Agent Of CAA Says Air Lines Shirking Duty

Declares Responsibility For Airplane Crashes Should Be In Companies' Hands

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP)—The Civil Aeronautics Administration claimed today that civilian air lines should take more responsibility for preventing plane crashes.

Meanwhile, the president of the Douglas Aircraft Company, Donald W. Douglas, said nothing should be allowed to interfere with the steady development of safety in aviation.

He did not explain the differences to which he referred. In Washington, Rep. Carl Hinshaw of California revived today his bill to ask James M. Lusk, chairman of the Civil Aeronautics board, why the air navigation aids developed during the war are not in general use.

3rd DDT Malaria Control Spraying Will Start Soon

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 23, (Special) Plans for a third, house-to-house DDT spraying program for malaria control in Florida counties, where a malaria hazard has been known to exist, are fast being whipped into shape by the State Board of Health.

This year, however, according to John Mulrennan, director of malaria control, in order for a county to be eligible for the service, that county will have to furnish the labor required in applying the spray. The State Board of Health will furnish the DDT, spraying and automobile equipment and supervision for putting the operation into effect. Heretofore, the program has been paid for entirely by funds allocated to the state health agency, by U. S. Public Health Service. Now, because of a shortage of money for so effective and so popular, it is a local health problem, it is felt that local people should assume a portion of the responsibility.

This house-to-house spraying program was begun by the State health department two years ago as a measure to control malaria-carrying mosquitos. It has proven so effective and so popular, it is felt that it should be carried out each year. Last year, alone, 59,942 houses were sprayed in 21 counties.

Under the new set-up all the houses will be eligible for a good going-over with DDT. Whereas, in the past, only houses in areas where there was a density of malaria mosquitos were sprayed. This is with the exception of those cities having a population of 1,000 or more. In those cities, a biennial program will be instituted if a malaria hazard is present, here, too, the cities are to furnish the labor.

Mr. Mulrennan pointed out that a house properly sprayed with a residual DDT remains effective in the control of many household pests besides the malaria-carrying mosquitos, for a long period of time. Flies, fleas, bed bugs, ticks and other insect pests have been effectively controlled for 12 months or more.

Because in the past, malaria was prevalent in those counties this service will be offered first to Hernando, Sumter, Citrus, Marion, Levy, Hamilton, Suwannee, Lafayette, Dixie, Gilchrist, Madison, Jefferson, Taylor, Alachua, Calhoun, Leon, Wakulla, Jackson, Citrus, Gulf, Holmes, Washington, Franklin, and Walton.

When sufficient DDT, spraying and automobile equipment can be obtained it is hoped to extend operations to the following eligible counties: Baker, Bay, Bradford, Clay, Columbia, Lake, Liberty, Okaloosa, Pasco, Seminole, Union, and Volusia.

The counties in the first group will be contacted by representatives from the Bureau of Malaria Control in the near future.





bodices are tightly fitted, with tau midriffs and drapery to dramatize bustline curves.

Long-waisted dresses with pleated skirts may recall the flapper era to many, but the 1947 version is less awkward, more elegant and strictly feminine. Whereas the flapper ideal of beauty was a flat-chested, hipless silhouette, today's styles accent curves. National League School In Ark.

George Barr, veteran of 16 years of umpiring in the National League, held his first school for umpires 12 years ago in Hot Springs, Ark. That first school in 1935 was a success, and from that beginning the school has grown to its present proportions, accommodating almost 100 enrollees.

The idea for a school for umpires was motivated by Barr's sincere desire to help young arbiters get started, and to give additional assistance to those already in professional baseball. To that end his schools have been successful.

Graduates of his school are now working in all classifications of organized ball. Some of the more prominent include: Bill McKinley, now in the American League; Robert Austin, in the American Association; Douglass Robb, of the International League; Bill Wilson, of the Texas League; and Lynn Dowdy, now with the American Association.

After six years in Hot Springs, the school was moved to Orlando where it was held in the winter of 1941-42. No classes were held during the war years, but in 1946 the school was resumed in Orlando.

The school is being held there for the first time this year, and the conditions under which the highly educational institution is being operated are excellent. The living quarters for the men, the weather, the progress of the students and the friendly attitude of the people at the school, and the people of Sanford has been highly gratifying to Barr and his associates.

Every year Barr receives hundreds of letters from all over the world requesting information concerning his school and requirements for entry. Not everyone who writes Barr can be enrolled, but an effort is made to teach as many as possible. This year's class is the largest since the school was founded.



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Hints To Housewives

KEEPING BACON

The proper keeping of bacon is always a matter of concern to the housewife and especially so at the present time when the saving of all fat is so important. Every slab and strip of bacon in the home needs to be kept and used with care so that none becomes rancid or "strong" in flavor and thus goes to waste.

Unfortunately, many housewives have the mistaken idea that bacon should not be kept in the refrigerator, and much bacon becomes unfit to eat as a result. This mistake idea apparently exists because most people do not realize that the commercially cured bacon on the market has changed in the last 10 to 15 years. Formerly, most bacon was of the salty type

the kind produced generally on farms by a longer and stronger cure. This saltier bacon can be kept, as it is on farms, hanging in the air during cool weather. On the other hand, mild-cured bacon, which is the kind now generally selling in stores, is more like fresh meat and always should be kept in the refrigerator—and only for a few weeks, after purchasing.

Mild-cured bacon is at its best shortly after it has been smoked, according to K. F. Warner, extension meat specialist of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Packers keep such bacon under refrigeration and sell it promptly. Housewives should treat it accordingly. In storage, even in a good refrigerator, it loses the smoke flavor and gradually takes on a rancid taste as the fat breaks down. Rancidity is hastened by heat, light, contact with air and

the salt in the fat. Therefore, keeping bacon cold and closely wrapped is an obvious way to hold back rancidity and keep it longer. Wise housewives buy it in small quantities at a time and plan to use it promptly. Bacon can be frozen and held for a longer period, but it will gradually develop a rancid or strong flavor even in *vacuo* storage.

Keeping saltier, home-cured bacon on the farm is a different story. Such bacon usually is used up through the winter, spring and early summer if stored at an appropriate temperature. If necessary to hold it through warm summer weather, freezing storage is best. Rubbing

smoked bacon with salad oil will play its part and also help keep down the mold which tends to form on the surface. Studies have shown that crude cottonseed oil is more effective for this purpose than refined cottonseed oil.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Senator Glen Taylor of Idaho today challenged the United States Army's competence to deal with crime in its own ranks.
