DETROIT (UPI) - March was the biggest sales month in history for all three major auto makers, the companies

Ford and Chrysler both said March rounded out record first quarters in sales of passenger cars. General Motors passenger sales were down slightly but its total vehicle sales were up to an all-time record. Chrysler reported March ed 136,875, up 14 per cent over last year while quarter sales

totaled 367,090 units, up 12 per cent over last year. Passenger car sales for General Motors, while a new record sales month, up to 443,-064 units, or 300 ahead of a year ago, were down about 55,-600 compared with the first quarter of last year.

Ford also celebrated the greatest sales month in its history, up 10 per cent from a year ago. Total Ford passenger car sales totaled 240,830. March marked the sixth consecutive month the company has set a new sales record.
