Dec. 7, 1941 78 --County VA Boss On Arizona

Sundays were always special days to Clint Westbrook at the beginning of the 1960s. He was in the navy then and Sundays were the only days you got to sleep late.

That one Sunday Westbrook will never erase from his mind did not seem special at the time. In fact, it was a disappointment. He was supposed to have been off for the day.

It was just Westbrook's luck to be called on to dump the garbage on the day he was supposed to have been off. What rotten luck. It probably saved his life. Had he not been on the garbage boat that Sunday he might have been sleeping late on his ship.

You see, this was not just any Sunday. This was Dec. 7, 1941.

This was not just any navy base. This was Pearl Harbor.

He was not just any ship. It was the USS Arizona. The Arizona lies now beneath the still waters of the channel that runs Ford's Island, the permanent tomb for 1,182 of Westbrook's shipmates.

The quiet man with the New York accent who serves as director of Seminole County Veterans Affairs, was a witness to history.

Thirty-seven years ago today he saw the beginning of global war and the end of many young lives.

Over the remains of the Arizona and the men entombed within, is a shining white monument accessible by four boats that visit the site hourly. The structure was assembled after the U.S. Department of Interior designated the spot a national landmark in 1954.

Visitors will come in greater numbers to the monument today — the anniversary of the attack.

It is said one can look at the water beneath the monument and see an emerging air bubble or some of the one million gallons of oil leaked on board Dec. 6, 1941.

Of all those who have seen the site, few have viewed it as Westbrook remembers it on that day so long ago.

As the 89-foot launch carrying Westbrook and a handful of fellow crewmen approached the USS Nevada, down the line from the Arizona in "Battleship Row," he heard

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May Be 1st In U.S.

Legionnaire Clinic Started In Sanford

In what may be a first for an American Legion Post in the United States, Sanford Post 33 has opened an out-patient clinic on its premises.

Initially the post, at 3306 Orlando Drive, (U.S. 17-81) is offering out-patient care two days a week, Mondays and Thursdays.

The man behind the clinic, Post Commander Octavio "George" Cintron of Sanford said he hopes to expand the program and include 24-hour

emergency ambulance service for anyone who needs the services.

"We have to do this," Cintron said. "There is so much red tape with the veterans administration (V.A.) Now we just do it and send them the paperwork."

Cintron said the red tape has prompted many local doctors to ask for cash from veterans and Medicare patients.

"Twenty to thirty-five percent of the doctors in town won't take it," he said. "They want you to pay cash and then you can apply to the veterans ad-

ministration for a refund and wait 90 days.

"But, a lot of people can't afford to lay out that kind of cash. How are they supposed to live in the meantime?"

"This is everybody's problem," Cintron said. "It's not my problem. My God, somebody has to help them. They helped us."

He said many local veterans have been forced to travel to Orlando's V.A. clinic for medical treatment.

In addition to the convenience the new clinic offers veterans, Cintron, who is retired, is on

hand to help patients fill out the often complicated V.A. forms for payment of benefits.

Two Orlando doctors traveled to the Sanford post to provide treatment. On Mondays, a heart specialist complete with cardiograph machine works at the clinic.

On Thursdays, a general practitioner complete with a portable X-ray machine works at the clinic. There is also a social worker on hand Thurs-

days to handle personal problems.

The clinic's hours vary, but generally they are open from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. or until the doctors are done with their work.

Cintron said the clinic is open to anyone and the fee is about the same as one would pay at any doctor's office. However, he said if someone was unable

to pay, he would pay for it.

Nothing is impossible in this life," he said.

SECA employees fall into three categories depending upon the number of months they work—10, 11 or 12.

In the 10-month category: A first year, 10-month aide will be increased from \$4,735 to \$4,874. An aide with four years' experience will be increased from \$5,283 to \$5,397. An aide with nine years' experience will receive an increase from \$5,925 to \$6,039.

School Board, Clerks Approve Pact For 400

School district clerical workers and the Seminole County School Board have reached agreement on a new contract, bringing to an end six months of negotiations marred by the clerical association's internal strife.

The agreement which affects about 400 workers is retroactive to Aug. 1 and was greeted with applause by the approximately 30 workers who had gathered Wednesday at Lyman High School's library.

The contract still has to be approved by the general membership of Seminole Educational Clerical Association (SECA) as well as the school board.

If ratified, it would be the last of the four employee associations to successfully bargain a contract.

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Once they were foes — heading opposing factions trying to represent SECA in school board negotiations. But all that changed Wednesday evening when a contract was approved and Sally Harvey (left) and Ann Finch shared the happy moment.

with four-years' experience will receive an increase from \$7,083 to \$7,413 while a secretary with nine years' experience will go from \$8,583 to \$8,938.

In the current school budget, \$1,028,000 has been allocated for clerical workers' salaries compared to \$1,530,000 last year, according to Roger Harris, assistant superintendent for budget and finance.

The last negotiations on Oct. 24 stalled when both sides could not agree and the school board declared an impasse while the SECA side said it would ask for

a federal mediator. School Board negotiator Ernest Crowley had planned to meet with SECA in early November, but on the advice of the board attorney the decision was changed because there were two groups claiming to represent SECA.

However, this week representatives from the two SECA factions got together and asked the school board for another negotiating session and the board agreed. Throughout the six months of

negotiations, the school board was held for one six-month period as an economy move by a former city council, but was restored after numerous complaints by residents.

"I'm sure it will be coming up at the next meeting," Grant said, "and I look for 600 to 650 names on the petitions. The residents deserve the best service we can give them for the money they pay. Committee member Larry Goldberg, who along with representatives from the two SECA factions voted to halt the trash collection, has called the meeting to the city "negotiations." 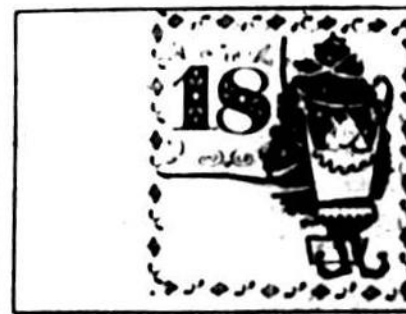
At the Oct. 5, meeting the committee voted to spend \$500 to replace the engine in the trash truck and it was repaired.

Petitions Circulated In Longwood Over Trash Pickup

City trash collection, scheduled to be dropped after Dec. 28, is far from a dead issue in Longwood, according to interim City Administrator David Cheary.

"I have already received a couple of petitions asking that it be continued and the petitions have asked to be on the agenda at Mayor's meeting," he said. "I'm prepared to go either way."

Action taken Nov. 13 by the city commission to discontinue the city trash collection after more than 50 years, became an issue in Cheary's recent election to office — a Russell Grant and Stephen Barton — credited their opposition to stopping the service the important factor in their victory.

"Every place I went in the city the people said the same thing,"

said Barton after Tuesday's win. "The people told me trash collection is one service where they can see what their taxes are being used for."

Notions were mailed out with the December water bills informing the residents that city crews would no longer collect

trash as of Jan. 1.

The city has been investigating the option of granting a single garbage collection franchise in the city to a company that would also provide trash pickup. There are several private firms operating in the city at present, some of which provide trash

pickup to customers.

"I found that one of the concerns when I went around campaigning was that they have their own garbage companies and they want to keep it that way," said Grant. "I don't see any way we can franchise it. I don't think the people would put up with it."

According to former councilman Perry White, there are five petitions circulating in different sections of the city stating "We don't want to discontinue free trash collection at the city after 60 years and don't want franchise garbage service."

"But a one has returned to me," he added. "This election came out the way it did because of the trash issue. We've got to change some rules. We'll find out Monday as John Crystal of Orlando will be asked to be on the agenda to present the petitions."

"The whole city is disturbed. This is a service we pay for with our taxes. They had \$5,000 in the contingency fund for trash collection and I see no reason to discontinue it," said White. "The city is well off."

During the years it has operated in the city, the trash collection was halted for one six-month period as an economy move by a former city council, but was restored after numerous complaints by residents.

"I'm sure it will be coming up at the next meeting," Grant said, "and I look for 600 to 650 names on the petitions. The residents deserve the best service we can give them for the money they pay. There is no way we can get rid of the trash truck as we have got to have something to keep our streets clean anyway."

negotiating, allegations of such labor practices were filed with the Public Employees Relations Commission. After the contract was signed, the SECA side agreed to drop all the suits it has filed.
The only suit that will remain is violation of the committee law charge which has been filed by Gene Grossman, executive director of the Seminoles Education Association (SEA).
Grossman filed the charge after the school board team and a SECA team met in mid-August and signed a contract.
Grossman contends in his suit that no notice was given of the meeting and that violation of state statute law.
Grossman said Wednesday he will continue to pressure his suit "in other instances in the county will know that any negotiations will be held in the middle."

High Schools: High Score

More students at each of Seminole County's five high schools passed the state standard test than ever before, with 82 percent passing the math section, up two and seven percent respectively from last year.
Earlier this week school district officials released overall county results which showed that Seminole County students did better on the tests this year.
These over-all results showed 59 percent of all students passed the test, an increase from 55 percent last year. The increase in the passing rate was attributed to remediation given to students last year when they became 11th graders. "We gave remediation to 10th graders who were identified as high risk as well as giving remediation to 11th graders for six weeks at the beginning of this year," according to Dan Dege.

Double-Tax Panel Kicks Off Mission

The double-taxation committee of the Council of Local Governments in Seminole County held its organizational meeting Wednesday night, elected officers, set a meeting for next Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in Altamonte Springs and asked the county and each of the county's seven cities for copies of their budgets for the 1979-80 fiscal year.
County Commissioner Robert French, chairman of the council, offered all possible aid to the committee from county government and its staff. Councilmember Bill Orler said the staff of his city also stands ready to help.
The committee is to determine in its study the areas of double taxation in county government, using as guidelines the state law on double taxation and a recent Florida Supreme Court decision acknowledging that the issue does exist.
Double taxation is where residents of municipalities are taxed by county government for services they do not receive or do not receive to the same extent as residents of the unincorporated areas.
The officers, chosen by the committee members, are the three delegates of the county commission: B.D. Simpson, Longwood real estate broker and member of the Seminole County Port Authority, chairman; Jan LaRba, chairman of the Seminole County League of Civic Associations, vice chairman; and Tom DeWolf, Orlando attorney and legal counsel for the Seminole County Republican Executive Committee, secretary.
Other members of the committee are: Sanford City Manager W.E. Knowles; Acting

Tax Wolves Avoided, But Only Temporarily

The purchase by a business associate of entrepreneur Glenn Turner of tax certificates for the 1973, 1974 and 1975 tax years will keep the wolves away from the Turner backdoor door — but only for six months.
In June 1978 a 1977 tax certificate for the 1978 tax year of \$5,121.76 plus accrued interest, owned by a Harold Merz, can be used by Merz to force sale of the turnkey backdoor door owned by Turner and other tax certificates for the 1973, 1974 and 1975 tax years. Merz's name, according to public records in the Seminole County Tax Collector Trey Ray's office.
The backdoor and its site and one-half acre (half of the land is submerged in the lake) is included within the property on which the tax certificates were issued. The only access to this particular parcel is by water, according to the records.
George Blackmore, an officer in Nature's World, Casselberry, and a business associate of Turner, paid \$23,861.49 in charges to the county for the tax certificates for the 1973, 1974 and 1975 tax years to the past few days in his wife, Vita name. The Blackmores live at 228 Business Ave., Altamonte Springs.
If Merz, whose address does not appear on the public record, wishes to force sale in June, he would have to pay for the three years' certificates owned by Mrs. Blackmore and taxes for 1977 and 1978, estimated to total \$40,000 to \$45,000, according to a spokesman in Ray's office.
Turner has been claiming, according to Seminole Property Appraiser Terry Gombel's office, that he owns the property on which the tax certificates do not involve the partially built Turner park as adjacent property. — DONNA ETTES.

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Let's Zero In On Key Issues

One additional trip to the polls is now needed for voters in Sanford and Lake Mary. The trip is planned for Dec. 19 when the two municipalities hold their run-off elections.

In Sanford, incumbent City Commissioner A. A. McClanahan, who garnered more votes than any of his challengers — but not enough to avoid a second go-round — will be facing David Farr who squeaked past Ned Yancy by a scant seven votes Tuesday.

In Lake Mary, Bill Smathers and Francis Mark will be meeting head-to-head for a seat on city council.

We congratulate all four gentlemen (as we do all the other winners from Tuesday in Longwood and Casselberry).

And we commended all the candidates for taking the high road in the just-completed campaign and avoiding the temptation for the campaign to evolve into a personality-name-calling contest. As Mr. Yancy observed following his losing effort in Sanford: "I think it was a very clean campaign. Everything was according to Hoyle."

But at the same time we encourage them and we beseech them.

We encourage them to use this occasion — the next two weeks — to zero in meaningfully on pertinent issues, issues which deal with the quality of life of the people they seek to represent.

We beseech them to eschew the temptation of going over and over the ground that has been gone over and over — particularly in Sanford — as if it pertains to the operations of some of the city's governmental entities.

There are certainly enough key, significant, positive solid issues that can and should be addressed by the candidates and governing bodies they want to join.

We'll throw out just one — and it is one that pertains equally to both Sanford and Lake Mary: growth.

How are these two cities — either individually or, preferably, in concert, going to cope with the growth and expansion which we all know is coming closer and closer?

There is very little time for procrastination or delay. The issue, if not the actual growth, is upon us. And it must be dealt with — at the very least a game plan must be prepared.

If it is not, we shall be facing — after the fact — some of the same problems the sudden sprawl created for our neighbors in the southern end of Seminole County.

Or, how about suggestions on how best to work with the county governmental mechanism in these coming days of activity and expansion?

We encourage and beseech all the candidates to take advantage of the public forum they now can command between now and Dec. 19 to do their homework and come up with reasonable, feasible solutions, ideas and game plans.

And to let the people they are soliciting for votes know where they want their cities to go and how.

And then we encourage and beseech the voters themselves to come out just one more time to exercise their precious franchise.

For, as we have said earlier in this space, it is elections that are made in the local city hall that affect each of us most forcefully and significantly as to the quality and quantity of life we can expect.

Budget Paring Outline

WASHINGTON — The assembly uncontrollable growth of the federal budget clearly has emerged as one of the nation's most pressing problems. Until recently, however, none of the proposed solutions was both economically sound and politically feasible.

Rep. Ron Thorn, an exceptionally bright legislator from Georgia, Democrat, has developed a "correct-and-older" plan that offers the promise of true budget discipline for the first time in several decades.

The "correct" is a series of reductions in projected income taxes, averaging 1 percent annually, in every year from 1980 through 1983. That translates into an additional \$9 billion in 1980, \$20 billion in 1981, \$45 billion in 1982 and \$60 billion in 1983.

The "older" is a trio of stringent requirements that would be a mandatory prerequisite to these tax cuts:

- Total spending on the part of the federal government, after being adjusted for inflation, could grow at a rate no higher than 1 percent a year.
- Total federal outlays, which now average for approximately 23.5 percent of the Gross National Product, would have to drop to 21 percent in 1980, 20.5 percent in 1981, 20 percent in 1982 and 19.5 percent in 1983.
- Beginning in 1982, the federal budget would be balanced. (According to Thorn, conservative generally agree that 1982 is the earliest feasible date to achieve a balanced budget.)

Thorn's proposal first surfaced in the closing days of the recently adjourned Congress, but it received little public attention until the week before last.

The unprecedented approach was considered and approved overwhelmingly by both the House (where the vote was 390-13) and the Senate (where it passed 68-37) but it never was incorporated into this year's omnibus revision of the tax code.

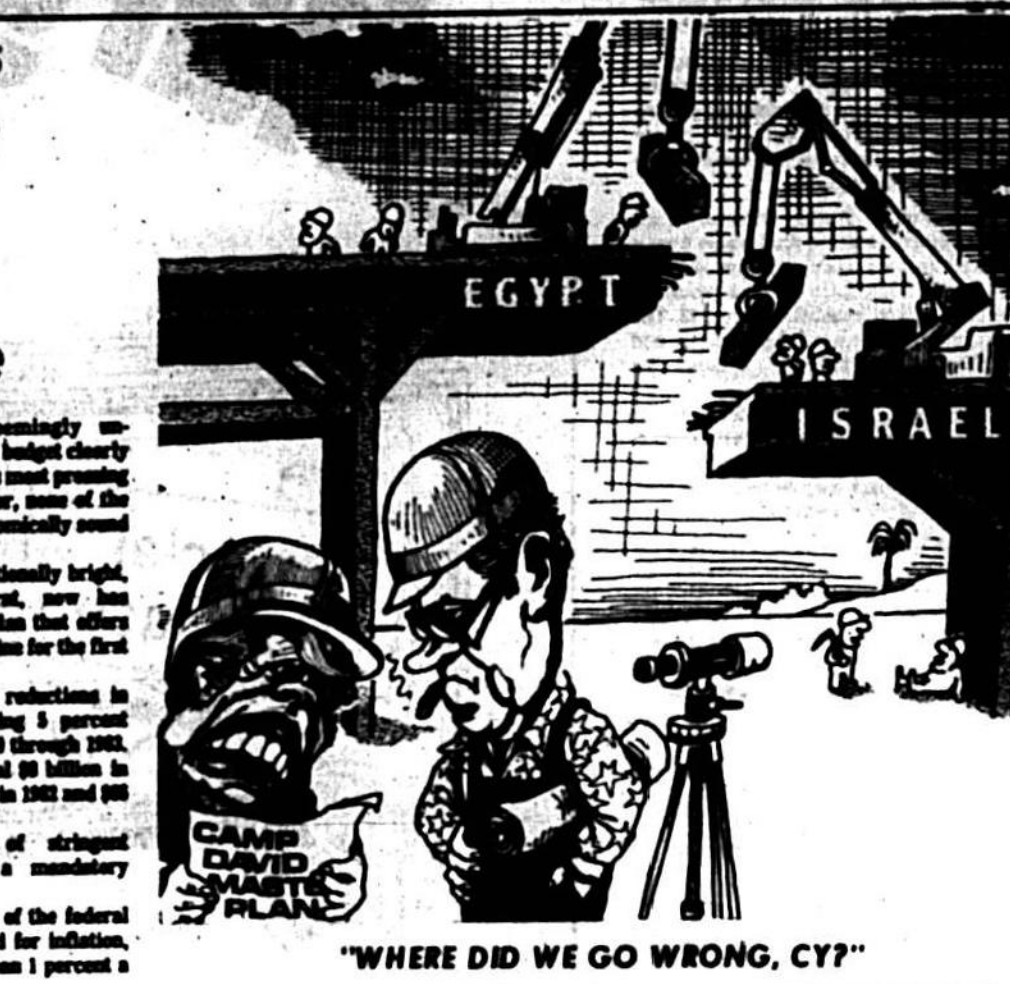
The memo for killing Thorn's plan was with the joint House-Senate conference committee charged with resolving the differences between the two bills approved by the two chambers.

The conference committee was dominated by the leaders of the two major parties with jurisdiction over tax legislation, the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee.

Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., chairman of the Senate committee, offered restrained support of the Thorn proposal during the Senate's floor debate. But Long's lukewarm endorsement to "see what we can work out in conference" was the signal to voters elsewhere of the only legislator that he probably would vote to kill the legislation behind the scenes.

Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., chairman of the House committee, made no effort to dispense his healthy support of the proposal, although it is the House floor on "a 100-hour effort" which could drive it right into the depths of a recession.

Long, Ullman and their colleagues on the conference committee threaten the will of both houses of Congress through legislative sleight-of-hand that replaced Thorn's very specific language with a vague, masterful substitute.

Nostalgia On The Block

They sectioned off bits and pieces of the public July Garland the other day.

Came to me of her personal possessions, including from the completely ordinary (reading glasses) to the elegantly costly (a 1932 Mercedes-Benz, \$6,000), went on the block in Beverly Hills in what could be developing into an annual happening in nostalgia. Last year, Joan Crawford's effects were similarly disposed of in New York.

The catalog items ranged from the significant in a long and honorable public career to the trivial odds and ends of an individual life, the latter an occasion bringing higher prices than the former. The star's very own "War of Wits" script brought \$1,500, the musical arrangement of "Over the Rainbow" \$1,500 and a script of "A Star is Born" \$700.

At the other end of the scale, a pair of loaded dice, a gift from costume designer Humphrey Bogart, went for \$2,500 and a pair of false eyelashes for \$25. (Joan Crawford's said for \$200, but that was for a full gram.)

All told, the lot brought in a quarter of a million dollars — a quantum leap over the Crawford gross of \$40,000. To those not moved to buy, the items were sold at a discount. The items may seem like a lot of money to be dropped into nostalgia. But as the auctioneer (who had hoped the total might hit half a million) noted, there is no way of setting a price on that particular commodity.

The several hundred buyers were for the most part dedicated Garland fans, with a sprinkling of commercial dealers in memorabilia.

They were there, some told reporters, to get "a piece" of July Garland.

Well, perhaps they did. At least of a July Garland personally. But if public personality is as much an artifact as the false eyelashes and such artifacts associated with it, then the real prize is not.

The items were sold in bits and pieces. And those who may think that paying a price for nostalgia is the same as buying into it are only wasting their money.

A Test For Sen. Byrd

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republican gains in the Senate will put Democratic Leader Robert Byrd's talents as a compromiser to their greatest test if any change is to be made in the Senate's ability to stop bills from being talked to death.

The filibuster is a time-honored but-often-undervalued majority apparatus that is the floor to talk at length to block legislation from coming to a vote, regardless of whether the bill has enough votes to pass.

To deal with the filibuster, the Senate in 1917 adopted a procedure — known as cloture — to limit debate on a bill to a specified number of hours. The Senate agreed in a motion to amend the bill to change it to 30 hours.

The concept behind cloture is simple. After the Senate agreed in a motion to amend the bill, the bill is then considered the sole business before the Senate and each senator is limited to one hour of additional talking time. Eventually, the opponents will use up their allotted time and the bill is then voted on.

But in recent years, the late parliamentarian genius Sen. James Allan, D-Ala., found a way to keep cloture from doing what it was intended to do: it opponents were rarely determined to stop a bill.

Carter's His Own Inflation Saboteur

WASHINGTON — President Carter is being his highly publicized anti-inflation campaign because of some highly unpublicized activities. And if the president wants to identify the chief saboteur, he need only look to the nearest mirror.

The fact is that just about everything Carter has done — or not done — on the economic front has added to the confusion in his own inflation. The confusion of course, are the American people, who as taxpayers and consumers, but the bill for every member their commander-in-chief makes.

Here are some of the factors that have been just because of ignorance, indifference or lack of concern on the part of the economic leadership in the White House:

- Government Spending. Federal budget deficits are the largest single cause of the inflation that is plaguing the economy. The amount of government spending has increased at a rate that is well beyond what the private sector can absorb. The government's share of the total product has increased from 16 percent in 1960 to 24 percent in 1978.
- Money Printing. The Federal Reserve has been printing money at a rate that is well beyond what the economy can absorb. The money supply has increased from \$100 billion in 1960 to \$400 billion in 1978.
- Tax Cuts. The Tax Reform Act of 1975 cut taxes by \$100 billion a year. This has led to a large increase in government spending and a large increase in the money supply.
- Wage Controls. The Emergency Economic Control Act of 1973 put a temporary freeze on wages and prices. This led to a large increase in unemployment and a large increase in inflation.
- Energy Policy. The Energy Policy Act of 1974 led to a large increase in energy prices and a large increase in inflation.
- Trade Policy. The Trade Expansion Act of 1974 led to a large increase in trade and a large increase in inflation.

DEAR DR. LAMB—My son died in 1961 at 26. The doctor said he had a tumor of the adrenal gland. It was a pheochromocytoma. My son was a doctor, age 26, who lives in Australia. I wonder if he may have a pheochromocytoma. Is it hereditary? What is the prognosis? I would appreciate your information.



DEAR READER—A pheochromocytoma is a tumor of the sympathetic nervous system, that part of your autonomic (automatic) nervous system that controls the internal organs. Most of these are in the adrenal gland, the small endocrine gland at the top of each kidney. The tumor of this gland is made up of cells that are in the autonomic nervous system. This is the major source of adrenaline for the body. The large number of these cells in the adrenal gland is why so many of the tumors are located there.

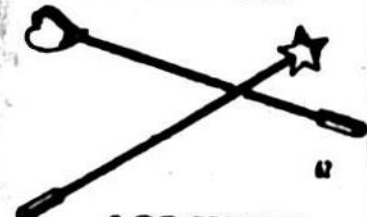

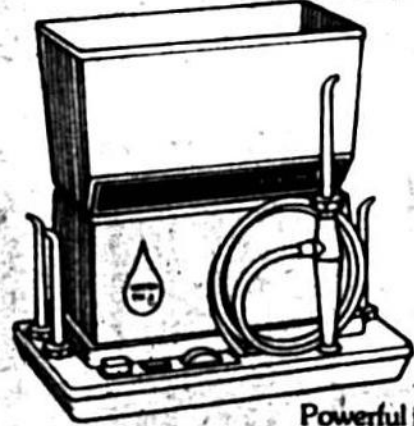

New regulations in the federally funded Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) program to become effective in January could eliminate the jobs of some participants, including Winter Springs City Planner Dick Rozansky and Lake Mary City Planner Reggie Alford on Jan. 31.

Frank Powell, supervisor controller with the Seminole County office, said today persons employed under CETA and being paid \$10,000 annually prior to Oct. 1 could receive a supplement to his salary of up to \$1,000 from the employer's account.

But if the supplement placed the salary over \$11,000 annually, those employees must be terminated from the program prior to Jan. 31.

More dates were added to Rozansky's job earlier this year by the city. His salary including the \$10,000 now is \$11,200 and he is due for another five percent increase at the end of this month, according to Winter Springs City Clerk Mary Norton.

Meanwhile in Lake Mary, Alford's \$10,000 CETA

primary reason for making Pearson's removal. Pearson reportedly forgot to schedule meetings, contact officials when requested and keep minutes of council meetings up to date, according to members of the council.

Pearson said he was aware of council dissatisfaction. "I expected some dissatisfaction, but it's not my nature to do office politically," said Pearson. Specifically, Pearson said he knew of "gripes" about the minutes.

"I don't think anybody who can satisfy this council," he said.

The clerk is contracted by the mayor with the amount of the council, according to city Attorney Gary Massey. However, the council does not have the power to fire the clerk. That power lies solely with the mayor.

Pearson said today he will work with Pearson on a number of projects.

"Big man either resign or I will appoint someone, whatever he wants," Swanson said today.

Golda Dies At 80



JERUSALEM (UPI) —

Former Prime Minister Golda Meir, the first lady of Israeli politics, died today in a Jerusalem hospital at the age of 80.

The state-run Israeli radio said Mrs. Meir died in the Hadassah Hospital—where she had been under treatment for pneumonia. She had spent most of the past four months in the hospital.

The state-run radio told Mrs. Meir died at 8:30 a.m. EST of a malignant blood disease.

The government announced it will hold a special mourning period Saturday night after the end of the Jewish Sabbath.

Mrs. Meir, born Golda Mabovitch in Kiev May 3, 1898, lived through Israel's entire history from its founding to its toughest year in 1973, when she was initially elected under Egypt's crowning of the canal into the Sinai and Syrian thrusts on the Golan Heights.

She served Israel in virtually every post — head of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, Israel's shadow government before independence.

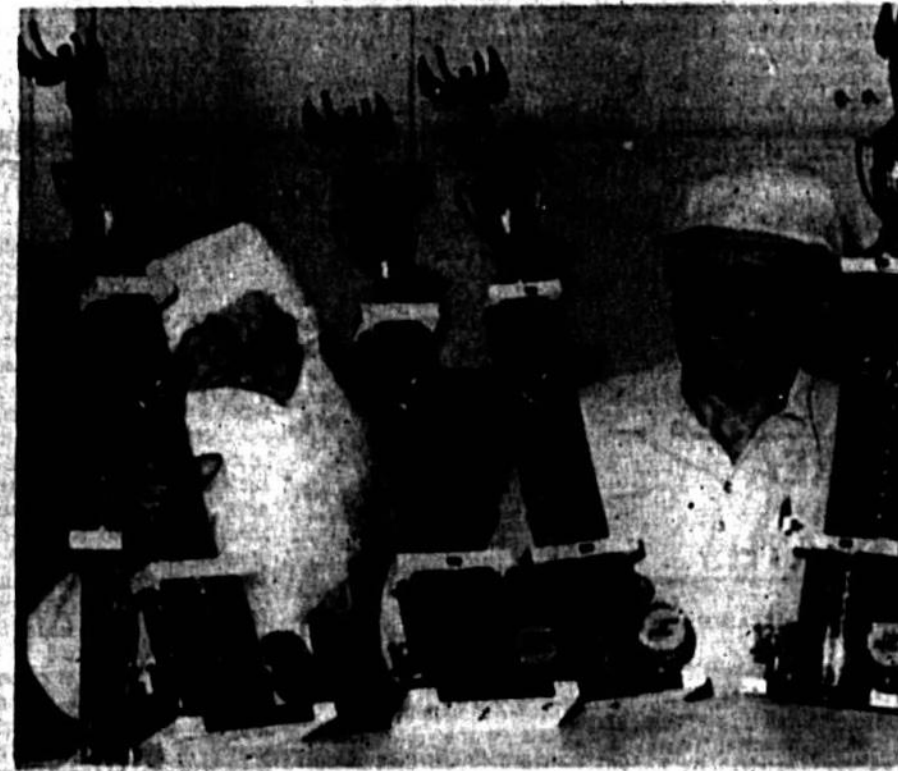
The Israeli radio said Deputy Prime Minister Yigal Yadin will hold a special meeting of the Israeli Cabinet Saturday night in mourning for the wily political grandmother who survived pogroms in Russia and poverty in Milwaukee to become prime minister of the Jewish state and steer it through its toughest war.

A Hadassah Hospital spokeswoman said that Mrs. Meir had "suffered for 12 or 13 years from malignant lymphoma and has received radiation and chemotherapy."

When Mrs. Meir died she was probably less than a month away from her dream of seeing the Jewish state sign its first treaty ever with an Arab state, taking a huge step to end its

"When he called two weeks ago to surprise me he said, 'This is someone you've been wanting to hear from for a long time,'" and we have just

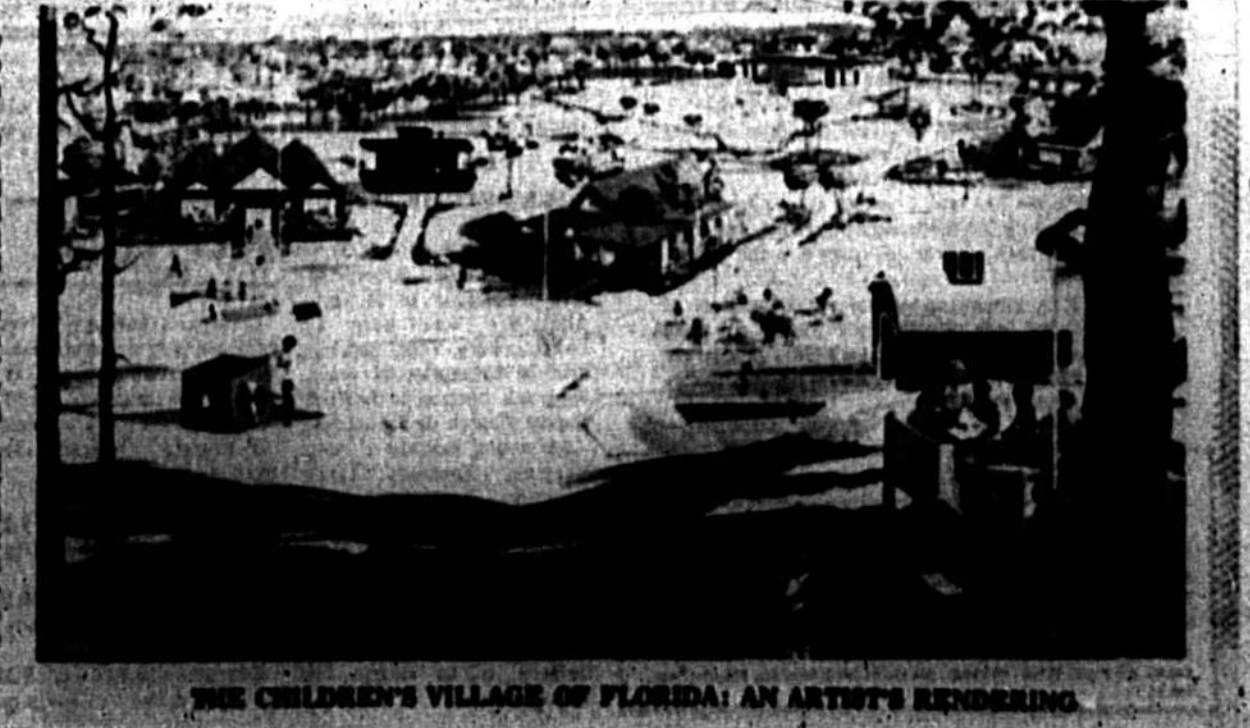
