Domestic Help For Citrus Crop Pledged By U. S

LAKELAND (UPI) - The U.S. Department of Labor is sending domestic laborers to help Florida citrusmen to harwest the crop, but citrus officials say this may not be the answer.

The Labor Department said its Bureau of Employment Security has recruited domestie workers to help pick fruit in Florida, and more than 500 workers are due in Florida by the end of this week.

Sen. Spessard Holland, meanwhile, informed Florida Citrus Mutual that Labor Seczetary Willard Wirtz told him the department will turn down Florida's request for permission to import an additional 500 foreign workers for the harvest.

State officials asked for the offshore workers last week, explaining that the unusually mild winter has hastened the maturing of early and mid season fruit and that if it is not picked, more of it than normal will be lost through droppage and growers also will lose money because of a decrease in the pounds-solids

Holland, however, and Wirtz indicated the government will pay part of the cost of on-the-job training for inexperienced pickers, making up the difference between what a worker might get and the federal minimum wage of \$1.25 per hour. A good picker ean make double this.

Robert W. Rutledge, Mutuml executive vice president, said the lack of training of domestic workers would slow down the picking too much. He sent a telegram to Wirtz

stating, "We still need an additional certification of 500 offshore laborers on a temporary basis."





Included in requests of the city will be legislation to permit the city to change its election time to the first Tuesday in December. By having separate 'election, commissioners feel they will be spared the disadvantage of having names of city candidates placed at the bottom of the ballot under a long list of national, state and county candi-

Commissioners also will ask for legislation boosting their salary schedule from the present \$50 per month salary and \$50 expenses to a straight \$150 a month salary with \$200 for the mayor.





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

Death Decrees

Capital punishment is slowly passing in this country, not so much from

abolition as from disuse. Nine states have now done away with 'it entirely-Alaska, Hawaii,' Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota, Rhode Island, Wisconsin and most recently, by referendum on Nov.

3. Oregon. Even among the 41 other states, and the federal government, the number of executions has dropped drastically. Last year's record, when 21 prisoners were put to death, was an all-time low. By contrast, 199 execu-

tions took place in 1935. The pros and cons of the value of capital punishment still arouse the passions not only of ordinary citizens but penologists, sociologists and other professionals. Advocates on both sides of the question cite evidence that the crime of murder increases, decreases, stays the same or bears no real relation to the existence or nonexistence of the death penalty.

It is likely that the question will never be settled statistically but only in the changing attitudes of men. The trend of history seems to be on the side of those who believe there must be a better way than the legal taking of lives to punish or prevent the illicit taking of other lives,



Lie Detectors **Reveal Traits** For Fire Jobs

By Kendrick Prazier DENVER (UPI) - Lie detectors, long used to screen police department applicants. are spreading into the fire departments in the Denver

Fire chiefs strating to use the polygraph say they hope to get better firemen by weeding out applicants with undesirable background traits.

The Lakewood Fire Protection District has been using the machines on applicants for three years. Saya Ralph Antonio, board chairman: "We're very satisfied with the results."

The Denver Fire Department plans to start using the He detector shortly. Says Cassio Frazzini, fire chief: "We hope to detect traits in advance to show he (the applicant) might not be the best man for the jub."

The Aurora Fire Department gave lie detector tests to prospective employes for the first time last fall. Says William H. Hawkins, chlef: "I think we will be giving a better overall test."

Frazzini says quiszing fireman applicants with a polygraph "seems to be a practice spreading throughout the

country." Undesirable traits hunted out by the electronic truth detectors range from "past associations" to "old back in furles."

Antonio says a test about three months ago revealed "from 5 to 10 per cent of the applicants showed trregular ser habits."

Behind Lakewnod's "lle-detector philosophy" are neveral purposes.

"Firemen have more opportunity for thefts than policemen," Antonio suys. "They enter hulldings after the ocrupants have fled, they wear haggy Nother and a fire situation is usually bectic.

"We give lie detector tests so we won't ever have to worry about looting. We want to protect ourselves and our men in advance from scan-

"We have a relatively new department at Lakewood, and we'd like to make it a model

So far polygraph tests for prospective firemen are muted in Colorado to the Lakewood, Autora and Denver de partments.

Not all Colorado fire chief commur with the lie detector enthusinsts.

Boulder Fire Chief George Morse put it this way: "I don't think we'll be influenced along that line. We give a very thorough oral test."

Polygraph tests are thorough without having an inquisition - like atmosphere about them, any others.

Each test costs \$15 and lasts one to two hours. They are given in the office of a private in detector firm and they start with a "pre-test." The applicant is asked to relax, told the questions he'll be asked and encouraged to volunteer in advance any infor mation he may not have divulged earlier.

"The pre-test is really the most valuable part of the sesnion," says Norm Gienker, director of personnel for Au-





Eight Million Cars Sales Picture For '65

DETROIT (UPI) - The automotive industry, although plagued with labor difficulties and fourth quarter parts shortages, ended its first 8 million-car sales year with predictions 1965 will be even

Top industry executives unanimously forecast more than 8 million cars, including imports, will be sold in the United States in 1986, marking the first time in history back-to-back 8 million cars have been recorded.

The final count for 1964 car sales won't be in until after the first of the year, but it will top the 8 million mark. And that milestone came despite strikes by the United Auto Workers at General Motors, Ford and American Mobors and parts shortages affecting all four U. S. car manufacturers.

Another record was the size of the settlement package between the industry in the UAW. The new three-year contracts will be worth from 54 to 57 cents an hour for each of the nearly 600,000 union members employed in the industry over the life of

Despite the lush agreements, the union waged a: 45day strike on national and local issues at GM, a twoweek strike over local contracts at Ford and a fourday work stoppage over the national contract at AMC.

The strike cut an estimated 675,000 units from the industry's production schedules and resulted in car shortages at the dealerships around the country. But the fourth quarter shortages were expected to cause an unprecedented first quarter demand for cars and spur sales next year. Optimism


