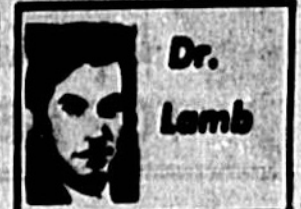

## Is Simpler Always Better?

When a campaigning Jimmy Carter denounced the U.S. tax system as a "disgrace," the opinion was probably legitimate.

As President, Mr. Carter no doubt expects broad support for those aspects of his tax program that promise a simplification of the instructions and forms that federal taxpayers are wrestling with this time of year.

But now a bipartisan move has been made in Congress to challenge the assumption that simplified tax returns are necessarily better.

Rep. Barber Conable Jr. of New York, a Republican, and Rep. Joseph L. Fisher of Virginia, a Democrat, are sponsoring a bill that would permit taxpayers who take the shortest of the standard deduction to claim an additional, separate deduction for their contributions to charities and tax-exempt organizations.

Their concern is that when the standard deduction assumes that a taxpayer has given a certain amount to charity, one motivation to make such donations is removed.

When taxpayers can list the specific amount of donations and deduct them from their taxable income, they're more likely to cough up when someone passes the hat.

At least that's how fund-raising experts analyze human nature, and they regard the growing use of the standard deduction as a threat to their revenues.

If the underpinnings of voluntary giving in America are threatened by the standard deduction, Mr. Carter's proposals for further simplification of the tax rules take on a different light.

Already 77 percent of federal tax returns use the catch-all deduction. The president's aim is to see that rise to 84 percent.

Congressmen come inevitably to the same question when it comes to tax law—whether an provision or another in the tax law should be changed in the interests of fairness or efficiency when it was placed there to benefit the general welfare.

The Conable-Fisher bill recognizes that the limited deduction for charitable contributions is more than an expendable bit of paperwork.

## Sharing Power

Republicans find it difficult to accept, but Sen. Smith, almost single-handedly, seems to be putting Seniors on the road to majority rule.

His plan is simple. He is demanding that the Senate pass the bill, and he is demanding that the House pass it.

### Rapid Transit Vote in Dade Successful By Narrow Margin

MIAMI (UPI) — Rapid transit narrowly passed in Dade County Tuesday, but it was a squeaker right to the end with the lead squeaking until the issue was decided finally 4 1/2 hours after the polls closed.

Although voters had approved \$132.5 million in Dade County bonds in 1972 for the elevated rail system, a group opposing it called "Stop Transit Over People" gathered 16,000 signatures — enough to force another vote on the bond issue.

So the way the ballot read, a vote "for" repeal of the bonds was a vote against the transit system and a vote "against" repeal was affirmation of the plan.

With all 602 precincts reporting, the vote was 117,446, or 50.28 percent, against repeal and 115,013, or 49.43 percent, for repeal — a mere 2,433-vote margin favoring pro-transit forces. The 2,050 absentee ballots not yet tabulated will have no effect on the outcome.

# Are Soviets Secretly Controlling Climate?

**OTTAWA** — Last March, during a cold and clear evening, a strange extra-terrestrial phenomenon occurred over Ottawa.

As reported by Canadian government official Andrew MacKinnon, "the sky lit up with a brilliant light."

MacKinnon, employed as a futurist in Canada's office of the secretary of state, had for some time suspected the Soviet Union in this regard. The short lighting activity could be explained, he said, by the fact that the Soviet government, and that of the U.S., that the world may be in a new and exciting period.

And he's not alone in this belief. A growing number of scientists are increasingly worried that the USSR is behind the recent surge of global climate conditions.

# The Big Bang: Cosmic Rays May Explain It All

**DUGWAY, Utah (UPI)** — Some 20 billion years ago — so the Big Bang theory goes — our universe was born in a gigantic explosion that sent the core of the super-nova scattering.

The universe, according to the theory, then developed into a system of expanding galaxies. But man's efforts to interpret the results of the expansion, explain how, until now, always been limited by limited technology.

Now a team of University of Utah astrophysicists is on the verge of opening a new era in cosmic ray detection and particle physics that may expand the limits of astronomy to the edge of the universe.

"We hope to learn about the dynamics of our galaxy," said Dr. George Casaday, associate professor of physics, "and perhaps the structure of the universe itself."

Casaday and his team of more than two dozen university professors and graduate students is developing a new method of tracking the faint, spreading light from cosmic ray particle showers.

The university's observatory, called "Fly's Eye," is being constructed on an isolated site in the U.S. Army's Dugway Proving Ground in the western state.

Casaday says Fly's Eye will

eventually be an array of about 100 giant cosmic mirrors that will focus the ultraviolet light of cosmic ray showers onto a bank of "photomultiplier" which amplify the light and convert it into an electronic signal fed into university computers.

The observatory will measure cosmic rays streaming in on the Earth from all directions.

"Lower energy cosmic rays ... are sent by the various electromagnetic fields in the universe," Casaday said.

But he said cosmic rays accelerated to the energy level of 10 to the 18th power electron volts, and at higher energy levels, tend to travel in straight lines.

Cosmic rays of this energy level most likely come from super novae, an exploding star; from pulsars, the contracted remnants of an exploded star which emit high energy impulses, or from Seyfert or N-type galaxies, which have small and intensely bright nuclei emitting strong energy signals.

"Since we know these cosmic rays in the top energy range travel in a straight line, once we go above the energy level of super novae, pulsars and N-type galaxies, it could be that we'll be measuring energy from quasars only."

In theory, the university team will be creating an energy picture from cosmic ray radiation from the edge of the universe as it expanded one by one.

And, by adapting the measuring equipment, the researchers hope to determine whether cosmic rays are uniform throughout the universe, and thus created by a source such as quasars, or if they come from sources inside the universe, which will tend to determine some of the bang in the Big Bang theory.

Casaday said, if the ultra high energy cosmic rays are coming from a few or many galaxies inside the universe, such as the Seyfert galaxies, "that won't disprove the Big Bang, but we may have to modify our thinking about the nature of the universe when the universe was formed."

The researchers predict up to 10 readings annually of cosmic rays in the highest energy range.

"We'll need at least 100 before we'll be prepared to come out with any definitive statement on the source of the super high energy stuff, if we can prove it exists at all," Casaday said.

# After 32 Years Of Tito...What?

**BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (UPI)** — Last year, his 38th birthday, President Tito of Yugoslavia began using a small but significant phrase more often in his messages to the nation he built: "I'm going." Only three words, but people noticed.

After 32 years of leadership — the longest term in power of any Yugoslav leader — Tito is preparing to leave Yugoslavia to survive on his own.

According to Tito's thinking, and the official policy of his ruling Communist party, the president's passing will bring no upheaval. "I can leave at any time," he says, "and nothing will change."

But not everyone is so sure. "This is the time that holds their own region, though, Tito says the Soviets have 'just control' and have not affected the world.

light a guerrilla war against the occupying Nazis, established a Communist state and — when the Soviet Union tried to treat him like a puppet — proclaimed his party's independence and created the first great split in the Communist world. He strengthened Yugoslavia's independence, improving an imaginative system of decentralized socialism and a

separate state. Next it was the turn of the Serbs, the largest ethnic group, who took advantage of a crackdown on the Croats to try to reassert their own primacy.

The Montenegrins, Macedonians and Albanians of the primitive, rural south are jealous of the industrial wealth of Croatia and Slovenia in the north. The affable Stojevic and Croats resent the policies that force them to subsidize the underdeveloped south.

In Kosovo, the southern province on the Albanian border, rising ethnic Albanians won the right in 1980 to fly Albania's red-and-black flag alongside the blue, white and red of Yugoslavia — and they are still pressing for more autonomy.

"Some people try to locate nationalism in only one or two of the republics," Party Secretary Stane Dolanc, a Slovene, warned in a recent interview with a Belgrade newspaper, "but the problem can be found in economic conflict: the per capita product of the Ljubljana area in 1975 was more than 50,000, while the rest of the republic was only 4653. And these regional conflicts could provide a tempting pressure point for domestic factions or foreign meddling to play on."

In 1971, Tito's own Croatian leadership brought the nation near a split when they called for

the first "real Yugoslav." He is renowned for his startling ability to speak with a Croatian accent to his native Croats, and a perfect Serbian accent in Serbia. When he goes, it may be difficult to find a successor who is equally trusted by all the country's nationalities.

On paper, the problem has already been solved: Yugoslavia after Tito will be ruled by a nine-man committee, "The Presidency," with one member from each of the republics and province plus the head of the Communist party. That way, power will be shared.

"But it is almost inevitable that some members will be more influential than others," a diplomat said. "And besides, a lot of the real power in this country isn't based in the institutions of the state, but in the party and the Army."

Veteran Yugoslav watchers are leaping their eyes on three main figures:

— **Edvard Kardelj** (Cag-del-ye), 68, Tito's World War II chief — chosen co-chairman and the author of Yugoslavia's system of "self-management" in factories and offices. But Kardelj, a Slovene, is in shaky health and party insiders believe he wants to concentrate more on his theoretical work than on day-to-day politics.

Still, he will almost surely be at the top of the post-Tito leadership — if only as a symbol of Tito's heritage.

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# China Wants U.S. Ties

**HONG KONG (UPI)** — China says relations with the United States will continue to improve and possible economic contacts will increase despite the dispute over Taiwan and the lack of formal diplomatic ties.

China is "willing to increase contacts" with the United States on a bilateral basis without normalization of relations, Premier Huo Kwang said in a state of the nation address to the Chinese legislature.

Country-to-country relations also "will continue to improve," Huo said, provided practical steps laid down in the Sino-American Communiqué "are seriously carried out."

The Shanghai Communiqué, signed by President Nixon and Chairman Mao Tse-tung in 1972, pledged both nations to work toward normalization of relations.

Despite "fundamental differences" in political philosophy and other areas, Huo said more than 4,000 delegates to China's Fifth National People's Congress, "the two countries have quite a few points in common on some issues in the present international situation."

His remarks came in a lengthy national report delivered to the just-concluded congress in Peking. The text of the report was broadcast here by Peking Radio.

He repeated the basic Chinese position on Taiwan — that the Peking-based island is a part of China and must be reunited with the mainland.

"We will continue to actively support the Chinese people's struggle for the liberation of Taiwan," he said.

# Strikers Press For Carter Mine Seizure

The Carter administration — rejecting demands that it order coal mines — today again restated its position on a proposal to let an independent agency order the seizure of a mine.

The proposal of seizure of the hole-in-the-wall order for 100,000 UMW miners appears bleak. Many miners say they won't obey the order unless President Carter does what he can.

A White House statement said there is "a belief and a presumption on the part of the government that people will obey the law."

"I personally know of six mine operators who have placed dynamite along the perimeter of their property," said Sen. Carl Albert of the Labor-Resource Committee. "If officials don't act decisively to prevent a confrontation, there could be a severe loss of life."

In Rockport, Ky., local volunteer fire departments — largely staffed by striking miners — refused to respond when fire broke out in a 700-ton pile of coal being shipped on a barge from a nearby conveyor belt conveyor.

The state fire marshal's office was asked to investigate the possibility of strike-related arson.

"The men believe they will get a better deal under Carter," Ohio UMW district official Bill Lamb said.

The United Auto Workers Tuesday donated \$1 million to the UMW, and earlier, sympathetic farmers, engaged in their own farm strike movement, shipped meat, produce and canned goods to striking miners in Kentucky.

## 'We'll Create Study Commission'

# Cities To State: Don't Force Law On Us

City delegates to the Council of Local Governments in Seminole County Wednesday night agreed, without exception, to the concept of a local government study commission to find ways of saving taxpayer dollars.

But all insisted that a state law creating such a committee is not acceptable and not the way to do it.

And one city official, Mayor Norman Floyd of Altamonte Springs, went so far as to threaten court action if the legislature creating the committee is sponsored by the local legislative delegation and passed by the legislature.

In addition, Floyd said if the effort is directed toward consolidation of governments in Seminole "during our lifetime," someone is "having a pipe dream."

Late May Councilman Cliff Nelson, suggesting that the study be conducted on a local level, rather than by state mandate, said the most effective way to conduct such a study would be local officials. He said that no one knows

as much about local government or has as many experts at their command as locally elected officials.

Nelson added that any elected official who is not in favor of saving tax money won't be around long.

"But, the elected officials of the cities do not want to be cut off," said Nelson. "All the hands of hell shouting isn't going to get it done. We don't want this shoved down our throats by state law."

"The proposed legislation shoots the hell out of humor. If you want something screwed up, put it in the state law," added Floyd.

The comments were made after Tom Kanellis and Larry Cole of the Seminole County League of Civic Associations explained the legislation they have submitted to the legislative delegation to create a local government study commission of 15 members.

Cole said his organization is sponsoring the legislation, and the county commission is supporting it. The bill would empower the proposed study commission to conduct a comprehensive review and identify of problems concerning duplication of services, double-taxation and over-

lapping or duplicative jurisdictional functions between municipalities and between municipalities and the county.

"To accomplish this task, the commission shall be empowered to review the structure and functions of governmental agencies and boards operating within Seminole County. Specifically, these are identified as county government, municipal government, public Indian corporations, all constitutional officers, and all officers, agencies, commissions, boards, institutions and subdivisions thereof," according to the legislation.

The proposed legislation also would empower the commission to conduct the study and research to determine the need for any revision of local governmental structure and functions and to determine whether tax savings or efficiency or better government can be gained for the taxpayers and citizens.

Another function proposed in the proposed legislation is drafting of a plan or plans for the solution of any problem which would be presented to the legislative delegation in the form of a special act. And any recom-

mendation requiring a referendum could be presented to the delegation on or before Jan. 15, 1980.

"We are a citizens group on an on's payroll. We are in business to make a profit and go to wherever necessary to get the job done," said Kanellis. Kanellis also expressed his group's failure to apprise the cities in advance of submitting the legislation to the delegation.

Kanellis said that the League of Civic Associations is composed of 25 homeowners groups and represents about 15,000 to 15,000 persons.

Floyd and Longwood councillor Steve Barton questioned whether the member civic organizations include any from the cities. Kanellis indicated there are twelve Altamonte Springs, but Floyd said that he had talked to a member of one of the three organizations on Wednesday who had denied that association.

Winter Springs Deputy Mayor John Dunstan questioned the composition of the proposed committee to be appointed four members by the legislative delegation. Five

## Mugged While In Police Car

Ford said three men approached the car, managed to open the locked door of the rear section and pulled him out.

"They just took everything," Ford said.

He said his house included \$200 in cash, a gold watch, a ring, and a \$50 gold piece on a chain worth \$200.

When Ford got on the police car radio and alerted for help, half a dozen patrol cars responded with the suspect he had arrested but the other was had disappeared while Ford was being robbed.

# Seminole Students Score High In Tests

Seminole County juniors and seniors topped national regional and state averages on the College Board's Admissions Testing Program (ATP), while students in other grades recorded the norm for statewide tests.

The ATP includes the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT); the Test of Standard Written English and the Student Descriptive Questionnaire Achievement Test.

School officials expressed pleasure with the results of the tests. However they were at a loss to explain the reason for the county's high scores.

"Using the state standards for assessment you would not have expected Seminole County to surpass the state level anything like it did," Bob King, Assistant Director of Evaluation, told the Seminole County Board of Education Wednesday.

The state uses four criteria, King said, for trying to gauge a school district's potential on the tests: median income; ethnic balance; adult education level and number of white collar workers.

Seminole County is "about average" in all those respects, King said. He noted that the county scoring higher than Seminole in the communications portion of the 11th grade examinations was "50 percent white."

Seminole County juniors and seniors taking the ATP topped the average of all the ATP tests with a score of 861, compared to 533 nationally, 528, regionally and 569 in the state.

The local score for the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) verbal average, which is used by many colleges to rank applicants, was two points above the national average at 611. Regional and state scores for that test were 416 and 461 respectively.

On the mathematics portion

of that test Seminole County scored 676 as compared to 619 nationally, 646 regionally and 624 statewide.

The written English portion of the test revealed scores of 63.6 for Seminole County; 63.9 nationally; 61.8 regionally and 63 statewide.

Seminole County students scored well above the state levels on statewide communication tests. On the composite scores for the Florida Statewide Assessment tests, Seminole County students scored higher in mathematics tests than on communication examinations in the primary grades. In Eighth and Eleventh grades, the trend reversed.

The basic skills tests are given to 3rd, 5th, 8th and 11th graders in Seminole County.

Eleventh graders were also given the Functional Literacy Test.

They were second in the state with 97 in communication and their mathematics score, 75, was third in the state, according to King.

Severn for the basic skills Test are as follows:

—Third Grade: communication, 91.1; math, 88.3 compared to 79.5 and 83.3 statewide.

—Fifth grade: communication, 91.9; math 96.1; compared to 78.6 and 79.9 statewide.

—Eighth grade: communication, 83.2; math 81.3; compared to 78.1 and 78.6 statewide.

—Eleventh grade: communication 83.2; math 80.1; compared to 77 and 73.3 statewide.

Results of the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CTBS) showed students in the district to be at or above their grade levels. The only exception was the seventh grade, where scores dipped slightly below grade level.

Questioned about the sagging seventh grade scores, school officials said they could offer no explanation.

## Judge Holds Order

# Traffic Fines Rebates Are Imminent

Circuit Judge Alan Dickey has prepared an administrative order authorizing court clerk Arthur Beckwith, Jr., to make refunds to those who paid traffic fine surcharges last summer, but says he does not intend to sign it until sometime next week.

March 15, is the deadline for filing for a rehearing before the State Supreme Court on its Feb. 25 ruling that the surcharge on tickets with the Good Drivers Incentive Fund previously

declared unconstitutional because it reduced the fees they paid them, Dickey said.

"It does not become final until the time for rehearing has passed and I intend to give the order as soon as I have more information for rehearing has been filed," Judge Dickey said.

Beckwith has previously said he is ready to act promptly in making out letters that will refund \$4,000 in related checks to about 1,000 drivers, as soon as he gets official authorization.

Judge Dickey said that those awaiting their checks will be notified by the clerk's office because in many inquiries have been coming in that Beckwith couldn't handle his regular work.

In its decision the Supreme Court upheld the rest of the 1977 Auto Insurance Act, which went into effect July 1, 1977. On Aug. 1 of last year, Judge Dickey declared the law unconstitutional and ordered funds already collected to be placed in a special depository until the Supreme Court could rule on the constitutionality of the law.

A month later, when the Supreme Court unanimously struck down the surcharge portion of the law, the justices failed to rule on whether the

decision would be retroactive to July 1. This left court clerks throughout the state without the authority to refund the amount \$40,000 that had been collected.

Eight bills had been drafted in the house of representatives and senate that would repeal the law.

None of these would have called for the funds to be paid to the state's general fund or the counties' funds and therefore funds, while others would have returned the money to those who paid the surcharges.

Under the Auto Insurance Act an additional penalty was levied to drivers fined for traffic violations—\$50 for a moving violation and \$20 for driving while intoxicated. The surcharge funds collected were to go into a Good Drivers Incentive Fund, which was to have made rebates to certain delinquent drivers.

Dickey said he does not believe any of the \$50 penalties were collected in Seminole County.

Deputy Attorney General Joseph Whinnand said last week he hopes to file a plan to appeal the ruling.
