Ranger Warns Of 'Blow-Up' Fire Crisis Threatens Seminole



JIM MARQUIS A Warning From Tucker

County Ranger Jim Marquis told The Herald today a "blow-up" situation is close at hand in the forests of Seminole County. "This is the driest it has been here in 12 years," Marquis said.

Since Jan. 1, 93 forest fires have burned the equivalent of 2,000 acres," Marquis reported, "as compared to 107 forest fires with burning of 923 acres all of last year."

"The wooded areas and even the swamps are tinder dry and getting drier every day. With winds all it takes is a spark to set off new fires."

Investigation by the Florida Forest Service of the latest fire near SR 46 and the St. Johns River revealed the fire had been set by an unknown person.

The rangers fought and brought under control a blaze near the same location which burned approximately 90 acres on Tuesday and part of Wednesday.

Although detailed information was unavailable at press time today The Herald was informed by the Forestry Service at Longwood a number of set fires were raging in the Winter Park Tract northeast of Lake Ashby about mid-way between Osteen and New Smyrna Beach. Several homes are located in the area, however, most of the lands are in cattle range.

Rangers at the Longwood station of the Forest Service have been placed on 24 hour weeks. Ranger Marquis stated 90 per cent of the fires are being caused by carelessness. "The people just do not realize how dangerous it is right now."

He advised residents to do "no burning" if there is brush or rough nearby. "All controlled burning has been stopped for more than a week now," he said. "I have seen fires recently jump a quarter mile at a lot and should get recognition."

Marquis commented the volunteer fire departments of the area, "They are sure helping a lot and should get recognition."

"Persons burning trash and debris are not staying with their fires and people must not rely on swamps to stop fires. Fires once they are started in swampy areas are difficult to stop," Marquis declared.

Bank Washes Its Hands Of Valdez Hotel

The Florida State Bank once and for all washed its hands of the Valdez Hotel. Florida State Bank Attorney William Hutchison filed papers yesterday afternoon in the Courthouse (deeding the property back to the North Front Street Corporation of Palm Beach, L. C. Boyce, president.

Both the hotel and the Carlin Lounge in the facility were closed today. Boyce was not available for comment.

Earlier in the week formal charges of violating a special alcoholic beverage license against John Burton, owner of the lounge were drafted by the state. The bar had been ordered closed last week.

On March 27, The Florida State Bank picked up the mortgage for the hotel for \$30,890 on the steps of the courthouse during a foreclosure sale.

However, Boyce had promised to make good his debt to the bank from a first and second mortgage. The hotel and property is appraised on the county books for \$110,000.

S. Seminole Rallies To Aid Little Leaguers

Businessmen and citizens of South Seminole have rallied to the support of the Little League to supply badly needed clay for ballfields in Longwood, Altamonte Springs and Lake Mary. The Herald learned today.

Twenty truck loads of clay were given gratis to the Longwood field Wednesday afternoon by Woodrow Prescott, local businessman, and transported to the field by city trucks.

Offers came into the town of Altamonte Springs by the owner of Skip's Restaurant in Casselberry and an official of the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club to supply the needed clay for the Altamonte field and the Lake Mary field.

Jack King, owner of Orange Paving and Construction Company, offered whatever assistance needed to place and transport clay.

Meenwhile District 3 County Commissioner and Altamonte Springs Mayor W. Lawrence Swofford reports he has been swamped with calls for support and offers of financial assistance with the fields.

Battle Due Over City Union

Gala Opening Set For Downs Friday

All of the action, thrills and excitement of big time thoroughbred racing comes to Seminole County tomorrow with the opening of Seminole Downs, located at Casselberry.

During the past hectic week, preparations were being made to accommodate the more than 100 thoroughbred horses which would be featured during the 37 action-packed nights of racing at Seminole Downs. Approximately 500 horses were on hand this morning, with more expected early next week after the closing of Gulf Stream Park in Miami next week.

Racing will be staged five nights a week, excepting Thursdays and Sundays and is the only track in the state which is offering night racing.

Seminole Downs was purchased from the defunct Seminole Raceway last year, which had operated the track for harness racing. The new owners, who spent more than one-quarter million dollars in repairs and remodeling making it one of the most attractive in the nation.

According to Publicity Director Robert Wade, "Our track is smaller than others at five-eighths of a mile, but it lends itself to our running any kind of race we'd want. There are two chutes at the track, one at the head of the stretch and the other at the head of the back stretch. So, we can run anything from a half-mile up to two miles."

Night racing has the greatest appeal to all enthusiasts attending the track in the state, according to one of its biggest boosters, General Manager Ralph Choisser. "We give the fans an opportunity to come out to the track after a day at the office or work and get to see the 'Sport of Kings' right here at the local level. And when I'm referring to local level I'm thinking in terms of a straight line across the entire state from Daytona Beach to Tampa."

An early morning visit to the plant will find many of the trainers working with their mounts preparing them for "their day." Or the jockeys "talking" with the horses and checking their every detail to make certain that all is ready for "their charge."

Comments like "they're going to buzz around this oval" or "I know he likes the feel of this turf" from the trainers and jockeys lends to the natural excitement of watching thoroughbreds in action.

At night, all of the patrons will have little difficulty in following their favorites around the entire brilliantly illuminated track.

Much of the rebuilding and remodeling plans have been aimed at the comfort of the patrons of Seminole Downs.

Ample seating and parking facilities have been provided. Inside the track, a large tote-board is in place featuring the results of the pari-mutuel wagering. The grandstand has been improved and repaired in the candy-striped red and white design. The spectators will have a chance at "speaking into the paddock" from the mezzanine floor since additional windows have been installed.

In the paddock are 12 stalls where the fans will have the opportunity of getting close to the action and watching the preparations for the running of the race.

The administration building, which adjoins the paddock area, will have in addition to the offices, has jockey quarters and a reducing room.

"I'd say that maybe a quarter to one-half of the horses registered by opening day will be from the State of Florida," said Wade. Indications are that a number of entries are expected from the Ocala horse farms.

With the addition of Seminole Downs into the area, the consensus is that with Al Alai and the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club within a mile radius of one another, Central Florida will become the top sports section of the state.

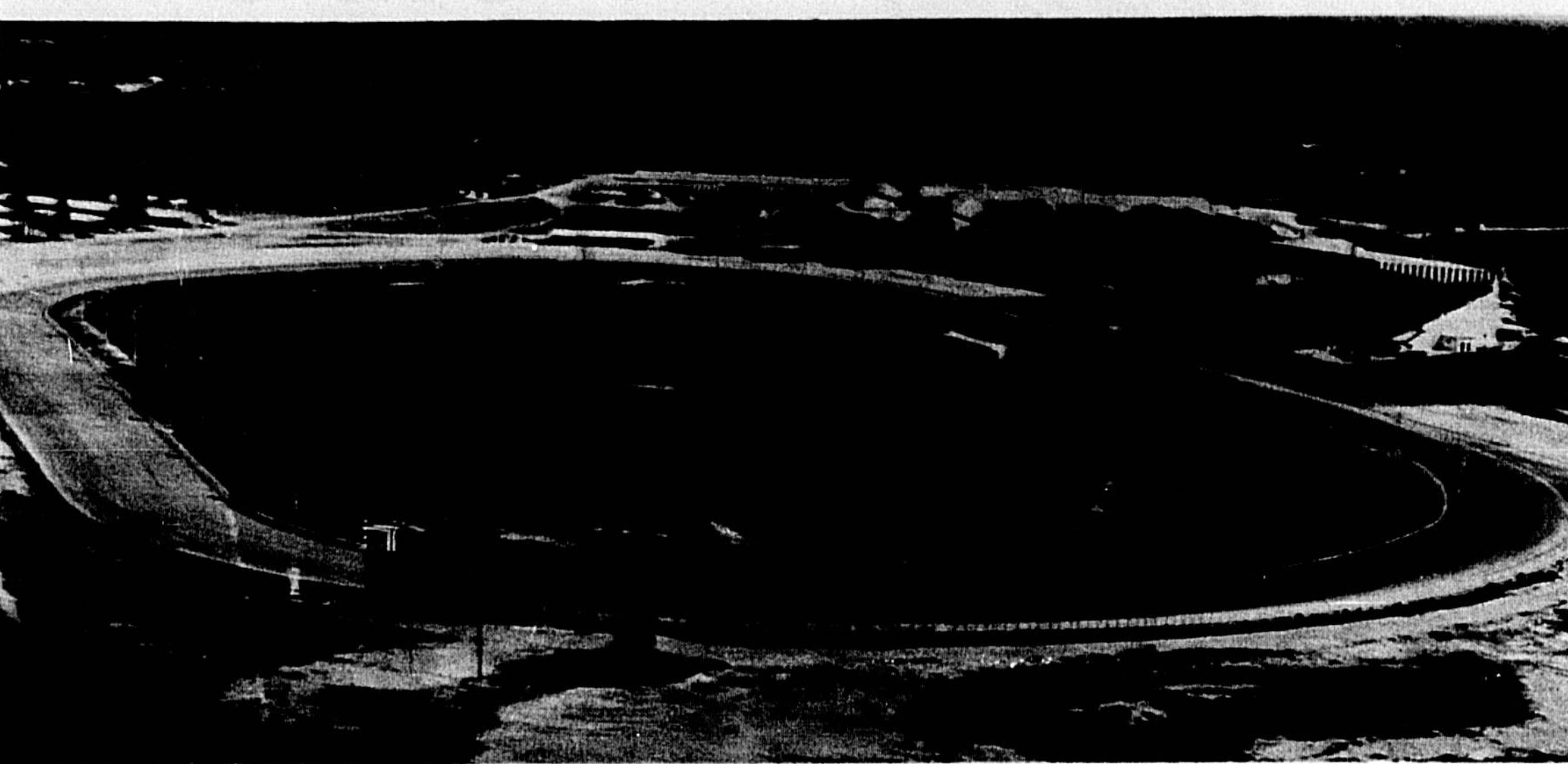

700 Top Thoroughbreds For 'Downs' Track

Some 700 horses will fill the stables at Seminole Downs by next week, ready to catch their names in the history books of thoroughbred racing. How are these names derived, who are America's race horses—and why? Why is one filly known as Rose of Sharon and the fine stepping gelding next door tagged "Garbage?"

Take the name, Upret, only horse to beat the great Man of War in a turf "upset" of staggering proportions, and entered the rolls as one of the best named horses of all times. Of course names do not make horses great, but the thoroughbred who brings greatness to his or her name. Incidents such as Upret's do happen, but it is with the twist of fate and Lady Luck ever present in the day-by-day dream of the turf. There was another, too, who could not have been better named.

He was ROUGH TIME.

It was a summer day in 1957 at Suffolk Downs, the largest track in New England's history packed the course to watch Rough Time and Appealing halter row between life and death. When the day came to name him there was never a question of what he should be called. Rough Time was tailor made. Late in his yearling year, tragedy struck one more. While learning the a-b-c's of racing, he stepped on a stone and fractured a bone in his foot. Everyone gave up on him that day—everyone but Yancy's wife.

Through the winter months Rough Time once again received the tender care from the one who loved him deeply. As spring blossomed, so did the young colt and strength poured back into the injured leg and he responded in the way of the thoroughbred, with obedience and the implicit faith that all was well.

His career is pleasant history. Champion of the three year old division in New England, and leading sprinter of his day. Being a slightly wild, feeding him from a baby bottle, covering him with blankets to protect his frail body from the chill night air. For weeks he balanced on the slender tight-rope between life and death.

This marked the close of Rough Time's career as a race horse. He was brought back to the racetrack, but not his usefulness on the track. After the injury, Rough Time was sent to the farm, being removed from the glory and excitement of the track, and there began to lose his appearance of greatness. There was no pride left in the curve of his hip, his challenge in his eyes. Christmas never was a better named horse.

Good ones like Successor, the 2-year-old champion of 1966, and Dr. Fugate had not yet won this new season. In his three previous races—all wins—he was permitted to trail the field until leaving the backstretch.

"The boy (Velasquez) warmed him up too much before the Florida Derby," says Hirsch Jacobs, Reflected Glory's trainer. "He (the horse) was hot in the gate and when he broke he was all excited. Maybe the boy thought the horse wouldn't come from far back at Gulfstream."

Nelson Won't Rush Things. Most trainers realize the Kentucky Derby isn't the end of the world for a 3-year-old, although a few have broken down running in it.

"No need to hurry things," said popular Eddie Neley who trains Successor and whose runners earned just under \$2 million last year. Successor, a going away winner of last year's Garden State, is Nelson's big 3-year-old hope.

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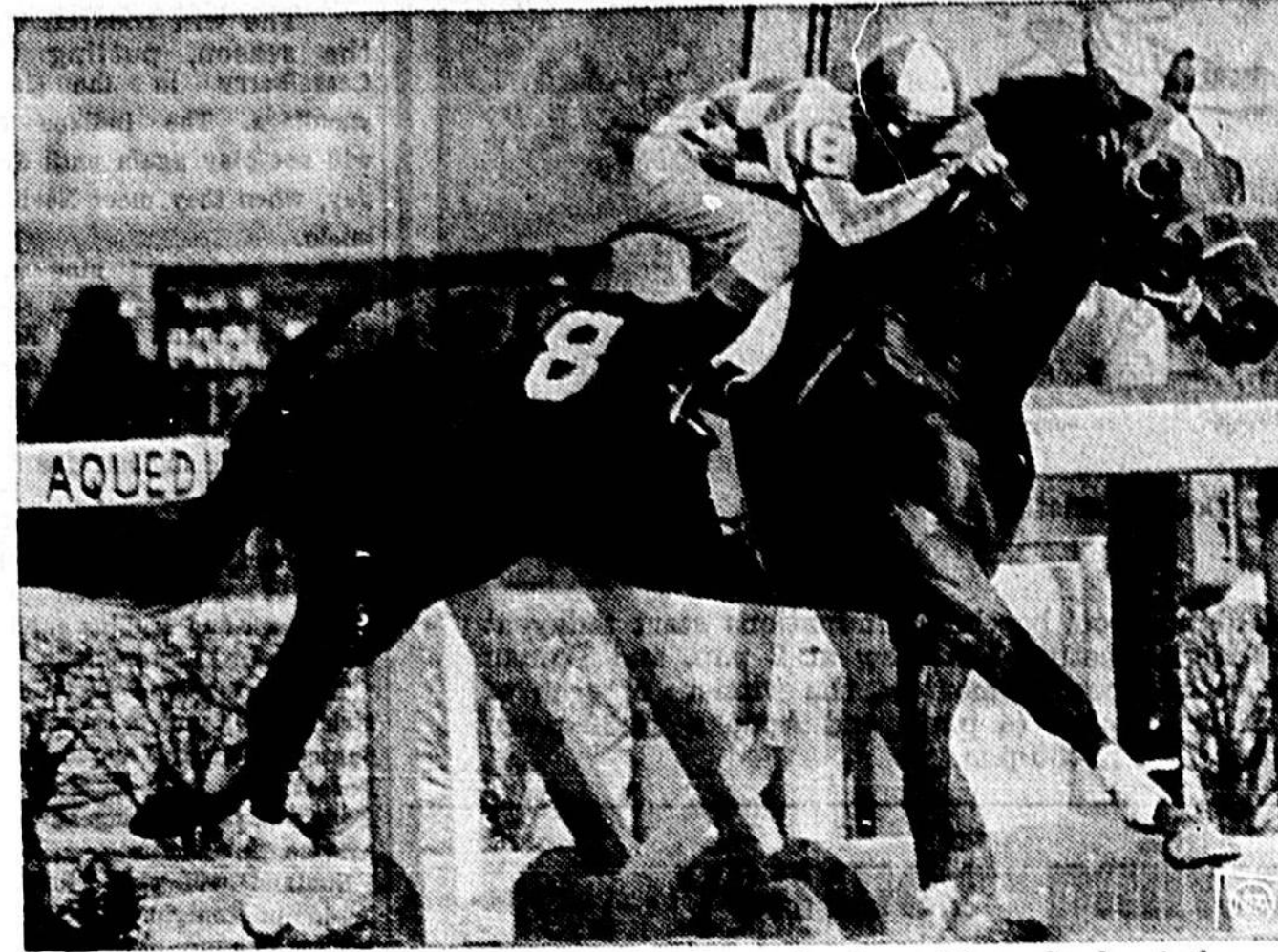

Club Women Hear FBI Agent

At the last meeting of the Daytona Women's Club, Edwin Duff gave a most informative talk on the subject of crime and law enforcement. He related that law enforcement has not kept pace with the rapid increase in crime and the job of the police force today is much more complicated than in the past.

Today, an officer must know a great deal about the laws themselves and this will require local agencies to provide education for their police. Much more book study is required since the latest Supreme Court interpretations have been made, in order to protect the criminal's rights and those of the law enforcement officers also.

The rise in crime has been 50 per cent since 1950. There is one rape every 23 minutes; one assault every 25 minutes; one robbery every 17 minutes; one burglary every 27 seconds; and one auto theft every 19 minutes. These are actual figures compiled by the FBI and are shocking.

There are only 350,000 investigators to 100,000,000 people and this is an almost impossible task. In a recent survey of the largest police departments in the country, it was determined that the largest factor contributing to the rise in crime was: (1) Public apathy, or refusal to become involved; (2) Decline in respect for law in this country.

Mrs. Duff suggested that the Women's Club form a law enforcement committee to work with the local agencies to see what can be done by the average citizen to help in this serious situation. He emphasized the need for help from all citizens. A question and answer period followed the talk.
