

Dictator's Abuses Said 'Enormous And Unforgivable'

Gorbachev Condemns Stalin

MOSCOW (UP1) — Terming the abuses of power committed by dictator Joseph Stalin "enormous and unforgivable," Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev today issued a ringing condemnation of the Stalin era and announced the establishment of commissions to rewrite the history of that period and rehabilitate the victims of its purges.

Gorbachev's speech, delivered in the cavernous Palace of the Congresses to 6,000 invited guests and parliamentarians, was expected to last at least three hours and run about 100 pages in length.

The Soviet leader also warned that his policy of perestroika, or reorganization, faced resistance within the country and it was necessary "to offset maneuvers by those braking perestroika." He said social-

ism needed the "second wind" provided by perestroika.

Billed as a review of the 70 years since the Communist Party seized power in the 1917 Russian Revolution. Gorbachev opened with praise of Lenin and his policies. But an hour into the speech, he turned on the "excesses" committed under Stalin.

"Many thousands of party members and non-party members were subjected to mass repressions." Gorbachev said.

"The guilt of Stalin ... is enormous and unforgivable," he said, adding that the "cult of personality" that grew up around him had no justification.

Gorbachev said the two commission formed by the Politburo would review new documents about the political trials of the Stalin era and rehabilitate those who were

in reality innocent of any crime.

Another commission, also established at Polithuro level, would review the history of the Stalinist period and produce "an honest understanding of both our prodigious achievements and past misfortunes" to provide a "true moral reference point" for the future.

State television Sunday showed a stream of representatives from Communist parties and friendly countries arriving to open the celebrations for the Nov. 7 anniversary of the revolution. Nicaragua's Daniel Ortega, sporting a fur "shabka" hat a bit early in the season, was among the visitors.

As widely predicted, Gorbachev called for the rehabilitation of some individuals killed by Stalin in his ruthless consolidation of Bee STALIN, page SA

Longwood Considers Rezoning

A public hearing on a controversial conditional use request submitted by St. Stephens Orthodox Church to build a church and hall in a R-1 zoning district on Range Line Road will head the agenda at today's Longwood City Commission meeting scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m. at city hall.

The project, proposed for vacant land immediately south of the Meadowridge subdivision, comes up for a hearing with two strikes against it. The Land Planning Agency voted unantmously to recommend denial and City Planner Chris Nagle is against the church's request unless the applicant is willing to substantially reduce the proposed size of the project and address the other building scale.

Rain Predicted On Voters Parade

The 88,000 registered voters in Seminole County have an opportunity to flex their constitutional muscles Tuesday, and demostrate the power of the ballot box. City officials are on the ballots in four cities, two cities are asking for voter approval of changes in their charters, and all voters in the county have an opportunity to vote on a proposed one-cent sales tax.

Predictions of voter turnout range from a low of 10 percent in Altamonic Springs, where there are no opposing candidates for city offices, to 35 percent in Longwood, although predicted rainy weather is expected to Longwood and Winter Springs are both asking voter approval of changes in city charters, besides electing commissioners.

Longwood voters will decide on three proposed charter amendments. They are voting in November this year rather than December as a result of a charter amendment approved previously. Tuesday, voters will decide whether to change the term of eity commissioners from

two to four years; whether in have direct election of mayors to four-year terms; and whether a deputy mayor should be elected by random drawing of the city commission, all to take effect in 1990. Longwood voters will also decide whether to enact a provision for recall of city commissioners ib accordance with state aw There are also six candidates vying for three seats on the Longwood City Commission. Harvey Smerilson, an enginner with Martin-Marietta, is seeking his third term on the commission from District 1, and is being challenged by Richard Bullington, who works in the construction business.

buffering and property use concerns which he has expressed.

The proposed conditional use application is to permit the construction of a 3,600 sq. ft. church building and a 3,600 sq. ft. social hall building. According to the architeet Ron Tarczyanski, the buildings are designed to accommodate approximately 125 persons each. Church officials said the two buildings would not be used at the same time.

Owners of the two-acre site are Amos and Queen Jones of Sanford. The church is currently located in DeBary.

Nagle said in comparison to a permissable six-lot single family subdivision, the project would generate less traffic Monday through Saturday. On Sundays the proposed project would generate comparable average traffic volumes if only one building was used. However, Nagle said he believes the proposed project is too large given the potential Sunday traffic impacts. The site as designed would also preclude. ingress-egress access to the lots to the rear and present site buffering and possible negative property value impact to the four abutting properties to the east and south.

In Nagle's opinion, a small single-story church that is appropriately sited and huffered is a desirable use of the property, especially from a traffic generation aspect. Should the commission be in favor of granting a church for the property, the project should be reduced to approximately 2.500 sq. ft. In gross area and his recommendations in a Sept. 21 memo should be considered.

Another public hearing will be held on the conditional use request by American Pioneer Savings Bank to locate a 1,300

tests the voting machines in preparations for Tuesdays elections. Rain is predicted which may reduce the expected 35 percent turnout.

reduce the number of eligible voters who make it to the 95 polling places. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

All voters in the county have the opportunity to vote for or against the one-cent sales tax for which county government has asked approval. The tax, which would be applied to purchases up to \$5,000 for 15 years, is wanted for county road improvements, including the Seminole County Expressway. A portion of the money raised would go to effes, which would use it in a variety of ways, including for road improvements, parks, sewer projects and municipal buildings.

Veteran commissioner June Lormann is seeking her eighth term, and is being challenged by

Sanford May Purchase Private Utility System

Sanford may acquire 53 new utility customers through the purchase of a private utility system.

The City Commission will discuss the possibility of buying the Indian Mound Water System Association today in a workshop session in the city manager's conference room at 4 p.m.

"What we'll be doing (if the purchase is approved) is dropping one wholesale customer (the Indain Mound Water System Association) and adding 53 retail utility customers." said Bill Simmons, Sanford's director of Engineering and Planning.

According to Simmons, the city would acquire the systems as it exists. The only cash involved in the purchase would be approximately \$1,000 to buy spare utility materials and the waiver of customary water system deposits totaling about

\$2,700. The city would also assume a loan balance of about **\$23,060**.

Simmons said he recommended acquiring this system as a means of expanding the city's utility capacity toward the east at vitually no cash cost.

"An immediate benefit would be the capability to loop the south end of this system located at the intersection of Cameron Avenue and State Ronte 46 with out new 10-inch line to be installed along the southside of State Route 46," Simmons said. "This looping would provide greater reliability for all concerned at very little cost."

If the commission decides to approve the purchase, it will then be scheduled for a public hearing. If the purchase is made, future service to the Indian Mound area will be hirnished by the city on the same basis that the city services other out-of-Bee SANFORD, page 7A

State Road Plan Requiring Tax Increases Unveiled

ORLANDO (UPI) — Gov. Bob Martinez and other state officials outlined a plan today to meet Florida's transportation needs by raising \$25 billion in new taxes over the next decade.

Martinez, Department of Transportation Secretary Kaye Henderson and other officials unveiled the "1988 Strategic Transportation Plan" that calls for building 1.360 miles of new highways, including interstates; widening 4.690 miles of highways; construction of seven fixed guideway systems, including south Florida's builet train; and construction of four new regional airports.

Martinez and Henderson estimated Florida's total transportation needs over the next 10 years at \$40 billion and they conceded that just \$15 billion is available from the current state gas tax and other revenue sources.

To finance the new construction will require massive increases in transportation taxes.

Martinez and Henderson said they would recommend a funding package for the 1988 Legislature next spring and that it could include a gas tax increase, a special tax on people registering vehicles in Florida for the first time and recapture of license tax money currently going to education.

They said they won't propose a special taxes package until state residents are sold on the transportation projects. To begin building that consensus, they began the live-city tour this morning in Tallahassee,

POLICE **IN BRIEF** Area Police Aided By Electronic **Beeper in Making Drug Arrest**

A twist of fate and an electronic beeper confiscated by undercover agents during a drug raid led to the arrest of an Altamonte Springs man Friday night after he inadvertantly contacted the agents with the device to arrange a drug deal

Robert Lee Deck. 28, of 485 Forest Way Circle, has been charged with possession and intent to traffick cocaine. Deck is employed an oyster shucker at the Calico Jack's resturant in Altamont Springs, according to the arrest report.

After the agents arrested Clark Linden Horner and Weatherford Kimball Rice at the Spanish Trace Apartment complex Thursday for selling them cocaine one of the men said they had bought the drugs from Scott L. Scopas, 26, of Apt. 102, 445 Wymore Road. The Scopas address is also part of the Spanish Trace complex.

When the agents searched Scopas' apartment, they found cocaine under the corner of a waterbed and in a kitchen fuse box. Scopas was arrested early Friday and charged with trafficking cocaine. Scopas, Horner and Rice were all listed as being held without bond.

While one of the agents was doing an inventory of the evidence found in Scopas' apartment an electronic beeper went off with a message for Scopas to phone a number given by Deck over the device. When the agent dialed the number, Deck answered the phone and asked for Scopas. The agent told Deck that Scopas was out of the apartment taking care of business, according to the report.

The agent said Deck asked him if he could "front him" an eighth of an ounce of cocaine. Deck reportedly stated he'd been buying cocatae from Scopas for some time and that he would pay for the drugs the following morning.

The agent agreed to meet Deck in the parking lot of Coconuts Lounge in Altamonte Springs at 8 p.m. Friday. When the agent arrived on the scene he was wearing a body bug and was supported by other backup agents.

The agent got into Deck's car and handed him a plastic bag containing the cocaine, after the suspect had promised to pay \$190 for the drugs on Saturday morning.

The agent then arrested Deck and transported him to the Altamonte Springs Police Department and later to the Seminole County Jail.

Deck, who told the agents he had planned to sell the cocaine, was released on \$2,000 bond.

Two Arrested On Drug Charges

Two Sanford men were arrested in seperate incidents involving cocaine Friday night.

Jophnny Lee Perkins, 1204 Oleander Ave., was with possession of cocaine after he was allegedly observed by authorities throwing a plastic pill bottle containing 13 pieces of crack cocaine on to the ground when a pairol car approached the area he was in.

Perkins was released from the Seminole County Jail on \$2,000 bond

In the second arrest, Harry Lee Harvey, 1008 West 12th Street, was taken into custody after he tried to throw away a matchbox containing a piece of crack cocaine, while he was being searched by police officers.

Harvey has been charged with possession of a controlled substance and resisting arresting arrest without violence. He was booked into the Seminole County Jall in letur of

Kentucky, Mississippi Will Choose **Governors In Tuesday's Elections**

In Election 1987 Tuesday, Kentucky and Mississippi will select new governors, cities from Miami to San Francisco will choose their mayors and voters across the country will decide issues ranging from nuclear power to horse racing.

A light schedule of varied off-year elections also will determine control of New Jersey's Legislature, whether Virgina gets a lottery and whether a new baseball stadium will be built in downtown San Francisco to replace chilly and windy Candlestick Park, home of the National League West champion Giants.

In Kentucky, self-made multimillionaire Wallace Wilkinson used his own money and a promise of a lottery to avoid a tax increase to build a strong lead in the polls over Republican John Harper, a state representative.

In Mississippi, businessman Jack Reed has made the strongest Republican bid for the governor's office since the post-Civil War Reconstruction Period, but he still trails Democratic State Auditor Ray Mabus. In the major mayoral races:

Miami's Xavier Suarez, the nation's first Cuban-born mayor. faces four challengers including currently divided, with Demo-Maurice Ferre, whose 12-year reign as mayor ended in 1985. and former Reagan administration official Arthur Tecle Jr. An expected heavy Hispanic vote Republican Gov. Tom Kean at favors Suarez and could avoid a runoff

Philadelphia's Wilson Goode, to grab control of both houses.

the city's first black mayor, is challenged by the flamboyant Frank Rizzo, a Democrat turned Republican who was mayor from 1972 to 1980. Polls show Goode with a comfortable margin despite widespread disappointment in his job performance.

San Francisco's Dianne Feinstein is unable to run, and Assemblyman Art Agnos has held a slight edge over John Molinari, a 16-year member of the board of supervisors, with former chief city administrative officer Roger Boas leading the remaining nine candidates.

In Hartford, Conn., Democrat Carrie Saxon-Perry is heavily favored to defeat Republican Philip Steele to become New England's first black female mayor

In Charleston, S.C., Mayor Joseph Riley is strongly favored for a lourth term over Republican Roy DeHaven.

And in Tueson, Ariz., Republican William Gilkinson, the city's former police chief, is battling a 3-to-2 Democratic edge in voter registration in a close race with Thomas Volgy, a Hungarian refugee on the city council for 10 years.

New Jersey's Legislature is crats holding a 23-17 majority in the Senate and Republicans holding a 50-30 edge in the Assembly, but without popular the top of the ticket, the Democrats think they have a chance

Texas voters will weigh in on the issue of legalizing parimutuel betting on horse racing statewide and dog races in coastal counties. A Virginia state lottery looked like a sure bet less than a month ago, but now few are willing to wager the legalized games will gain voter approval.



Return to your other pleasures of life such as preparing for the dance competition in the Golden Age Games. the senior dances at the Sanford Civic Center, etc. No more practing rain-making.

Why? First, efforts of Seminolians were exerted for the folks in the Northwest but the signals got crossed and the effect was felt in the Alaskan northwest - Yukutat to be specific. Four and one-half feet of rain. That's right, 54 inches. Then everybody got straight and the Pacific Northwest of the contiguous 48 states got rain, as desperately needed to break a 102 day drought. You did wonderful. But you spared not the other 46 states. And look what you've done to Seminole County. We're grateful for your response to our call to raindance and your effectiveness has been overwhelming.

It's raining. We mean RAINING. And, it's going to keep it up for a couple of days. probably. There's a strong system working in the central U.S. that is affecting us from the north. There's an even stronger system affecting us from the south. That's the biggie. And if it gets any bigger, they're gonna call it Gert. Terrible name for a storm or even a tropical depression. At any rate that low pressure

center is going to give us the rain, and the collision of the two systems is causing the winds - fresh and breezy.

The late-season tropical depression threw 35-mph winds and heavy rains at Cuba and much of the Caribbean, and forecasters issued a precautionary tropical storm watch

for the Florida Keys At 5:30 a.m. EST, the depression, packing top winds of 35 mph. was about 140 miles southeast of Havana, Cuba. and was moving northwest at 10 mph. Forecasters predicted it would take a more northerly. track during the next 24 hours

Forecaster Noel Risnychok said the depression could become tropical storm Gert after moving over the coast of Cuba and into the open Caribbean today.

"Once it clears Cuba, it could regenerate enough to become a tropical storm." he said. "It's late in the season. but it has the potential to do that."

Forecasters posted a tropical storm watch for the lower and middle Keys and advised boaters to stay in port. Risnychok said residents there. might be battered by winds of at least 39 mph. which is tropical storm strength, by this afternoon.

A weekend rain storm over parts of the Pacific Northwest helped firefighters contain Oregon's largest forest fire in more than four decades and dropped moisture on places that had not seen rain for three. months. Yakima, Wash., ended a

104-day rainless period, and a third of an inch kept Seattle from setting a record for the driest October in history, but the skimpy rainfall was not enough to have an impact on one of the worst droughts in Washington in decades.

In Washington. Seattle and Tacoma received a little rain. but not enough to end a ban on outdoor watering. The water shortage in Tacoma caused the layoffs of thousands of workers at some water-dependent industries and water restrictions for all residents.



Two Brevard County Girls Killed in Weekend Accident

Two girls from Astronaut High School in Titusville were killed and two more were injured Saturday night in an auto accident that occured when their car was struck by a pickup truck at the intersection of State Road 46 and Pine Ave. in Mims. a city in north Brevard County.

Melisa Talbert, 16, and Cheri Vessels, 17, were killed when the Buick they were traveling in with Katie Thurston, 17, who was driving the car and Karla Severs. 16. was struck by the truck being driven by Clyde Conway, 24. of State Road 46, in Mims. Thurston reportedly ran a stop sign at the intersection where the accident took place.

Thurston and Severs were both injured in the accident. Thurston was released late Saturday night after she'd been treated at Jess Parrish Memorial Hospital. Severs sustained a broken shoulder in the crash and was listed in stable condition at Wuesthoff Hospital in Rockledge. Conway was listed in stable condition at Wuesthoff.

The girls were reportedly on their way back to Titusville after they'd attempted to suprise Jeff Kramer, the AHS girl's cross-country team coach, by trick or treating at his home in Mims. Vessels was the only girl on the trip not a member of that team.

The Florida Highway Patrol is still investigating the accident to determine whether charges will be made against any of the drivers involved.

TAMPA (UPI) - Lawyers for two half brothers sentenced to die in the murder of a Tennessee woman were to go to federal court today to argue that their clients were victims of investigators who builted witnesses into giving false testimony.

The two woman, both of whom were present at a rowdy party where Pasco County Sheriff's deputies said the murder allegedly took place, are expected to testify at today's hearing before U.S. District Judge George Carr. The 11th District Court of Appeals in Atlanta decided last year that a judge should hear the arguments.

He stressed that the total 54 teachers the board dealt with were either approved or disapproved were in the vocational or exceptional education field.

Warren said most of the teachers without certification were approved by the board because they were only in their first year of teaching outside their field.

"We (the board) approved those teachers very reluctantly. ideally every teacher should be teaching in their own field." Warren said. She added that the ideal wasn't very realistic though.

Any teacher in the district not qualified to teach in a field must be specifically approved by the school board in order to continue working out-of-field. If any non-certified teacher is placed in a vocational or exceptional class the full time equivalent (the amount of money the state pays for each student in a class) must be reported as a basic class. instead of a special one, according to Ferrell.

'The idea is that it costs more to educate gifted students than those in a regular class." Warren said.

Ferrell told the baord he had a difficult time understanding why someone who taught advanced

science couldn't teach a gifted science class, but that someone with absolutely no background in science could teach the same class just because they werd certified to teach gifted cilidren.

Warren told Ferrell that he just didn't understand the difference between "giftedness and advancedness."

Warren said that in many cases students who are consid cred gifted by the district often have unique needs. "Teachers for gifted students need to be able to motivate these students just because a child has a 130 Q. doesn't necessarily mean they'll perform to their abilities." Warren said.

In some cases the gifted teach er needs to concentrate more of teaching the student rather that the subject, according to War ren. "That's not to say that advanced teachers only teach the subject and not the students there are some very good advanced class teachers out there," she said.

Marshall Ogletree, executive director of the Seminole Education Association (the represcutitives for the school district instructional employees), said that he didn't think the situation was a fair one. The School Board doesn't pay for overtime of school costs for the teachers working on out-ol-lield certificates, according to Ogletree.

Warren said there should be a "little incentive" to encourage Seminole teachers to work on obtaining certificates for out-of lield instruction.

In some cases, according tel Ferrell, district principals just select a teacher from their school to teach an out-of-field course. 'll puts a pretty difficult load on a leacher to say, we want you to go back and take six hours just to teach one class." Ferrell said.



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More Press Meets Needed

At the end of a recent Rose Garden ceremony honoring talented teachers. White House reporters peppered President Reagan with questions about Robert Bork's Supreme Court nomination, then at a critical stage. As he turned toward the Oval Office, the president paused briefly and responded in typical fashion to a question about whether the nomination would fail: "Over my dead body!"

The teachers were shocked by the clamor of correspondents badgering the president at a ceremonial event.

But presidential one-liners in response to reporters' shouted questions are what pass for news conferences these days at the White House.

Such hit-and-run encounters-as Reagan boards his helicopter or is photographed in the Oval Office with a visiting dignitary-are hardly conducive to exploring his views in a substantive way. Yet these chance meetings provide the only regular opportunities for journalists to pose questions to the Chief Executive.

The fact is that the media's access to Ronald Reagan is more severely restricted than was the case under all of his modern predecessors.

Live televised press conferences, once a prime forum for presidents to communicate their views to the American people, have been virtually abandoned by this president.

During all of 1987, Reagan has held only two White House news conferences. Most occupants of the Oval Office since the days of Franklin Roosevelt have averaged at least one or two per month.

Gerald Ford, for example, staged as many news conferences during his 29 months in office as Reagan has during the 81 months of his presidency.

Although Reagan's record of meeting with the press has never been good, it has grown even worse since the Iran-Contra scandal erupted last November.

Since that time, he has met with reporters in the East Room only three times for televised interrogatories.

Reagan, like L, ndon Johnson during the Vietnam War, Richard Nixon during Watergate and Jimmy Carter during the Iranian hostage crisis, has withdrawn from the media and from the nation in the face of his political troubles.

Reagan Might Finish Up With Good Year

WASHINGTON (UPI) - In his seven years in the White House, President Reagan has probably never encountered such a roller coaster of events.

He may have thought the roof was falling only a year ago, in November 1986, when the Iran-Contra aid scandal broke and he went underground as one shoe after another began to hit the floor.

This fall has been equally horrendous in terms of the stock market crash, the defeat of Robert Bork's nomination to the Supreme Court, Nancy Reagan's cancer surgery and escalation of hostilities in the Persian Gulf.

The silver lining is the turnaround by Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev who miscalculated the times and stalled on setting a date for a summit meeting with Reagan, knowing that it would add luster to Reagan's fading presidency.

But now that's back on track and the president can effd the year on a happier note.

Deputy press secretary B.J. Cooper, who was the Commerce Department spokesman for the late Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige, has a prized memento from his boss.

Cooper now wears a magnificent silver buckle on his belt that was a prize given to Baldrige. after he placed fourth in a rodeo. Baldrige died while participating in a rodeo last spring. His widow gave the buckle to Cooper.

Cooper brought with him the framed complaint of most persons who deal in public relations in government. Everyone wants to get into the act and put their squiggly marks on every press release

On his wall are the words: "No passion in the world, neither love, nor hate, is equal to the passion to alter someone cise's draft."

"That's the end of Santa Barbara as we knew

it." quipped White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater when the Government Ethics Office banned federal workers from accepting free lunches, dinners and drinks.

It also will be reflected on reporters' expense accounts. Much business is done in Washington over meals. Inviting a White House top staffer, or government official to lunch has been par for the course over the years when a reporter is seeking information or an exclusive.

During the days when White House chief of staff Donald Regan prevailed, some of his key aides prided themselves on not spending a dime for a meal when accompanying the president to his vacation spot on the West Coast.

Reporters were happy to shell out, believing that it would be fruitful and informative to have dinner with a top aide.

But now apparently when White House staffers go out with a member of the media, they will have to pay their own way.

Diet

BOSTON (UPI) - New diets seem to hit the grocery store check-out line racks and book store shelves faster than the refrigerator empties during an eating binge.

So it's no wonder that overweight people have a hard time sorting through the latest diets in search of the one that will really help them lose those unwanted pounds safely, and keep them off.

To help. Theodore Berland, an associate professor of communications at the Grand Valley State College in Allendale, Mich., has developed questions dieters should ask themselves before embarking on another weight-loss effort.

"There are a lot of desperate people out there who want to go to bed fat and wake up skinny ... But some diets may be dangerous, and may hurt their health." he said.

Berland's questions are: 1. Is the diet based on a secret?

'There are no secrets in dieting." said Berland. Diets should instead be based on sound nutritional and medical evidence, he said.

2. Is the person promoting the diet well known, well respected and knowledgeable?

"A lot of people who write books are doctors, but that doesn't make them an expert on nutrition." he safd.

3. Has the author tried the diet on a lot of people?

Toward Fairer Sentencing

WASHINGTON (NEA) - A revolutionary method of sentencing federal criminals has gone into effect,

Nov. 1 - are a reaction to public clamor for tougher treatment of criminals. They are designed to ensure that defendants convicted of the same crime serve similar amounts of time in jail. The new system eliminates parole.

Formerly, a barsh judge might give out a maximum sentence while a lentent judge might give out a much lighter term for someone convicted of an identical offense. In

The judge then adds or subtracts points depending on other factors associated with a crime or delendant. He ends up with a value that greatly narrows the sentence he may choose

The biggest change in the new system is that it completely climinates parole. From now on, the amount of time given is the amount of time that will be served. The only exception is 52 days a year in sentence reduction for good behavior:

Say a judge is faced with a convicted defendant with one prior conviction for a felony. He has robbed a bank of \$40,000, using a gun, and terrorized the employees.

WASHINGTON WORLD **GOP Has** Edge, But Hold Bets

WASHINGTON (UPI) - There are only 53 weeks until the 1988 presidential election and here is a first guess on the outcome: the Republican candidate will win.

This early line is based on the political situation as it exists today. and it obviously could change before the election. But absent some dramatic change, the GOP has to be the favorite.

A bad recession could be one of those changes. If the stock market swan dive is the signal of an extended, serious decline in the economy at large, the presidential odds switch to the Democrats. That is the worst thing that could happen to the Republican Party, which still is haunted by the ghost of Herbert Hoover.

There are two good reasons to make the Republicans the early favorites.

First, they have the best record.

GOP candidates have won six of the nine presidential elections since 1952: foar of the six elections since 1968

Some analysts have looked at these results and discounted the explanation that the Republicans have a .667 batting average in the last two decades simply because they picked more atractive or better qualified candidates.

They see the GOP record as a function of the great shift of population (and electoral votes) away from states in the Northeast and the industrial Midwest with cords of support for Democratic presidential candidates toward states in the South and West that have been good to Republican candidates. Others emphasize ideology. The usual formulation is that majority support for liberalism waned after World War II and ended in 1980. They say conservatism now dominates and that the Republicans own that label in national elections.

If this bunker mentality at the White House continues, the press will not be the only loser. That's because news conferences provide an important vehicle for the president to grasp the mood of the country and to examine issues in detail in order to prepare for questions.

At the same time, a prime-time session gives the president a perfect forum for informing the public and generating support for his policies at the grass roots.

Perhaps more important, however, live encounters give Americans a chance to understand not only their president's views, but also his personal traits to see how well he thinks on his feet, to take his measure in the broad personal way that television allows.

Reagan should resist the temptation to become isolated from the unpleasant realities of the moment.

Holding press conferences on a regular basis would offer the surest opportunity for breaking out of the White House cocoon.

The only way to know for sure if a diet works is through careful controlled, scientific studies, said Berland.

4. Have the results of the diet been published in a scientific journal or presented at a conference for peer review?

That's the best way to know whether the experts agree that the diet can work, he said.

5. Is the planner a recognized authority in the field? "Someone who knows what they are talking about." he said.

This should raise an eyebrow, said Berland. "It's OK if you challenge, but you have to have data to back it up," he said.

6. Is the claim based on the principles of someone else?

If so, find out whether that person agrees with the diet.

7. Is the diet nutritionally balanced?

That's very important, he said. because many diets are not and therefore can be bad for your health. addition, statistics show that white-collar criminals are more likely to be granted short sentences. or probation than blue-collar criminals convicted of the same crime.

The new guidelines also seek to address complaints about the parole system. Previously, when a prisoner had served a third of his sentence. the Parole Board would decide when to release him. This resulted in criminals serving widely different terms for the same crime.

The parole system also resulted in judges "over-sentencing." If a judge thought a defendant should serve five years, but knew the Parole Board would be handed the case after a third of the sentence, the judge might hand down a term of 12 years. Then, when the defendant came up for parole, if he did not impress the Board, he might end up serving six or eight years - significantly more than the judge intended.

Under the new system, all federal crimes are given a base point value.

The judge goes to the crime listing and finds "robbery." He then adds points for "specific offense charaeteristics" - use of the gun, stealing more than a certain amount, terrorizing the "vulnerable" bank employees during the robbery. He then adds additional points for "offender characteristics" - the prior conviction. He ends up with a certain "offense level." The judge looks this up on a chart and is told. he must sentence the defendant to between 51 and 63 months.

Had the judge found miligating factors, such as first offense, no gun, repentant defendant who pleaded guilty and made restitution, etc., he would have subtracted points.

The guidelines carry a provision that allows a judge to deviate, either higher or lower, if he feels extraordinary circumstances are present. But he must state explicitly what those circumstances are, and why he is deviating. All sentences are subject to review on motions by either prosecution or defense, and sentences may be modified by higher courts.

The second reason to favor the Republicans is that they have better-known candidates.

George Bush has been on two national election tickets, both big winners. Robert Dole has been on one national ticket (1976) that lost narrowly and has kept himself in at least the periphery of the national spotlight as the leader of the Senate Republicans.

Each of the other declared GOP candidates has some element of national recognition. Alexander Haig's service in the Nixon White House and the Reagan State Department. Pete du Pont's trademark family name, Jack Kemp's football and political credentials.

Jackson Tiptoes 'Tween Arabs, Jews

WASHINGTON - The prevailing wisdom among Democratic Party insiders is that Rev. Jesse Jackson can't win the presidential nomination, but will arrive at the Atlanta convention next summer with enough delegates to be a kingmaker - or at least to extract concessions from the eventual nominee. Several party leaders have told us they believe Jackson hopes to be secretary of state.

Those close to Jackson, of course, insist he's dead serious about his candidacy, and believes the arithmetic of the primaries can make him the nominee. According to them. Jackson is counting on the enthusiasm of his supporters -- and the fact that only about 14 percent of eligible voters turn out for the primaries.

One of Jackson's major problems involves Jewish support, without which any Democrat would be hard pressed to get the nomination. But

Jackson does not want to alienate his long-standing allies within the Arab American community. In a recent interview with the liberal Jewish magazine Tikkun, Jackson made one of his first tectoring steps across a tightrope he has stretched between these two political factions. Reaction was mixed among the Jewish leaders. They are still wary of Jackson's reluctance in 1984 to shed the support of Black Muslim Louis Farrakhan, who has denounced Judaism as a "gutter religion."

But his overtures to the Jewish community do not seem to be hurting him among his Arab American friends. In March, he was the keynote speaker at a conference of Arab Americans.

More recently, Jackson and some 20 Arab-American leaders met in Washington's elegant Radisson Park Terrace Hotel for a closed-door birthday banquet in honor of the black Baptist candidate. After the roast tenderloin, a lancy cake was brought in with the frosted inscription, "Happy Birthday, Mr. President."

Among the dignitaries present for the birthday bash was Jean Abi Nader, president of the National Association of Arab Americans. The event was organized by James Zogby, president of the Arab American Institute. It was a "small, private meeting." Zogby told our associate Stewart Harris. "It was a chance for people to hear Jackson five feet away." he explained.

Jackson didn't return our calls for comment. Zogby said the party conversation was "general," dealing with education, support for small business and similar topics. He said Jackson also repeated his Middle East policy: Palestinians and Jews must be more sensitive to the needs. of each other. Palestinians have a right to self-determination, while Israel has a right to secure borders, Jackson told the group, according to Zogby.

Jackson has always bucked the

political odds. He sees his role as that of a battering ram breaking down barriers. His friends say he draws his inspiration from the Bible. which he interprets as a chronicle of the underprivileged battling against the odds for their birthright, their homeland and their self. determination.

But Jackson is also a canny politician and an opportunist who realizes that he must somehow curb his inflammatory populist rhetoric and come to terms with the privileged classes if he has a prayer of becoming president. With that in mind, he has been restructuring his campaign speeches to be perceived as for America, rather than against 11.

At the same time, Jackson must keep his enthusiastic followers fired up, so he can't tone down his rhetoric too much until the primaries have been won. The best he can do is soften it to the point where he doesn't actively offend Jewish voters and other mainstream Democrats.

NATION **IN BRIEF**

Reagan's Court Nominee Denies Conflict of Interest Charges

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Justice Department denies any conflict of interest in the actions of Supreme Court nominee Douglas Ginsburg when, as an assistant atlorney general with about \$140,000 invested in a cable television company, he argued before the high court a case involving expansion of that industry.

Chief department spokesman Terry Eastland, authorized to speak for President Reagan's latest nomince to the nation's highest bench, said Sunday the case in question bore "no impact" on Ginsburg's personal financial holdings.

Meanwhile, Ginsburg found himself in a separate controversy following weekend revelations that his second wife, Dr. Hallee Morgan, performed abortions as part of her obstetrics training seven years ago. Opposition to abortion is one of the key tenets of Ginsburg's vocal conservative supporters in the Senate.

Boby M Surrogate Is Pregnant

EAST BRUNSWICK, N.J. (UPI) - The pregnancy of Mary Beth Whitehead by a man other than her husband is evidence that she should not regain custody of the baby she bure for a childless couple, the infant's guardian says.

Court papers filed last week stated that Whitehead, who signed a \$10,000 surrogacy agreement and gave birth to a daughter known in court as Baby M. is pregnant by someone other than her estranged husband. Richard,

Custody of Baby M was awarded to the infant's biological father and his wile in a bitter and widely publicized court battle. Whitehead appealed the ruling to the New Jersey Supreme Court, and a decision is expected by the end of the year.

Whitehead's pregnancy further justifies denying her access to the child, said Lorraine Abraham, the lawyer appointed to represent Baby M.

Month is Critical For Reagan

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Even as President Reagan's time has been drawn upon by personal crises, top advisers have kept the administration engaged in urgent priorities that now command his full attention in the month of November.

The president, returning to the White House from a weekend memorial service for his mother-in-law, found htmself today faced with developments in perhaps the three biggest issues, the summit, the stock market and the Supreme Court.

During the weekend, as Reagan and his wife, Nancy, were in Phoenix mourning the death of her mother. Edith Davis, leading senators warned again of threats to the treaty he hopes to sign at a summit next month, leading market experts called again for him to act on the federal hudget deficit and controversy yet again surrounded his attempt to fill the vacancy on the nation's high court.

Locomotives Plunge Off Canyon

LIVINGSTON, Mont. (UPI) - Three driverless locomotives rumbled along 13 miles of mountain tracks at itp to 100 mph before plunging into a canyon, injuring a hobo and causing \$3 million damage in what railroad officials called a deliberate act of sabotage.

The incident happened just hours after about 150 United Transportation Union workers staged a wildcat strike to protest the sale of Burlington Northern tracks to Montana-Rail Link, a move they said was done to break the union.

The Friday night strike ended when the railroad obtained

Chinese Reformer Elected New Chief

BEIJING (UPI) - Premier Zhao Ziyang, a close ally of senior leader Deng Xlaoping and architect of China's sweeping economic reforms, was formally elected chief of China's Communist Party today.

The party's Central Committee elected Zhao. Hu Qill and Vice Premiers Li Peng. Yao Yilin and Qiao Shi to the Standing Committee of the ruling Politburo.

In a surprise move, disgraced former party chief Hu Yaobang was reelected to the Politburo, along with 11 other men, most of whom are strong supporters of Deng's liberal economic and political changes of the last nine years.

The others are Vice Premiers Wan Li and Tian Jiyun, Shanghai Mayor Jiang Zemin. chief economic planner Li Tieying, Tianjin Mayor Li Ruihuan, Li Ximing, Yang Rudai, military veteran Yang Shangkun, Foreign Minister Wu Xueqian. Song Ping and Gen. Qin Jiwei.

The appointments were announced after the first plenary session today of the party's new 13th Central Committee, which was

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elected Sunday by a five-yearly party congress.

Deng, who retired Sunday from the Politburo Standing Committee, was elected to head the Central Military Commission. thus giving him effective control of China's 3 million-member armed forces.

Zhao was also elected vice chairman of the military commission - an appointment which analysts described as extremely important since it virtually guarantees support for the new party chief from powerful hard-line military leaders and ensures his position as heir-designate to Deng.

Western diplomats expressed astonishment at the new lineup of the Politburo. pointing out that all seven newly-elected full members are strong supporters of Zhao and his reform policies.

"They have picked out the most prominent reformists from several provinces and the most forward-looking government officials." said one Western diplomat. "There Isn't a conservative in sight."

But diplomats cautioned that Vice Premiers Li Peng. 59, and Yao Yilin. 70 - both known to have reservations about some aspects of China's market-oriented reforms may represent more conservative attitudes on the otherwise reformist standing committee.

The Central Committee also elected a new and smaller secretariat, down from 11 members to just five, in a move analysts said was intended to increase Zhao's control over the body responsible for day-to-day running of the party.

The new secretariat members are Hu Qili. Qiao Shi, Shanghai party secretary Rui Xingwen and Yan Mingfu, as well as one alternate member. Wen Jiabao.

Qiao Shi was also appointed to head the powerful Central Discipline Inspection Commission, which oversees moral and political conduct of party members.

Alling veteran conservative Chen Yun. 82. who retired with Deng from the Politburo Standing Committee, was elected to head the Central Advisory Commission.

Koch Meets With Contra Leaders

MIAMI (UPI) - New York delivering typewriters to the Mayor Edward Koch met with Nicaraguan opposition newspaleaders of Nicaragua's Contras and told them they should stop their rebellion against the government of Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega.

Koch and eight other New Yorkers arrived in Miaini Sunday on the first leg of a fourcountry Central American tour to monitor a regional peace plan.

They (the Contras) should lay down their arms." Koch said before having dinner with Contra leaders. "That's what's required."

Koch said he believed the Contras should trust Ortega and other officials in the Sandinistagovernment in Nicaragua, but acknowledged it would be difficult.

"There's a certain amount of courage that's required here," he said. "I don't believe that Ortega is going to violate the protocols with respect to these people. The question is whether he violate the protocols by not freeing those already in jail."

Koch and the New York delegation was scheduled to leave Miami today and head for Honduras. He also plans to visit El-Salvador, Nicaragua and Costa Rica.

The four nations, along with Guatemala, signed a regional peace plan in August that takes effect Thursday, when Koch is scheduled to be in Nicaragua.

The plan was formulated by Costa Rican President Oscar Arias Sanchez, who was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize last month.

Koch said he plans to ask Ortega that the cases of thousands of prisoners not included in a general amnesty for political prisoners be presented to the foreign ministers of the five peace plan nations.

The New York delegation was

Soviet Troubleshoot Finishes Talks With Iranian Officials

KUWAIT (UPI) - Moscow's Middle East troubleshooter has concluded talks in Tehran with Iranian officials and criticized the U.S. military presence in the Persian Gulf in what is seen as a Soviet bid to gain leverage in the region.

Before returning to Moscow Sunday, First Deputy Foreign Minister Yuli Voronstov delivered a message from Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev supporting "the idea of a Persian Gulf free from foreign forces," the official Islamic Republic News Agency IRNA said.

Voronstov, on the final leg of a Middle East trip that also took him to Iraq and Kuwalt, handed the letter to Iranian Foreign Minister Ali Akbar Velayti. Voronstov arrived in Tehran Saturday.

The Soviet envoy's mission was seen by analysts as a bid by Moscow to gain leverage in the Persian Gulf following Washington's decision to provide U.S. naval protection to 11 re-flagged Kuwaiti oil tankers.

Central American Plan In Doubt

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (UPI) - With the Central American peace plan set to take effect Thursday. unresolved differences over its implementation have led to doubt it can do what it set out to: end guerrilla wars in El Salvador, Nicaragua and Guatemala and bring Western style democracy to the region.

"I really hope the peace plan can work," a South American diplomat in Costa Rica said over the weekend. "but no one can yet show me how."

It has become increasingly clear that the plan - which calls on signatories to achieve a cease-fire, grant amnesty to anti-government rebels, stop using their territories to attack other countries and adopt sweeping democratic reforms - will not be fully implemented by the original Nov. 5 deadline.

Former Quebec Premier Dies

MONTREAL (UPI) - Former Quebec Premier Rene Levesque, who struggled unsuccessfully for most of his political life to achieve independence for the Frenchspeaking province, has died of a heart attack. He was 65.

Levesque was entertaining guests at his Montreal-area apartment when he was stricken Sunday. An ambulance crew found Levesque unconscious and tried unsuccessfully to revive him. He died an hour later at Montreal General Hospital at 10:30 p.m. EST, hospital officials said. An autopsy was scheduled today.

When he retired from politics in 1985, the chain-smoking premier was no closer to his goal of Quebec's political independence than when his Parti Quebecois swept to power on Nov. 15, 1976.

The most prominent name mentioned by Gorbachev was Nikolal Bukharin, who split with Stalin over the dictator's plan for forced collectivization of farmers and his emphasis on heavy industry. Vindication of Bukharin's more gradual approach would open the way to reforms of the notoriously ineffictent collective farm system inherited from Stalin.

However, Gorbachev's book "Perestroika (restructuring) and New Thinking," released on the eve of the speech, contained a defense of the collectivization process. Although at least 5 million people died in collectivization. Gorbachev said it had ensured food supplies during World War II.

Agriculture had frequently been identified as an area where reform might show quick returns, as it did when China began abandoning communist orthodoxy in the late 1970s. Industrial reform is assumed to be more resistant to change.

Members of the leadership have warned that the country is approaching the make-or-break phase of Gorbachev's program to revitalize the nation's stagnating industry.

A major shift in decisionmaking away from the Moscow central planning administrators to individual managers in hopes of spurring productivity is set for Jan. 1.

But Western experts are predicting chaos as ill-prepared Sovict managers are suddenly called upon to follow both the central plans decreed by the Kremlin and to operate independently along Western profit-based methods.

Concern about the economic future coincides with deep political uncertainty created by the request by Moscow Communist Party chief Boris Yeltsin to resign because of the slow pace of the reforms.

Yeltsin's resignation, not yet accepted, was confirmed by the party on Saturday.



Candidates Discuss Issues Facing The City

By Brad Church Herald Staff Writer

All the Winter Springs candidates were posed several questions concerning Winter Springs policies and problems. Their answers follow:



-Leanne Grove Mayoral Candidate

How do you feel about the proposed city ordinance 390 which would amend the city charter to provide that the city commission "shall designate an accountant no later than six months, rather than 30 days, after the beginning of a fiscal year: providing for referendum election by the city electors to approve or reject the amendment to the city charter

Torcaso: I think it would help the staff in preparing for the city audit. Also, they would be able to amend it before the reporting period if this amendment were passed.

Grove: I don't think there is any problem with the ordinance the way it is and see no need to change it.

Jacobs: I proposed this change so as not to change accountants in the middle of an audit.

Hopkins: No answer.

Cerra: The change is necessary because at present the auditing firm preparing the current audit becomes a "lame duck" if a change is desired by the city.

Holfman: This ordinance is needed so the commission has an opportunity to evaluate the auditor before deciding to renew the contract or select a new one. Presently, the decision is made while the audit is in progress.

What is your opinion of pro-

ble that sometime in the future the streets in that area will have to be paved in order for police and fire personnel to have access to respond to emergencies there in a short time. Right now I accept the wishes of the people who live there, but think sometime in the future paving will have to be done.

Grove: For a long time I was not in favor of paving roads in The Ranchlands to preserve its uniqueness. All the development there was on large two- and three-acre lots. However now. there has been higher density development in that area and I think the city should seriously look into paving the streets there.

Jacobs: To provide residents all the information as to costs, assessments, repayments plans, etc. Have to weigh the costs against the improvements. To hold public meetings to get input as to what residents want and what is needed.

Hopkins: This is a very delicate issue and needs to be studied further.

Cerra: The Ranchlands area of the city has a unique character that the majority of its residents wants preserved. If and when a clear cut majority requests paving., then a cost estimate should be determined and an equitable assessment should be made. A workshop meeting has been set by the commission to study this.

Hoffman: The Ranchlands has not had paving by choice to keep the ''seeluded'' neighborhood. If the residents are asked to vote for paving the should first know the full costs. If a majority of ALL ask for it and the drainage can be ac-

Torcase: I think all residents should be treated the same and not accused of anything in-





Jacoba: The only stumbling block would be a commission that would not be prepared to keep our services even or ahead of growth.



Torcaso: Each commissioner is elected by thousands of people and I see no reason why three shouldn't be able to remove the county manager when it takes just three commissioners to vote any law into effect in the city.

Grove: For the most part, I'm in favor of majority rule, and 1 think the motive for this change is not in the best interests of the community.

Jacobs: Having an extraordinary vote to remove the city manager, as it is now, has worked very well in our city. There should be a wide separation between the city commission and city manager and four votes for removal provides that margin.

Hopkins: Majority rules on other boards, and should apply to this matter too.

Cerra: The thinking behind this proposition is that the city manager is hired by a majority of three votes and termination should be possible by the same majority. However, the city manager is most important to the city and both his hiring and removal must be carefully considered.

Hoffman: The charter requires only a majority vote to select a manager, thus a majority of all should be able to re-select one. A capable manager has nothing to fear from a responsible commission.

In the end, it was Lake Mary that caught the biggest wave and rode it to victory, nudging the defending champions by seven points, 335-328.





Giants, Cowboys: Avoid Oblivion


IRVING. Texas (UPI) - The New York Giants are trying to return from oblivion and the Dallas Cowboys are seemingly headed there.

ORLANDO - The University of Central Florida's defense has not gotten much credit this season. It has been the UCF offense that has received most of the recognition.

But in Saturday night's game against Grand Valley State (Mich.), the "Knightmare" defense gave GVS more than just a Halloween scare.

The 11th ranked (Div. II) Knights used an awesome defense performance and an equally impressive offensive outing en route to a 67-3 annihalation over the Lakers before 7.552 drenched fans at the Florida Citrus Bowl.

The 67 points set a new school scoring record. UCF scored 66 points against Samford last year. UCF has scored an incredible 200 points in its last four games.

'We have had some pretty good performances this season," UCF coach Gene McDowell said. "But this was undoubtedly one of the best ones."

If there was any doubt that the Knights were not one of the best teams in the country, that doubt was blotted out on Saturday night.

UCF held GVS, which came into the game with tenth best offense in Div. II, to 184 total yards.

The Knight defense accounted for nine UCF points, and registered four sacks for 27 yards. The UCF defense caused nine turnovers, setting up several touchdowns.

The victory, the Knight's fourth in succession. boosts UCF's records to 6-2. It also improves its chance of moving up in the poll. UCF will end its five-game homestand next week when it hosts Liberty (Virginia) University.

"I think that we will probably crack the top 10 In the poll," McDowell said. "I know of at least one team ranked ahead of us that lost, but with the point spread in this game, we should climb a few more notches." Earlier in the season. top-ranked North Dakota only beat GVS by 21 points. UCF leads the nation in points per game (37), and yards per game. (418).

The setback dropped the Lakers to 5-4. "I think that we caught them with their britches down." McDowell added. "They are a good football team. but they just didn't play very well against us."

The win was costly for UCF as two key

offensive performers went down with injuries.

Wide receiver Bernard Ford, the leading receiver in Div. II. injured his right ankle in the second quarter, and will miss next week's game. Ford caught four passes for 83 yards and a touchdown in the first half. His touchdown grab was his 12th of the season.

Fullback Parry Balasis, a 210-pound freshman who is used primarily for blocking, suffered a broken left ankle in the game. He underwest surgery on Sunday, and will miss the rest of the SCH5011.

Tailback Mark Giacone, a powerful freshman making his first start, had an outstanding game as he rushed for 73 yards on 20 carriers and three touchdowns. The three rushing scores tied a school record.

'Mark goes berzerk when he gets the ball." McDowell said. "On one of his touchdowns, he ran over four guys."

UCF quarterback Darin Slack, the leading passer in Div. II. had a sound game as the senior went 16 for 31 for 273 yards and two touchdowns. Slack has thrown for 2.300 yards and 22 touchdowns this season.

Much of Slack's success can be attributed to the

fine play of the offensive line. The UCF O-line has only given up two sacks in the last three weeks. "At the start of the season, I was more concerned with our offensive line than any other part of the team." McDowell said. "I had no idea that these guys would improve so quickly.

The UCF defense held GVS quarterback Guy Schuler in check. Schuler, the seventh leading passer in Div. II. went seven for 22 for 99 yards and five interceptions. The five thefts set a new school interception record.

'Our defense did one heck of a job." McDowell said. "They played the most aggressive game of the season.

Ford's injury gave Sean Beckton, a 1987 Scabreeze graduate, an opportunity to play. Beckton made the most of his chance as he caught six passes for 104 yards and a touchdown. "For a young guy. Sean has done a superb job." McDowell said of the freshman. "He made a few great catches."

Welch, 42, **Oldest NYC** Champion

NEW YORK (UPI) - Priscilla Welch offered a lesson in biology as well as marathoning Sunday. At 42. the Englishwoman

became the oldest runner man or woman - to win the New York City Marathon.

"That's just a social disease that people say you can't do anything at such and such an age," said Welch, who turns 43 later this month. "Forty is not old. I think 80 is old."

Welch, who lives in Boulder, Colo., led from the start and won the women's division in 2 hours. 30 minutes, 17 seconds. The field of more than 22,000 was the largest for any marathon.

Ibrahim Hussein, a Kenyan native who attended the University of New Mexico on a track scholarship, won the men's division in 2:11:01. The victory ended Italy's recent dominance of the world's largest marathon.

Welch, the third fastest woman marathoner in the world this year and eighth fastest of all time, is aiming for a berth on Britain's 1988 Olympic team.

Since running 3:26 in her first marathon in 1980, Welch has improved her personal best by one hour. She ran 2:26:51 in May while finishing second to world record holder ingrid Kristiansen in the London Marathon. Welch, however, realizes her





Riley Guarantees Lakers Will Repeat As Champions

NEW YORK (UPI) - Fresh from knocking off the Boston Celtics in the NBA finals last June, Lakers Coach Pat Riley wasted little time in taking a swipe at history.

He guaranteed Los Angeles would repeat as NBA champion. Riley put aside coaching eti-

quette - the curiolus condition that prevents bold predictions and claimed in the victorious locker room that his team will be the first in 18 years to win back-to-back titles. The last to do so were the 1968 and 1969 **Hoston Celtics.**

Much stands in the way of Riley's prediction. The Celtics return their formidable starting five while Detroit and Atlanta are certain to contend.

There will other subplots as the league enters its 4 1st season. which begins Nov. 6 with 11 games, including the Lakers at home against Scattle.

The league features six new coaches, including the return of Bill Russell, the player-coach of the 1968-69 Celtics.

In addition, the players and owners likely will enter the season without a new collective bargaining agreement, making a strike yet another sports strike a possibility. The two sides are still meeting, but have failed to agree on the salary cap, the college draft and the right of first refusal.

'The fun part about basketball," said Golden State Coach George Karl, "is that an injury here and a contract squabble there and things can blow up in your face."

Riley has led the the Lakers to four league titles in the 1980s. and withstood the injuries and hubris that can unhinge a champion. He decided to challenge the Lakers from the instant he knew they would be defending the title.

"The question is posed to you from the minute you win: 'Canyou repeat?" he said. "Peoplewill tell you it can't be done. there is no way the Lakers can play another 100-game season

and go unscathed by injury. there is no way they have desire to win it agein. They list this criteria and the players begin to believe that they can't do it.

"I am not a boaster, I am not an arrogant person, but I truly believe this is the only thing left for them to accomplish. This time I don't want pressure to come from the outside, it needs to be internalized. In reality, it should have started September of 1986 (when Los Angeles opened camp as runner-up in the Western Conference), we are looking at a two-year window.

"I want that this team to understand that it is shooting for something that could separate it from the best. This could be a special team in a special scason."

The Lakers return the key players from a team that went a league-best 65-17 during the season and 15-3 in the playoffs. Magie Johnson, who took on more scoring responsibilities at the request of Riley, is coming of his best season. He again led the league in assists (12.2 a game). He was also named league MVP for the first time and MVP of the NBA finals for an unprecedented third time.

However, the 28-year-old guard missed most of the exhibition season because of tendinitis in his knees. He he is expected inthe lineup opening night. Los Angeles returns Kareem Abdul-Jabbar for his 19th season at center along with forwards James Worthy and A.C. Green. Byron Scott, at times a liability at shooting guard in the playoffs. was re-signed.

In addition, there is Mychal Thompson, the key acquisition last year at forward center: Defensive Player of the Year Michael Cooper: and Forum favorite Kurt Rambis.

"Right now I predict them to win the NBA championship," said NBA Coach of the Year Mike

Schuler of Portland. "We are playing for second."

Added Karl: "Right now they are at least 10 percent befter than any team in basketball. The question is are they a year older or are they a year better?"

Second in the Pacific Division is a tossup. Golden State, Portland and Seattle all improved last season. The Super-Sonics, behind Dale Ellis, Xavier McDaniel and Tom Chambers, were a surprise opponent against the Lakers in the Western Conference final.

Portland finished second in the division, but lost Sam Bowie to another broken leg and are in derneath.

Industrial Orders Up

WASHINGTON (UPI) - U.S. manufacturers booked 1.1 percent more orders in September than in August, recouping nearly all of a sharp decline between July and August, the government reported Monday.

Total orders for the month on a seasonally adjusted annual basis reached \$205.7 billion during the month, compared with \$203.3 billion in August. It was the largest increase

since a 2 percent like in June. Orders had fallen from \$206.1 hillton in July to \$203.3 billion in August.

Excluding defense orders. which are volatile and often distort the wonthly numbers. total orders during September were up 1.3 percent, following a decline of 1.2 percent from July to August.

In the category of durable goods — so-called big ticket items designed to last at least three years - September's total

orders were up 1.8 percent with the biggest jump in primary metals and machinery.







Heart Failure Causes **Are Many And Varied**

DEAR DR. GOTT - My mother died recently of con-gestive heart failure. What is this? is it inherited? Could her years of smoking have contributed to her untimely death at age 59?

DEAR READER - When the heart beats ineffectively, excess fluid is trapped in the body and builds up in tissues. This causes lung congestion, liver enlargement, ankle and leg edema (swelling) and general fluid overload. Most people who die from congestive heart failure suffocate because lung fluid replaces air and they cannot breathe.

Congestive heart failure is not hereditary. However, certain forms of heart disease - such as coronary artery disease - appeal to be hereditary. These forms of heart disease can lead to heart failure. Cigarette amoking is associated with heart disease; it contributes to heart failure. Therefore your mother's smoking certainly could have contributed to her early death.

in many cases, congestive heart failure is treatable and controllable with certain medicines or, in some instances, with surgery. However, such patients must stop smoking, lose weight, reduce sait intake and take treatment for associated discases, such as hypertension and excess blood cholesterol.

DEAR DR. GOTT - I was wounded in Vietnam and had shell fragments in the abdomen. I had a repair of the small intestine and sigmoid colon. My weight climbed 50 pounds. Is the weight gain related to my injury?

DEAR READER - Your war injury is an unlikely cause of your weight gain. Intestinal wounds more commonly produce weight loss. You have gained weight because you are consuming more calories than you are burning for energy. Cut down on your calorie intake if

you want to lose weight. If you cannot control your weight by prudent dieting, check with your doctor for an examination and more specific advice.


