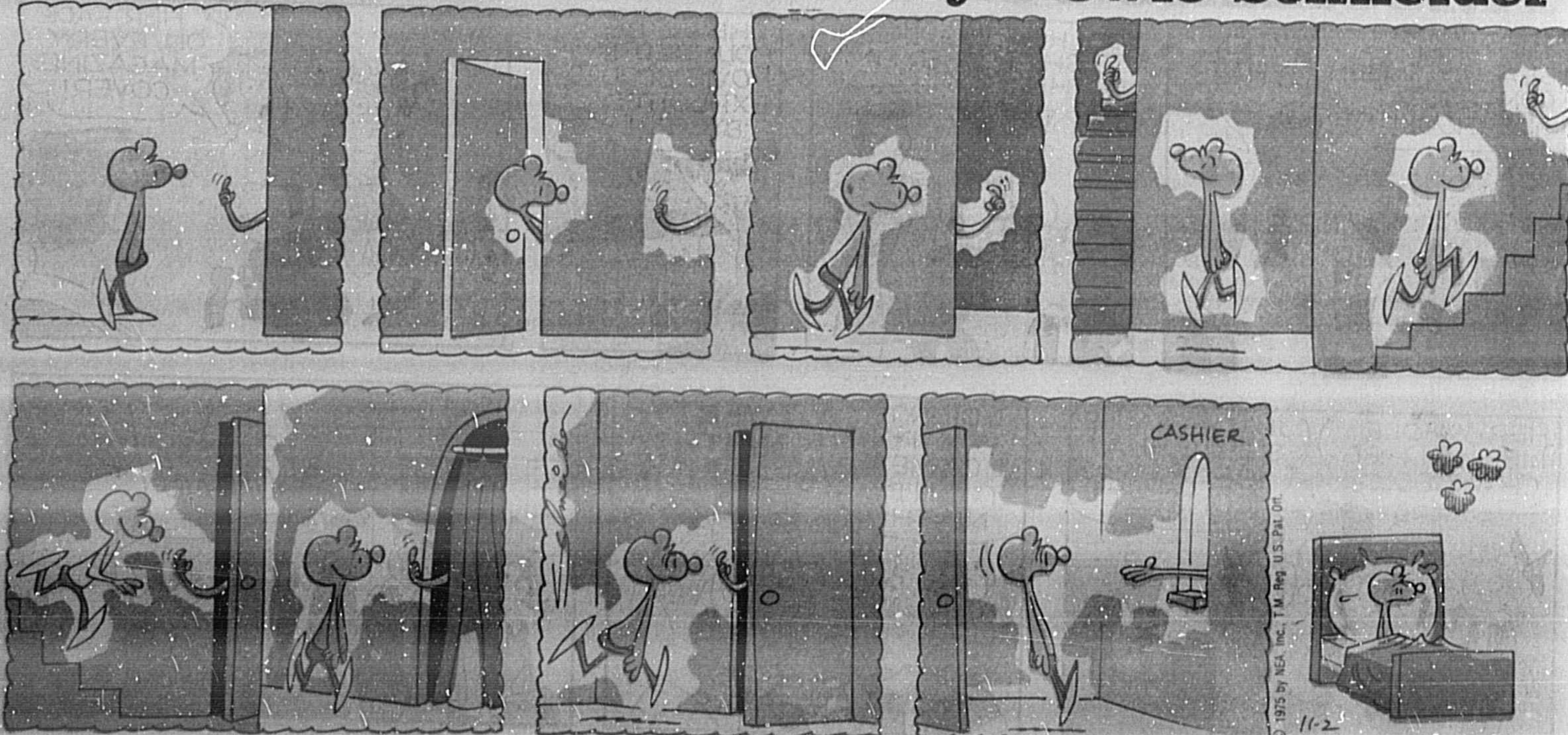

Sanford Hit-Run Is Fatal

Sanford police and area law enforcement agencies today were pushing a search for a vehicle that struck and killed a 26-year-old pregnant Sanford woman Saturday night on French Avenue and fled the accident scene at a high rate of speed.

Patrolman D. H. Whitmire said police are looking for an older model pickup truck, grey primer or a faded black in color. Officers said the vehicle may have damage to the right front or side.

Mrs. Kathleen Louise Culler, 26, of 2517 Princeton Ave., died four hours after she was struck as she exited her disabled auto in the northbound parking lane on French Avenue just south of 20th Street, police said.

Mrs. Culler was five months pregnant and traffic homicide reports list two deaths in the accident, according to homicide investigator H. J. Shea Jr.

Whitmire today urged that anyone who was in the vicinity of Guy's Bar-B-Q, 2101 French Ave., at 7:40 p.m. Saturday to contact police.

Whitmire related the following account of the fatal accident:

Mrs. Culler and her brother, Mike DePeyster, 23, of 2517 Princeton Ave., were northbound on French in Mrs. Culler's 1967 Chevrolet sedan when the auto ran out of gas.

Mrs. Culler and her husband, Bob, who works for a Sanford service station, were in the process of moving from the Sanford address to Cysr Trailer Park at DeBarry.

DePeyster was walking toward the restaurant after the car stopped next to the curb and Mrs. Culler had exited her car when she was struck and crushed against her auto by the unidentified hit and run vehicle.

DePeyster told officers he just saw "a blur" as the other vehicle fled the scene.

A man at a coin laundry across the street told officers he heard a loud "thump" and saw a pickup truck leave the area at a "high rate of speed." Another person told officers that a northbound vehicle ran the red light at the nearby French Avenue and 20th Street intersection.

Police said Mrs. Culler was hurled over the left front hood of her car onto the pavement in front of the parked car.

Police said Mrs. Culler was taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital, then transferred to Florida Hospital North, Altamonte Springs, where she died of internal injuries four hours after the accident.

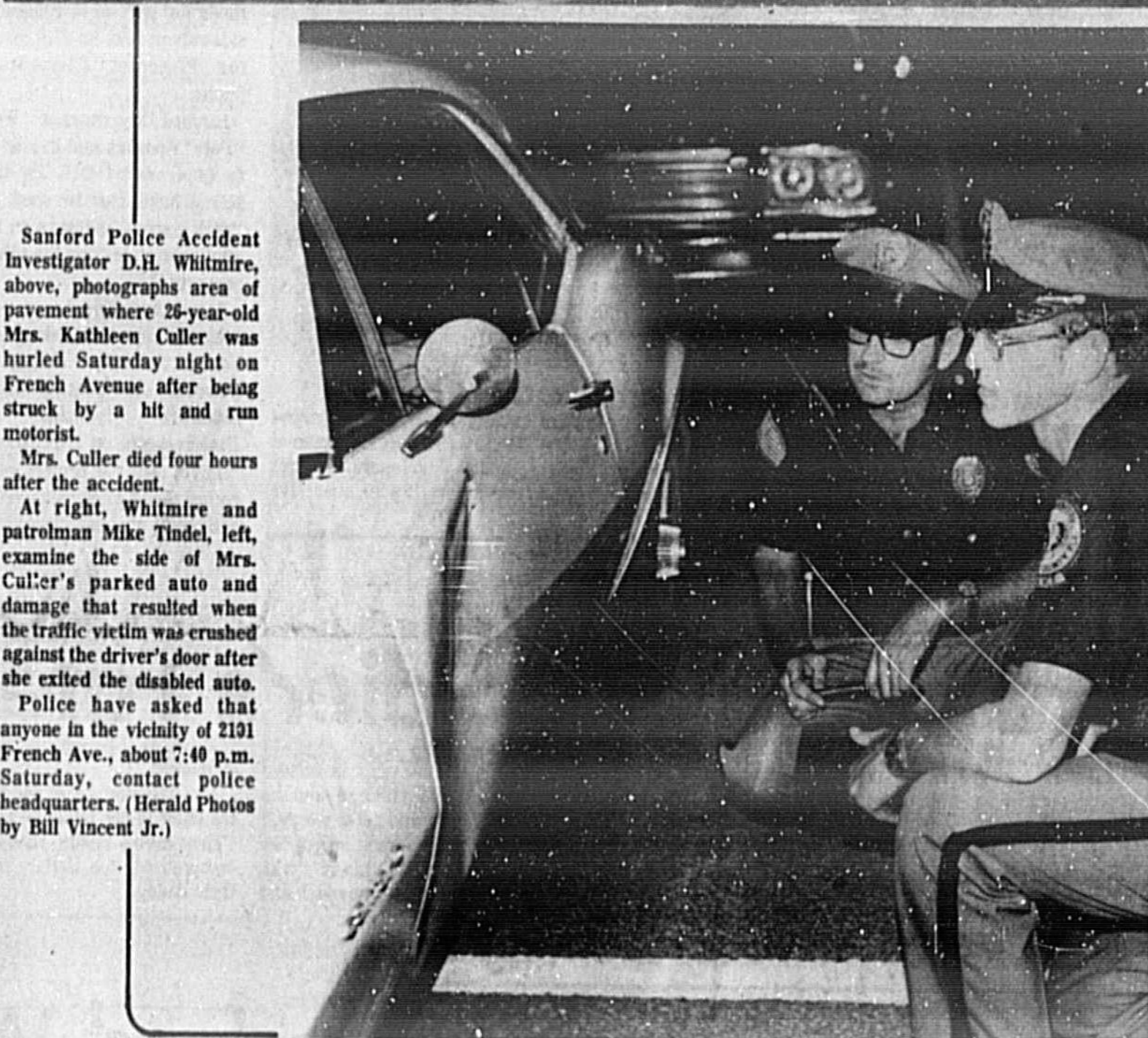
Officers said there were no skid marks left by the hit and run vehicle and it apparently made no contact with the Culler car.

The victim's clothing was to be examined at the Sanford Crime Lab today in hopes some clue to the hit and run vehicle may be turned up.

Mrs. Culler attended schools in Sanford and returned here three months ago from Ramseur, N.C. She was a member of Jordan Missionary Baptist Church.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at Gramkow Funeral Home chapel with burial in the Peace Church of Christ cemetery, west of Sanford.

Survivors include her husband, Bob Marshall Culler; parents Mr. and Mrs. Allan Wrenn and brothers Donnie Wrenn and Michael DePeyster, all of Sanford.

Rockefeller Out In 1976 Election

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller stepped aside today as President Ford's 1976 running mate, saying he does not want to be considered for the Republican ticket next year.

He did so in a letter to Ford, saying: "After much thought, I have decided ... that I do not wish my name to enter into consideration for the upcoming Republican vice presidential nominee."

"I wish you to know this now for your own planning," Rockefeller said.

The Rockefeller announcement, a political bolt no one had anticipated, could undercut the planned presidential challenge of former California Gov. Ronald Reagan. The conservative Reagan had gained early support among GOP liberals.

Rockefeller's announcement was relayed by his press secretary Hugh Downs, who said the vice president was delivering the letter to Ford today.

Rockefeller's decision means the Republican vice presidential spot will be an object of maneuver and potential political bargaining. It also means that if Ford does win the GOP nomination, he will be in a position to choose a new Republican face who would instantly become a party power for future campaigns.

There had been no advance signal that Rockefeller was considering the step he took today, but there had been public evidence of disagreement between the President and vice president over administration handling of the financial crisis besetting New York City.
