## CABINET HEADS AGAIN DISCUSS DEBT QUESTION

Additional Pressure Is  
To Be Exerted Upon  
Foreign Debtors Of  
The United States

## J. S. Waiting For Belgian Message

Caillaux's Plan For  
Funding Debt Will  
Be Presented Today

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Further study was given by high administration officials today to means of exerting additional influence on the American government's foreign debtors. Secretaries Mel-

lon of the treasury, Kellogg of the state department and Commerce, the only three members of the American debt commission to be present in Washington, conferred for several hours on the general debt question.

Neither would discuss the meeting, which coincided however, with official disclosure that the government's move to direct communications from Belgium had taken the form of a direct communication to Brussels government. While assurance was given that the note Belgium, delivered late last night by Ambassador Phillips, was no suggestion of harsh treatment of the Belgian debt, it bore, nevertheless, the direct statement of this government believed to be the last step should be taken and final commitments made.

Whether the three secretaries took any action at their conference is not known. It is believed that the sending of similar communications to others of the debtors remained undisclosed until last night, when there were intimations that such thought was in the minds of those charged with obtaining payment of the vast loans made in the United States during and after the war. One official suggested that if such action were taken, the communications would be sent out simultaneously but at different times, according to their presentation to the different governments.

Time to Pay Has Come  
Such a course would be in line with the policy adhered to in the past to speed up funding of the debt. It is believed that the start toward a settlement since the stage of the debt funding act years ago, various channels have been utilized for transmission of the information that, in the government's opinion, the time for funding had arrived. With the knowledge that the note had been sent to Belgium, there were renewed reports that Belgium might attempt to transfer to Germany the responsibility for payment of at least a part of her debt. It is believed that the state department officials here do not expect the Belgian government to seek any part as reason for failure to remit to the United States.

## LAWYERS CLASH IN PICKING JURY FOR POISON TRIAL

Call For Veniremen Down In Second Panel of 100 Men; Detective Leaves To Aid In Search For Lost Witness

CHICAGO, May 26.—Selection of a jury to try William Darling Shepherd for the alleged murder of his millionaire foster-son, William Nelson McClintock, by administering subtle poisons and typhoid germs developed into a sharp battle of wits yesterday between Robert E. Crowe, the state's attorney, and William Scott Stewart, chief of defense counsel, but was a losing battle so far as filling the jury box was concerned.

The twelve men locked up last night included four juror and eleven in last Friday, one venireman tentatively passed by both sides two questioned by the prosecution and five who had not been examined by either side.

The call for veniremen was well down into the second special panel of 100 Monday night, a total of 73 having been excused from jury service because of prejudices against certain legal requirements or fixed opinions, 25 by agreement of prosecution and defense, eight by peremptory challenges by the state and two by defense peremptory challenges.

Late Monday a panel of four was tendered the defense and in the legal jockeying the state was forced to use two more of its 20 peremptory challenges and the defense one of its score. The net was a loss of two temporarily selected jurors chosen Saturday.

A detective from the state's attorney's office left tonight for Philadelphia to assist the police there in searching for Robert White, described as a fugitive, who was the defense as a much desired witness. Joseph P. Savage, assistant state's attorney, today received a special letter mailed in Philadelphia Saturday and purporting to have been written by White.

## No Words Received Of Polar Expedition; May Dispatch Relief

DISTRICTING BILL PASSED IN HOUSE BY 57 TO 25 VOTE

South Florida Members Lose Fight To Amend Measure; Two Hours of Bitter Debating Precede the Final Vote

TALLAHASSEE, May 26.—The senate reapportionment bill passed the house by a vote of 57 to 25, Monday afternoon just before adjournment. The bill came up for discussion at 3:30, and South Florida members led by Representative Taylor, of Highlands again fought unsuccessfully for two hours to amend the measure.

The South Florida members really lost their fight, by a single vote, several minutes before the bill was actually passed. The passage of the measure became a virtual certainty when a motion of Rep. Davis, of Leon, that the rules be waived and the bill be put on final reading, received the exact two-thirds vote required, the vote on this motion standing 52 to 28.

Rep. Taylor, as soon as the bill was called for consideration, offered an amendment. It would have made various changes in the senate bill, the one most objected to by its opponents being that it would "legislate Senator Hale out of office," by virtue of the change made in the district. Senators Hale and Elice produced the measure in the senate. The amendment, which he indicated, would be the last offered by the South Florida members. He quoted figures showing that the population of the state would have a population of 67 per cent greater than those of North Florida; the average population in the southern districts, he said, would be 17,000 greater than the average of those in the northern portion of the state.

"We have conceded your claim," Mr. Taylor said. "We are giving north Florida 22 senators, 24 in Florida and 22 in the rest of the state, for all they claim. We have conceded your claim, but we claim the right to apportion south Florida as we please. And I don't believe you will jam this abortive thing down our throats."

Representative Davis replied to Mr. Taylor by reading an editorial from the Tampa Tribune, giving its approval to the senate bill. The speaker stated that it seemed to him that the senatorial vote was in favor of the amendment, "is a legislative monster, I ask you, are you going to ignore the voice of the people, the voice of the constitution, the voice of your oath?"

Over one-half of the population, three-fourths of the wealth and two-thirds of the population of the state have been represented by the minority vote cast for the amendment to this bill. The people spoke at the polls, and over half of them have spoken on this floor, through their representatives.

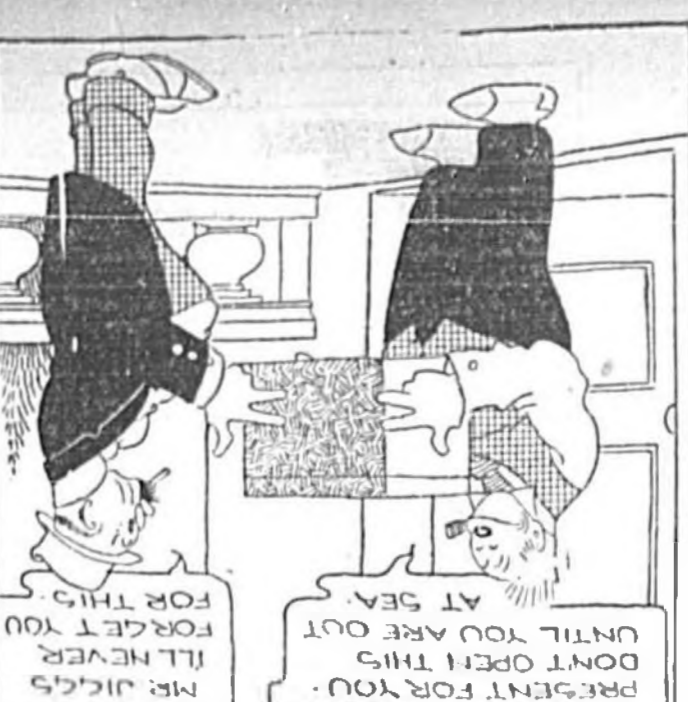
