## Are You Insecure On Dance Floor; Well Read This

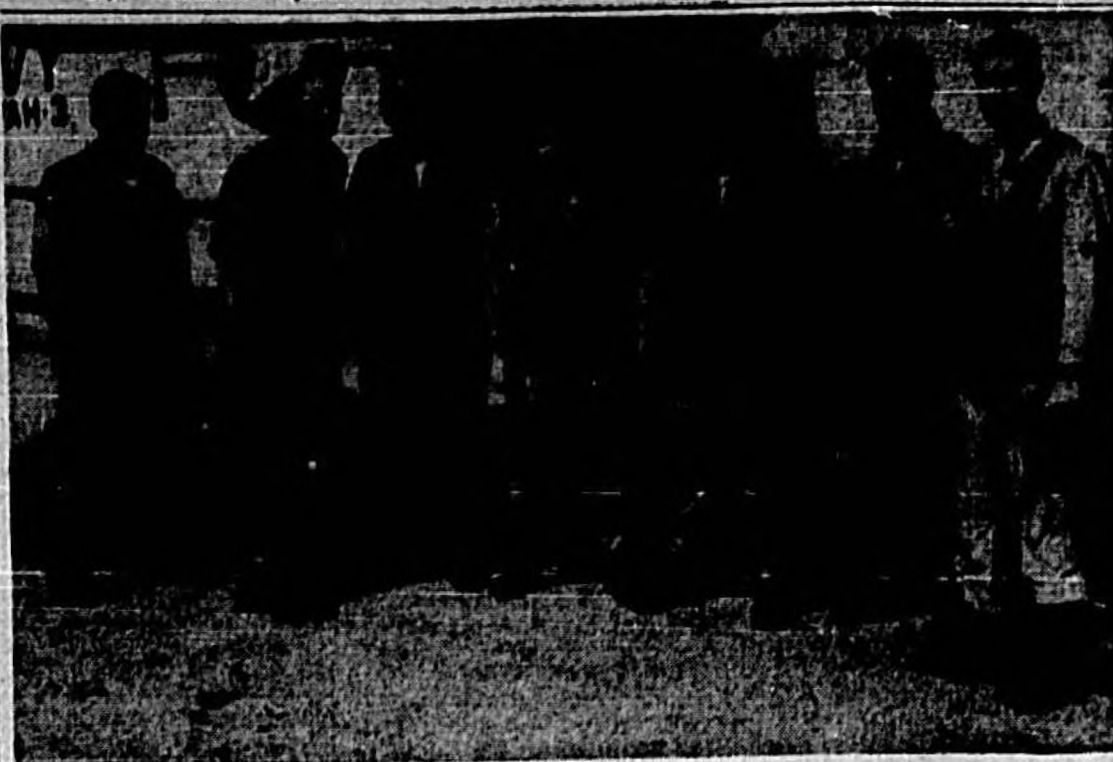
Ronald Perry, city recreational director, has these questions to ask of Sanford residents:

## 'Trick Or Treat' Program Set For Lake Mary Area

On Halloween evening little spooks and goblins, spacemen and witches will ring the doorbells in Lake Mary, Sunland Estates, Little Venice, and Loch Arbor areas and townfolks will hear the familiar chant "Trick or Treat for UNICEF."

Sponsored locally by the churches of Lake Mary and nationally by the U. S. Committee for UNICEF, the United Nations Children's Fund Halloween program will be carried out at the same time in some 10,000 other communities. Last year more than two million American youngsters participated in the biggest project ever carried out by children to help children.

Each penny collected by the Trick or Treaters wearing the UNICEF black and orange tag can mean five glasses of milk for a needy child overseas, or the BCG vaccine to protect him from tuberculosis. A nickel's worth of UNICEF penicillin will cure a

child of yaws, a crippling tropical disease.

The junior citizens of the above named areas who are participating in Trick or Treat for UNICEF will meet at the Lake Mary Boy Scout Hut Monday at 6:15 p. m. They will canvass the neighborhoods in small groups, escorted by adults who are also volunteering their time.

After the collection, boys and girls in public grades, four through six, will return to the Lake Mary school, boys and girls in public grades seven and eight will return to the Lake Mary Boy Scout Hut and boys and girls in public grades nine through 12 will return to the Lake Mary Fire Department building for UNICEF Halloween parties which will include costume contests, games, and refreshments.

UNICEF is not a give-away program. Governments that request its aid spend an average of more than \$2.50 for each \$1.00

received in UNICEF supplies.

## Time Running Out For Navy Reserves

VAdm. W. R. Smedberg III, chief of Naval personnel, today advised high school seniors and graduates that they have until Nov. 18 to apply for the Navy's Reserve Officer Training Corp. Applicants will take the nationwide exam on Dec. 10.

The NROTC program makes it possible for a young man to earn a regular commission while studying at a civilian college of his choice. All tuition, fees and text books are provided by the Navy and an annual retainer of \$600 is given the student. During the summers students travel to many parts of the world on regular training cruises.

Upon completion of the four year schooling, a commission in the regular Navy or Marine Corps is received and the officer goes on regular duty.

The program is open to all 17-year-old high school seniors and graduates who will not have their 21st birthday before July 1, 1961. Those making a qualifying score will receive a rigid physical exam early next year. From the qualifying rolls, at least 1600 will be

picked to begin school next September.

NROTC also is open to enlisted men who are on active duty with the Navy or Marines, however a separate quota is established for these applicants.

Application forms are available at high schools, Navy Recruiting stations or from the Chief of Naval Personnel, Department of the Navy, Washington 25, D. C.

I was born in Boston and spent the first twenty-five years of my life there. I was an average Bostonian, who like many others respected the Kennedy family. The Kennedy family took decisive action in things cultural, philanthropic and civic for all to take advantage of and to enjoy. Boston College is Kennedy endowed, but available to Catholic, Protestant and Jews providing they have high entrance standing.

The Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr. Foundation since 1948 (long before Jack sought presidential nomination) has spent 13.3 millions on 2,000 non-denominational homes and hospitals in Massachusetts, New York, Illinois and California; 30 millions for doctors and psychologists to work on new research programs for the mentally retarded in our land.

The Kennedy family personified "family togetherness." Their family togetherness has been severely weakened; how can it be, when we have this togetherness stressed in our churches, literature, etc., of today? The Kennedy's have played together, laughed and cried together and worked for the common interest of the members of their family, and therefore, have the strongest foundation of good family living. Rose Kennedy, mother of Jack, instilled in her children, although they easily could have become idle rich decadents, "Your advantages carry with them strong obligations." You and I know that each of the Kennedy "Clan" carries out such obligations in different areas of good citizenship.

Papa Joe and Rose also stressed that no matter what job their children undertook, that they should do the job with courage, integrity and to the very best of their ability.

We sometimes hear people say "Just see how Kennedy got there," implying, of course, that Papa Joe bought him the senatorial seat. Jack worked hard when he made his political debut in 1946, in Boston's Eleventh District, flatly refusing any and all of the Honey Fitz Ward support. History points out that Kennedy won handsomely with 42 per cent of the vote over the politically well known Henry Cabot Lodge.

The prestige of America HAS slipped and noticeably during the past few years. With smug complacency we have permitted this to happen. To be the first nation in the world requires that we constantly must be working for the best. We need a man with foresight and awareness and part of

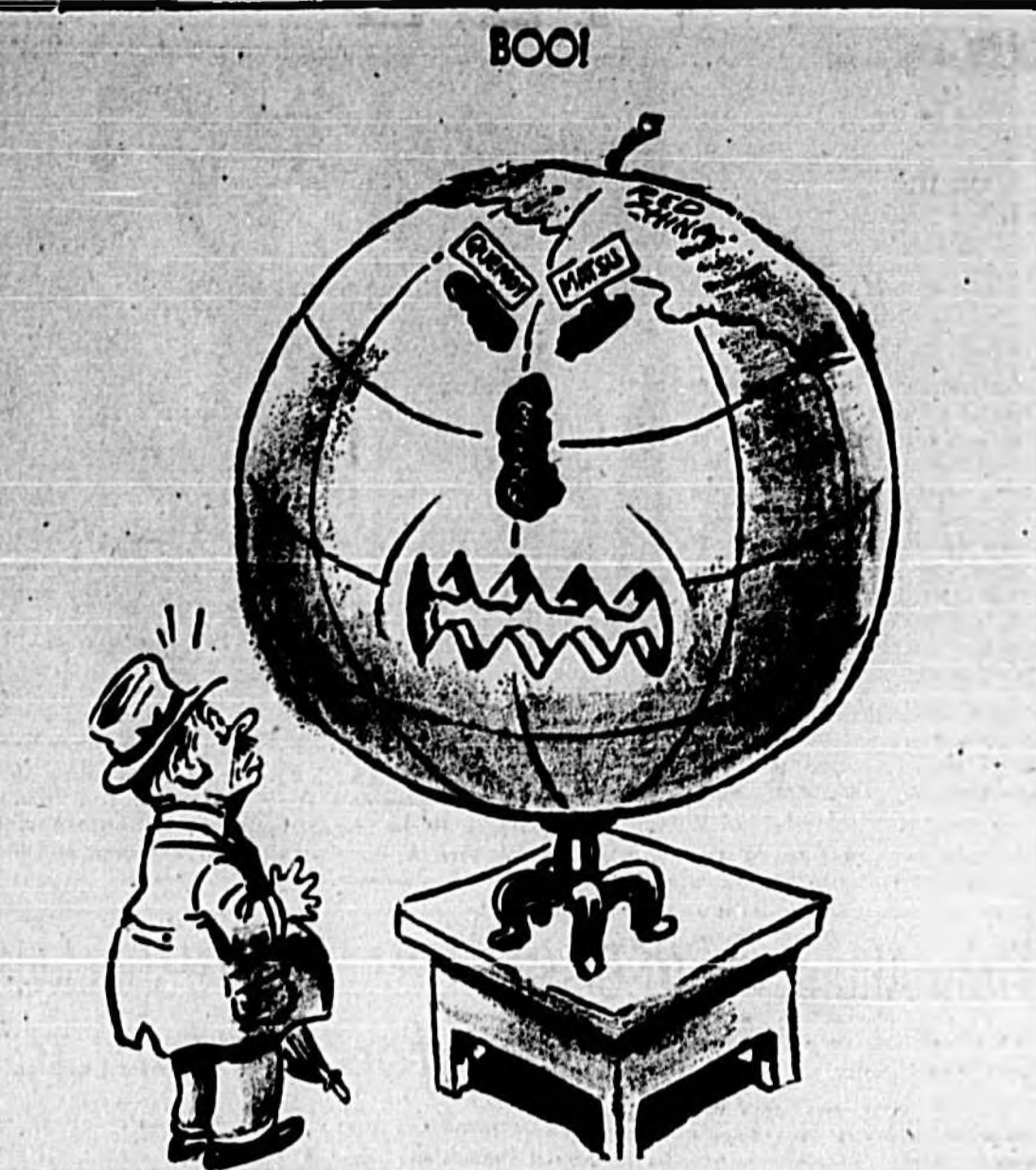

Leland's query about the "entailers" is clever, but you mothers need to tell your youngsters the truth about sex matters. Otherwise, you may become accessories to their later sexual malbehavior. Children are purely selfish at the outset. So give them the facts. Order the booklet below to help you answer their questions.

CASE G-410: Leland H., aged 4, is the son of an Army captain. Recently, his mother was describing an event that had happened years ago.

"Mommy," broke in Leland, "was that while I was still in the catalogue?"

Apparently, Leland was familiar with the common American custom of ordering household furniture from a mail order catalogue.

That's an improvement on the bizarre story that the stork brings babies.

"Mommy, where did I come from?" asks the usual child when it is about 3 years old.

In past years, mothers often acted prudish and thus were responsible for helping fan an abnormal interest in sexual matters by their fibs or evasive answers.

Instead, give the child the information it desires: Then it will not lie awake night indulging in satelicious dreams, as old fashioned folks mistakenly imagined.

"The truth shall make you free," says the Bible, and that is applicable to sex truths.

So when your child inquires as to where it came from, just reply:

"You came out of Mother's tummy."

That isn't anatomically exact, but the youngster regards the entire abdomen as "tummy" so you mothers will be talking language it understands.

"Yes, Dr. Crane," a fearful grandmother, recently protested, "but suppose the child wants to know how it got out of its mother's tummy?"

If it shows that much curiosity, then answer the youngster.

But the usual child waits a few years before he asks the second question. Then, possibly having noticed a pregnant wife in the neighborhood, it may casually inquire:

"Mommy, how did I get out?"

Since this query may not be apropos of anything that has been said during the past few minutes, the mother may not get the point.

"How did you get out of where?" she may reply.

"Well, you said babies come out of their mother's tummy. So how do they get out?"

The more easily understood answer involves a brief description of the Caesarian route, so you mothers may say:

"Sometimes it happens like this: After Mother goes to the hospital, the doctor gives her some medicine to put her to sleep. Then he cuts a little door in her tummy and lifts the baby, after which he sews the doorway shut again."

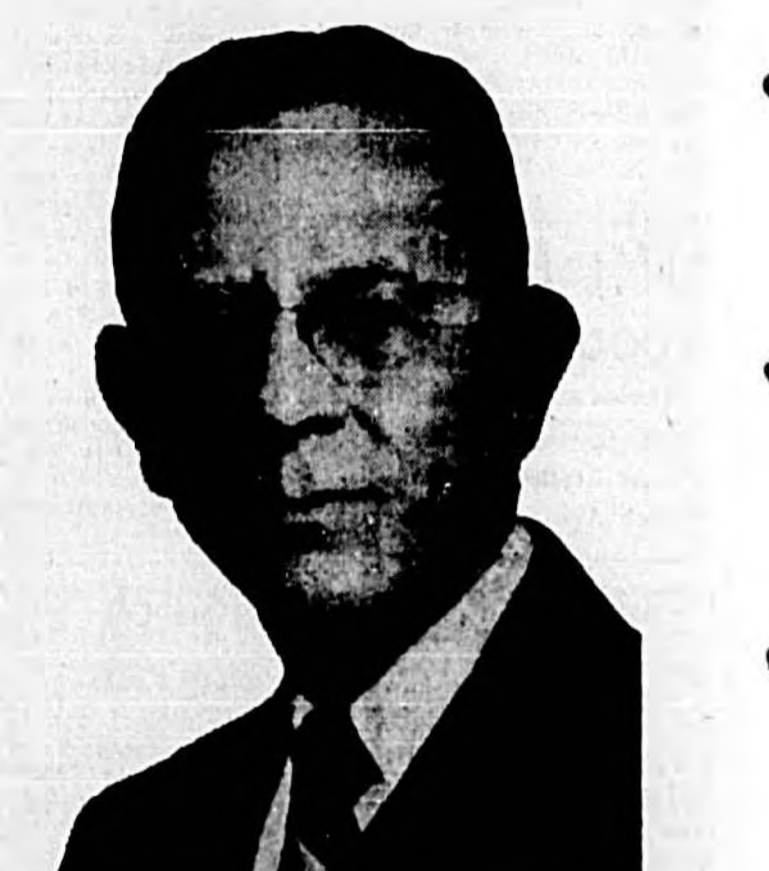

## Bait Box

The Florida Outdoor Writers' Assn. this week launched a campaign of opposition to the proposed constitutional amendment modifying the organization of the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

The move follows unanimous adoption of a report by the FOWA's special investigating committee at the organization's fall convention at Cape Coral.

Headed by Jim Martenhoff, boating editor of the Miami Herald, the committee's main purpose is to serve the public's outdoor interests by closely scrutinizing all legislation and other activities which would in any way affect Floridians.

This was the first in a series of quarterly reports the committee plans to make to the full organization.

The report said "The Florida Outdoor Writers' Association believes Amendment No. 3 is not only not in the best interests of Florida, but is actually an unwise and ill-advised effort to set Florida's wildlife resource management back a generation. In effect, it is an effort to start backward on the trail to the days of the senseless slaughter of the egrets."

"We feel the voters of Florida are unaware of the tragic potential inherent in this seemingly harmless Amendment No. 3," said Edmund McLaurin of St. Petersburg, president of the statewide group of newspaper, magazine, radio and television reporters in the outdoor field.

The investigating committee's report traced the history of wildlife management in Florida since the days when ruthless plume



hunters nearly wiped out the state's egret population. The report pointed out that game commissions had been established and abolished many times in the past 50 years—to the detriment of wildlife management.

"The FOWA regards the proposed amendment as an obvious political maneuver not in the best interests of the people of Florida," said McLaurin.

# U.S. Officials Believe Nikita May Open Diplomatic Offensive On Berlin

WASHINGTON (UPI) — High American officials believe Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev probably will launch a new diplomatic offensive against Berlin soon after the U. S. presidential election. They think he very likely will "firm up" his rather general demands, expressed in recent talks with West German and British of-

ficials, for an early settlement of the Berlin issue and on the question of a German treaty. Khrushchev wants an early end to the Allied occupation of West Berlin and separate peace treaties signed with West Germany and Communist East Germany. Officials here think it likely that Khrushchev will move quickly in an effort to embarrass the

new administration, whether it be Democratic or Republican, with demands for immediate negotiations on these critical issues. The Soviet leader is well aware that the new administration will be in no position to undertake substantive negotiations for several months. It will need first to get its feet on the ground, organize a legislative program and

chart its domestic as well as foreign course. The feeling here is that Khrushchev will try to exploit American inability to agree to quick negotiations by claiming again that the United States is stalling Russia's peaceful efforts to settle the Berlin and German crises. Khrushchev, in a talk last week with the West German ambassa-

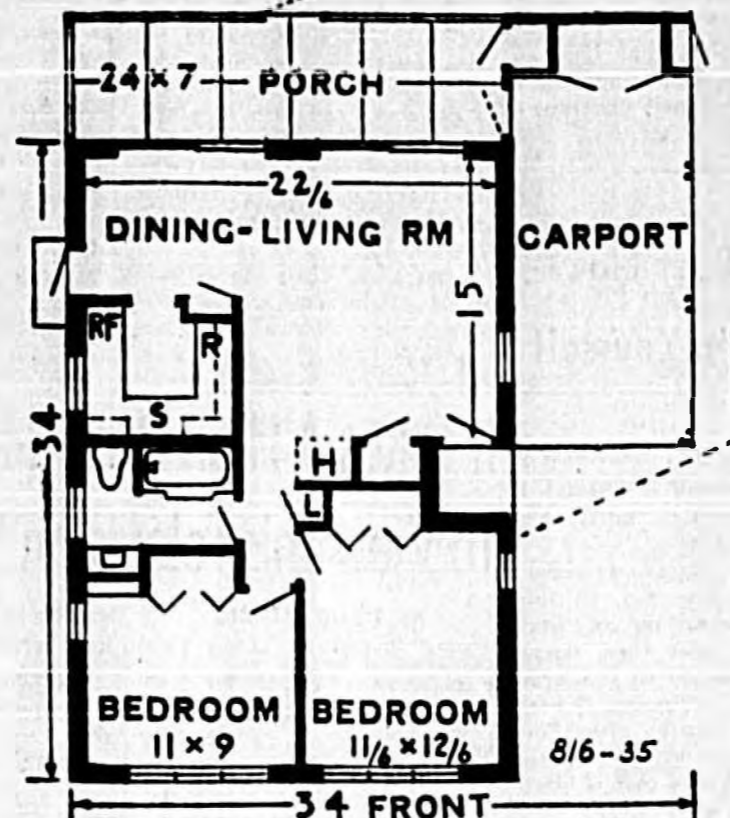
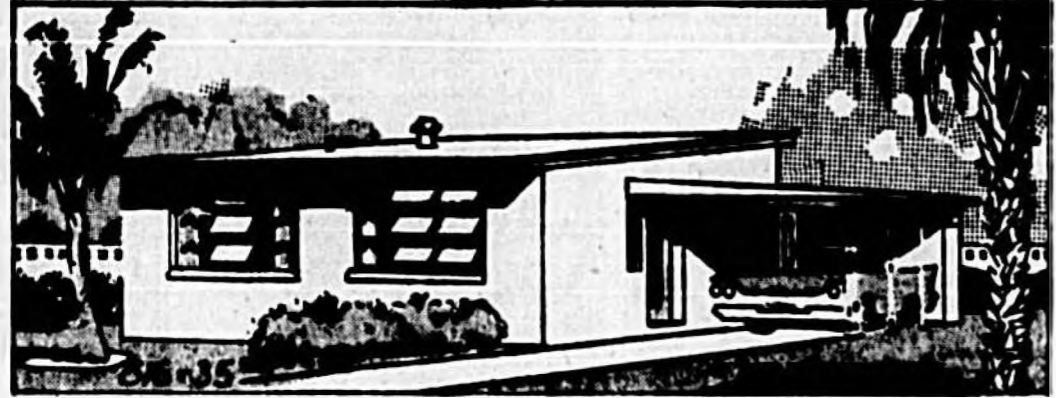
der to Moscow, said that he wanted some decision on Berlin by May 1. He added that he would sign a separate peace treaty with East Germany by next September at the latest, if the Allies had not come to terms by that time. The United States, Britain and France warned the Soviet Union again Thursday against trying to place any restrictions on the air

corridors into Red-encircled West Berlin. The Western powers said any such attempts would create "a dangerous situation" for which the Russians would be held "fully responsible." The Western notes, identical in wording, again rejected Moscow's argument that the Soviet sector of Berlin is part of East Germany.

# House Plans with a Florida Flavor!

## 9-Ft. Ceiling and 8-Ft. Glass Doors Make Cheery Living Room



This 24 foot x 34 foot two-bedroom slab house is designed for a narrow, level lot with the preferred view (or sun exposure) away from the street. That is why the L-shaped living-dining area and the 24 foot x 7 foot screened porch face the garden, making an unusually cheerful, liveable home.

The indoor-outdoor feeling is increased by two 8-foot sliding glass doors between the living-dining area and the porch. Furthermore, there is a 9-foot ceiling at this widest end of the room. This is possible because the shed roof slopes up from the street side. The ceiling which is 7 1/2 feet high at the bedroom end follows the roof line.

**FLOOR PLAN**  
This house, No. 816-35, which has a simple rectangular floor plan, is 816 square feet in area, and the 10 foot x 20 foot carport is attached along the end wall of the living room and the porch. The carport and porch are topped with an 8-foot roof which forms an L around the garden side of the house, while on the street side it is extended to provide shelter over the house entrance (see picture and dotted line on plan).

The 8 foot x 7 foot kitchen with its U-shaped work-counter is handy to the dining room and the service door. An outside window lights the counter-space between the sink (S) and the refrigerator (RF). The range (R) has a hood and fan over it. Wall cabinets are shown dotted on the plan. For greater economy of plumbing installation, the sink is back-to-back to the bathroom fixtures. There is a 30 inch x 12 inch closet in the dining

area which may be used for china. If desired, the kitchen may be closed off from the dining area by a folding door (not shown on plan).

**BEDROOM AREA**  
Both bedrooms have cross ventilation and bi-fold doors on closets; the master bedroom has a 5-foot closet and the other bedroom a 4 1/2-foot closet with 36 inch wide shelving next to it. A linen closet (L) is handy to bedrooms and bath.

The 8-foot-deep bathroom has the tub away from the window the wall-hung toilet is hidden behind the shower-head wall, and the 26 inch wide counter features a built-in washbasin with cabinets underneath and mirrors above it. Provision for a small built-in electric heater is also shown on the blueprints.

There is an additional closet in the living room and a 3 foot x 10 foot storage wall at the back of the carport with closets opening into the carport, the porch, and the garden.

The construction of Home No. 816-35 is as follows: The 4-inch-thick and reinforced floor slab is poured over solidly compacted fill and vapor mem-

brane. All exterior walls are of 8-inch-thick concrete blocks with furring strips (or insulation boards) with plaster on the inside and stucco on the outside. All interior partitions are of regular wood frame and plastered on both sides. The ceilings, also plastered, follow the lines of the roof, and heavy insulation is called for between the rafters. Heating may be oil or electric.

### Light Up Your Foyer

CHICAGO (UPI) — A few carefully chosen accessories in the foyer will leave a good first impression on visitors.

Harry Layton, an accessories designer (for Syracuse Ornamental Co., Inc.) suggests baroque accessories for this area as highly decorative and suitable to almost any decor. These might include a big rectangular mirror framed in wood with a metallic gold finish, perhaps deeply carved with stylized scrolls and flanked by a pair of sconces carved in the same scroll motif. The three pieces can be hung on a small wall or in a recessed niche.

Greenery, always attractive indoors, also provides a nice touch for the foyer. It can be set in wall planters with brass containers

that hold real or artificial leaves or flowers. A pair of the planters, hung on either side of a door, might also be filled with flowers, where more color is desired.

Artificial lemon and orange trees also make highly decorative foyer accessories that require little space. Their realistic-looking painted metal fruit and leaves form an interesting pattern on the wall.

Any efforts to decorate the foyer are wasted without the proper lighting, which has induced at least one lamp manufacturer (Lightolier) to come up with architectural translucent panels that fit over fluorescent bulbs. The lamps, available in a variety of sizes and shapes, can be affixed to ceiling or wall.

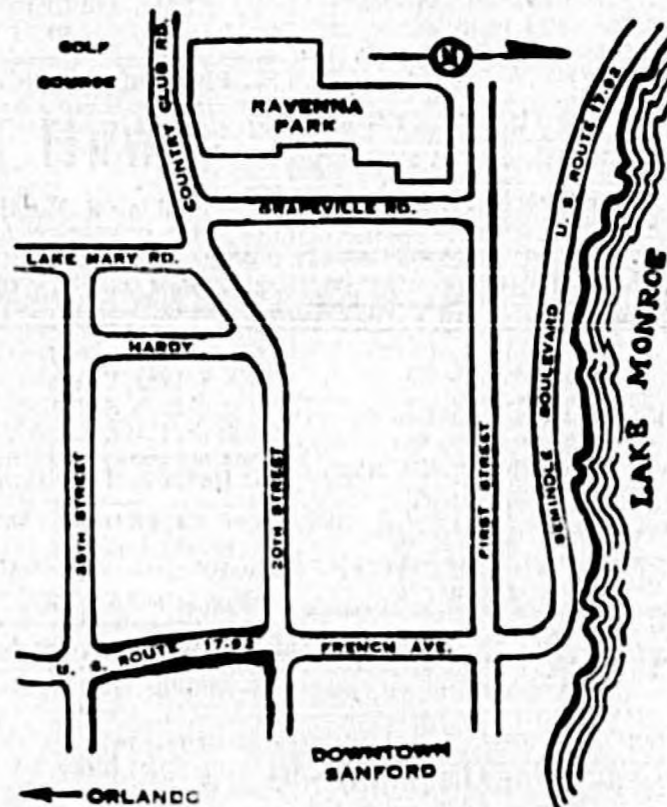
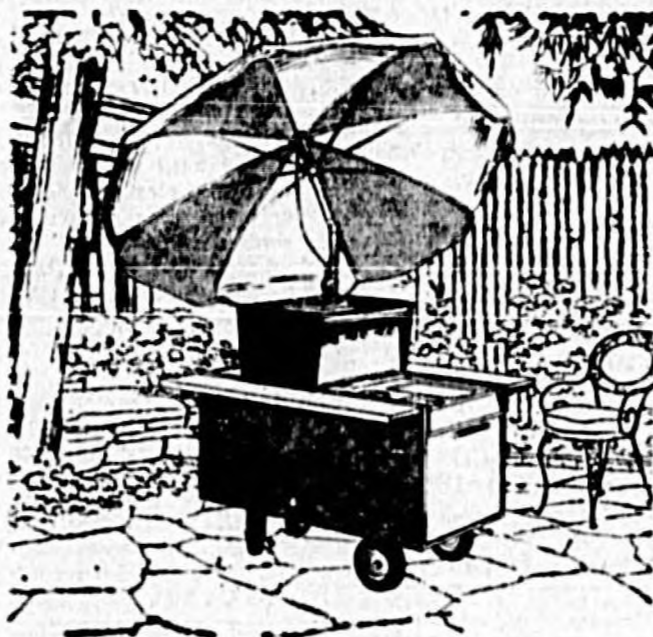

## Castro Halts Fleeing Cubans

HAVANA (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro's revolutionary government started cracking down on the exodus of Cubans today and two foreign airlines decided to quit because of lack of business.

The government was reported ready to nationalize travel agencies to tighten its control over the swarms of nationals fleeing to the United States and other foreign countries.

Tens of thousands already have left and, with the government whipping up fears of a U. S. supported invasion, the outgoing stream increased.

The revolutionary regime circulated a long list of names of bank executives shareholders and executives of nationalized businesses and industries with instructions to airport and harbor officials not to let them leave the country. Immigration authorities were told to lift their passports.

The foreign counter-revolutionary Swan Island radio broadcast names on the list telling them to seek asylum in foreign embassies.

The Dutch KLM airlines and the Venezuelan national airline LAV served notice they would pull out this week. LAV closed its ticket office today. KLM told passengers booked on flights to Miami Tuesday to leave today as "there may be no more flights from Havana."

The "Show of Shows," one of the most popular television programs in Cuba, announced Sunday night it was going off the air to make room for "Television Revolution," a government sponsored day long propaganda program.

Television has been totally nationalized in Cuba and purged of almost all U. S. programs except Perry Mason and Huckelberry. Some U. S. newsreels are used but slanted for government purposes.

Invasion talk simmered down somewhat Sunday when military men, who had been alerted for duty after 1,400 U. S. Marines

landed at Guantanamo naval base for weekend liberty, were released from duty in the afternoon.

However, all doctors and nurses were kept on duty at hospitals through the weekend in conjunction with the alert.

The U. S. Navy attack transport Boxer sailed from Guantanamo Base early today carrying out the Marines whose Saturday arrival for a liberty week-end raised Cuban cries of "provocation."

A base spokesman said the Marines' weekend stay was "quiet and normal." It was their first shore leave in a month of maneuvers.

MIAMI (UPI)—The State Patrol today counted at least 16 persons dead from traffic crashes between 8 p.m. Friday and midnight Sunday in one of the year's bloodiest and most tragic weekends.

**Goldfine Aide Guilty**  
BOSTON (UPI)—Miss Mildred Paperman, secretary-partner to industrialist Bernard Goldfine, pleaded guilty today at the outset of her trial on income tax evasion charges. She was given a suspended four month jail term and fined \$2,300 on each of five counts.

**Bryant Spends \$4,994**  
TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Farris Bryant, Democratic nominee for governor, said today he spent \$4,994 and collected \$3,400 in his campaign last week. His GOP opponent, George Peterson of Fort Lauderdale, said he spent \$2,250 and collected \$1,157 in the same period.

A possible half-million-dollar fire was prevented Saturday afternoon when the Lake Mary, NAS and the Forestry Service fire departments answered a call at the American National Foods Corp. on Grapeville and McCracken Rd.

M. J. Bridges, living nearby, spotted the fire and called the Lake Mary and NAS departments. Both arrived shortly after and extinguished flames on the loading ramp bordering the ACL Railroad Line.

At 11:45 p. m. the fire again flared up and the Naval base answered the call. The Lake Mary Fire Dept. was unable to come due to a break-down in the equipment. Causes of the fire is yet undetermined.

The fire damage spread over 100-feet of the ramp. Damage was also done to an electric motor, some crosses of the ACL Railroad and minor damage to the railroad line itself.

## Presidential Politics

Kennedy Stresses Strength . . . Nixon Plans One-Two

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—Sen. John F. Kennedy derided Vice President Richard M. Nixon's strategy for peace today by insisting "there is no push-button magic for averting war."

The Democratic presidential candidate said he is "convinced that peace can be obtained only through a stronger America—an America in which a strong economy, supporting a strong defense posture, is manned by a citizenry striving in their sense of purpose. . . ."
