WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower solemnly pledged today to devote the "full energies" of his last year in the White House to promote peace in the world and unprecedented prosperity at home. The President hopefully asked the Democratic-controlled Congress to stop "wrangling" with his dministration and work together

with him to achieve these goals.

He charted the goals for his
last 12 months in office in a State of the Union message to a joint session of the House and Senate. The message was largely a good news report, but laced with cau-
