SPEARING OF FISH

Considerable publicity has been given throughout the country to the onservation measures advocated by the Florida Fish and Came Protective Association, organized several months ago by the sportsmen of the atate. Doubtless the publicity will tend to help the association in its work. It may have another result, however, which will not be so beneficint. Northern anglers may get the tden that the supply of fish in Florida waters has been exhausted and that it would be foolish to come to the state with the expertation of backing good

It would be unfortunate if this idea became general, particularly so bezause it is not based on fact. The truth is, of course, that the tourist angler can find as good sport in Florida today as he could at any time in the past. That does not mean that the fish are as numerous in all sections of the state as they used to be. In some of the more thickly settled lecalities the waters really have been "fished out." Hot there are still many places remaining where the angler can make connections with as many fighters as he wants.

In advocating fish conservation, the state association refers mainly to the fresh water species. And the efforts of the association to restock the lakes and rivers and to prevent illegal fishing are highly meritorious. Steps certainly must be taken to protect the fresh water fish from extermination. The supply is limited and when diminished beyond a certain degree it will be difficult, if not impossible, to demands. 4-Tampa Tribune. The teplenish it.





money value of all crops in the Sixth i Federal Reserve District this year will be "appreciably in excess of that of last year," the Atlanta Federal Reserve Bank declared today in its monthly business review.

"This especially is true of cotton," the report said, "as the estimated production this year is over 2,000,000 bales greater than the final ginnings of last year's crop, and the range of prices this fall is more favorable than that of a year ago."

The Alabama agriculture statistician, the report continued, estimated the total agricultural production for that state this year will be \$121,058,-000 greater in value than for 1921.

Georgia's apple crop amounted this year to \$1,292,000 bushels, "passing all expectations," the report asserted. The decline in the Georgia field crops. it was noted, were more than off-set by higher prices, "and the net money return to the state will be much greater than last year.

The Louisiana report indicated that the yield per acre of rice, white and sweet potatoes is above the ten-year average, with the other crop yields eserally very satisfactory.

Mississippi reported practically all rops harvested and an increased proluction in a number of the leading
