# Court Rules Mobile Trailers Subject To Double Taxation



**TALLAHASSEE (UPI)** — Mobile homes used primarily for housing and rarely on the public highways are subject to personal property taxes as well as a state license tag fee, the Supreme Court has ruled. The court issued the decision in a 4-3 split opinion, which went against several mobile

home owners in St. Johns County.

St. Johns Tax Assessor Percy Palethorpe levied personal property taxes ranging from \$7 to \$33 against the trailers, despite the fact the owners

bought \$13 license tags for their mobile homes.

They claimed that an act of the Legislature gave them the choice of submitting to personal property taxation or purchasing a house trailer tag,

but they were not required to pay both.

The high court, in an opinion written by Justice Richard Ervin, disagreed. Ervin's opinion said house trailers lose status as motor vehicles when

they are used primarily as lodging accommodations.

The court held constitutional property taxation trailers used "primarily as motor vehicle units and not otherwise."

The decision would exempt from the tax so-called travel trailers and smaller house trailers regularly used in

over-the-highway travel even though they were "incidentally and occasionally used to house

persons overnight while in transit or to house them for

short periods on holidays or vacations." The court left up to the tax assessor the determination whether a trailer was used pri-

marily for housing or for over-the-highway travel.

Agreeing with the majority opinion were Justices B. K. Roberts, Millard Caldwell and retired Justice T. Frank Hobson.

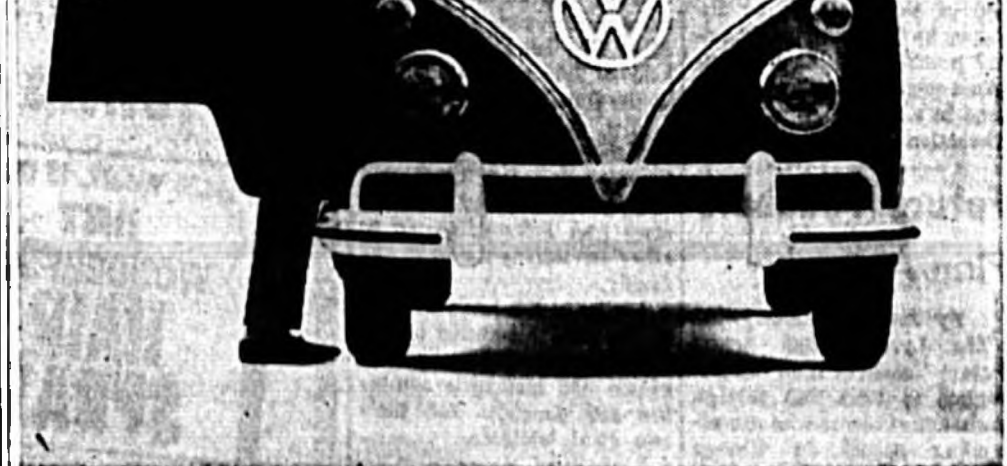

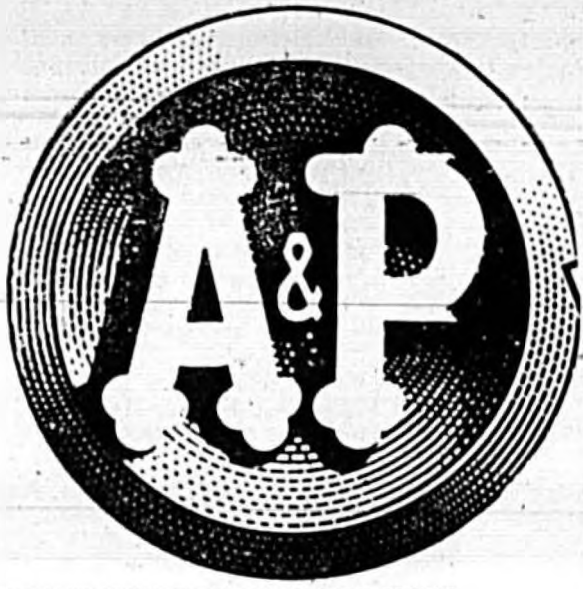
Basketball Star Recovers Use Of Arm Once Lost

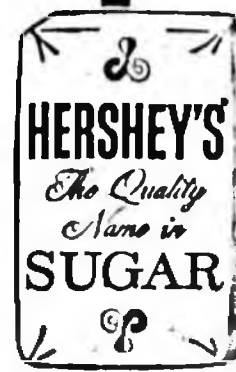

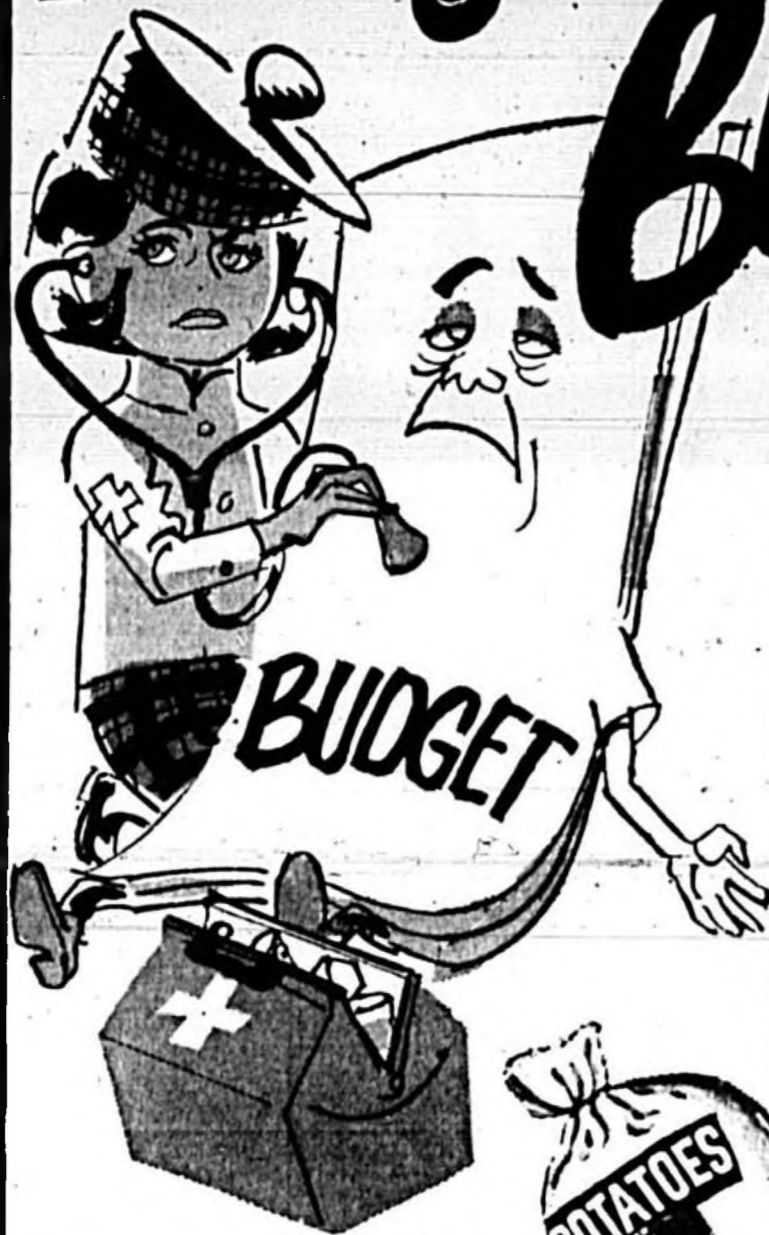

Aldrich said the following game was killed on the managed hunting areas: turkey 1,139, quail 18,624, squirrel 9,956, ducks 1,936, and wild hog 1,122.

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### Lie Detectors Reveal Traits For Fire Jobs

By Kendrick Frazier  
DENVER (UPI) — Lie detectors, long used to screen police department applicants, are spreading into the fire departments in the Denver area.

Fire chiefs strating to use the polygraph say they hope to get better firemen by weeding out applicants with undesirable background traits.

The Lakewood Fire Protection District has been using the machines on applicants for three years. Says Ralph Antonio, board chairman: "We're very satisfied with the results."

The Denver Fire Department plans to start using the lie detector shortly. Says Casio Frazzini, fire chief: "We hope to detect traits in advance to show the applicant might not be the best man for the job."

The Aurora Fire Department gave lie detector tests to prospective employees for the first time last fall. Says William H. Hawkins, chief: "I think we will be giving a better overall test."

Frazzini says quizzing fireman applicants with a polygraph "seems to be a practice spreading throughout the country."

Undesirable traits hunted out by the electronic truth detectors range from "past associations" to "old back injuries."

Antonio says a test about three months ago revealed "from 5 to 10 per cent of the applicants showed irregular sex habits."

Behind Lakewood's "lie-detector philosophy" are several purposes.

"Firemen have more opportunity for theft than policemen," Antonio says. "They enter buildings after the occupants have fled, they wear baggy clothes and a fire situation is usually hectic."

"We give lie detector tests so we won't ever have to worry about looting. We want to protect ourselves and our men in advance from scandal."

"We have a relatively new department at Lakewood, and we'd like to make it a model one."

So far polygraph tests for prospective firemen are limited in Colorado to the Lakewood, Aurora and Denver departments.

Not all Colorado fire chiefs concur with the lie detector enthusiasts.

Boilder Fire Chief George Moras put it this way: "I don't think we'll be influenced along that line. We give a very thorough oral test."

Polygraph tests are thorough without having an inquisition-like atmosphere about them, say others.

Each test costs \$18 and lasts one to two hours. They are given in the office of a private lie detector firm and they start with a "pre-test." The applicant is asked to relax, told the questions he'll be asked and encouraged to volunteer in advance any information he may not have divulged earlier.

"The pre-test is really the most valuable part of the session," says Norm Gieske, director of personnel for Aurora.

He says accepted applicants will not come to work with the idea they were mistreated. "In fact morale will be higher. The men will know they are working among a high-caliber group."

### Wright Sees Jobs Upped In State

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Industrial Commission chairman J. D. Wright Jr. said today the State Employment Service will step up efforts to increase job placements in Florida.

Wright said the service placed 245,823 persons during 1964, which was a decline of 17,863 from the all-time record set in 1963.

Wright said the commission would push to reverse the decline, which followed a nation-wide trend.

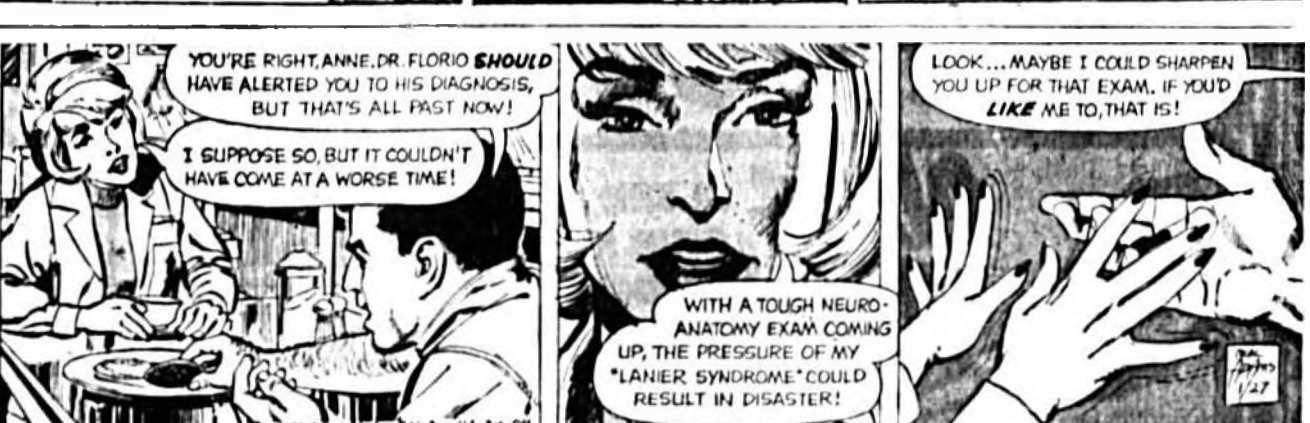
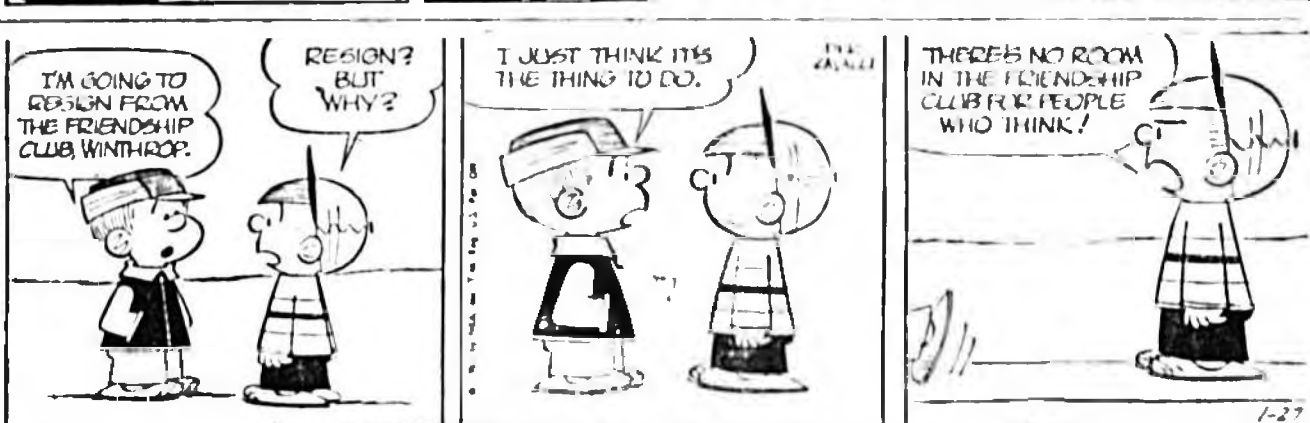
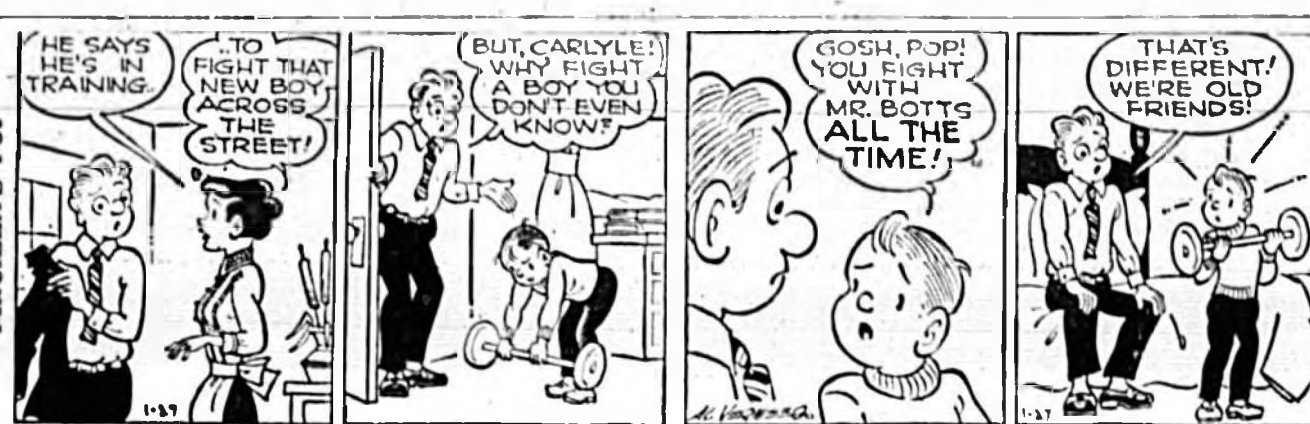

## Eight Million Cars Sales Picture For '65

DETROIT (UPI) — The automotive industry, although plagued with labor difficulties and fourth quarter parts shortages, ended its first 8 million-car sales year with predictions 1965 will be even better.

Top industry executives unanimously forecast more than 8 million cars, including imports, will be sold in the United States in 1965, marking the first time in history back-to-back 8 million cars have been recorded.

The final count for 1964 car sales won't be until after the first of the year, but it will top the 8 million mark. And that milestone came despite strikes by the United Auto Workers at General Motors, Ford and American Motors, and parts shortages affecting all four U. S. car manufacturers.

Another record was the size of the settlement package between the industry in the UAW. The new three-year contracts will be worth from 64 to 67 cents an hour for each of the nearly 600,000 union members employed in the industry over the life of the pacts.

Despite the lush agreements, the union waged a 45-day strike on national and local issues at GM, a two-week strike over local contracts at Ford and a four-day work stoppage over the national contract at AMC.

The strike cut an estimated 675,000 units from the industry's production schedules and resulted in car shortages at the dealerships around the country. But the fourth quarter shortages were expected to cause an unprecedented first quarter demand for cars and spur sales next year.

Optimism  
Henry Ford II, board chairman at Ford Motor Co., had the most optimistic prediction for 1965. He predicted car sales next year "may well be as high as 8.7 million," counting in nearly 600,000 imports. Ford estimated total 1964 car sales in the United States at 8.1 million and he said 1.4 million trucks will be sold both years, maybe more next year.

GM board chairman Fredrick G. Donner said 1964 car-truck sales totaled 9.4 million and predicted 1965 would be as good or better.

"Although the present period of business expansion has now continued for close to four years—one of the longest peacetime growth periods on record—most indicators point to further growth ahead," Donner said. "Assuming that this expectation is realized, there is every reason to anticipate that 1965 will be another good year for the automobile industry."

Chrysler President Lynn A. Townsend said the auto industry "is coming within shooting distance of its first 10 million unit year."

He pegged 1964 car sales at 8 million and truck sales at 1.4 million.

"There is a possibility, of course, that if recent trends continue, if conditions in the general economy during the coming year are as good as they promise to be, and if the country is spared from prolonged strikes and major international disturbances, 1965 could be the year when 10 million new cars and trucks will be sold at retail in the United States for the first time," Townsend said.

According to Roy Abernethy, American Motors president, 1964 put the auto industry on a new plateau. He predicted that reaching the 8 million mark in cars, although it was hit for the first time, was the start of a five-year trend. The industry will average better than 8 million car sales annually for the next five years with 45 million units sold in the 1965-69 period, he said.

Spending Programs  
To prepare for the expected auto boom in coming years, the industry has undertaken vast capital expenditure programs to expand carmaking facilities. For 1965, the Big Three of GM, Ford and Chrysler has set aside \$2.25 billion for expansion.

During 1964, the UAW negotiated with the industry what union president Walter P. Reuther described as "the most historic" contract in the history of industry labor-management relations.

Its main feature was a new early retirement program that called for retirement at age 60 with pension benefits up to \$400 a month. Other features were an additional week's vacation, two additional paid holidays, improved insurance benefits and contract language covering in-plant working conditions.

Cars took a new look in 1964. Ford introduced its sporty Mustang and it immediately caught fire on the sales floor. Sales for the year will surpass the quarter-million mark.

Chrysler followed with a sporty model of its own, the Barracuda. It also has been a good seller although not produced anywhere near the volume of the Mustang.

All four companies completely restyled most of their 1965 model offerings. The fastback, or sloping rear roofline, came into vogue. Cars came on clean lines with a minimum of chrome.

Buyer demand appeared to be continuing strong and the youth market more potent than ever.

And, as Donner said: "Thus, 1965 bids fair to be the fourth consecutive good year for the Free World automobile industry."

### Nuclear Testing On Short Notice

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.) said the United States is ready to start atmospheric nuclear testing on very short notice if any other nation violates the nuclear test ban treaty.

Jackson, chairman of the Senate House atomic energy committee's military applications subcommittee, said the present situation was "a very substantial improvement over our position at the time of the signing of the test ban treaty" nearly two years ago.

### Theater Garbs Ad Gimmick

DENVER (UPI) — A local theater took extreme precautions to offend no one during its current showing of the James Bond thriller, "Goldfinger."

The movie has a scene in which a nude woman is covered with gold paint. A statue of the woman, displayed outside the theater, is adorned on a gold halter and a pair of shorts.

### Rocket City May Resume Sales

TAMPA (UPI) — Director Carl Bertoch, of Florida's Installation Land Sales Board, says sales and development of Rocket City east of Orlando may be resumed in about a month.

The state's "watchdog" board suspended the operation of the All-State Development Corporation Jan. 19 because of its financial status.

Bertoch said, however, the state board is talking with two firms negotiating to buy the rights to the Rocket City development.
