The federal government will have no secrets in its prosecution of Al Capone, Attorney General Mitchell has sald recently, and what facts concerning the gangster are not brought out in his trial will be released to the public later through the press. The government has had enough of this criminal and others of his type and, to put it plainly, is out to "get" him. Capone pleaded guilty recently to charges of violating the income tax laws in the hope of receiving a light sentence, but at the last minute, apparently getting wind of the government's more determined attitude, asked to change his plea to one of not




