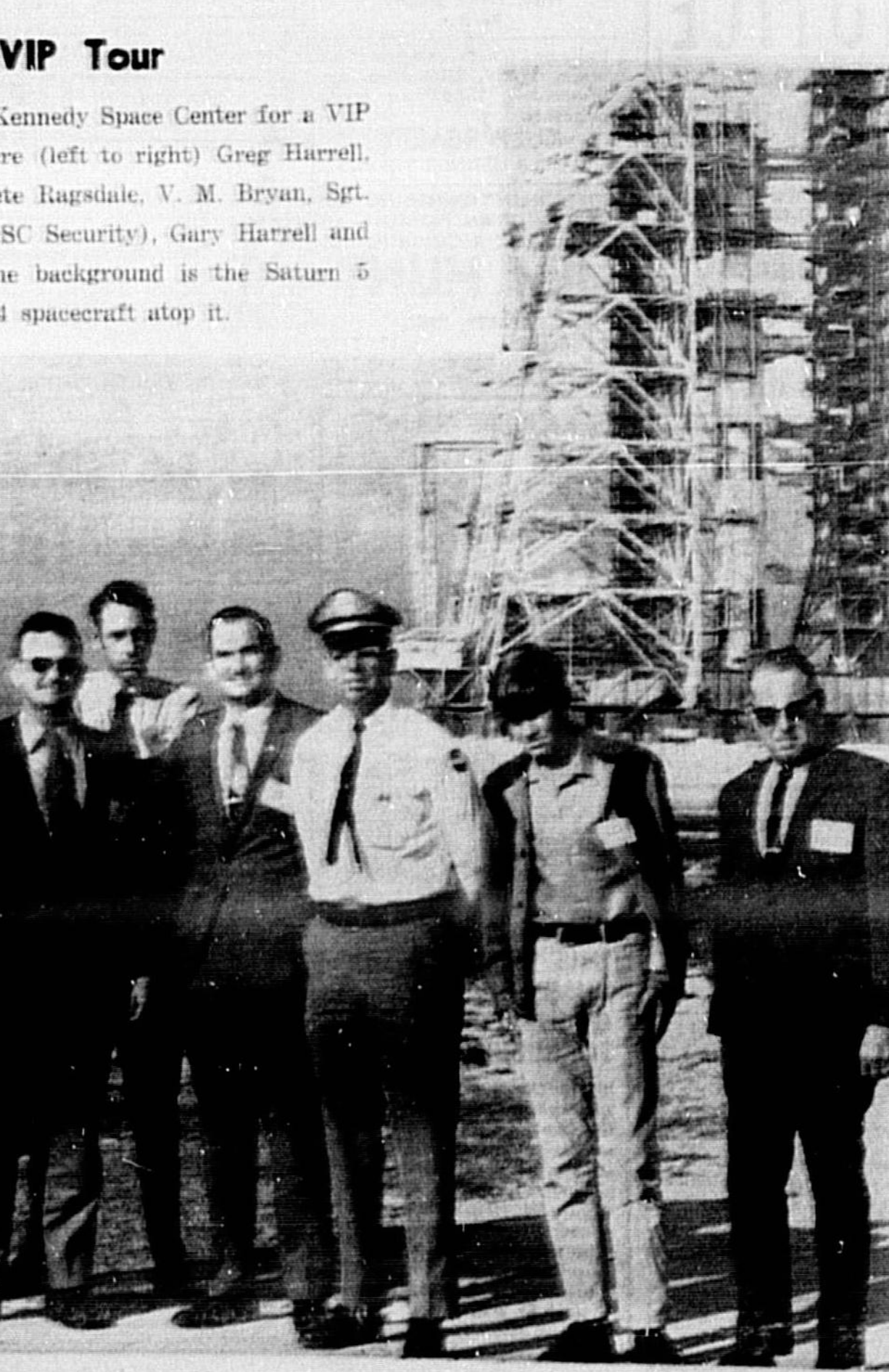

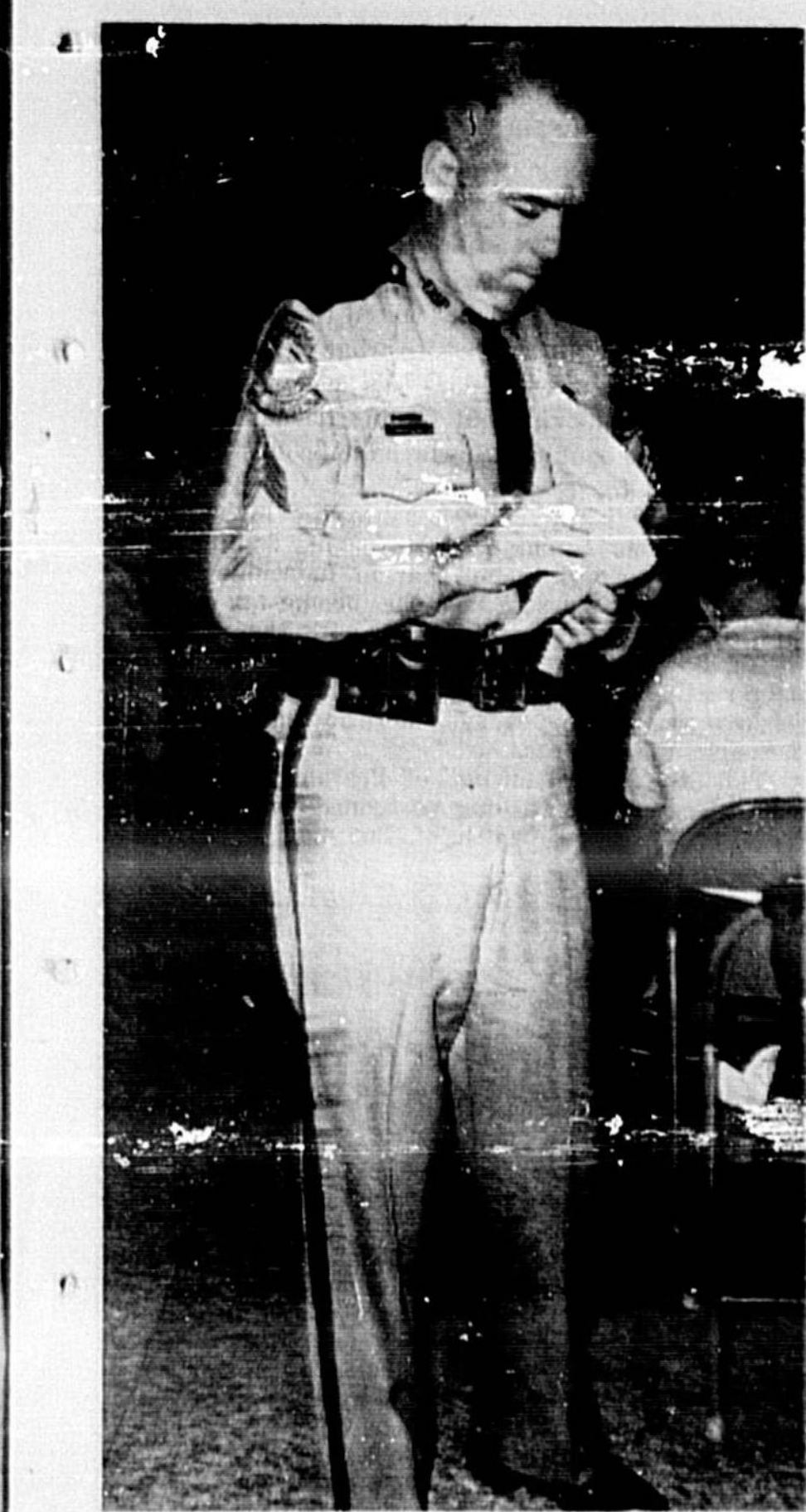

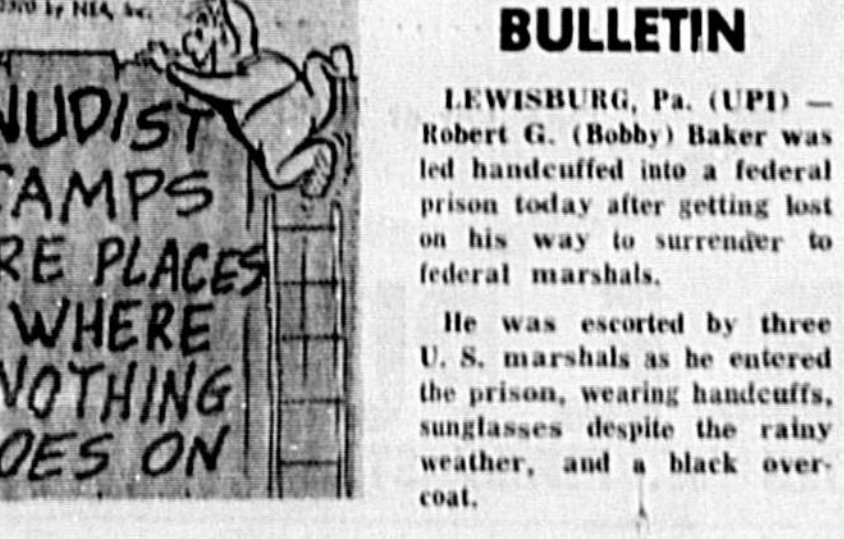
