Bridges wins District 4 New commissioner defeats Dean Ray by a vote of 292 to 83

SANFORD — Taking the District 4 seat for the city commission will be Sanford attorney Jack Bridges.

He won the special election against opponent businessman Dean Ray Tuesday by a vote of 292 to 83 in low voter humout.

The election was necessary to replace former Commissioner Kevin Hipes, who stepped down from his position for undisclosed medical reasons Aug. 24.

Bridges admitted when he filed to run that he had never had political aspirations until now.

"When Hipes resigned, I thought, that's a shame, because that's my district commissioner," Bridges said in September.

Bridges is 58 and moved to Sanford in 1951. He said he has grown to love the city by the river.

During his campaign he said Sanford was on the brink of breaking out of its

shell. He noted escalating property values and the interest in the city shown by developers.

He has served on the city's planning and zoning commission in the late 1970s and early 1980s

Bridges is married to Elizabeth, who is financial analyst for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. Bridges graduated from Seminole High School and was once an usher for the Ritz Theatre, now the Helen Stairs Theatre in downtown Sanfund.

With only District 4 voting in the special election to replace Hipes, Bridges received 78 percent of the vote to Ray's 22 percent. Only 375 people voted in the election.

In other area races, incumbent Lake Mary Deputy Mayor Janet Jernigan defeated challenger Realtor Jeff Bales. This is the second election in a row that Bales has lost to an incumbent commissioner as he lost to Michael McLean in 2004

Jernigan received 376 votes to Bales' 156. Only 532 people voted in Lake Mary in an election open to the whole city for **Commission Seat 4**.

Longwood had a higher voter turnout for two races and two charter amendments.

Incumbent Mayor H.G. "Butch" Bundy defeated opponent Rosa M. Figueroa for the Longwood District 4 seat. Bundy received 948 eight votes, and Figuenia won 390 votes with 1,338 people casting ballots.

In Longwood's District 2 race, incumbent Commissioner Dan Anderson won against challenger Lori LaVasseur by a vote of 906 to 423. Also in Longwood, Charter Amendment 1 allowing a city commissioner to request information from city personnel was approved overwhelmingly 1,007 to 291.

Amendment 2 to appoint a charter Advisory Committee every seven years rather than every three years was defeated by just 27 votes, 640 yes and 667 no.

SANFORD - The city has limited the Larry A. Dale Aquatic Center to a single club team and that has rankled at least one parent whose daughter's team wants to rent lanes for practice.

David Lundberg charges that the city of Sanford just won't allow competition at the public facility. His daughter Lauren's team wanted to rent six lanes at the Sanford pool

City officials said the notion that Sanford won't allow access to the aquatic center for Lundberg's team is misconstrued.

Mayor Linda Kuhn said the city has not denied access to anyone.

"We welcomed Lauren [Lundberg] to join the existing team here," Kuhn said. "They declined to do so."

Furthermore, Kuhn said, the policy of the

SANFORD - The Core Committee working on middle school rezoning in Lake Mary and Sanford narrowed 25 plans down to three Monday, but also had five more plans submitted for consideration.

The committee meeting Monday evening was facilitat-ed by Ron Pinnell, executive director secondary education - middle schools, and held at Sanford Middle School.

Sanford, Greenwood Lakes Middle in Lake Mary and Millennium Middle in Sanford

are all under rezoning because the district plans to open Markham Woods Middle

School in August 2006. "This area has been relatively stable when it comes to middle schools," Pinnell said, pointing out that the area has not be rezoned since Greenwood Lakes opened in 1986

The Core Committee has met six times, including a public input session, and was expected to be on hand Tuesday night for a work session with the School Board.



Resident wants city to correct cemetery mess

SANFORD — Betty Giles placed "Do Not Mow" signs on her family's plot in the Sanford cemetery about 15 years ago just in case something happens like the situation there this past week.

The contractor that mows and maintains the grass in the cemetery applied grass killer a little too liberally and many plots have unsightly dead grass surrounding memorials and gravestones.

Some stones have also been scratched and damaged by mowers, and small plastic American flags were chewed up by blades as the grass was cut.

as the grass was cut. "They run up and down with a great big commercial mower," Giles said. "I try to keep it like a little garden because you know what I appreciate my family." Giles said this kind of thing has happened

before and she has complained. She added that she doesn't fault the city, but someone has to stay on top of the contractors.

Marc Hultin, manager for parks and grounds for the city of Sanford, said he is aware of the problem. He said the city has always allowed the contractors to spray Roundup grass killer around the grave markers so they don't have to get close with the large mowers.

"When you first put that out, it looks bad," he admitted.

They were definitely overzealous with the Roundup. They are going to re-sod those areas. We have already called them on the carpet for that."

The contractors are Bonne Terre of Ormond Beach, Hultin said. They will pay for the damage, he added.

Hultin wanted residents to know that they have some more trimming to do. Soon new signs will replace old section markers.

"I have a somewhat limited budget to do this with," he said. "Mrs. Giles at times has been our eyes and ears." They listen when Giles talks.


"I'm just upset about my cemetery now," Giles said. Her parents and nephew are buried on the family plot, as well as her brother who was killed in the Korean War. That is when the family purchased the plot, she said.

'They are not going to run over my son," Giles said.





city is to only have one club team at their facility.

Oviedo High School head swimming coach and Blue Dolphins club coach, Charlie Rose, responded to the recent news in an e-mail to Kuhn.

He echoed sentiments that in his professional opinion it was counter-productive to have two teams at one facility and ultimately leads to the failure of both.

"Two teams, competing for the same clients, at the same pool is an accident waiting to happen and is a poor business practice," Rose wrote.

David Lundberg said they offered to sign a non-compete agreement.

The reality is at the end of the day, they don't want a competitive, successful, club team in their water," Lundberg said.

According to Lundberg, for young swimmers the space at the facility, the city pinnacle of their athletic claimed they didn't have career is making it to the Junior Olympics. He said his daughter's team had all 40 young team members qualify last year for the Junior Olympics.

Numerous e-mail testimony from parents of swim-mers who belong to Seminole Aquatics, who call the Larry Dale Aquatic Center home, said coach Tony Ackerson is a coach who welcomes all levels of

"Tony has illustrated dozens of times to our kids what character is about," Tom Hutchison, who has two daughters that were led by Ackerson, said.

"I don't know where to send my daughters to become Olympic caliber swimmers, I do know I can put them in an environment where they become world class kids and adults ... with Tony," Hutchison wrote in an e-mail to Kuhn.

For the past five months, Lundberg has been pushing for the use of Sanford's facility for FastLane Aquatics, who currently divides their time at a pool in Clermont and a pool in Oviedo.

Lundberg said he received several different reasons for why his daughter's team couldn't rent the facility. He said he was first told that his daughter's coach, Alec Rukosuev, had interviewed with another team. Then he said he was told that they heard that if the Rukosuev left to another team, his swimmers would go with him.

Lundberg's response to those claims were simple, he said. He asked what person hasn't interviewed for another position to better their career? And, he also said that if a child was with a coach that they were comfortable with and was a high caliber coach, then why not move to another club team with that coach?

According to Lundberg, when he continued to ask for room for another club team. Then, Lundberg said, they told him it was USA Swimming policy to have only one club team per facil-

ity. The The city lastly told Lundberg that it was their own policy and preference to have just one club team at their facility, he said. "They wish I went away,"

Lundberg said in an inter-view at his home last week. But Kuhn is sticking by

the city's policy. She said that FastLane Aqualics is not the first club team that has been told no.

"We intend to adhere to that policy," Kuhn said. But, she also added that, "No one's being denied a tax payer's pool."

She said anybody who wants to come and use the facility individually, is more than welcome to.

Ackerson said that at virtually any other pool there is only a single, registered club team calling that facility its home pool.

Pat Hogan, Club Development Director, for USA Swimming, said teams at the same facility can cause problems with water time.

He also said that especially in a community pool, hav-ing two competitive club teams, can limit other aquatic activities.

Hogan also said there could also become a difference in philosophy, which can create a situation where one team tries to take athletes from the other.

Hogan said that although there are some instances in the country where two club teams share facilities, he always sees the same set of problems arise from those situations.

"I don't encourage facilities to have more than one competitive swim team at a time," Hogan said.

Ackerson also pointed out that FastLane Aquatics already has space to swim at a facility in Oviedo and in Clermont. "They have, locally, a

beautiful pool and training space," Ackerson said.

But some members of FastLane Aquatics live closer to the Sanford pool. Such as Lauren, who lives in Alaqua Lakes.

David Lundberg said he feels that since the city of Sanford pool was built with part of Seminole County tax payer's dollars, his daughter's team should be able to swim there.

"It should be about the kids," Lundberg said.

Lundberg also said that because of the caliber of FastLane Aquatic's team members, their team could potentially bring in additional revenue from having swim meets at the Sanford facility.

Stephanie O'Malley, a mother of a team member of Seminole Aquatics club team, said her son chose Ackerson as his coach, so she drives him from Winter Springs to Sanford for swim practice all the time.

She also said that 50 percent of the team lives in

> on Seminole Aquatics team drive many miles to get to Sanford, even though there are closer pools. We choose to drive, because Coach Ackerson's fine coaching is worth it," O'Malley wrote in an e-mail.

Many more e-mails flooded into Mayor Kuhn's Inbox last week and this week from concerned parents and swimmers. Many echoed praises of Ackerson, his coaching ability, and his program. Others

supported Lundberg's claims, saying they were parents of team members who also had to drive a great distance to Clermont

They accused the city of protecting a "good ole boy" coach, Ackerson, instead of letting in a "successful, level certified swimming 4 coach".

Robert Lord, who is a parent of a FastLane Aquatics swimmer, asked Kuhn to look deeper into the issue asking what would it hurt if their team practiced at Sanford's facility.

Lord wrote in his e-mail that it was indeed common practice for swim teams to share water in order to fully utilize a facility.

Lord further claimed in his e-mail that FastLane's coach is being punished for "rocking the boat and starting his own swim team."

Lundberg said his next step, if the city of Sanford continues to deny his daughter's team use of the Sanford facility, would be to issue a complaint with a tax advoca-

cy group. Lundberg has already arranged sit down meetings with state Rep. David Mealor, County Commissioner Brenda Carey, and other heavyweights in the area.

But, Kuhn reiterated during an interview with The Herald: "This is our policy,"

Mid-City offers security and investigation

LAKE MARY - Even while serving for 20 years with the New York City Police Department, Gregory Quinn dreamed of owning his own business.

When he retired and moved to Central Florida in June 2002, he started Mid-City Special Service in Lake Mary. The statelicensed company specializes in security or protection services and investigative servic-

In a search for diversity, he decided to offer both types of services, Quinn said.

The majority of the business is 75 percent security, but we interweave the two," Quinn said. Many clients take advantage of both services, he

added. For example, if the company performs security for an apartment complex, personnel will follow up on any crimes that happen

"The police department may not have time to follow up on a stolen bicycle, for example," Quinn explained. "We'll do that follow up and see if there are witnesses."

Mid-City also works with motels, retail stores and even house watches, he said. When people leave for vacation, the company can watch the house, but more common are business owners or managers who feel under some sort of threat from employees who have been fired.

"Believe it or not, that's been very common to hire our firm for personal protection after firing employees," Quinn said.

The company also works on personal protec-tion and matrimonial investigations on spouses who cheat on their husbands or wives.

Quinn said he usually hires current or former law enforcement personnel because he likes their professionalism. Others are corrections officers or retired military police. Florida licenses for his business require certain training, but he sends personnel out for additional training, including CPR and first aid as well as investigative train-

ing Quinn himself has a background suited for his new business.

He retired as a police sergeant in New York. He commanded a field training unit that trained

new police officers for the first year on the job. He loved the work, but hated the politics of being a New York cop, he said.

"Internal politics, that is the true stress," he said. In 1985, he served in the 30 th precinct when crack cocaine first hit the scene. The mile square area topped more than 200 homicides in a year, he said. They sometimes experienced seven to 10 shootings per day, he added.

You know what amazes me about this work? It's people who steal for absolutely no reason, just for the sake of stealing," he said.

Working for the transit authority police in New York, he said people would jump the lumstile to keep from paying. They often had guns or warrants, and just as often they had plenty of money in their pockets.

"It's in their nature," he said. "That's the mentality."

Knowing the minds of criminals, Quinn tries to gear his clients toward hiring armed security. We will abide by their wishes of course," Ouinn said.

"But if our officers can't defend themselves, it does make a difference. Officers will have more

confidence knowing they can protect them-

selves. It's a psychological thing." Mid-City serves all of the Orlando area, although right now most of the company's clients are in Orlando itself with a few in Sanford and Seminole County.

The company is based in Lake Mary, where Quinn lives with his wife, Leigh, and their three children Samantha, John and Gregory, who all go to Lake Mary schools.

Right now, the company is gearing up for December when there seems to be a hike in burglaries.


"I think our company is a cut above most other security companies because we have the most public service background," Quinn said. Many security firms are in it for the money, he explained.

We are here to make money, but the public service background brings a commitment to provide protection services for people and their property."

"This has not become a cold case," Davidson said Monday. "We have not exhausted all of the leads in this case by any stretch of the imagination."

Investigator Greg Seymour of the Major Case Unit told Alfreda Monday afternoon that several cases had finished, and that Eric's would be a priority.

Investigators did interview a known drug dealer who may have been dating the same girlfriend, according to Alfreda. At this point, however, Davidson said he could not go so far as to say a suspect had been identified.

He wanted to remind the public of a couple of imperative aspects.

Any piece of information, no matter how trivial or insignificant it may seem, can be important in this case. "We encourage anybody


with any information, no matter how small, to certainly call us," he said. Anyone can call Crime Stoppers at 1-888-277-TIPS or 8477. The caller may be eligible for a reward.


Davidson also said there is a general feeling about this case that people know more than they are telling. He urged anyone who has information who may be withholding it for whatever reason, to come forward. People may be fearful or not willing to get involved, but he said their information can be immensely important.

He acknowledged the frustration of the family and the Sheriff's Office.

"We take this very personally when one of our citizens are murdered," he said. Investigator Seymour's office referred calls to Davidson.

Davidson could not disclose any specifics about the case. He added that some things are not able to be shared with the family as well.

"I wish we had something more to tell," he said, adding, "This case is very solvable."


Alfreda herself has heard that people know who killed her son. She simply wants to know who did this, but even more important to her is why her son had to die.

"It's about to kill me," she said. Alfreda described how lonely and quiet it can be when she arrives home from work. Her older son, Craig, lives at the house. When he arrives, Craig hollers to his mom so they know each other is home.

The brothers were very close, Alfreda said in an earlier interview. "It's killing him," she said referring to Craig.

She described Eric as a good-hearted person, as any mother would, but she has proof in the form of a scrap book from the staff and students at South Seminole.

"My eyes filled up with tears as I heard the news ... Why'd you have to leave Mr. Walker," wrote a distraught



student in a letter contained in the scrapbook.

Alfreda said she has confidence that the Volusia Sheriff's Office is doing what it can.

"I'm not going to let it go," she said. She even said she could forgive the killer because that is what Christian's do. She would also want to know, though, why the murderer took the cowardly way out.

An elderly couple heard the car crash, she said. Eric was not robbed, but he was murdered, she said.

"I believe he knew the people who did this," she said. Alfreda talks to God and Eric, she added.

"Bring something to me," she pleads with her son. "You know who did it to you. I know you know who did this."

Plans were rejected mainly because they did not meet rezoning parameters set up by the board and the committee. Free and reduced lunch, percentage of black and Hispanic students as well as projected enrollment figures were all compared to parameters. If one or more varied too much, the plan was put aside.

The school district remains under a federal consent decree meant to balance racial makeup at area schools. The parameters address that decree to try to make the plan acceptable to the U.S. Department of Justice.

According to School Board chairman Jeanne Morris, who attended some of the committee meeting, the district is very close to moving out from under the consent decree.

The three plans that passed muster are known as 19, 20 and 22

Plan 19 would move 2,052 students, but even this plan was not perfect. One committee member pointed out that students within walking distance of Greenwood Lakes in Cell 37NW, south of Lake Mary Boulevard would be moved.

Plan 20 moves 2,136 students. Some said there were too many islands in the plan, meaning that areas sending students to one school were surrounded by communities sending students to another school.

"There will be some islands," Pinnell said. Others agreed that the isolated communities were not too bad.

Of the three plans that will move forward in the process, Plan 22 moves the least amount of students at 1,970. One committee member shouted her feelings about Plan 22: "That's a good one."

Plan 22 has very few islands. Also areas that will experience the most future growth were divided among the various schools, which was an aspect favored by some committee members.

Another plan, number 21, also met the parameters, but was rejected because it includ-ed Sanford Middle School itself. Students surrounding the school would attend another one, which didn't make sense to committee members.

Pinnell was to update the School Board on the committee's process. Public input was also expected from par-ents who don't want their children moved out of a

school.

The committee has looked at the numbers for these plans and will consider the five new ones, but Pinnell said the focus will turn now to the question of whether the plans make sense. A final adoption of the plan is expected in January

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

25 Not that he's making excuses, but Caughell said that the emotional state of the
