






Gas Exports To Reds May Be Restricted

WASHINGTON, June 27, (A) Legislation to restrict gasoline and petroleum products exports was introduced today as the House Merchant Committee laun-ched an inquiry into oil shipments

to Russia.

The bill, offered by Committee Chairman Weichel (R Ohio), would prohibit any petroleum exports unless the War and Navy Departnot interefere with nationad denot interefere with national de-fense, and the Commerce Depart-ment certified that they would not restrict domestic consumption. Weichel's committee is trying to find out why oil is being exported to the Soviet and other countries at a time when there is talk of gasoline rationing in the United States.

States.

Capt. Ralph. E. Wilson, Navy representative of the Army-Navy petroleum board, testified at the first session that the shipments

petroleum board, testified at the first session that the shipments to Russia represent "normal requirements" and there is "no indication" that the Soviets are trying to build up military stocks.

Wilson also told the committee in response to questions:

1. The oil going to Russia from the West Coast does not meet Navy specifications, but could be made so by refining processes.

2. There is no way to tell for what purpose the oil is being used but it is of a type equivalent to that used in the Merchant Marine.

3. This country's present known oil reserves amount to 23 billion barrels, which is being drawn upon at a rate of 1,800,000,000 barrels a year.

In connection with the latter point, Wilson told the committee that the United States fleet might be "largely immobilized" in a major war if unable to obtain oil imports.
