# Ranking Scientist Set To Send Non-Returnable Missiles Into Air

PASADENA, Calif., Aug. 15 (AP)—A ranking American scientist says he will be ready in a few months to shoot projectiles into outer space—missiles which never will return to earth.

The scientist is Dr. Fritz Zwicky, one of the country's top experts on jets and rockets. He is an astro-physicist of the California Institute of Technology here and the Carnegie Institution in Washington, where centers of operation are Palomar Mountain and Mt. Wilson Observatories.

violent explosions in which stars destroy themselves in a few days. He says his plans:

1. Some of the rockets may strike the face of the moon, causing vivid flashes which can be seen through large telescopes.
2. Others may reach and set fire to the "combustible atmosphere of the planet Jupiter, more than 400 million miles away. Some may be shot out to Venus or Mars, which are much closer. Still others may go angling off in the upper atmosphere to become short-lived satellites of the earth.
3. Many of these man-made meteors will flash through the skies close to earth, much as do natural meteors, giving astronomer hitherto unobtainable data about the upper air and earth's magnetism and electric field.
4. These things will be the little cousins—and forerunners—of space platforms and interplanetary rockets.
5. The know-how and the means of doing all this is already at hand—there need be no waiting for other inventions or discoveries. All he needs is a little time and a little money to buy the necessary materials.

Dr. Zwicky has commitments which will keep him busy for another six months or so. Then, at a minimum of \$10,000, he says he will be ready to go.

Many laboratory tests, by other scientists as well as by Dr. Zwicky, have demonstrated that a certain kind of explosive, shaped in a certain way and lined with a thin sheet of metal, can produce missiles of such terrific speed that they will leave the earth and go on indefinitely into space.

This requires a projectile speed of at least seven miles a second, or 25,000 miles an hour. Speeds greater than this are easily obtainable, Dr. Zwicky says, by improving the design of the explosive charge and the metal liner. He calls the process ultraflight.

One group of researchers has reported achieving a speed of about 35 miles a second. So there is power and speed to spare.

The shooting probably will not be done in this country, because objections have been raised in some quarters that it might endanger people.

Either the Sahara Desert or Britain's great 3,000-mile rocket range in Australia are likely spots, Dr. Zwicky reported in an interview he has the necessary permission from both French and Australian authorities.

The remarkably explosive made from commercially available substances, is packaged into a cone-shaped missile which produces a jet effect when set off. The hollow cone is lined with the sheet of metal. The blast breaks this metal into little pieces which form a jet as they come out the big end of the cone at terrific speed. The metal becomes the projectile.

This is not a new idea. Its principle was used during World War II to give the bazooka, a one-man tank killer, its striking power. But the explosive used in bazookas was not potent enough to drive a missile at the escape velocity.

Any bullet fired at seven miles per second through the relatively heavy lower part of the atmosphere would burn itself up while traveling a few feet. So Dr. Zwicky's charges will have to be lifted above the lower atmosphere before they are set off. For this he needs high altitude balloons such as have been used for cosmic ray research.

These balloons go up 21 miles or more. Their cargo of charges would have to be fired automatically or by electronic control from the ground.

Above the 20-mile level the air is too thin to heat the projectile in the glowing point but it must glow in order to be observed. The scientist has solved this problem by fashioning the cone-shaped liners to contain substances which will heat them internally to incandescence by chemical action.

The initial shots may give observers an opportunity to learn more definitely the physical and chemical nature of the incredibly thin atmosphere 20 to 300 miles up. One missile might contain a substance which reacts violently with ozone, a form of oxygen. There is a layer of ozone about 60 miles up which prevents the extremely long and extremely short rays of the sun from reaching the earth. It probably saves people from being slowly sun-banned to death.

A bullet that would set fire to a little spot in the ozone layer might tell scientists much about what other substances exist there. Also observers for the first time will be able to stand behind a meteor and watch as it speeds in a straight line directly away from them. If it veers a little to one side or the other it will give scientists their first real picture of the workings of the earth's electrical and magnetic fields on the substances which make up the atmosphere.

Any projectile that strays off horizontally from a balloon instead of climbing out of the gravitational field might for a time become a satellite of the earth, but not for long. It would travel in a slightly curved orbit for a few hundred miles and then fall.

To establish a useful earth satellite would require a far larger projectile and it would have to be carried hundreds of miles up before being shot into orbit, Dr. Zwicky said. A series of powerful rockets would be needed.

A better idea, the astrophysicist adds, might be to set up a space something that would start a nuclear reaction in some minor planet or asteroid. Experimenters, he said, might count upon the success blast to burn up a small



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part of the asteroid, and in doing so give it a kick that would change its orbit and cause it to move closer to earth. This is all in the dream stage so far, however.

Any projectile large enough to produce an observable blast on Jupiter would have to be fairly bulky, but Dr. Zwicky said one of his larger creations might do it. Traveling at 25,000 miles an hour it would need about two years to get there.

The atmosphere of Jupiter is mainly methane and ammonia, both combustible gases. But since there is no oxygen there to support combustion the missile would have to carry its own supply. At that, the fire would go out as soon as the little oxygen was used up, but Dr. Zwicky said it could make a flash big enough to be seen through large telescopes.

Aiming at such distant targets would require very high precision. A shot at the moon would be pretty good, Dr. Zwicky said, but the projectile in the semi would have to land on the darkened part of its face, during the new moon or first quarter. It should reach its destination about 10 hours after firing.

Amateur astronomers with good sized telescopes would be asked to watch for the landing flash. This projectile also would have to contain something to produce Indian descent. So far as known there is nothing on the moon's surface that will burn, and there is no oxygen.

The attorney general said he thought Matthews could "protect his interests" by purchasing his paper at a newsstand.

**Knitting Needle**

BALTIMORE (AP)—A knitting needle head sent 23-year-old Roy F. Bryant to prison yesterday for a crime he committed in a store.

Authorities said he used a tool improvised from a needle to open screen doors and rob homes. He pleaded guilty before Judge S. Ralph Warken in five charges.

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# Eisenhower Has Knack Of Shunting State Problems Aside For Playtime

DENVER—President Eisenhower's knack of shunting state problems temporarily into one corner of his mind while he concentrates on golf or trout fishing is a sign of his personality which doesn't often show in Washington.

At his vacation headquarters here, that ability to relax in the face of the tremendous strain of the presidency is the subject of much conversation.

On Monday, for example, he discussed one of the most serious problems with Secretary of State Dulles—the idea of American retaliation if the Chinese Communists and the North Korean Reds refuse to release some U.S. prisoners of war.

An hour later, Eisenhower was battling par on the Denver Cherry Hills course with the intensity of a professional whose income depended on the outcome of the golf game.

The next day was the same way. Adm. Arthur W. Radford, the incoming chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, gave the President an important briefing on the world military situation.

A bit later, Eisenhower was on the golf course, giving as much attention to whether to use an 8 or 9 iron to avoid that trap around the green as he had shortly before in Radford's report.

The next day he signed 20 pieces of legislation into law, and aides reported that he studied each measure—most of them of secondary importance—as thoroughly as he did a back-to-back check.

Then he set out for the Colorado Rockies and had the time of his life casting for trout. Watching him there in the trout stream, an aide wondered just how Eisenhower did it.

"I know he's just as deeply concerned now as he was a couple of weeks ago," said the aide, "but he has a wonderful knack of shunting the problem away as he fishes, as he is doing now, and then coming up with the answer when he gets back to the desk."

Last night, it was business again. The President had dinner with two aides who flew in from Washington during the afternoon. Special Counsel Herbert M. Shantley, and Robert J. Cutler, White House liaison man with the National Security Council.

## Three Doctors Give Report Of Health Study

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 8 (AP)—Is your family small and headed by a college-educated white-collar worker whose health is middle-aged? If so, you probably won't have to worry about its health.

A survey made by the University of Pittsburgh graduate school of public health shows a definite relationship between a family's health and its social and economic position. These conditions also affect its social welfare.

But don't worry if your family isn't like this model—and hypothetical—one. You won't necessarily have trouble.

The report, which covered 2,370 Pittsburgh families, simply says the closer your family is to the "ideal" the better its chance of escaping health and social ills.

Three doctors—Antonio Cioceco, Paul M. Densen and Daniel G. Harvitz—reported the survey. In it, they reached these conclusions:

1. Large families, social agencies more often and have a greater number of health problems.
2. Families headed by widowed, divorced or separated persons contacted social agencies more often, but had fewer health problems.
3. Those headed by young persons had fewer contacts with social agencies. Those headed by middle-aged persons had fewer health problems.
4. Social agencies were needed by almost twice as many non-white families as whites, but there was little difference between the two groups in health.
5. White collar families consult social agencies less than other families, and had fewer health problems.
6. Social agencies were contacted by more than 30 per cent of families whose head did not complete elementary school, but by only 20 per cent of those whose head attended college. Health problems also were fewer among college educated.

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# Science Puts Firefly To Work

 OAK RIDGE, Tenn., Aug. 9.—After centuries of day-dreaming and inspiring poets—and little else—the firefly has been put to work.

Using lightning bug extract, scientists at Oak Ridge National Laboratories are feeling their way closer to solution of an age-old mystery: How plants turn sunlight into energy. It's called photosynthesis.

Among other things, the scientists have learned that firefly enzyme and extract from green leaves contain a common chemical—a compound with the tongue-

## Emergency Loans On Livestock Now Available

Emergency livestock loans, authorized by recent legislation, are now available to eligible farmers and ranchers in Florida.

William T. Shadlock, Florida Home Administration state director, announced today.

These loans will be made to established producers and feeders of cattle, sheep and goats, provided they have good records of operation, have a reasonable chance to succeed and are unable to obtain needed credit from other sources to continue their normal operations. Such loans will not be made to carry on commercial feed lot operations, to refinance existing debt, or to pay for payment of current incidental bills, or to enable a borrower to start livestock operations.

Special livestock loans will bear five percent interest and may be made for periods up to three years. Borrowers will be expected to repay the loans as rapidly as they can. Each loan must be secured in the full amount by the personal obligation and available security of the borrower.

The Government will not require present creditors to subordinate their liens but borrowers will be expected to obtain standby agreements from their present creditors so they will have a chance to work out of their difficulties. Also, present creditors must be willing for a stock income to be paid on the live-  
 government loan.

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has designated the Florida Home Administration as the agency to handle this emergency credit program and has made Administrator R. B. McLeish responsible for it at the national level. However, all loans must be approved by the special livestock loan committees appointed by the Secretary.

To serve as a temporary State special livestock loan committee for Florida, the following have been named: William T. Shadlock, state director, Florida Home Administration; H. G. Clayton, state director of extension, and R. Anderson, chairman, State PMA Committee. This temporary committee was named in order to speed up processing of applications for assistance.

Application forms may be obtained at any county office of the Florida Home Administration or from other established lenders in the area. They may be filed with the local county FFA supervisor or directly with the state special livestock loan committee.

## Top Red Men In Moscow Have Plush Jobs

BERLIN (AP)—Top Red army men have been given plush jobs in Moscow but actually wield little influence on the Kremlin's political course, a refugee Russian officer said today.

"I do not think that the influence of the army has been able to increase the slightest bit," formed Major Leonid Nikitich Rhozhin said at a news conference in West Berlin.

Rhozhin, a mechanized battalion commander in East Germany, fled to the West last April. He said Premier Georgi Malenkov and the other "politicians" still hold the reins of power, and that the troops in the field know it.

"When Stalin died there were no tears and there was no rejoicing," he said. "We expected no change."

Rhozhin said there are countless more officers like himself opposed to the Soviet system.

"Ninety five per cent of the officers have radios and they listen to BBC, the Voice of America and Radio Free Europe," he added.

Asked how the Russian troops viewed the June 17 uprising of two million East German workers against their Communist government's repressive measures, Rhozhin said the army itself was in an impossible position.

"The officers were compelled to explain to the men that these Germans in the streets were workers, not capitalists, and it was plain that they were workers just like the Russians in 1917 when they overthrew the Czar."

And since all living things, including man, ultimately make use of the light of the sun for their energy, fireflies may open endless possibilities for science, which always is looking for the answer to life itself.

Already, Hollaender and his associates have learned to use the same chemicals the lightning bug does to produce an eerie green glow in a test tube.

And they've found that the lightning bug, as he flits around, nonchalantly mixes no less than five chemical compounds. Including ATP, in the right proportion to make him light up.

The scientists are less casual about it when they make a test tube glow, but it works.

Using the mixture, they have been able to measure very small portions of any one of the five compounds by measuring the amount of light given off by a solution of firefly enzyme when more ATP is added.

This ease with which the enzyme can be measured is one thing that makes it a valuable scientific tool—and why, in an atomic age, the little glow worm seems to glow brighter than ever.
