# State race officials scrap visit

**SANFORD** — A state agency that mediates situations of racial tension has decided to postpone making a visit to Sanford because the situation does not merit immediate action by the agency.

Ed Dixon, assistant director of race and government relations for the Commission on Human Relations, had planned to meet with city officials next week. However, he said Wednesday the trip is being postponed, and would not commit on whether a visit to the city in

the future would be scheduled.

"We are not coming next week because we're too busy elsewhere," Dixon said. "Right now, (Sanford) does not have the priority of the other situations we are dealing with statewide."

Dixon stressed that the Commission on Human Relations is not conducting an investigation into racial tension in

Sanford. Instead, the Commission is prepared to offer mediation and conflict resolution if it is necessary.

Dixon is the director of a unit formed to assist communities by providing mediation, discussions, and conflict resolution.

"We don't do investigations," Dixon said. "We are not an investigative agency.

We are available strictly to offer tension management, conflict management, to assess the situation and the need for services that community relations provides."

One reason for a visit by the Commission on Human Relations would be an invitation by city officials.

Although city officials did not initiate contact with the Commission, Dixon has been in contact with Mayor Larry Dale. Dixon did not say whether anyone invited the Commission to visit the city.

## Mayer: 'The most beautiful woman in films'

**CASSELBERRY** — Hedy Lamarr, the famed actress from the Golden Age of movies, was found dead Wednesday in her Casselberry home.

Lamarr, 86, was found by friends who were checking on her shortly before noon in her home located at 968 Wesson Drive.

Investigators say Lamarr died within the previous 24 hours of natural causes. No autopsy will be performed on her body, said Steve Olson, a spokesman for the Seminole

County Sheriff's Office.

She had lived in the Orlando area for the past decade, including Allamonte Springs, moving to an unincorporated area of Casselberry several months ago.

Born in Vienna, Austria, as Hedwig Eva Kiesler, Lamarr's date of birth is listed as Nov. 9, 1913. However, she told her friends she was born Nov. 9, 1914. She married six times, having two children and one adopted son with John Loder.

"She was described as quite reclusive, only seen outside when taking out the garbage to the curb or making a trip to

the dentist's or doctor's office," Olson said.

The reclusive life in retirement belies Lamarr's active life as a movie star.

She began making films in Germany in 1930. Her 1933 film "Ecstasy" included nude scenes that, while tame by today's standards, caused the film at the time to be banned by the US government.

When Adolph Hitler assumed power in Germany, she left both her husband and country for London. While there, she met Louis B. Mayer who signed her for a contract See Lamarr, Page 5A

## Residents lawsuit against City filed with Circuit Court

**SANFORD** — The lawsuit by seven residents of Sanford's historic district, seeking an injunction prohibiting Sanford from granting an off-street parking waiver for a free dinner program proposed by Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, has been filed in Circuit Court.

The suit, Joseph DeSantis et al. versus the city of Sanford, was filed in the Circuit Court of the 18th Judicial Circuit for Seminole County on Tuesday. A complaint with intent to file suit was delivered to city officials in December, 1999. The city had 30 days to respond before the suit could be filed in court.

The City Commission responded to the complaint by agreeing to work with Jean Metts, director of Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, in seeking legal representation. Metts said she hopes an attorney will take the case free of charge.

The city has another 45 days to respond to the suit being filed in Circuit Court. Sanford Mayor Larry Dale has said the City Commission needs to meet

in an executive session to discuss the suit as soon as it is filed.

The suit, obtained through the Clerk of the Court's Office, alleges that without an injunction, the value of the plaintiffs' properties will be harmed by the operation of the Seminole Volunteer Enterprises meal site located at 407 W. 4th Street.

"The merits of the lawsuit have always been about the equal enforcement of land development regulations, planning and zoning codes, and code enforcement," DeSantis said. "The City Commission cannot arbitrarily and capriciously apply the laws to one individual and not apply them to everyone."

The Sanford City Commission in November granted a parking variance to Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, allowing the non-profit agency to open a meal site that will serve up to 100 needy people in conjunction with existing food distribution programs.

The agency plans to serve its first dinner on Feb. 14. Dinners would initially be served at See Lawsuit, Page 5A

## Arbor Day: The floating holiday

**SANFORD** — If Arbor Day was a legal holiday causing banks, governments and many businesses to close, we wouldn't get much accomplished. Arbor Day is probably the most prominent holiday, seemingly observed whenever the occasion arises.

The first Arbor Day was April 10, 1872. It was the idea of J. Sterling Morton, a pioneer, journalist and orator who settled in Nebraska in 1854. He advocated tree planting and care, and wrote and spoke about environ-

mental stewardship and the interrelatedness of life.

Through the newspapers and speeches he encouraged everyone to set aside a specific day to plant trees. The suggestion was adopted by the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture and became legal in that state in 1872. More than a million trees were planted on that day, and Morton became known as the Father of Arbor Day.

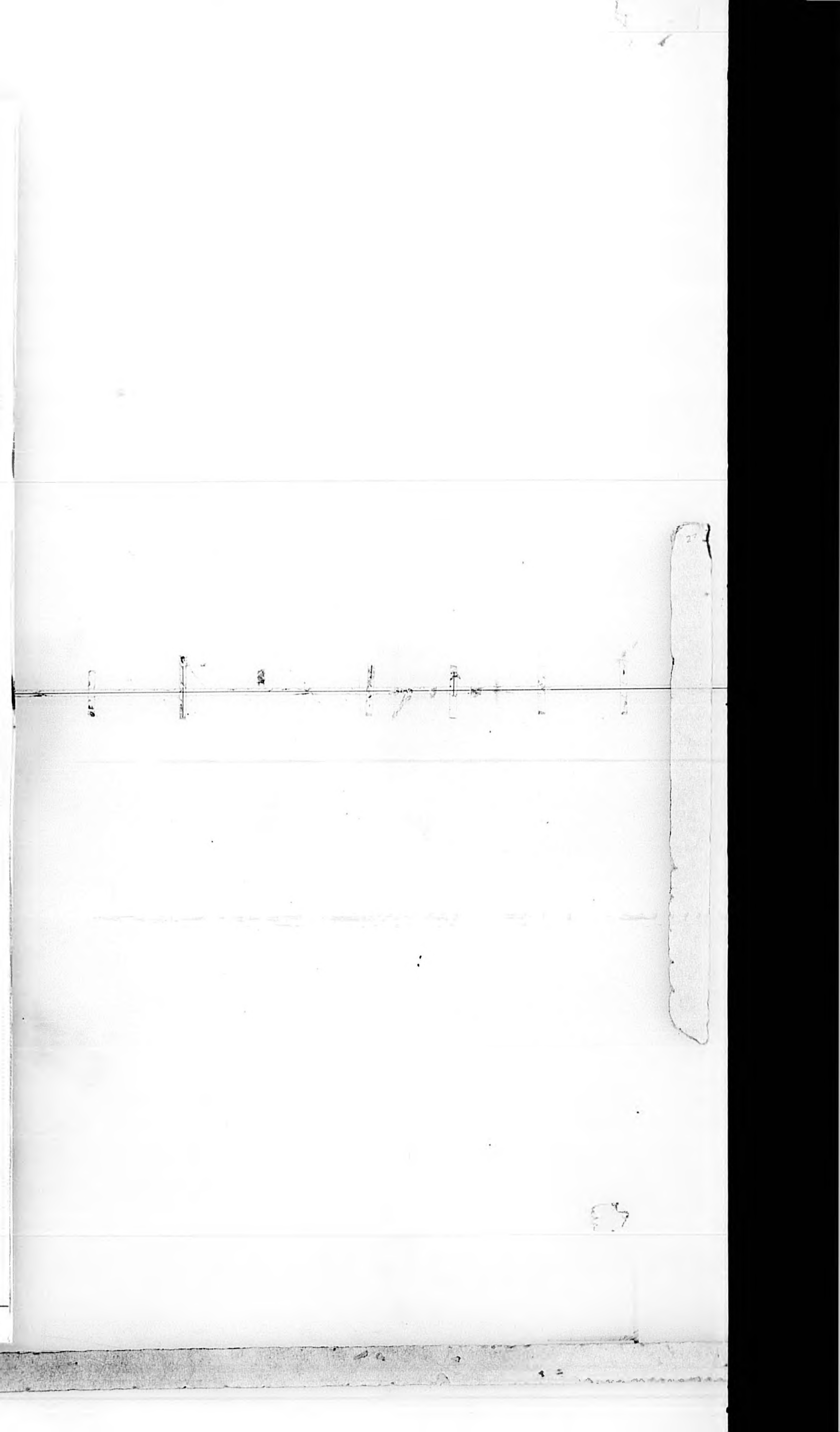
By 1890, Arbor Day was celebrated in every state of the union. The word "arbor" is derived from the Latin word for "tree."

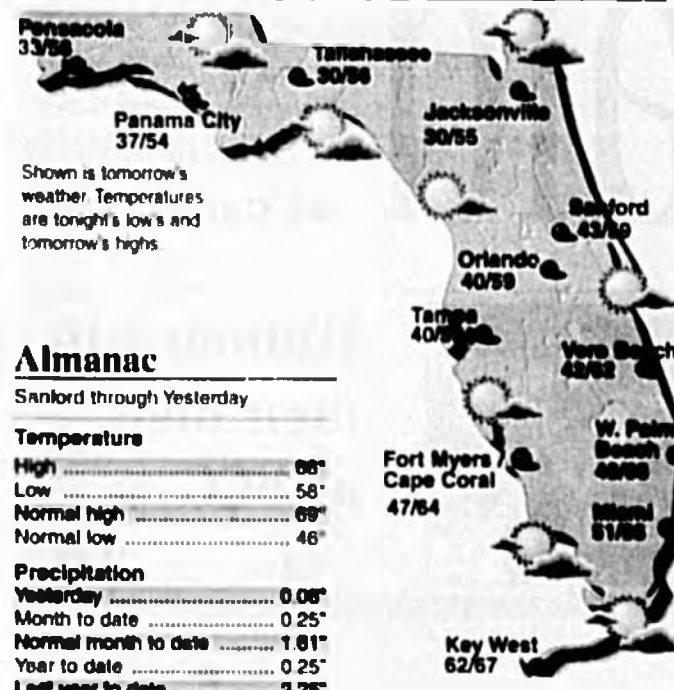

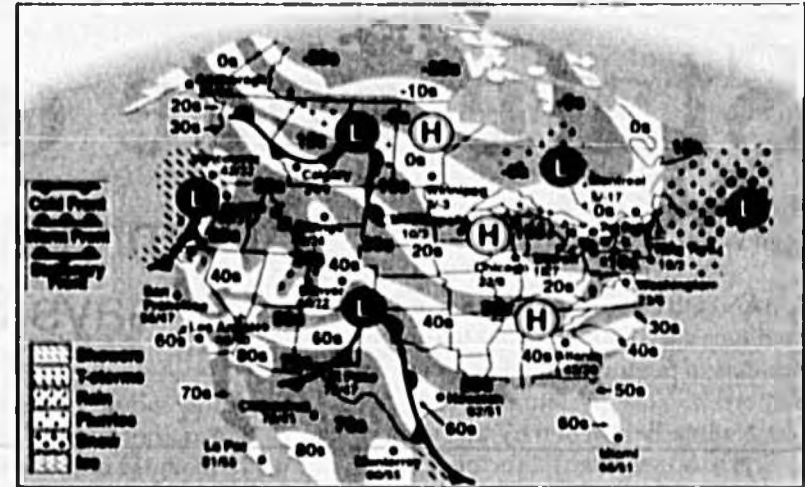

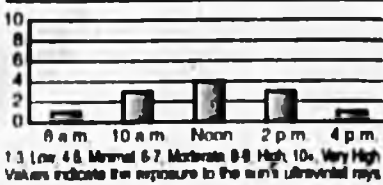

# Raising bar exam has nothing to do with race

What percentage of correct answers do you think it takes to pass a Florida bar exam? Do you think 56 percent would be enough? Or perhaps 59 percent?

Right now, 56 percent is good enough. There's a proposal by the state's law examiners to nudge it up to 59 percent.

Well, you would think someone had raised a Confederate flag over the courthouse in Tallahassee. A number of law school deans say raising the exam requirements discriminates against African American and Hispanic students. Don't do it, they say.

Here's what's happening. According to the Florida Bar, only 2 percent of Florida's lawyers are black and 6 percent are Hispanic. Should the bar exam get tougher, some believe it will stop more minority students from making it into the legal profession.

Most of us probably don't appreciate what it takes for a man or a woman to get a law degree. We know John Kennedy Jr. had to take a few more exams than he expected. With so many people breaking

the law, attorneys-to-be have much to learn.

If a black man wants to play professional basketball, he competes with other blacks and whites each shooting at a basket 10-feet from the floor. Why then, would it be different for those wishing to become attorneys to be tested to the highest standard?

As it is the current passing grade for Florida law students places in the nation's bottom third. If the state adopts the proposed bar exam, it would be in the top third. The Florida Supreme Court is taking public comment until Feb. 14.

If I were a minority attorney who is licensed and practicing in Florida, I would be outraged that anyone thought a tougher exam would discriminate against minorities. Advancing to law school ends prejudices and discrimination. The finest of students pass or fail the bar. Making the bar exam tougher means making it tougher for everyone.

"These law school deans who say minorities will be hurt if the grades get tougher are

wrong," said Lurlene M. Sweeting, an educator and mother of attorney James Sweeting III, who has law offices in Orlando and Daytona Beach.

"For years, people who should know better have tried to categorize people," said Lurlene Sweeting, a black woman. "They've measure a person's innate capacity and make their own conclusions. What's important to test a person on what he has been exposed to. If that exposure is to law, that person - black or white - has the same chance to succeed."

Attorney James Sweeting never had trouble learning. He gained his law degree from Stetson University. He passed the bar exam the first time he took it. "The bar exam is an important test but not the final measure of a good attorney," Sweeting said.

"All too frequently testing in itself as been an exclusionary tool," Sweeting said. "This isn't the case here. The bar exam is the same for everyone. That's why I don't think that lowering it or making it higher is that controversial. This is a race neutral situation."

least three days per week. Dinners are planned for Monday, Tuesday and Friday from 4:30 p.m. to 7 p.m.

If the injunction is granted against the city, the commission may be required to reconsider the parking variance.

Meanwhile, DeSantis said he does not accept an apology made by Metts regarding remarks on Jan. 10 before the City Commission in which she accused the commission and historic district residents of fostering racial prejudice.

"I don't buy her apology for two seconds," DeSantis said. "Metts' libelous statements were not made in an extemporaneous or impromptu fashion. They were drawn from a written and prepared statement. Her attack was premeditated and calculated. Jean Metts knew exactly what she was doing."

Metts said she will issue a formal apology before the City Commission on Monday, Jan. 24.

"It has been weighing heavily on my mind," Metts said. "It is not in my nature to hurt people, but to help people."

The plaintiffs are seeking a permanent injunction prohibiting the city from granting a variance waiving off-street parking requirements for a restaurant.

In addition, the suit requests the Circuit Court to conduct a trial and declare the City Commission's development order concerning the variance inconsistent with the city's comprehensive plan.

The suit also seeks a temporary injunction against the city prohibiting the operation of the restaurant. The suit asks the Circuit Court to prohibit the city from issuing development

orders, occupational licenses or certificates of occupancy at the site.

Without the waiver, city codes would have required the agency to provide 40 parking spaces in order to serve up to 100 people. Seminole Volunteer Enterprises does not have on-site parking, according to city records. Those parking at the facility tend to use areas along city rights-of-way and other public parking spaces.

The program has drawn fire from many residents of Sanford's historic district who oppose plans by Seminole Volunteer Enterprises to serve dinners for the needy, saying the program will increase crime and vagrancy in the area.

The Winter Springs law firm of Lefler & Associates is representing the historic district residents in the case.

with the Hollywood studio MGM.

After a screen test, Mayer changed her last name to Lamarr in honor of silent film star Barbara Lamarr. She made her U.S. film debut as Gaby in the 1938 film "Algiers."

Mayer publicized Lamarr as "the most beautiful woman in films," and the successor to siren Greta Garbo. The moneysayer stayed with Lamarr throughout her career.

Her most famous roles include Tondelayo in the 1942 classic "White Cargo" and Delilah in the 1949 Cecil B. DeMille film "Samson and Delilah." Her final film was "The Female Animal," made in 1957.

She turned down the leads in both "Gaslight" and "Casablanca."

In addition to acting, Lamarr was also an inventor. In 1942, under her married name Hedy Kiesler Markey, she was awarded a patent along with co-inventor George Anthelil, for a "Secret Communication System." The invention was the first instance of spread-spectrum communications based on frequency-hopping techniques.

While it was never used during WWII, once the patent expired Sylvania used a modified method in satellite technology.

Life in retirement occasionally brought trouble for Lamarr. She was arrested for shoplifting in January 1966 and found not guilty. She was also arrested for shoplifting in 1991, and the charges were dropped.

Lamarr is survived by her three children — Anthony, James and Denise.

## Know all the facts about fictitious name registration

A few months ago we discussed the Fictitious Name Statute whose purpose is to protect the public, to give the public information as to person with whom the public deals, and to afford protection against fraud and deceit.

As discussed then, the Fictitious Name Statute prohibits a person or persons from engaging in business under a fictitious name unless they first register the name with the Division of Corporations of the Department of State. However, not everyone is required to register.

A business formed by an attorney licensed to practice law in this state, or

by a person licensed by the Department of Business and

Professional Regulation, for the purpose of practicing his licensed profession need not be registered under this section. Additionally, a business incorporated or authorized under Florida law is not required to register the corporate name unless the name that the corporation intends to conduct business under differs from the corporation's name as stated in its articles of incorporation. However,

those persons that are not exempt must register as required by law.

As previously noted, a fictitious name registration is valid for a period

of five years. At any time between July 1 and Dec. 31 of the fifth year, the registrant may file a renewal statement. Upon timely filing of a renewal statement, the effectiveness of the name registration is continued for five more years which, like the original registration, expires on Dec. 31 of the fifth year.

However, if the owner of the name registration fails to file a renewal and pay the appropriate processing fees prior to Dec. 31 of the year of expiration, the name registration expires. In the event a name registration is allowed to expire, the Division of Corporations will remove the name registration from its records and may purge the registration.

In order to avoid the unwanted

expiration and removal of name registrations, at least three months prior to the expiration date of the registration, the Division of Corporations will mail a statement of renewal to the last reported mailing address of the registration name on its records. This puts registrants on notice that if they wish their fictitious name to remain registered so that they may continue to conduct business in the state, they must file a renewal.

The above renewal procedure, however, does not apply if the ownership of the business registered changes. Under these circumstances, the owner of record with the division must file a cancellation and reregistration that meets the requirements of a name being registered for the first time.

Additionally, said cancellation and reregistration must be done within 30 days after the occurrence of such change.

Complying with the Fictitious Name Statute, which prohibits a person or persons from engaging in business under a fictitious name unless they first register the name with the Division of Corporations, is relatively simple. However, those persons not exempt from the registration, must follow up on their renewals. In the coming weeks we will discuss other aspects of business law.

DEAR HURTING: Please accept my sympathy for the loss of your beloved wife. I'm sure the loss is compounded by the isolation you are now feeling. However, since I do not know the friends and relatives you mention, I cannot guess at the reason they have dropped away just when you need them most.

In the same batch of letters as yours, I received another that touches on the same subject. I think you'll find it informative. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: I recently lost my dear husband, who died very suddenly. The grief following such a tragedy is indescribable. My salvation has been to keep busy and to join a grief support group.

The reason I am writing to you is to urge anyone who has

suffered a devastating loss to find a grief support group and join. The first meeting or two is very hard, but stick with it and you will find solace in the friendships and the sharing of your feelings. It was stated at one of our meetings that "We are a group of people who belong to a very exclusive club that no one wanted to join, but each of us paid the dearest price on Earth to join." All of us in this group agree that the best medicine for our grief is our weekly meetings.

I encourage all people who are grieving to find a grief support group. Ours was formed by a coalition of churches. Following the death of my husband, the mortuary, the hospital and my church all told me of grief groups. They are out there, and you don't have to look too far to find them.

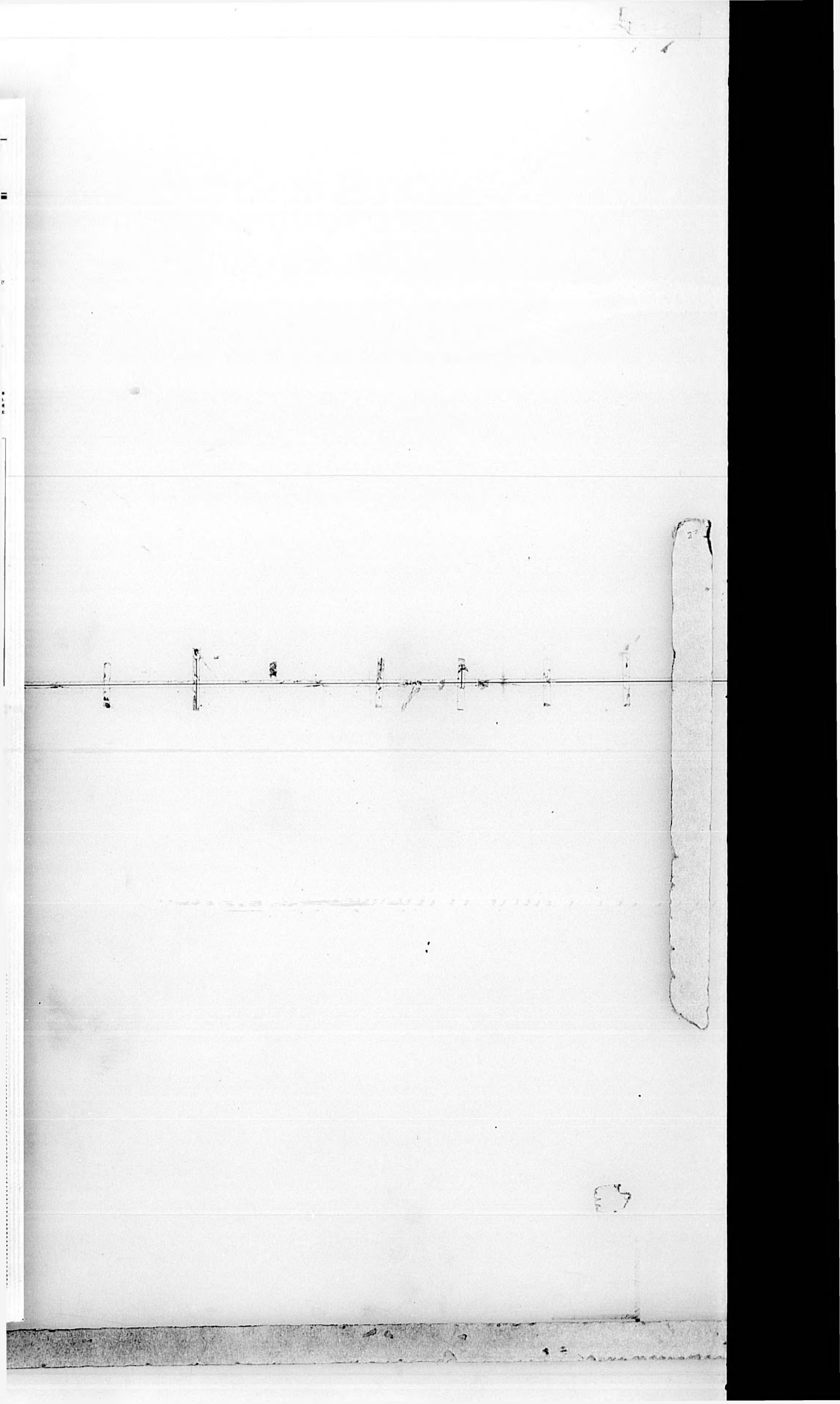

## Schmidt moved to St. Louis

LAKE BUENA VISTA - Indy Racing League driver Sam Schmidt, paralyzed in a testing accident Jan. 6, was transferred Jan. 18 from Orlando Regional Medical Center to the Barnes-Jewish Hospital and Washington University School of Medicine Spinal Cord Injury Program in St. Louis. Treadway Racing officials announced.

The Barnes-Jewish/Washington University program provides state-of-the-art medical, surgical, rehabilitative and long-term care for individuals with a spinal-cord injury. The program also is a leader in research and implementation of medical and surgical treatments for spinal-cord injuries.

Schmidt continues to suffer from paralysis from the clavicle down due to a spinal fracture suffered in the accident during the league's Open Test at Walt Disney World Speedway. He is breathing with the aid of a respirator and is awake, alert and aware of his surroundings. Treadway Racing spokesperson Ruthie Culbertson said.

Neurosurgeon Dr. Phillip St. Louis used a pin and a bone graft to fuse Schmidt's C-3 and C-4 vertebrae during surgery Jan. 6.

Schmidt was testing with other Indy Racing drivers in preparation for the season-opening Delphi Indy 200 at Walt Disney World Speedway on Jan. 29.

## Win at Bridge

### Out of the medals

 Have you guessed which country has the fourth-greatest percentage of Internet users? In case you've been abroad for the last three days, the leading nations are Iceland (320 surfers per 1,000 population), Finland (305) and Norway (304).  
 This deal was declared by Anders Morath during his country's march to the 1977 European Championship title. His performance won that year's Bois Brillancy Prize.  
 In the other room, the Spanish pair reached six diamonds by North. Unfortunately for them, East led a club one down.  
 One no-trump was a forcing two-way response that, when followed by three diamonds, announced a slam-try in diamonds. Three no-trump showed a minimum with no side-suit shortage. Four clubs was a cue-bid, at which point

West came out of a stupor to ask questions. The significance was not wasted on Morath, who converted to six no-trump to protect his club king.  
 West led the heart two.  
 Declarer won in hand, played a diamond to dummy's jack, and took a spade finesse. Next, Morath collected his four remaining diamond tricks, throwing a spade from hand while West released a pair of clubs. Morath took a second spade finesse and cashed the spade ace, making West feel uncomfortable. He had to retain three hearts, so discarded the club queen.  
 Now it was easy for Morath to lead the club 10 out of the ace. Morath, who is from Sweden, took the last three tricks with dummy's heart ace-queen and his club king.

## Doctor Gott

### Here's what happens with edema

DEAR DR. GOTT: My legs are swollen. The skin cracks and bleeds. I've been told to elevate my legs, but I can't sit all day in a lounge chair. My doctor has prescribed diuretic medicine and says there's no cure. Is he correct?  
 DEAR READER: You appear to be suffering from chronic venous insufficiency, a condition caused by poor circulation in the legs, leading to edema (swelling) and stasis dermatitis (break-down of the skin). Here is what I think is happening: When we sit or stand, gravity pulls blood into the leg veins, toward the feet. This causes a corresponding increase in hydrostatic pressure; that is, pressure in the leg veins increases, leading to a condition called dependent edema. Ordinarily, venous blood does not

tend to pool in the lower legs, because of a system of valves that prevents excessive venous backflow. However, if the valves are incompetent and don't fully close — as is the case with varicose veins — the veins will dilate and stretch over time, thereby accepting more blood and further increasing the pressure. Eventually, the veins balloon out. As their walls become thinner, colorless liquid from the blood leaks out into tissues. This edema fluid causes tissue swelling, a feeling of heaviness and — eventually — skin irritation.  
 Dependent edema is also a consequence of other conditions, however, including heart failure, liver disease, malnutrition and pregnancy. (The edema of pregnancy is caused by the developing baby that exerts progressive pressure on the pelvic veins, thereby increasing hydrostatic

pressure in the legs.) Elevation of the legs and avoidance of prolonged standing will help the condition by using gravity to encourage blood flow out of the lower extremities. In addition, diuretic drugs, which stimulate the kidneys to excrete excessive fluid, will often reduce edema. As you can see, treatment of edema and stasis dermatitis depends on the cause. Topical measures — such as moisturizing creams, prompt attention to infection, avoidance of scratches and other trauma, and careful washing — will help maintain skin integrity and reduce discomfort. However, despite skin treatment, effective therapy must also address the underlying condition. While your doctor may be correct that, in your case, the affliction cannot be cured, useful therapy is certainly available to minimize your discomfort.
