**HAMPTON BAYS, N. Y. (UPI)**—The boat got a late start from its dock. Once outside the inlet the Atlantic was calm and shrouded in fog. At the boat rode the silvery water, the five men waited and watched until the calm under the sea was broken with a jolt. It was a big fish and it ran. On the other end of the line Harry Neumann, a muscular young man, braced to fight the big fish. It was 1:30 p.m. on Sun-

day when the fish went for the whole squid on the hook. For hours the fisherman from Wyandanch, N. Y., and the big fish gave and took line. Three, maybe four times, the fish charged the 36-foot boat. 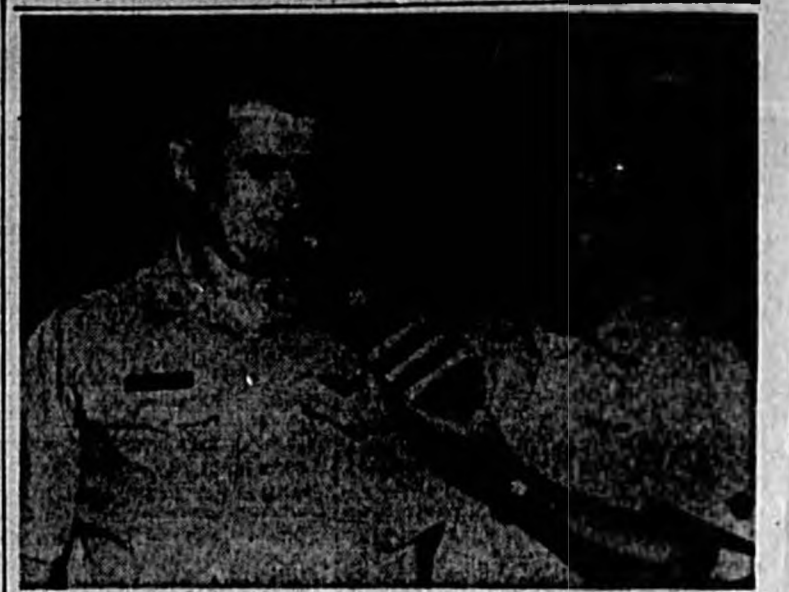
## U.S. Nazi Storm Trooper In For Trouble

# Last Minute Weather Hitch Stops Grissom Again

## Delayed Until Tuesday?

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — Bad weather at the last moment today forced a second postponement of America's attempt to hurl a second astronaut into space.

The "scrub" meant that astronaut Virgil I. (Gus) Grissom's space hop could not come before Friday and might be delayed until Tuesday. Forecasters said Friday's weather prospects were poor.

A Caribbean weather front had prevented the launching originally scheduled for Tuesday morning. Space officials re-set the shot for today.

When the countdown started at about midnight, the skies were generally clear and starry. Grissom entered his capsule, atop a tumbling Redstone rocket at 5:38 a.m. EST and was sealed in at 6:32.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced the "scrub" decision at 9 a.m. No new launch date was announced immediately but the odds appeared to be that it will be rescheduled for Tuesday.

The early morning weather was fine. But by 7:30 a.m. clouds which had been drifting in from the sea had blanketed the cape with a 15,000-foot cover. Minimum requirements are for a ceiling of at least 35,000 feet.

At 7:30 a.m., with the countdown only 10 1/2 minutes from shot time, officials ordered it held up. A postponement after the rocket had been fueled and filled with liquid oxygen automatically puts off a new attempt for 48 hours while the oxygen is drained out and the missile dried.

But bad weather could lengthen the postponement. As today's scrub announcement was made heavy banks of clouds lined the area north and west of the cape. Indications were that storms probably would move over the area later today. This left scientists with no hope that they could get the rocket off by 2 p.m., the cut-off time for today's shot.

When the postponement decision was made, Grissom had been in his space craft for three hours and 23 minutes. He was freed shortly after the scrub announcement.

Navy Cdr. Alan B. Shepard Jr. was in his capsule four hours and 14 minutes before his historic rocket hop of May 5.

Grissom was to have taken the same space trail blazed by Shepard. The plans call for him to soar 115 miles into space and 300 miles out to sea.

## Jarrard May Be On The Way Out

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant, utilizing baseball lingo to drive home his point, squelched speculation Tuesday that Wendell Jarrard might be on his way out as chairman-director of the State Development Commission.

"Mr. Jarrard is the pitcher on that particular governmental team," said Bryant, "and I would be a poor manager if I even thought of pulling him when he's still throwing high and hard."

Rumors that Jarrard might be sent to the showers followed a Monday meeting in which commission members overrode Jarrard on a vote to hire a Miami accounting firm to run a top-to-bottom study of commission finances.

Bryant indicated, however, no animosity with any of the commission lineup.

"If all of the commission members agreed all of the time," he said, "I would be inclined to think they were sick."

"Rubber stamps are easy to come by," said Bryant, "meat of action are not."

The terms of Jarrard and two commission members expired July 8 and the terms of two others run out this week.

But, said Bryant, "I will be in the great rush to act on these appointments up for renewal because I know a good job is being done."

## Post Office Bid Opening Aug. 28

Bids on the new Sanford Post Office will be opened Aug. 28 in Jacksonville, Congressman Syd Herlong told the Chamber of Commerce today by letter.

Herlong stressed in his letter that the facility, to be located between Sanford and Palmetto Aves, west of the Civic Center, will be a "privately owned facility and pay city and county taxes."

It also will be three times the size of the present post office.

The terms of the contract will be for 20 years; one option of 10 years and four options of five years.

## New Terror Wave Sweeps Congo

ELISABETHVILLE, The Congo (UPI)—United Nations sources reported today that hundreds of tribesmen were fleeing to escape a new wave of murder and torture that has erupted in the Congo's Kasai Province.

UN experts said that forces of South Kasai "king" Albert Kalonji were on the rampage against Kanjoka tribesmen, burning villages and killing rival tribal members.

One unconfirmed report reaching here said "thousands of women and children" had been shot and burned in the course of violence in the Kanjoka tribal area, but there was no official confirmation.

In Leopoldville, a UN spokesman said three Katanga guerrillas were killed and two wounded in the clash between Indian UN troops and Katanga soldiers at Niemba in Katanga Monday.

The Katanga government said that two of its guerrillas were killed and several more wounded, two of them gravely, in the clash.

The UN spokesman said there were no UN casualties.

Gendarmerie officers involved in the clash have been placed under arrest, the UN spokesman said. Indian troops were reported to have used mortars during the engagement.

## Bryant Suspends Hernandez JP

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Hernandez County Justice of the Peace Elbert H. Royal, convicted of public drunkenness earlier this month, was suspended Tuesday by Gov. Farris Bryant.

A bartender accused Royal of waving three pistols around in his place and making improper advances to a waitress. When a deputy sheriff came to the scene, Royal fled in the deputy's car.

Royal, said Bryant, brought his office into disrepute and was incompetent to continue in it.

## Commission Hears Picture Aide to Board

The County Commission, in a special "informal" conference with Alachua officials today heard a "rosy" picture on hiring an administrative aide for the board but a poll by the Herald after the two hour conference revealed that the commission was split on establishing that job.

However, the board asked Alachua Administrative Assistant Howard Weston to supply it with an attorney general's ruling which gives them the okay for hiring an assistant.

The Herald poll revealed that District 5 Commissioner John Fitzpatrick favored the hiring of an assistant; Ted Williams "No, unless we can eliminate some department head jobs to supplement his salary;" Vernon Dunn—"No decision as yet but have expressed myself as favoring a deputy clerk;" James P. Avery—"Have not made up my mind yet;" J.C. Hutchison—"I have expressed myself in public of favoring an assistant."

Sidney Martin, Alachua commissioner who along with Weston explained the duties of the job, said that it would save the county a great deal of money "and you'll have your finger on the pulse of each community at all times."

The Alachua Administrative assistant supervises zoning and purchasing and is solely responsible to the commission.

"There is no overlapping of duties," Weston said. He also is in charge of periodic equipment inventory checks.

# Kennedy To Tell U.S. Crisis 'Facts'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy announced today he will make a speech to the American people next Tuesday night on what steps must be taken to build U. S. defenses during the Berlin crisis and in days ahead.

The President said he also would ask Congress next Wednesday for whatever measures the administration decides must be taken to guard against mounting Soviet threats.

Those decisions will be made following a meeting of the National Security Council today and consultation with the NATO allies.

Kennedy made these announcements at a news conference after delivering a sternly-worded statement in which he warned the Soviet Union again that it is risking war over Berlin.

"Today there is peace in Berlin, in Germany and in Europe," the President said, "if that peace is destroyed by the unilateral actions of the Soviet Union, its leaders will bear a heavy responsibility before world opinion and history."

The President stressed that the issue of Berlin is "very basic" and the United States intends to "honor our commitments."

## Plat Enforcement Tabled; Called 'Potent, Strong'

The County Commission Tuesday afternoon tabled action on a resolution to strengthen the county's plat laws after commissioners and County Attorney Mack Cleveland Jr. called the resolution "strong and potent stuff" and wanted more time to study the matter.

The resolution cites the "obvious efforts on the part of certain persons, firms or corporations to circumvent and ignore Seminole County's plat law" and says that

such efforts must be stopped and eliminated. The resolution orders the zoning director not to issue building permits to any person, firm or corporation if careful investigation and determination by the zoning director indicates that the person making application for the permit appears to be doing so with the intent and purpose of violating portions of the plat law.

The resolution hits at persons violating platting by meets and bounds.

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**66 Reported Dead In DC6 Crash**

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# More Proof Needed In Mass Murder

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. (UPI)—A Texas official said today William Estel Benson, 41, may have to convict himself if he wants to be punished as possibly the biggest mass murderer in American history.

Benson, an ex-convict with a record of mental illness, claims to have sabotaged gas pipes and caused the New London, Tex., school explosion March 18, 1957, that killed 293 students and teachers.

He took a lie detector test Tuesday to prove he was telling the truth. But he was so nervous physically and in such a mental state that the test was inconclusive.

Police plan to give him another test either today or Thursday when he calms down. Some officials believe his story. Others do not. If they feel he is telling the truth, he will be taken to Texas and tried for murder.

Texas Ranger Jim Ray, Dist. Atty. William Ferguson and Rusk County, Tex., Sheriff Pete Gibson arrived in Oklahoma City Tuesday night from Henderson,

the seat of the county in which New London is located. They plan to question Benson themselves today.

Ferguson will have the job of handling the prosecution of Benson if he is telling the truth. He said it is still a long way in the future, but if Benson wants to be convicted he will have to help.

"This boy could be guilty as sin, want to be punished, and still it will be real difficult to punish him," Ferguson said. "If we can make a connection with him loosening the pipes and then causing the explosion . . . but there is no physical evidence left."

"I don't know how it is going to connect up. There has to be corroboration . . . and so far there is only his word."

Benson was arrested by Oklahoma City police for questioning about a \$58 robbery and he blurted out a story about being responsible for the explosion "to get it off my chest."

# UAW Denies New Contract Demands Are Inflationary

DETROIT (UPI)—The United Auto Workers Union today denied its new contract demands were inflationary and would cost the Ford Motor Co. \$600 million.

The UAW said the price tag placed on its demands by Ford was "utterly ridiculous. Utterly false and an attempt by the company to hide its responsibilities . . . behind a phony inflationary smokescreen."

Ford Tuesday estimated the union's 1961 demands would mean a 30 per cent increase in labor cost—an extra \$1 an hour for each of 120,000 hourly-rated workers.

The package would cost a minimum \$600 million over the next two years, Ford estimated.

Walter Reuther, UAW vice president for labor relations, said, "No package of this dimension obviously poses a strong inflationary threat."

The proposals add up to one thing—a demand for "more pay for fewer hours with less work per hour," Reuther said.

The union, following what it called a "bargaining" approach, had proposed for its members a shorter work week, higher wages, better pensions, improved health care and salaries for hourly-rated production workers.

Ken Sawyer, chief UAW negotiator with Ford, said that "because we are not rigid and dogmatic in our approach, it is impossible at this stage of the negotiations for either the company or union to set a cost figure on them."

Sawyer said Ford "seems to feel the only way to counter our proposals is to raise the inflation issue even if it may have to make up a figure to do so."

# Union Leader Raps Powell

The charge was made by G. J. Walsh, secretary general of the AFL-CIO's 1.5 billion member Building Trades Department.

Walsh attacked Powell for "attempting to build up a reputation as a leading labor leader by attacking the building trades union and its members."

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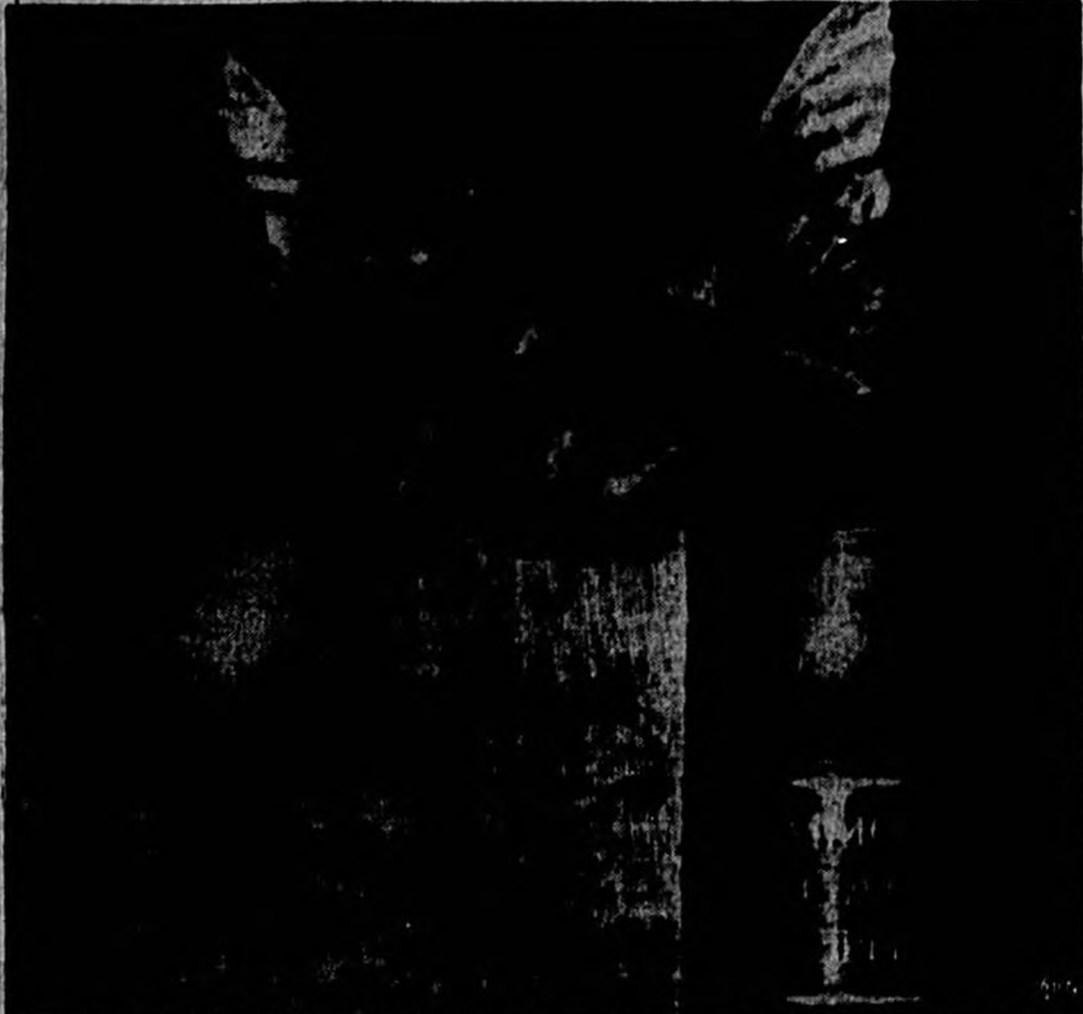

# Foreign Aid Approval Predicted

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate Democratic Whip Robert M. Humphrey today predicted the Senate will approve President Kennedy's requested long-range borrowing authority for foreign aid.

Humphrey told a reporter that the five-year request might not get through the House, but "we may be able to get three years in the final bill."

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee voted late Tuesday afternoon to send the \$4.8 billion aid request today. The outlook was good for final committee action this week.

It still must deal with major money amounts in the authorization, and the long-term borrowing authority to finance the Development Loan Fund.

# Mrs. Duke, Three Others Killed

NEW YORK (UPI)—Mrs. Angler Middle Duke, successful hostess to heads-of-state and diplomats, looked toward a private and quiet little birthday party Tuesday when she climbed aboard a single-engine charter plane.

Waiting for her in Southampton, N. Y., was a cake baked by her cook and the wrapped presents, as well as daughter Maria Luisa. It was Maria Luisa Duke's seventh birthday.

But Mrs. Duke, 38-year-old wife of the State Department's chief of protocol and descendant of Spanish aristocracy, never arrived for the party that would have been so personal and different from her diplomatic entertaining.

She was killed, along with two other socially prominent women and their pilot, in the fiery crash of the Beechcraft Bonanza. The plane was only 1,000 feet from the end of a runway it was trying to reach after encountering trouble during take-off when it crashed in a side yard of a home.

Also killed were Mrs. Arthur G. Altmuhl, 38, wife of the chairman of the board of General American Investors Co.; Mrs. Stanley W. Metcalf, 37, whose husband is chairman of the Columbia Rope Co., Auburn, N. Y., and the pilot, Paul Du Buque, 39, father of two who had been living in East Hampton, N. Y.

# Press Secretary Denies Claim

WASHINGTON (UPI)—White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger has denied a congressman's claim that Salinger's 5-year-old daughter got a free ride to Europe on an Air Force plane.

Rep. H. R. Gross, R-Iowa, told the House Tuesday that Air Force Secretary Eugene Zuckert had said in response to an inquiry that Salinger and his daughter, Suzanne, flew to Europe June 30 on a "space available basis" along with four other non-official riders.

Gross said Salinger's daughter, "has no connection with the government and there is no reason why any American should not make similar application."

Salinger told reporters, however, that he wrote a check to the Air Force covering his daughter's fare on the day he returned, July 5. He said he did not recall the amount of the check.

# J. A. Cottingham Dies In Hospital

MR. J. A. Cottingham, 72, died at the Winter Park Memorial Hospital late Tuesday after a lingering illness.

He had made his home in Longwood for the past 20 years at 127 W. Church St. He was born July 24, 1889, in Eaton, Ohio.

Survivors are five children, Miss Marjorie Cottingham of Longwood; Fred Cottingham of Ft. Lauderdale; Mrs. John McMillaney, Mrs. Norman Willis and Mrs. LaRoy Urris, all of Miami.

Four great-grandchildren and one brother and two sisters in Ohio.

Funeral services will be held at 1 p. m. Thursday from Brison Funeral Home with Rev. Ruth E. Great of Longwood officiating. The body will be sent to Eaton for 2 p. m. Sunday services and burial.

# Kennedy Will Have Crisis Authority

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A declaration of a national emergency by President Kennedy would give him enough authority to take all measures being considered for a short-term Berlin crisis, in the opinion of government legal experts.

On his own declaration, the President could call up as many as a million reserves, could sharply increase the draft, and could suspend competitive bidding on public purchases.

But, if the crisis should be extended, the legal experts think the

President would have to go to Congress for more authority as well as for the money to pay for emergency operations.

The administration has been considering in the past two weeks only short-term measures, which if adopted, would strengthen American forces during the next six months.

In one key area—the possible commandeering of commercial planes for transport or supply flights—a presidential declaration would not provide any additional authority.

However, the Defense Depart-

ment has voluntary agreements with the private airlines under which a large number of planes could be chartered immediately on a declaration of emergency by the defense secretary.

A presidential declaration also would fail to provide authority to keep men in service beyond the expiration of their enlistment, draft or reserve obligation terms.

Only a congressional declaration can require service "for the duration." In the case of enlistees and draftees, the experts believe, legislation would be needed to extend their terms.

# Tunis Police Seek To Drive French Out

TUNIS, Tunisia (UPI)—Tunisian policemen, national guardsmen and civilian volunteers today blocked all roads leading to France's big naval base at Bizerte in an effort to drive out the French.

President Habib Bourguiba had given France until today to agree to leave the base, which the French retained after granting Tunisia independence in 1956.

The French said they would not negotiate under threats.

French troops erected barbed wire barricades and set up machine-gun posts around the base. Tunisians have been clamoring for the ouster of the French ever since Tunisia won independence, but Bourguiba refrained from pressing the issue because he hoped for a peaceful solution to the Algerian question.

# 5 Show No Effects Of Atom Blast

WASHINGTON (UPI)—There will be no special physical examinations this year for the "mayor of ground zero" and four other Air Force men, who stood unprotected directly under an atomic explosion four years ago today.

The purpose of the test on July 19, 1957, in Nevada was to prove that the Air Force's nuclear-tipped anti-aircraft missile, the MBI "Genie," could be used effectively at an altitude of 18,000 feet without injuring civilians on the ground.

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North Orlando Fire Dept., Fire Hall, 7 p. m. . . . Chulota Youth Club, Community House, 7:30 p. m.

No radiation could be detected in Col. Sidney Bruce, the senior officer who was designated "mayor of ground zero" by the four who stood with him. They wore ordinary uniforms without dark glasses when the warhead was fired.

"I guess they've lost interest in us," Bruce commented with a smile when asked why no special physical examinations were deemed necessary this year.

He added that there never was any concern and never the slightest evidence of injury or after-effects.

Possible eye injury could have resulted had the men looked at the atomic blast, but their instructions were to assume a normal civilian posture. They were looking straight ahead.

The seldom-described test took place above Yucca Flats, with Capt. Eric Hutchinson of Webster City, Iowa, the pilot and Capt. Cliff Barber, of Wild Rice, N. D., the "weaponer" aboard an F-84 fighter plane. They released the only live "Genie" ever fired.

With Bruce on the flats were Lt. Col. Frank Ball, Washington, D. C., Maj. Don Luttreck of Dallas, Tex., Lt. Col. Norman Bodinger, Monument, Colo., and Lt. Col. John Hughes, McKeesport, Pa.

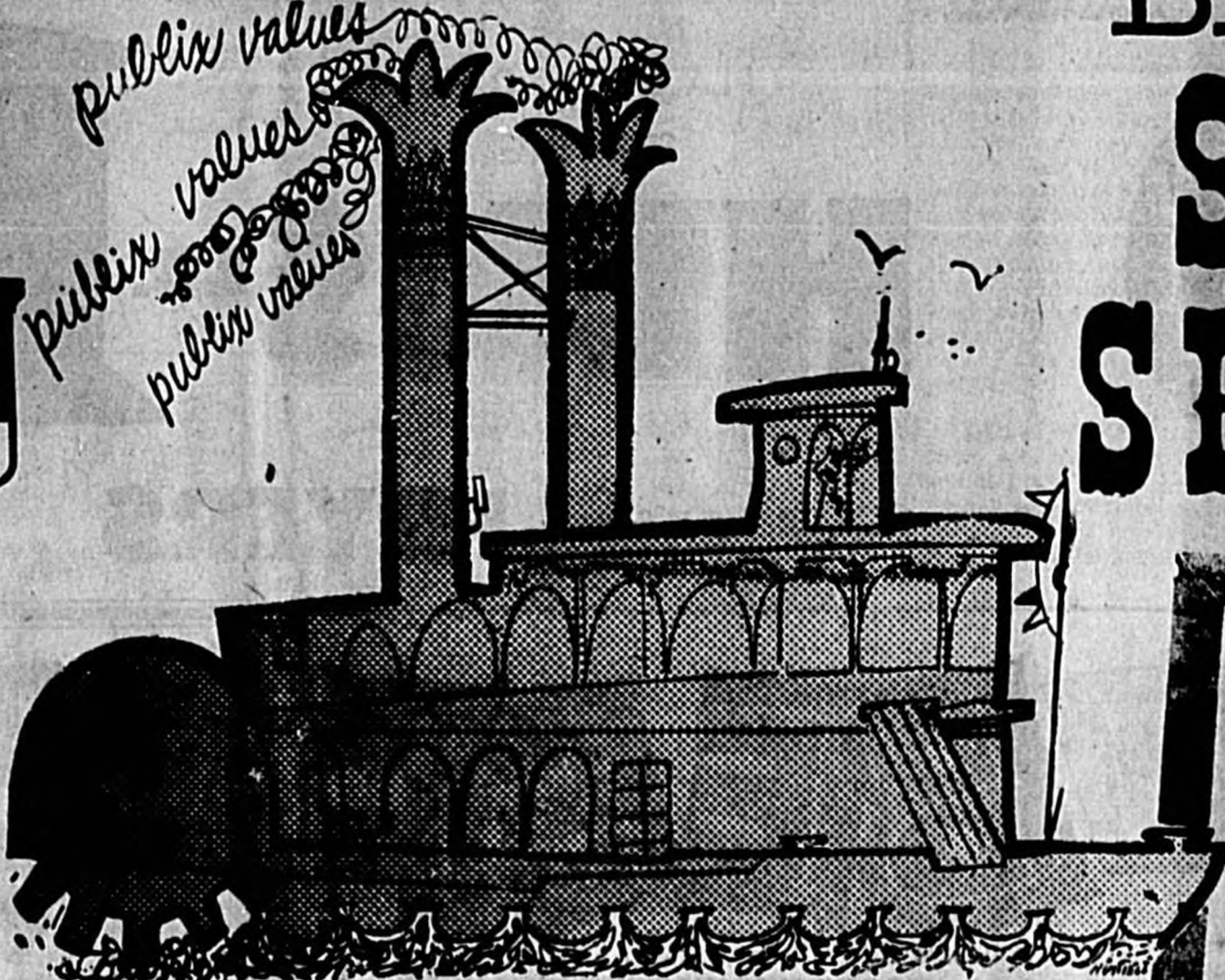

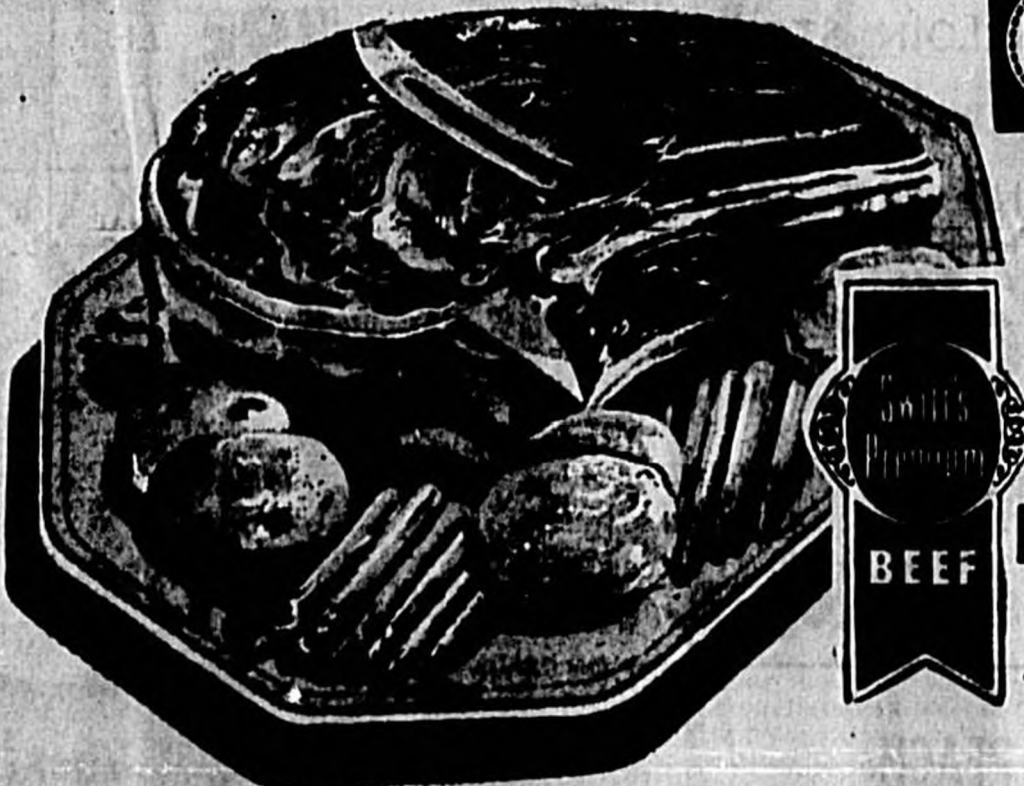

### Eichmann Says He's Being Roasted In Court

Jerusalem (UPI)—An angry, shaking Adolf Eichmann protested indignantly today that he is being "roasted" in the Jerusalem court trying him for mass murder "until the meat's done to a turn."

"They want me to go on until they get the answer they want from me," Eichmann snapped.

It was the nearest Eichmann had come to breaking in nine days of prodding grilling cross

examination by Israeli Atty. Gen. Gideon Hausner.

Eichmann's patience snapped suddenly after continuous questioning by Hausner about the so-called "confession" he is alleged to have dictated while a fugitive in Buenos Aires in 1947 to former Dutch SS Major Willem Sassem.

Eichmann suddenly denounced the document as "false."

"I only know that from now on I will not make any stand nor answer any question about this document since I see that it's false," he shouted.

Justice Moshe Landau rebuked him sternly with the words, "You will continue to answer questions until I tell you that you no longer have to answer questions."

Eichmann bowed, "Yes, your honor, that is true. But I have the feeling that I'm being roasted here until the meat's done to a turn. They want me to go on until they get the answer they want from me."

### Governor's Meet Opens Minus Nine

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI)—Gov. Ross Barnett's "Southern unity" meeting opened today minus nine of the 11 governors he invited.

The Mississippi chief executive and two other governors—Ernest Hollings of South Carolina and John Patterson of Alabama—along with representatives from three other states had no agenda of discussion topics set up.

Barnett sent his invitations to all of Dixie's governors less than a week ago. He said he thought the governors would benefit from their getting together and exchanging views. He suggested they could talk about anything they wished.

Barnett has mentioned "economic development" as one of his chief interests, but segregation was expected to command prime attention.

Three states sent representatives in place of their governors: Louisiana Gov. Jimmie Davis, who first agreed to come but changed his mind Tuesday, was represented by Lt. Gov. C. C. Ayoack. Georgia Gov. Ernest Vandiver sent Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook. Florida Gov. Harris Bryant also sent a legal expert.

The other governors said they could not or would not attend and they declined to send representatives. One of them, Tennessee's Buford Ellington, said he saw no point in coming because Barnett's invitation failed to say what the meeting was about.

### Police Probe Racial Shooting

CHICAGO (UPI)—Police questioned four white youths today about the shooting death of a Negro high school student, an incident blamed for a week of sporadic violence by bands of Negro teen-agers seeking revenge.

The youths were arrested at the same Southwest Side street corner where Matthew Tolbert Jr., 17, was killed a week ago today. They were picked up with other suspects in a police drive against suspected troublemakers Monday.

Discovery of charges against the four were dropped Tuesday and Boys Court Judge Walter J. Kowalski released them into police custody.

Inflamed by a rumor that Tolbert was killed by a white gang called the Latin Counts, groups of Negro youths roamed the Lawdale district around Harrison High School. About two dozen persons, mostly white, have been beaten during the past week. A 17-year-old tramping victim said he was attacked by three Negroes.

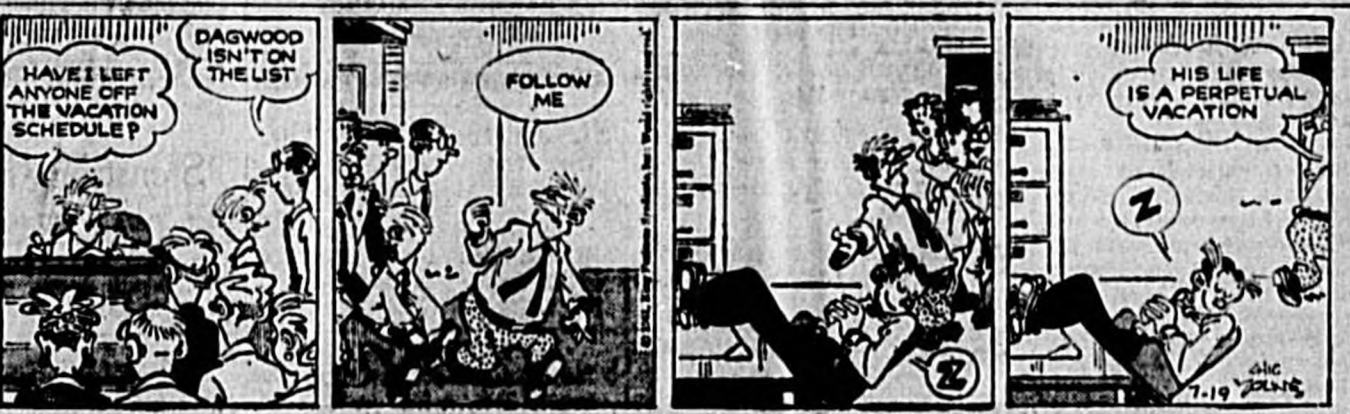

### Congress School Aid Supporters Seek New Help

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congressional supporters of school aid dug out from the rubble of President Kennedy's stalled education program today and looked to the White House for some form of help.

The White House was silent Tuesday when the House Rules Committee tabled—and apparently killed for this session—Kennedy's school aid proposals. But reporters were likely to ask the President today for comment at his news conference.

One possibility that would hasten school aid advocates would be a strong declaration by Kennedy that he would veto any separate bill revising the highly popular program of federal aid to "impoverished" schools.

The President's supporters see the vote thrust as a perfect wedge to pry open the school aid matter, something called down by the 9-7 committee vote.

Chairman Adam Clayton Powell, (D-N.Y.), of the House Education Committee has quoted Kennedy as saying he would reject any separate bill extending the \$1.9 billion impounded aid program for schools crowded by the children of federally connected families.

Powell said if the \$1.9 billion House members who have impounded schools in their districts want a continuation of the aid that expired June 30, they will have to accept the rest of Kennedy's \$2.1 billion construction program for all public elementary and secondary schools. The Senate already has passed a similar bill.

The general aid plan and extension of the impounded district aid were tied together in one of the bills drafted by the rules group.

A second Kennedy bill would have provided \$2.5 billion in loans and grants for public and private colleges and college students.

A third \$1.7 billion measure would have extended the 1958 National Defense Education Act, with \$975 million in long-term loans for private and parochial schools to build classrooms for teaching science, mathematics and languages.

### House Outlaws Quickie Divorce

## All-Out Battle Raging Between French, Tunisians

TUNIS, Tunisia (UPI)—President Habib Bourguiba said today French aircraft were attacking his forces with "bombs and rockets" in the battle over the Bizerte naval base.

Bourguiba said at least 33 Tunisians had been killed in two days of fighting—20 of them this morning in a battle at Bizerte's main army.

He announced he would sever diplomatic relations with France and demand an urgent meeting of the United Nations Security Council.

In Paris, French government sources said French forces counter-attacked Tunisian forces who were shelling the Bizerte base, killing "several" Tunisians and capturing 30 others.

The French sources said the paratroopers, backed by an umbrella of fighter planes, lost one man killed and three men wounded in their "sorties against limited objectives" close to the camp's perimeter.

The French said the attack was launched to relieve pressure on the base by Tunisian forces attacking with heavy and light weapons.

The French Ministry of Information said that Tunisian troops were preceded by women and children in a march against the base today.

Bourguiba spoke to a packed press conference in Tunis, just 40 miles from Bizerte where he launched a campaign Wednesday to drive the French out of the big Mediterranean base.

The Tunisian president accused France of putting "all means of modern war" into operation and announced that Tunisia itself now had gone into a "virtual war" footing.

"A French aircraft carrier is operating off the Tunisian coast," he said.

"Successive waves of fighter aircraft are attacking the national guardmen at the barricades put up to ban circulation of the French armed forces.

"Armored cars are firing point-blank at the demonstrators who are advancing on the roads leading to Bizerte.

"Red Cross vehicles have been attacked with machinegun fire. Two ambulance men have been wounded by grenade explosions."

While Bourguiba was speaking, Tunis was in the throes of almost a complete general strike. Excited crowds milled in the streets shouting "evacuation"—demanding the French get out of Bizerte.

## Comptroller Gives State Financial Vote Of Confidence

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Florida's financial future received a vote of confidence Wednesday from Comptroller Ray E. Green, who said the state was "getting out of the minus, into the plus column."

Although he said there was no tangible evidence the state is coming out of its financial slump, Green said he was "very hopeful" about revenue for the next two years.

"People are talking optimistically," he said.

A new estimate of the state's income for the next two years is being prepared and will be ready in a few weeks, Green said.

Earlier predictions of \$750 million in revenue for the biennium will probably hold true, Green said, when all estimates are in.

A budget in excess of \$763.7 million was adopted by the 1961 Legislature. If there is not enough money to pay for services and construction, the state will be forced to release funds and see that the state doesn't go into debt.

Florida has a state law against deficit financing.

Revenue will be minus about \$4 million this biennium, Green said, because of a bill passed by the Legislature cutting intangible tax on stocks and bonds. But Green said several loopholes in tax laws were also closed by the Legislature, providing revenue to cover the loss.

The Cabinet Budget Commission will use financial reports from Green and Budget Director Harry Smith as a basis for allocating funds for building construction.

# Floods Cover West Virginia City

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (UPI)—A devastating "monsoon-like" cloudburst struck this capital city of West Virginia as it slept early today, cascading walls of water through scores of homes, tossing them down hillsides and killing at least a dozen persons.

The vicious rainfall, capping a week's downpour, sent water over the banks of the Kanawha River and nine large creeks bordering the city, bringing with it waves 15 feet high. Many of the victims were trapped in their bedrooms. Others perished when the swirling water engulfed them as they fled.

Death claimed young and old alike. Five-year-old Caroline Thompson and her 2-year-old brother were being led from their home by their father. A sudden surge of water broke the father's grip and the children disappeared. Caroline's body was recovered. Rescuers searched for her brother.

Weary rescue workers set up a makeshift morgue in the fire department, not far from the main boulevard that courses in front of the Capitol building where a 30-foot section of pavement collapsed.

Most hard-hit were the eastern and northern sections of Charleston. The rampaging waters thrashed houses loose and ripped out hillside. Victims were found on the west side and on the east side, more than three miles away.

There were three persons reported missing in the Elk Two-Mile area, two miles north of town. A family of three died when they ran from their home and took refuge in a chicken house. But the torrent loosened dirt around the foundation, and the structure crashed into the water. Ironically, their own home suffered only minor damages.

The Thompson girl's body was discovered by radio newscaster Bud Burke of station WTIP.

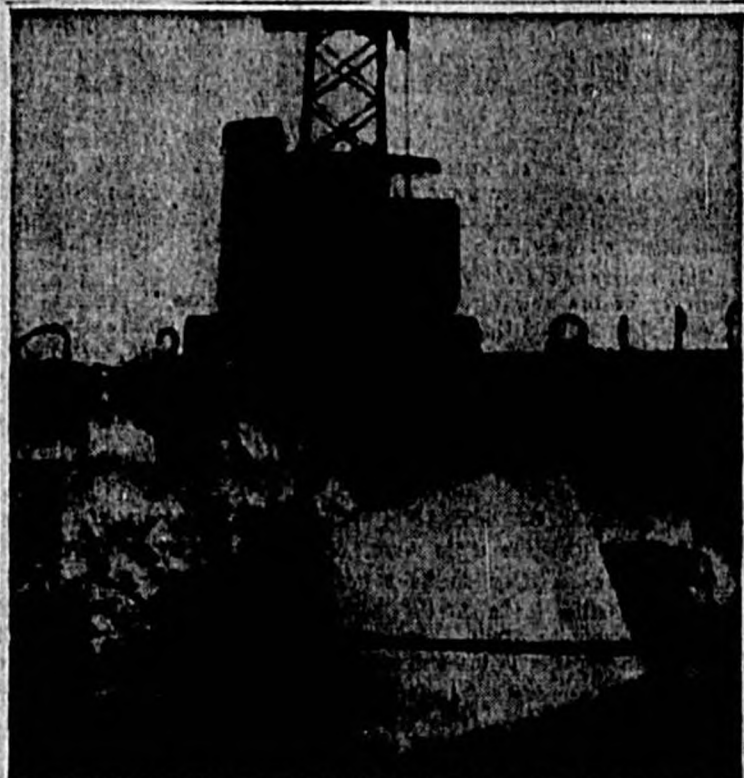

## Tropical Storm Anna Brewing

MIAMI (UPI)—The San Juan, Puerto Rico, Weather Bureau said today an area of low pressure in the south-eastern Caribbean had developed into the season's first tropical storm.

The bureau said hurricane hunter plane and ship reports indicated the storm, named Anna, packed winds up to 60 miles per hour in a small area near the center. It said gale winds extended 65 miles in the northern semicircle and 25 miles in the south semicircle.

At 8:30 a. m. the storm was pinpointed near Latitude 12.0 north, Longitude 64.1 west, or about 800 miles south-southeast of

The first tropical storm of the season, named Anna, spawned off the northern coast of South America today with winds up to 45 miles per hour. At 11 a. m. the Miami Weather Bureau located the storm's center about 645 miles south-southeast of San Juan, Puerto Rico.

San Juan, P. R. It was moving between west and west-northwest at about 17 miles per hour.

"Future direction and rate of motion of tropical storm Anna is uncertain," the Bureau said, "but it is expected to be toward the west for the next 12 to 24 hours. It is expected to increase gradually in size and intensity during the next 24 hours."

The bureau said persons in the coastal islands of Venezuela and the islands of Curacao, Bonaire and Aruba should be alert for further information during the day.

"Vessels in the path of this storm should exercise caution," the warning said, "and small craft in the southern Leeward, Windward Islands and along the coast of Venezuela from the Paraguana peninsula to Trinidad should remain in port."

The weather bureau defines a tropical storm as a disturbance with a circular motion that contains winds up to 74 m.p.h.

## Inch Of Rain Falls In Area

More than an inch of rain fell over the Sanford area Wednesday but no damage to any county or city roads were reported by officials.

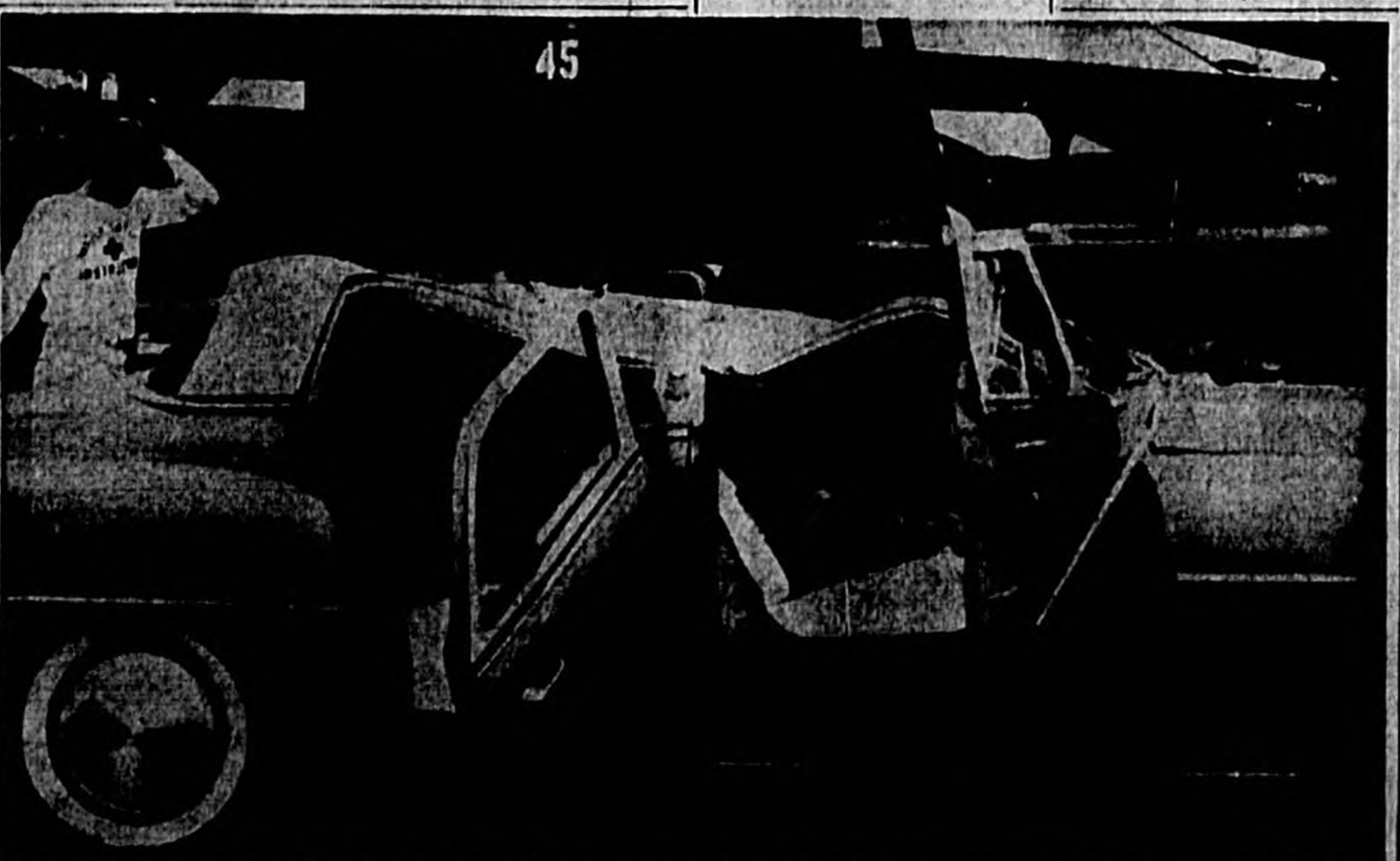
Over the state, the Weather Bureau said rain and wind would be less severe in North and West Florida today following day-long rains spawned from an easterly wave of squalls.

## Kennedy Ready To Spell Out Defense Needs

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy prepared today to tell the Western Allies of stern steps he has decided to take to bolster U. S. military might because of the Soviet threat to Berlin.

He also planned to ask the members of the NATO alliance to step up their own military prepared-

ness and work in closer co-ordination to strengthen the Allied forces in Western Europe.

The President and his National Security Council agreed late Wednesday on moves to build up U. S. military units for a possible showdown on Berlin. Another Security Council meeting was scheduled today, but it was described as a "normal briefing session."

Officials said the contemplated steps in addition to strengthening U. S. forces for the Berlin crisis, were designed to increase the ability of this country and its allies to meet Communist pressures elsewhere in the world.

The American people will get the details Tuesday night in a presidential radio-television report to the nation. Kennedy will speak on all networks for 30 minutes starting at 10 p. m. Tuesday.

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
