But the home is not complete within itself. It must be fortified and supplemented by the church, the school and other forces in the community.

"Society cannot afford to contribute to the delinquency of its children by allowing spiritual guidance and social education to lag behind economic and scientific development," he declared.

He cited the need for correcting harmful or potentially harmful community conditions that lead children into delinquency, and pointed to the part that recreation can play in the conservation of youth.

The 4-H clubs not only provide recreation and a wholesome atmosphere but also help to train the girls and boys in everyday activities, in leadership and in good citizenship.

French Troops Are Killed In Hanoi Fighting

State Of Siege Proclaimed In Indo-China As Blum Prepares Statement

PARIS, Dec. 22—(AP)—French President Leon Blum told the national assembly today that the situation in Indo-China may grow worse in the next few weeks. Blum said that conditions are serious now, and that he was dispatching an armed warfare specialist, General Jacques le Clerc, to Indo-China. Blum said also that French troops have won part of Hanoi from the Indo-Chinese independent forces.

PARIS, Dec. 23—(AP)—The new French interim government headed by elderly Premier Leon Blum moved today to halt the native rebellion in French Indo-China. A state of siege was proclaimed in the worst trouble spots in that rich colonial possession of the Fourth Republic. This was announced by the French Press Agency in Paris, and confirmed by dispatches from Hanoi, capital of French Indo-China.

More than 200 French troops are said to have been killed or wounded in recent fighting with insurgent Viet-Namense forces in Hanoi, and a dispatch from there tells of a drastic warning to the natives. They were warned that any of them found carrying firearms and not wearing uniforms would be shot and that any house that fails to fly a white flag would be searched and that any houses from which shots are fired would be attacked by French forces. After the warning had been issued, French troops attacked native forces which had barricaded themselves in the city half-way past the day's end.

Authorities said 29 French civilians, including 11 women, had been killed in the battle.

Meanwhile, the people of France were tensely awaiting a policy statement on the troubled Indo-Chinese situation from Premier Blum.

HANOI, Dec. 23, (AP)—French military authorities said today that 29 French civilians were slain by Indo-Chinese independence forces in recent fighting in Hanoi, capital of French Indo-China. Eleven of the victims, said the French, were women. The French further claimed that the bodies of the 29 slain persons were brutally mutilated.

In addition, the French listed many other civilians as missing and perhaps dead in the Hanoi fighting.

French troops are said to have the situation well in hand in all towns in northern Indo-China, where fighting with the Viet-Namense has occurred. They said that mopping up operations were being carried out slowly in Hanoi in order to avoid unnecessary casualties and damage.

The French admitted the capture of the Pasteur Institute Building in Hanoi by the Viet-Namense. The French warden and his family were said to have been kidnaped.

Political Fight For Governorship Looms In Georgia

Tributes Pour In As Talmadge Is Laid To Rest In McRae, Ga.

ATLANTA, Dec. 23, (AP)—The death of Governor-elect Eugene Talmadge has thrown Georgia into a political feud which will be settled in the courts. The showdown will come Jan. 13 when the new general assembly convenes. Originally, the assembly was to declare Talmadge governor, but death removed the man with the red hair.

The new constitution provides that the lieutenant governor should succeed in the event of the governor's death. But it is hazy on what happens should death occur before inauguration.

Some argue that the legislature can choose between the two Democrats receiving the largest write-in vote, which would be Talmadge's son, Hermann, and James Carmichael. The ballots are sealed and the count won't be known until the legislature meets.

Carmichael has announced he won't serve. That might leave the field to Talmadge's son. However, some insist that Governor Ellis Arnall, bitter foe of Talmadge, will hold office until the courts decide the issue.

Meanwhile the body of the late Eugene Talmadge was laid to rest today in the small-town cemetery where he wished to be buried—among his friends.

The three-times governor, who was elected to serve a fourth term, but didn't quite make the inauguration, was viewed by ten thousand people yesterday as he lay in state in the Georgia State Capitol in Atlanta. Ten thousand more attended the funeral in McRae, Ga., today, where the funeral services were held this afternoon at 2:00 o'clock at the McRae Baptist Church with the burial in the Oak Grove cemetery.

From all over Georgia and the South tributes poured in to the man who so strongly advocated white supremacy. Thousands of telegrams expressing sympathy lined the McRae telegraph office. Two freight cars of flowers have already arrived with others pouring in steadily.

The Georgia Capitol building was closed today and all business in McRae was halted for the funeral.

No Clues Yet Discovered To Death Driver

Two Sanford Men Are Killed When Black Sedan Forces Them Off Paola Highway

No further information as to the cause of the overturning of a furniture truck Friday afternoon on the Country Club road, causing the deaths of two occupants, Charles McClung, of Sanford, the driver, and Lewis Adney Crocker, 21 of Lake Mary, a passenger, has yet been obtained. L. C. Bender, state highway patrolman, who investigated the accident, announced this morning.

Patrolman Bender stated that he had been informed by the three survivors of the accident that a black sedan, heading toward the Sanford-bound truck, had forced it off the road, causing it to turn completely over and then a half-ton, after McClung had swerved sharply to avoid a collision at the turn of the road by the home of F. F. Lindquist.

Floyd Sjoblom, 17 year old Lake Mary youth, was the worst injured of the survivors, having abrasions on the head and arms. He was sent home from the hospital where he had been taken by F. M. English, Sanford doctor, who happened on the scene of the accident. Sjoblom was resting comfortably in bed, and he reported that Earl Griffin, 17, of Lake Mary, one of the three passengers sitting in the back of the truck amid a load of furniture, had been only slightly injured.

Millard Rice, partner of Mr. McClung in the furniture refinishing business in Lake Mary, was riding in the cab of the truck, and was bumped about the head and shoulders and his arms were skinned, but was not seriously injured.

Charles McClung, Navy veteran and son-in-law of City Attorney Fred H. Wilson and brother-in-law of W. H. Williams, died at Fernand-Laughton Memorial Hospital at 8:30 o'clock Friday evening from internal injuries. Lewis Crocker, whose skull had been fractured, according to his physician, Dr. C. L. Parks, did not regain consciousness, and died at 7:30 o'clock Saturday morning at the hospital. Mr. McClung was reported to have been on his feet for some minutes after the accident, and tried to help the others. The truck was a 1942 half-ton Chevrolet. It was loaded with furniture in Lake Mary and had set out for Sanford with the three passengers aboard.

Funeral services for Mr. McClung were held Sunday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock at the First Methodist Church with the Rev. J. E. McKinnis officiating. Burial was in Evergreen cemetery. Pallbearers were Richard Deas, R. A. Newman, Jr., Jack Hall, John Higgins, Tom Holt and Millard Rice.

A resident of Sanford for the past 10 years, Mr. McClung lived at 1900 Sanford Avenue. He was employed at the Sanford shipyard in the Navy during World War II. He is survived by the wife, Frances Wilson McClung, the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur M. McClung of Wallace, N. C., four sisters, Mrs. W. R. Williams of Sanford, Mrs. C. C. Brown and Mrs. Herbert Fisher, both of Raleigh, N. C., Mrs. Harry Bizzele of Charlotte, N. C., and three brothers, A. H. McClung of Durham, N. C., B. N. McClung of DeLand, and James Hall McClung of Floral City.

Funeral services for Lewis Adney Crocker were held at 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the Community Church in Lake Mary. Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery. He was born in Holo-paw, July 11, 1925, and had lived for the past eight and a half years in Lake Mary. He is survived by the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur E. Crocker of Lake Mary; one brother, Roger, of Lake Mary; and a grandfather, M. J. Berry of Bushnell.

Duranty Approves Byrnes' Policy Toward Russia

The "firm but not tough" policy of Secretary of State Byrnes toward Russia, was yesterday termed a "very swell job" by Walter Duranty, who spent 21 years in Russia as a newspaper correspondent, and who with H. R. Knickerbocker, another veteran resident correspondent, recently concluded a long series of debates on the Russian question which began at Amadori, Fla., and ended at Sanford Methodist College in Lakeland last Tuesday evening.

Mr. Duranty, who is now enjoying a rest at the Mayfair Inn, has lived for the past several years in Los Angeles, Calif. In December, 1943, he was ill from pneumonia contracted while in Milwaukee, but said that he has now entirely recovered.

One of the first correspondents admitted into Russia after the Revolution, he was resident correspondent for the New York Times there from 1921 until 1934. Later he did free lance writing, wrote a number of books and won the Pulitzer journalistic prize. His in Liverpool, England, he was educated at Harrow and Bedford and won a scholarship to Cambridge.

He served as a war correspondent in World War I. One of Russia's greatest needs at present, he pointed out, is new agricultural machinery to replace that destroyed by the Germans, who when they realized they were being dined out by the Russians, who were also much destroyed in Stalingrad, which, when he first saw it in 1921, had about 60,000 people and which with its factories, ship building concerns and food canning plants, grew to more than 350,000 population by the end of 20 years.

He declared the housing problem in Russia is still critical as more than 7,000,000 homes were destroyed by the Germans. The whole struggle in Russia, he pointed out, has been to educate the people. Withdrawal of more than 3,000,000 white Russians after the revolution, many of whom were well educated, made it more difficult to get good teachers.

Russia is the best grain producing country in the world, he said, provided the machinery in available to carry on. During peace time the Russians have produced more than 100 million tons of grain a year. Workmen are free to choose which occupation they like on collective farms, get double pay for overtime after a seven hour day of work, and can secure food, furniture, clothes as well as cash in pay. Mr. Duranty declared. Freedom of religion for all sects is now allowed, he declared.

Many Conscientious Objectors Are Seen Affected By Ruling; New Lewis Appeal

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The United States Supreme Court handed down two decisions today which may affect scores of conscientious objectors who were found guilty of violating the draft law. It reversed the convictions of two Jehovah's Witnesses for alleged violations. The nation's highest tribunal found that the men were denied proper trials by lower courts. The lower courts had refused to let the defense challenge the draft classifications of the defendants.

In other business today, the Supreme Court agreed to hear a new appeal by the United Mine Workers and John L. Lewis. The appeal questioned the validity of the preliminary injunction issued against the union and its leaders during the recent soft coal strike. It will be heard on Jan. 11, when the court hears other issues in the case.

In another decision affecting labor, the court agreed to rule on two cases involving the question of whether plant guards are covered by the National Labor Relations Act. The labor board has appealed decisions of lower courts that the guards are not covered by the act. The companies involved in the cases are the Jones and Laughlin Steel Corporation and E. C. Atkins and Company.

The Supreme Court also refused to review a voter's unsuccessful suit against collection of a poll tax in Tennessee. He voter J. D. Johnson, of Greene County, Tennessee, had asked the high tribunal to rule that the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting was invalid under the U. S. Constitution.

Dyer, of Palmetto, Fla., and Mrs. H. E. Hollenbeck of Jacksonville. Her husband was a graduate of Christie, Pa. 12 grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.
