STATE COLLEGE FOR WOMEN FILLED TO OVERFLOWING

Total Enrollment Will Exceed 600 Pupils in Fall Term

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 23.—Dr. Edward Conradi, president of the State College for Women, stated today that the total enrollment at the beginning of the coming fall term would exceed 600 and although every possible space in the dormitories was taken, over one hundred applications had been turned down, solely because of the lack of accommodations and dormitory. State girls are of course given first consideration, and all students from other states than Florida, will not be given rooms on the campus. There are about fifteen out-of-state students who would attend the college this winter and rooms have been secured for them in the immediate neighborhood of the college. President Conradi has made room in his own home for four students, and all told, there will be about thirty girls who will have rooms in private homes, near the campus.

The Florida State College for Women has grown almost beyond all months no advertising of any nature was carried on, and in spite of the fact that no soliciting was done, there are over a hundred young women of the state, who will be compelled to go elsewhere to attend college. Ten years ago the total enrollment of the Florida State College for Women was 257, and the graduating class of that year boasted of being the largest in the history of the institution. There were nineteen graduates of the academic department. In the spring of 1920, the graduates from this same institution numbered markable growth and advancement can not be maintained unless equipment is furnished to meet the needs of the institution, and Dr. Conradi stated that at least one-half million dollars should be appropriated by the

legislature to carry out the tentative plan of the board of control.

Judge Fined Himself

Judge Schelle Maines, judge of the municipal court was caught exceeding the speed limit one day this week and was pulled by the motorcycle policeman who plays no favorites and had to pay a fine just like any of the common herd and the municipal court records will convince any sane person that the speeders are being fined regardless of who they are or where they came from and the policeman knows none of them and is no respecter of persons.

This silly twaddle of the Orlando people is absurd and it is also noted that none of the Orlando offenders appeared in the municipal court to defend their cases but they knew they were guilty and estreated their bonds.

TO LENGTHEN TOURIST SEASON IN FLORIDA

Railroads Authorize Sale of Tickets Effective October 1st.

The problem of lengthening the tourist season in Florida to seven or eight months, including fall, winter and spring, has been solved so far as the railroads are concerned. They have authorized the sale of round trip tourist tickets from distant points to Florida, effective on and after October 1st, up to April 30th with a return limit on all tickets of May 31st.

The Florida Development Board has written the passenger traffic manager of each of the main line roads entering Florida urging that they give ample publicity to the early sale of tourist tickets, in order to start the tourists to Florida early in the season and thereby relieve congestion in passenger traffic in January and February.

The local commercial organizations can do very effective work by starting their advertising early, and by providing a longer period of entertainment.

POLES ARE VICTORIOUS.

Bottle Up Bolsheviki and Take Many Prisoners.

Washington, Aug. 26.—The process of bottling up the Russian Soviet forces on the northern front between the Vistula and Russia has been completed, according to an official statement issued just before last midnight. The Poles have closed the gateway of escape, taking prisoners and materials to such an extent that it is impossible to chronicle them.

Poland has been cautioned by the American government not to permit her armies in their present counter-offensive against the Russian bolshevik, to advance beyond the ethnographic boundaries of Poland. Informal representations on the subject, it was stated officially today, have been made to the Polish government, through the American charge at Warsaw.

The attitude of the United States with respect to the invasion of Russian territory was made plain to Poland formally in the United States note to Italy addressed to her ambassador.

The allied and associated powers favored preservation of the integrity of Russia, it said, and the United States suggested also that a declaration should be accompanied by the announcement that no transgression by Poland troops would be permitted.

Great Britain has joined with the United States, officials said, in an endeavor to prevent a second violation by Poland of Russian territory and the position of the two powers is expected to curb any headlong impulses which present bolshevik defeat may have inspired in Poland.

THE SPEED LAWS

There is much fuss and feathers about the motorcycle policeman enforcing the speed laws these days and it seems childish to say the least. The speed law is twenty miles in the city limits of Sanford and certainly if any drivers are running faster than this they should be pulled and fined. The editor of the Herald has been pulled for speeding in other cities besides Sanford where the law was fifteen miles an hour and we never kicked but paid our fine. We also paid several here for other people who did not have sense enough to observe the speed laws and we see no reason why people should kick when they get caught. If the speed law is a bad law it should be repealed and the motorcycle policeman taken off and the cars allowed to run wild and loose over the streets killing people and causing all kinds of damage. Other cities have these laws and enforce them and if Sanford has a zealous officer who gets them every time they drive too fast here is no valid reason why there should be such a loud outcry about his doing his full duty. FLORIDA WOMEN VOTE IF SUFFRAGE RATIFIED
Attorney-General Says Legislation Is Unnecessary—Catts Says No Poll Tax

In a conference between Attorney-General Van C. Swearingen and his assistants, it was announced that no new legislation would be necessary to permit women of this State to participate in the November election contrary to the expressed belief of Rivers H. Budford, of Marianna, who becomes Attorney-General next January and who Thursday afternoon issued a statement declaring that in the event of ratification of the State Legislature would be necessary to make it possible for women to vote. The Attorney-General's office issued a statement as follows: "The effect of the 19th amendment to the national constitution is to expunge from all State constitutions and laws the word 'male' wherever it appears in election laws describing the qualification of voters." Mr. Budford in his statement yesterday, urged the Governor to call a special session of the Legislature to change the present election laws.

ALL KINDS OF VICTIMS.

Boston, August 26.—A list of investors in the Ponzi postal coupon scheme—people who trusted in the overnight financier to make riches for them in a month or two—looked like a cross section of the community when it was printed today. All walks of life were there—that 30,000 in all placed their money in the scheme which is now in receivership and of these about half withdrew it with or without the 50 per cent. interest which Ponzi paid before the crash. The others are relying on federal officers to recover what is left.

The list runs the gamut from judge to office boy. Former liquor dealers turned to Ponzi in the hope of recouping their broken fortunes; a wealthy spinster was there, a contractor, a business man of high standing; a sporting promoter, soldiers, real estate dealers, manufacturers, police inspectors and the ordinary laborer in large numbers. In the Italian quarter, especially, his investors were legions.

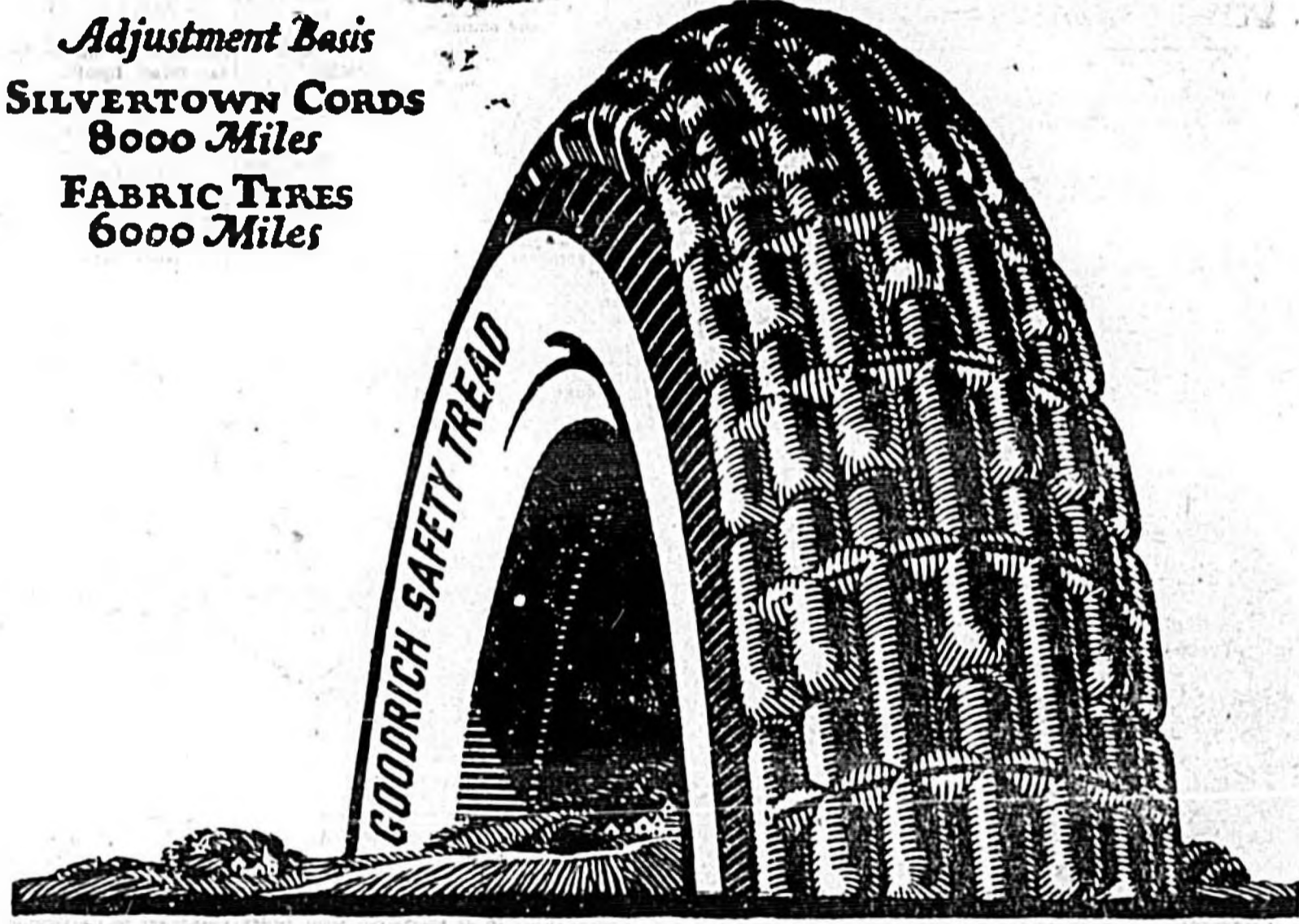

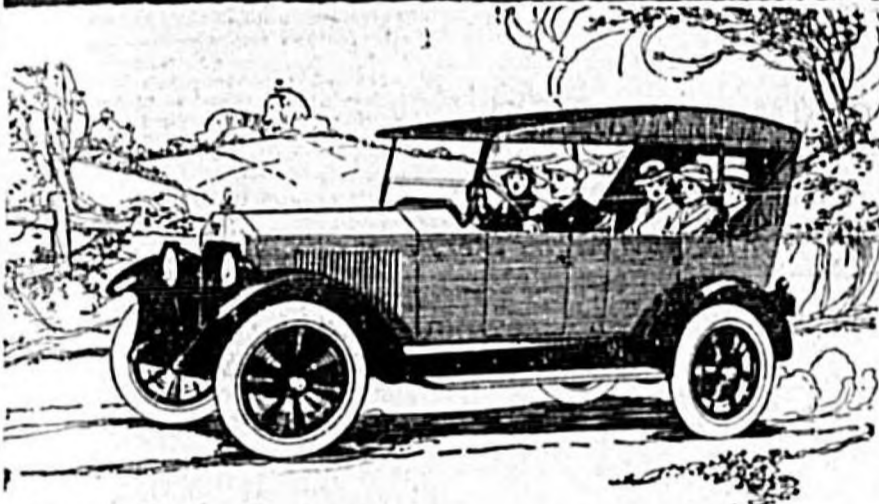

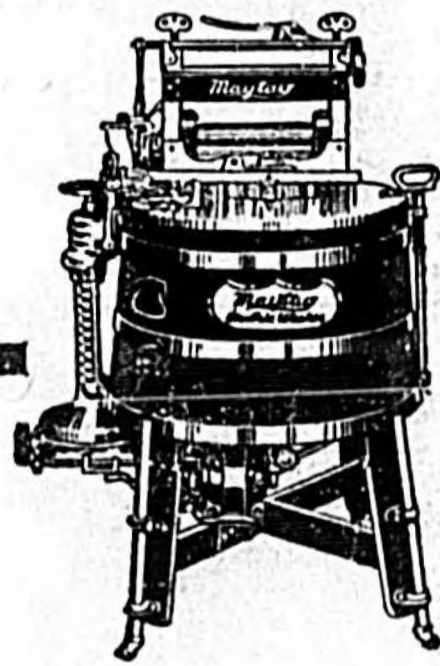
