





## Ike Maps Out Peace Program Before Congress

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower solemnly pledged today to devote the "full energies" of his last year in the White House to promote peace in the world and unprecedented prosperity at home.

The President, who had asked the Democratic-controlled Congress to stop "wrangling" with his administration and work together with him to achieve these goals.

He chartered the goals for his last 12 months in office in a State of the Union message to a joint session of the House and Senate. The message was largely a good news report, but laced with caution.

Eisenhower declared that Russia's recent behavior pointed to "the possible opening of a somewhat less strained period" of Soviet-free world relationships which would depend on Moscow's deeds.

In his 7,200-word message, the president:

—Declared that "1960 promises to be the most prosperous year in our history," with the government winding up this fiscal year next June with a 200 million dollar surplus despite lower revenues because of the steel strike.

—Promised a balanced budget for fiscal 1961 but said nothing about lowering taxes.

—Disclosed for the first time that this country's Atlas ballistic missiles have been hitting within two miles of target in test after test over distances of more than 5,000 miles.

—Proposed no new labor legislation, but said he intends as a consequence of the long steel dispute to encourage regular discussions between management and labor outside the bargaining table to protect the public interest.

—Urged "every possible effort" by steel unions and management to avoid a steel price increase.

—Said farm law is woefully out-of-date, ineffective, and expensive, and urged Congress to enact legislation that would curb costly surpluses and achieve higher net farm incomes.

—Urged civil rights legislation, including right to vote guarantees.

—Summoned the nation to an all-out battle against inflation—Called for congressional action on his request for school legislation "designed to stimulate classroom construction, not by substituting federal dollars for state and local funds, but incentives to extend and encourage state and local efforts."

## CAB Probes Air Disaster

BOLIVIA, N. C. (UPI) — Teams of investigators seeking the cause of a National Air Lines plane crash that took 34 lives have discovered that the four-engine craft's altimeters were stuck at 1,500 feet, it was learned today.

Investigators already have theorized that the DC-6B disintegrated or exploded before it hit the ground early Wednesday. The position of the altimeter dials may indicate that the plane fell apart at 1,500 feet, a spokesman told United Press International.

The theory that the plane disintegrated was strengthened by the fact that most of the victims apparently fell free from the plane and were buried in the soggy field where the plane hit.

The airline meanwhile was flying 14 relatives of victims to Wilmington, N. C., in a special plane to help identify the dead.

The relatives were to be driven to the little fishing village of Southport where the bodies lay in the high school gymnasium.

A team of identification experts from the FBI in Washington had identified 11 of the bodies, including all five crew members, by late this morning but did not plan to release the names of passengers identified until the work is completed.

The FBI moved in to investigate the possibility of sabotage, but searchers said there was no evidence of an explosion in the baggage compartment, the mailbags were banged up but intact.

## Cristiani Circus Negotiating For Move To New Location Adjacent To Circusland

The world famous Cristiani circus family announced today that negotiations are nearly complete on an agreement to make the circus' winter quarters in Seminole County and to manage the show area of Circusland.

Business Manager Paul Cristiani said the move would not interfere with schedules of the travelling unit, billed as the "World's Largest Tent Circus."

"We are well acquainted with the plans of Circusland and believe that it is being planned in the tradition of clean entertainment on which we always have insisted," Cristiani said today.

"We think we are at the point where we can finalize an agreement to fit into its operation," he said.

Cristiani and show official David Budd recently visited the attraction site near Sanford and attended a series of meetings with officials of Entertainment Enterprises, developers of Circusland.

Circusland President Maurice Marshall confirmed negotiations that would make Sanford known nationally.

"We have held out for the best," Marshall said, "the best location, the best in design and engineering—and now the best people in show business, the Cristianis. Paul Cristiani was elected to represent the Cristiani circus group on the board of directors of Entertainment Enterprises, Inc., and in this capacity he will funnel the family genius into Circusland's operational plans."

This first family of the circus has a background of more than 100 years in the entertainment business, as performers and in management as well. Today more than 70 members of the

versatile clan are active circus performers, staging acts so difficult and dangerous that no one dares to imitate them.

Plans call for the circus quarters to be located adjacent to the Circusland site, far enough to be maintained as a staging area for the road unit but close enough to the attraction to facilitate a constant streamlined show.

The Circusland arena will be utilized to introduce new acts, which will later go on the road as "features from Circusland, Florida."

Personnel of Marco Engineering are expected to arrive within the next few weeks to supervise construction of Circusland. The firm, now directing the building of New York City's Freedomland, has estimated a construction period of 8 1/2 months for Circusland.

## Last Of Double Sessions Slated For Spring Term

### Switch Plan Set Jan. 26

County school children and parents will be inconvenienced by double sessions for the last time during the spring term.

County Director of Education Stewart Gatchel said today that the last of the double sessions in the schools will start Jan. 26 when children attending school during the mornings will switch to the afternoon sessions.

Supl. of Schools E. T. Milwee said that double sessions will be eliminated by the fall term.

Indications were that double sessions were to be put into operation by the spring but Milwee said today that plans to eliminate double sessions would wait until the fall so the schools could conduct an extensive pre-school roundup.

Milwee also said that by fall the nine school building projects undertaken by the board would be completed.

Among the projects is a new high school to be located near Lake Jennie.

After the board's meeting next Tuesday, members will inspect projects underway.

The board decided to hold its meeting Tuesday as Supl. Milwee will be in Gainesville Thursday attending a meeting of the state's county school superintendents.

Milwee is chairman of the state committee.

Gatchel also announced that the county would match funds with the federal government for purchase of audio visual equipment for its science, math and social science departments.

The county's share of the program will cost \$22,500, Gatchel added.

Among equipment to be purchased will be science kits, models of biological specimens, science demonstration kits and tape recorders.

## Turner Going Fishing After 53 Years Service As Phone Company Employee

Earl Turner of Sanford, who has put in 53 of his years with the telephone company, was officially honored today by the men he served.

Turner, who retired from Southern Bell Dec. 31, was honored with a dinner at the Mayfair Inn and was feted by Bell Telephone officials including Claude Yates, vice president and general manager of the Southern Bell in the state.

Turner started working for the telephone company in 1906 when he was a lad of 12 in Carrollton, Ga. He tells it this way:

"I made up my mind to join the telephone company one snowy day in March. All telephone lines were down in the town and there was an urgent need for men, they told us."

"At that time, women were afraid to work for the company because of the late hours and so they hired me without asking any questions."

Turner recalled that he worked late into the night and placing a call to a neighboring town sometimes took as long as 20 minutes.

"Things sure are different now," he said.

After a few years in Carrollton, Turner moved to Lake Charles, La., as manager of the local company there.

In 1927 he moved to Florida and took over a similar post in Ft. Lauderdale.

It was there that the most exciting part of his job occurred "and the most trying too."

"A hurricane ripped across the

city and we were left stranded, with only one telephone in the whole town."

Turner recalled that there was only one thing to do then. "We just closed the office and went home for three days."

Turner came to Sanford in 1935 and has been with the local company ever since, serving as private manager.

Looking back over his 53 years of service, the improvements that stand out in his mind are the change in long distance operations and direct dialing.

"I can remember some 30 years ago when everything spoken over long distance had to be repeated even if you were calling from a town 100 miles away."

"Now, a person in Sanford can call Paris and it will be like talking to a friend in the same room."

Turner also said of direct dialing, "It eliminates the middleman, or operator, and you can reach New York in a matter of seconds."

Turner said he had no regrets about choosing his life's work and if he had it to do over again it would end up the same way.

Now, Turner plans to do some hunting and fishing and spend more time with his family.

"I caught me a bear yesterday, and hope to catch some more before the season ends," he said.

South's Worst Storm On Wane

Light rains spattered the Southeast today, melting the ice-and-snow residue of the South's worst winter storm in a decade.

The storm marched out to sea, leaving behind at least 18 persons dead and temperatures below freezing as far south as Louisiana.

More than six inches of snow fell on Memphis, and roads were ice-slicked all across Dixie.

Highway accidents blamed on the storm killed 11 persons in Alabama, North Carolina, Virginia, Tennessee, Texas, Oklahoma and Missouri.

Cold weather fires claimed six lives in Oklahoma and North Carolina and an Arkansas pilot was killed when his plane crashed in fog.

The rains today stretched from the lower Mississippi Valley to the Carolinas. Athens, Ga., received 16 inch, the heaviest rainfall.

Snow flurries persisted in parts of the Tennessee Valley.

## Government Accused Of Smear Campaign Against Cranberries

CHICAGO (UPI) — The editor of the Journal of the American Medical Assn. accused the government of smearing the American people about cranberries, charcoal and chickens.

Dr. John H. Talbot made the accusation in an editorial entitled "Cranberries, Charcoal and Chickens" in the current Journal.

"The smearing and smearing were done in a very deliberate and planned way as a condition, some members of administrative staffs have been investigated by the FBI more than 500 years ago," he wrote.

Talbot said the cancer-producing agent, called aflatoxin, which led the government to inspect them shortly before Thanksgiving.

"Little known," Talbot continued, "was the fact that the evidence that administrative actions occur naturally in vegetables, notably cabbage, turnips and broccoli as well as in mustard." He added that the anthraxoid action of aflatoxin had been described in current medical books.

Talbot said that charcoal or carbon black came under government scrutiny Nov. 20, 1959, less than a year after being listed in the federal registry as a permissible food adulterant.

Loosely candy makers use the substance as a coloring, and protected the government's action. Consequently, less than a fortnight after carbon black came under suspicion, food and candy makers got a three-month grace period to produce evidence that burned toast is harmless, Talbot said.

Lithographic crayons came under suspicion for a few days, despite the fact that neither poultry producers, manufacturing chemists nor the chicken themselves had violated any federal regulation, Talbot said.

Talbot said only about 1 percent of the chickens eaten in the United States had been given antibiotics. The government banned its use when recent improved tests revealed residues of the drug remained in the skin, liver and kidneys.

"When next fall rolls around, we hope that cranberries will be permitted for the festive dinners, that lozenges and jelly beans will be for sale at the candy counter, and that southern fried chicken will be a permissible menu item," Talbot said.

LIDICE, Czechoslovakia — It was in May of 1945 that Mrs. Rose Petrakova was led by her mother to the top of the hill, and her mother said: "Bless yourself for something that your heart may not endure."

Rose stopped on a grassy knoll and looked into the west at the village of Lidice. But her mind went blank for the warm little community with its dairy houses and old church wasn't there.

Three years before, Rose, with other women of Lidice, was hustled off to a Nazi concentration camp. And until that moment in 1945 she hadn't known that the Nazis had bulldozed her town under — rubbed it off the map as if with a giant eraser.

Now, in late 1959, Rose and I stood at the rim of the little town that isn't there and she told me how it happened to her. I expected her to cry, and she did, for she had lost three fine grown children — murdered, as was her husband.

Rose showed me a letter written in a concentration camp by her daughter, Ruzena, then 15 — a letter to the child's grandmother. "Where is Mamma? Where is Daddy? . . . Please send some bread and some clothes for I am cold and hungry." The grandmother sent the packages. It was returned. Little Rose and her brothers, Mirek, 11, and Edouk, 9, were put to death in the gas chamber as were 79 other children from one year old to 16.

The men of the village, 173 of them, including the priest, were shot through the heart. They're

## Senators Brave Winds For Flag Raising

WASHINGTON (UPI) — It is not every day that a fellow gets to see the first flag raised at the new Senate office building. If he also gets to ride the new Senate subway on its maiden voyage, his cup runneth over . . . or at least splitteth a few drops.

I participated in such an eventful double-header Tuesday and my cup, a paper carton I brought along from the Senate restaurant, sloshed all over my news paper. Fortunately, I had one of those new pens that write under coffee.

Wending between the dark brown stains, I can make out from my notes that two U. S. senators braved the frosty wind to take part in the flag-raising ceremony.

This honor fell to Sens. Dennis Chavez (D-N.M.) and Styles Bridges (R-N.H.) because they are chairman and ranking GOP member respectively of the commission which supervised the erection of the building.

In view of all the criticism of the expense and inconvenience of the building, the privilege of hoisting the first flag was small enough compensation for their service.

The senators were getting red-nosed from the cold before a phalanx of photographers, who seemed to be in charge of the ceremony, finally permitted Chavez to run up the flag. Despite a strong breeze, the banner, once aloft, refused to wave. It barely flapped.

Then the Rev. Frederick Brown Harris, Senate chaplain, led us in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance and we all went inside for the main event — the formal opening of the 1,000-foot subway tunnel which links the new office building to the capitol.

The subway project, which cost more than six million dollars, or roughly \$6,000 a foot, also has caused some eyebrow-raising among the economy-minded, such as taxpayers. But Chavez and Bridges, in their ceremonial remarks, assured us it was worth it.

Chavez snipped a red, white and blue ribbon across the tunnel entrance and we all climbed aboard the rolling stock — two shiny electric-powered cars with green carpets and bouncy brown foam rubber seats.

In his opening prayer, Chaplain Harris likened the cars to "swift chariots of democracy." To me, they looked more like roller coasters. But I did feel a bit like Sen. Hur as we went scotching along over a sound-proofed roadbed at speeds up to 17 miles an hour.

There was a rush of wind on the face and the recessed, indirect lighting along the air-conditioned tunnel was blurred before

# Bowl Officials Deny Payments To Gridders

Officials of all-star bowl football games throughout the country all denied today a charge of making under-the-table payments to participating players.

Jim Pearce, founder of the Senior Bowl game in Mobile, Ala., charged that his game is the only one "open and above board" about paying players.

At a meeting in New York, the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. said it is investigating the charges and is considering outlawing bowls found breaking the rules.

Pearce named the Blue-Gray game in Montgomery, Ala., the North-South game in Jacksonville, Fla., the Copper Bowl in Tucson, Ariz., and the Hula Bowl in Hawaii as "illegitimate" bowls and then included "all of them."

Replying to the charges, William C. Brown, chairman of the North-South game, said, "We don't have to pay anyone. They're tickled to death to come here."

Brown added, "We certainly have nothing to hide. And I'm sure the East-West Shrine game in San Francisco doesn't either. We give our players a jacket, a wrist watch and a \$100 expense allowance, which amounts simply to per diem similar to that permitted in many other types of amateur competition."

Dave Rowe, director of the Copper Bowl, said all players in the game "receive \$7.70 per diem for 10 days plus \$25 terminal expense." Rowe said this is in accordance with NCAA regulations although the Copper Bowl is not under NCAA control.

At a Montgomery, Ala., Champ Pickens, founder of the Blue-Gray game, said the Blue-Gray presents competitors with "gold footballs and other trinkets given at a Christmas dinner" and also allows "each player \$100 and a trip like any other bowl."

A spokesman for the East-West Shrine game in San Francisco denied any East-West player ever had been paid to appear.

The Senior Bowl pays members of the winning team \$500 and members of the losing team \$300 plus expenses. Senior Bowl players are penalized by the NCAA with loss of their eligibility for other college sports and forfeiture of their athletic scholarships.

## Sooners May Lose Bowl Bid

NEW YORK (UPI) — One man stood today between the University of Oklahoma's football team and a possible trip to the Orange Bowl next year.

The man is Arthur L. Wood, an Oklahoma City accountant and booster of the Sooners, whose alleged "recruiting fund" resulted in the National Collegiate Athletic Assn.'s indefinite probation of Oklahoma Wednesday.

That means Oklahoma, national football champion in three of the last nine years, will be ineligible to appear on NCAA television programs or in post-season bowl games for an indefinite period. The Sooners, who previously were placed on probation in 1955 for two years, have won the Big Eight championship the last 13 years.

They are favorites to win the title again this year and normally would win a trip to the Orange Bowl in Miami, next New Year's Day. But they will not be permitted to appear in any bowl game unless Wood makes a full disclosure of the operations of the funds under his administration from 1955 to 1964.

The University of Tulsa also was placed on probation for one year—without restriction of privileges—because a "representative of athletic interests of the university" offered a prospective athlete a "gift or loan of \$600." That probation does not cut Tulsa anything, however, and was considered something of a slap on the wrist.

Oklahoma's probation provided the biggest excitement at Wednesday's session of the NCAA's annual meeting and there was immediate conjecture as to whether Wood would produce the desire records so the NCAA might lift the stigma from the Sooners.

Wood, however, gave no such indication at his home in Oklahoma City.

"I don't plan to cooperate at all, either with the university or the NCAA," he said bluntly. "I don't give a damn."

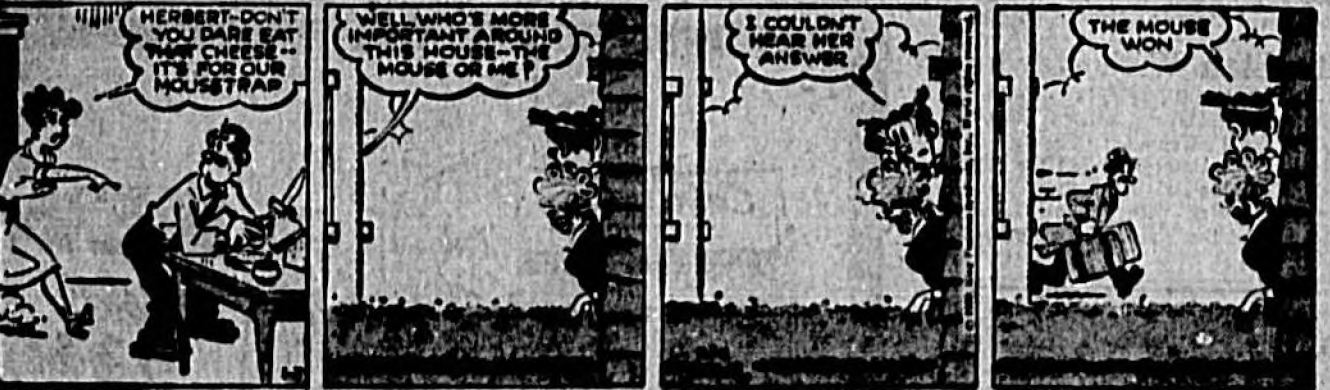
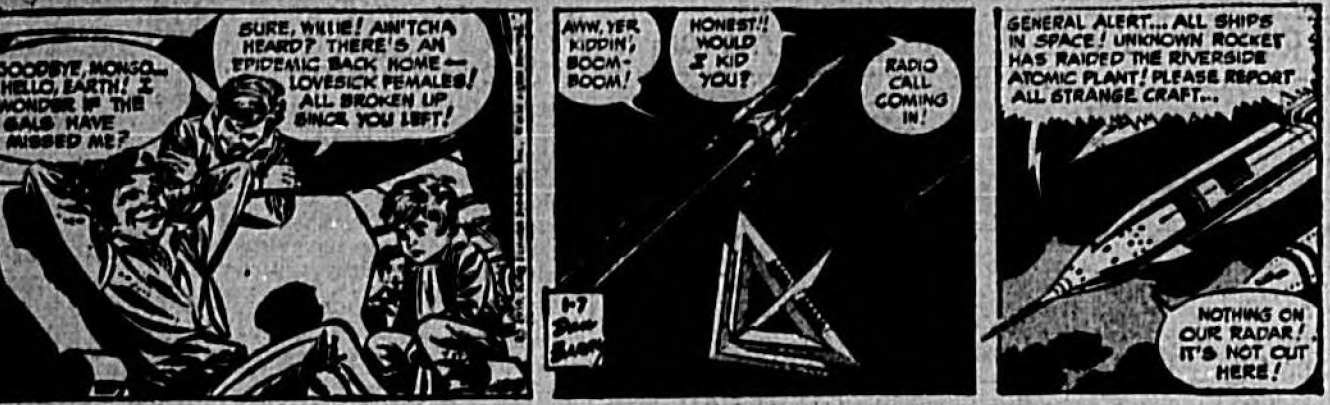

## His TV Horse Has Fan Club; Why Can't He

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — A simple "thank you" to a producer who gave him a part has resulted in TV stardom for Peter Breck, the lawyer-gunslinger hero of NBC's "Black Saddle" series.

"I was a nobody when I did a small part on 'Zane Grey Theater,'" said the slender, 30-year-old actor. "Well, I've always had the habit of saying 'thank you' for any favors people do for me. I believe that in show business, a guy is only the result of the collection of people behind him.

"So I went up to Hal Hudson, who produced the 'Zane Grey' show and simply said, 'Thank you.' His reply was, 'How would you like to be the lead in a new series?'

"After I picked myself up off the floor, I said, 'Fine.' And he said, 'All right, we start shooting tomorrow.'

Like most show business breaks,

Breck was backed by years of plugging and getting nowhere. A native of Rochester, N. Y., his father was the old Dixieland bandleader, Joe Breck (The Prince of Pep), Joe's trombonist was Jerry Colonna, who later went on to comedy fame.

Peter got out of the Navy in 1948. "Then," he said, "I played third string with the Rochester Royals professional basketball team in 1948-49 — right before they joined the organized pro leagues.

"After that I sang in nightclubs in Rochester. But it was too rough — the late hours and everything — for a kid of 19. I gave it up and went to the University of Houston to study drama.

"I never thought it would come in handy for my acting, but one summer I was a professional wrangler on the Circle B ranch in Bandera, Tex., between semesters.

Breck's association with real cowpokes has made him one of the few TV cowboys who honestly know their way around horses.

"People think of a horse as a kind of dumb animal," he said, "but I hate the word dumb used that way. A horse gets to know you and makes your work — at least mine — easier. I've had one horse named Curly, and he's always good on camera. Not off though—he's a real ham, just when the cameras turn. If I lead him into a scene backwards, he'll turn around.

"Curly's even got a fan club in Wyoming, and I don't have one yet. How about that for scene-stealing?"

Off camera, however, bachelor Breck prefers dogs. He lives in a home in the San Fernando Valley with three German Shepherds named Brutus, Cassius and Portia, and a poodle named Caesar.

## Smell Of Success — Through A Cold In The Nose

NEW YORK (UPI) — Success is a wonderful thing if you don't weaken. Rod Lauren, the newest "name" on record labels, inhaled a spoonful of soup and from his bleary eyes you would guess he was weakening.

"I've been going since nine o'clock this morning," he grunted. It was 6 p.m. and he still had one more rehearsal and a TV show to do before turning in.

"He's all keyed up," said a watchdog from RCA-Victor who was sitting at the restaurant table. "Last night we had to post someone at his door at the hotel to make sure he didn't get up and go out."

At 19, Lauren is living in a world of hectic schedules, microphones and spotlights, and fan magazine glory. Four months ago he was working in a California steel plant.

Such names as Perry Como and Bob Hope were luminaries far out in space. Today, he has appeared with both as a TV guest star. His own first record album will be out early next year.

"I had never earned a cent singing until all this happened," Lauren said.

All this began to happen when he obliged a musician friend by doing the vocals for some dem-

onstration records of new songs. An RCA scout heard the discs. He didn't care much for the songs, but who was that singer? Shortly after, Rod Lauren signed his name to a seven-year recording contract and RCA unlocked the vault to give him the big build-up.

Lauren is the son of a musical couple in Fresno, Calif. His mother is a church organist and his father sings in the choir. They wanted him to be a dentist, but instead he took to acting, playing the trombone with jazz bands and, now and then, singing a number of two.

He studied dramatics for a year at Stockton (Calif.) Junior College but he had to quit and go to work.

"What I really want to do is become a serious actor," he said asking the waiter for a glass of milk. "I want to do naturalistic roles. I enjoyed playing Peter in 'The Diary of Anne Frank' and I

want to do that kind of thing. I'm going to study acting again next year."

He downed his milk, and stretched his husky 5-foot, 11-inch frame. "From New York I go on a disc jockey tour — I'm not sure what cities — and then we record that album. You know, I think I'm catching cold."

Lauren excused himself and slouched wearily back to the TV stage next door.

# Sanford Ave. Road Project Starts Monday

Widening of Sanford Ave. from 13th St. to 25th St. will start next week, weather permitting, City Street Supt. Eddie Griffith said today.

City property on the west side of Sanford Ave. will be used to widen the street eight feet.

The city will supply the labor and right of way and the county will pay about \$10,000 for the necessary materials. The street will be widened for 5,140 feet but will remain two lanes.

The Sanford sewage department has started a downtown sanitary sewer line that will end using many storm sewers for organic waste. The new sewer extension being put in on Elm Ave. from Fulton St. almost to Commercial Ave. will serve the proposed Florida State Bank building on First St. The extension will eventually cover an area between Oak Ave. and French avenues and between Fulton and First streets.

These lines will someday run to the site of the proposed \$400,000 sewage disposal plant northwest of Sanford on Lake Monroe, sewage supt. Robert Kelly said yesterday.

# Planner Recommends Monroe Yacht Basin

Sanford resident city planner, Gerald Dake, last night recommended to the Sanford planning board that the Lake Monroe band shell be torn down and replaced with a marina and yacht basin.

A city yacht club building should replace the bandshell which has been costing Sanford money for many years, Dake said. The sea wall should also

be further extended into Lake Monroe to give shelter to boats, the city planner said. The planning board had no comments on Dake's suggestion.

Reporting on land use in Sanford, Dake said that the city has a tremendous high percentage of vacant land. Of the 2,834 acres with the city, 1,301.15 acres or 37 per cent are vacant.

Dake said that Sanford now has about eight persons per gross acre population. The city could have 15 persons per acre and still have a low population density, he explained.

Dake predicted that Sanford's 19,000 population will rise to 40,000 by 1980. Right now the city's existing limits could support 36,000 people, he said.

The planning board expressed approval of Dake's plan for a perimeter road to stop traffic congesting downtown areas and going through residential areas. The road is in concord with State Road Dept. plans and this department would be expected to bear a majority of the cost, Dake said. The road would run from First St. south on Grapeville to

25th St., east to meet 17-92 near Sunland Estates and across 17-92 to the Old Orlando Highway. From there it would go north on Orlando Highway to a point near Ginderville, east to Cameron Ave. north on Cameron to 13th St. and there meet a proposed extension of Seminole Blvd. and run along Lake Monroe.

# Dixie Senators Hit Ike's Speech

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Southern senators today bitterly criticized President Eisenhower's State of the Union farm proposals.

But the senators, with a few notable exceptions, gave a hesitant pat-on-the-back to many parts of the speech.

Sen. Allen J. Ellender (D-La.), chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, charged that the administration again failed to make any new proposals.

Sen. Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.), leader of the southern bloc, said Eisenhower "did not indicate a willingness to apply any remedy except the Benson formula of lower prices and lower farm income... which will kill rather than cure the patient."

Sen. Herman Talmadge (D-Ga.) said the "failure to outline a positive and realistic program" was the most serious omission in the message.

Sen. Olin D. Johnston (D-S.C.) called the whole speech a mass "of half-truths" and "omitted truths."

He said "I want no more of Benson or Eisenhower's proposals such as the belated soil bank farm busting project."

Sen. John Stennis (D-Miss.), expressing his disappointment at Eisenhower's failure to spell out a farm program, said "without his help there is scant chance to pass a constructive farm bill this session."

Possibly the sharpest criticism came from a southerner in the House of Representatives — Agriculture Committee Chairman Harold D. Cooley of North Carolina.

"The economic position of the nation's farm families worsens day by day and all the President has to prescribe is more Benson, more Benson, more Benson," Cooley said.

But many southerners found something to praise in the speech.

Sen. George A. Smathers (D-Fla.) called it a "splendid speech."
