Observation Posts

The Seminole County Air Raid Warning Service is having some difficulty in securing sufficient volunteers to man the various observation posts which have been set up in this county. But this condition is not unlike that which prevails in most parts of the country.

Published in a recent issue of the Observation Post, is a letter from the head of the Aircraft Warning Service in Culpeper, Va. originally published in the Culpeper Star, which replies to some of our citizens who are "too busy", "too tired" or "too uninterested" to serve.

"This is not a war of politics; it is not a war of individuals; it is not a war of religions; it is not a war of theories. It is a total war to take from you what your forefathers gave to you—the right to live in peace and freedom.

"Men are dying every hour and every day; 47,000 so far in this war have given their lives and freedom so that we can have the time to get ready to fight our enemies—and all the Government is asking of you, through the U. S. Army Air Corps, is your time serving at these aircraft warning posts. Is that asking too much of you when so many thousands have already given their lives?

"If all the prominent men in your community will call a meeting and prove by their own actions that they are taking an active part in helping to win this war; if all the ministers in your community will take part in helping to enlist the people in this war on Hitler; if all the men who employ others will enlist the aid of their workers to help watch the sky for the Nazis. Then and then only will these neighbors of ours be safe from bombings; for while we watch for others, don't forget that thousands are watching the skies elsewhere so that our loved ones will not be blown to bits in their sleep.

"It is a proven fact that this method of watching the skies for planes is the only way our interceptor planes can know where to find the enemy planes. It is the only way that our men who man the anti-aircraft batteries which defend our cities can be ready to shoot down any raiders that dare invade our land. It is the only way that our F.B.I. and our Army aircraft can find just where and what enemy planes are up to and where they are headed.

"You act as eyes and ears for the U. S. Army Air Corps. To you is given this task of serving your country without glory or without pay. If all people in all communities would serve it would mean an hour a month or possibly two hours a month. But as it is, many men and women have to serve as much as 12 to 14 hours at a stretch. This is too much, and yet these fine Americans do it every day and night—keeping these posts open 24 hours a day so that Americans might be safe from Hitler's bombers."

And so when the Aircraft Warning Service calls on you to help, get in there and do your part. Remember what the men of Batavia, Wake, and Midway have done for you.

Lombardi Has Good Chance Of Copping National Batting Title

NEW YORK, Sept. 10. (AP)—The National League may have big Ernesto Natoli Lombardi of the Boston Braves for a batting champion again this year even though he has been at bat only 266 times and stands no chance of getting the 400 turns at bat plate which customarily qualify hitters for major league leadership.

The husky catcher who captured hitting honors as well as the most valuable player award in 1938 while with the Cincinnati Reds now has an average of .322, six points ahead of Brooklyn's Pete Reiser, and it was learned today that he has the official blessing of the National League if he finishes on top.

Ford Frick, president of the senior circuit, has refused to be drawn into the question of Lombardi. But he has the right to designate the player the league considers the official batting champion and is expected to follow the same reasoning by which the league recognized Debs Garms of the Pittsburgh Pirates as champion in 1940 although he went to bat only 258 times in 103 games for an average of .335.

Formerly both the National and American Leagues required 400 times at bat to qualify for the batting title and the American League still has this rule. But a search of the National League rules in 1940, when Garms was awarded the crown, showed there is no such requirement now.

If the 400 times at bat qualification had been enforced in 1940 Lombardi would have come to Stan Hack of the Chicago Cubs who had 603 official trips to the plate in 149 games and averaged .317.

In 1938 when Lombardi topped all other hitters in his league he averaged .342 while going to bat 459 times in 123 games. As a player he already has made 87 hits in 265 turns at bat. The Braves have 18 games left to play, making it likely that Lombardi will get into difficulty although his total times at bat may not greatly exceed 300.

Either Alvin Dark or Joe Glamp, soph tailbacks, could keep the ends busy on an average afternoon. Dark, particularly, is respected for his pitching, having sparked the fresh team with his throw, a season ago. Both Dark and Glamp are major league baseball prospects.

Brazil Will Lend Material, Moral Help To Allies

Wide World Feature
Brazil, the first South American country to declare war on the Axis (Japan excluded) is expected to lend material and moral aid of definite proportions to the Allied troops.

This huge Portuguese speaking nation, biggest of the South American republics, is larger in size than the United States by approximately 250,000 square miles. Brazil has a population of about 45,000,000, borders on every South American country but Chile and Ecuador and has a coast line of almost 5,000 miles to guard.

Her army consists of 100,000 regulars, with 200,000 reserves. Navy has 10 destroyers, two cruisers, 11 destroyers and four submarines in addition to several smaller craft. Brazil had a peacetime air force of 3,500 men, is rapidly expanding that service.

Brazil entered World War (Only South American nation to do so) for same reason it came into present conflict: ruthless German submarine attacks on Brazilian vessels. Brazil's World War contribution consisted of a fleet detachment sent to European waters, a medical mission and a number of aviators. Biggest part was played on the food front.

Top Brazilian is President Getulio Vargas, definitely Axis. Brazil's immediate problem is to keep a wary eye on strong Axis nationalist groups who have settled there. Brazil has about 4,000,000 residents of German or Italian extraction, 300,000 Japanese. The latter represent the largest Japanese minority planted anywhere in the world.

Tobacco Is Used To Make Soap, Boards

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE
NEW YORK, Sept. 10. (WW)—The complete smoker can now wash his hands in a brown soap made from tobacco and decorate his pipe with a varnish made from tobacco.

He can also build a dam in which walls and ceilings—floors too if he wishes—are made of tobacco fiber boards.

These new uses of tobacco are reported by J. S. McHargue, of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station in The Frontier, a publication of the Armour Research Foundation. They come from the search by scientists for profitable uses for low grade tobacco.

McHargue thinks the quality of smoking tobacco has been improved by finding new uses and markets for the low grade stuff, which he hints sometimes get into your smokes despite the efforts of the tobacco companies to buy only the best.

The soap, he says, possesses excellent cleaning qualities. The varnish, brown in color, gives a high luster. The tobacco fiber board is unusually light-weight.

He thinks it will be a useful supplement to present fiber board sources. There is no tobacco fragrance in these products.
