



### Some New Year

The record in Vietnam is ample evidence that truces are meaningless, either from the standpoint of our military effort or as they relate to a meaningful peace.

Still, for the second time in recent weeks we have established, unilaterally, a short stand-down in Vietnam, and plan still another during the Oriental new year on Jan. 26.

In typical fashion, the North Vietnamese aggressors and the Viet Cong use the lulls to build up for an extra surge. To them the extra gasp is becoming more and more important as they become weaker militarily in South Viet-

On the other hand the truces are becoming more important militarily to Americans, because they permit the additional enemy activity. To the extent that they prolong the war, they also affect adversely our withdrawal

Nor, as we observe the current standdown, o we have the least hope that the respite will enhance the prospects for genuine concessions on the part of Communists at the Paris peace talks. Indeed, it may even provide one more opening for propaganda.

Still, when all of this is said, we must acknowledge that the truces reveal a typical American trait. We have to believe that our sincerify and obvious honesty will generate a reciprocal response from the enemy. It is basic to our make-up.



"For years we used to say fat people were jolly and cozy. It is more accurate to say that if we eat the right amount of fat, our stomachs will feel jolly and happy. Fat is more slowly digested and so delays the feeling of hunger longer."

"Historically, we thought of pork as fatty food. With today's breed of leaner, sveite and even willowy hogs, this is not nearly

"It is important to remember that pork is not fat meat. The covering around it may be fat. But today that fat is usually trimmed long before the pork reaches the consumer."


Two more kind words for fat from Arlene Christianson: Most function without fat, just as it cannot continue without protein and carbohydrates. Also, the fatty deposits throughout the body protect vital organs and fat directly beneath the skin helps protect the body from excess loss of heat.

She and her company are aware of the recommendation about high fat cuts of beef, pork, and other fat foods proposed by the Inter-Society Commission for Heart Disease Resources.
