A Chance To Help

It is a most difficult matter to get people to vote in even the hottest elections where the gravest issues are involved. In our own city we have seen matters settled by the voice of scarcely a third of the voters, and settled contrary to what we were fully confident was the will of the majority.

But if it is difficult to get people to vote where differences of opinion have resulted in a warm contest, it is even more of a problem to get them to cast their ballot in an election where a vote of confidence is the maximum result to be obtained.

Tomorrow—and this may come as a tremendous surprise to many—another election will be held. Such an election, an election to fill three places on the City Commission, might ordinarily be expected to stir up some excitement.

That this election has not been preceded by an intense campaign was due entirely, of course, to the fact that there was no opposition. Sanford has become so completely satiated with the old order that when three men, who everyone knew represented the people's interest, announced their candidacies, no one wanted to run against them.

But regardless of how much labor the incoming Commissioners may devote to the local government's tangled affairs, they can accomplish little toward the final resuscitation of the City without the undivided support of the people of Sanford.

It should be a pleasure to vote for such men as Gray, Newman, and Speer and we sincerely hope that there will not be many who will neglect to avail themselves of the opportunity.

The Bolshevik Newspaper

Among certain people any newspaper which presumes to criticize the powers that be, no matter how good or evil they are, is called Bolshevik. The impression, which it is hoped the word will connote, is that the newspaper would do away with all government, when as a matter of fact frequently all that is wanted is a clean government.

"For years readers of 'Excelsior,' the principal daily newspaper of Mexico, have admired and wondered at its candor, hoping that a policy so courageous could be maintained. 'Excelsior' was the one influential journalistic voice still lifted, from time to time, in criticism of powerful officials, in independent, frank comment upon the activities of government.

"When the non-sectarian publications of the world accepted assurances that Toral was not tortured under the regime of the dreaded and subsequently dismissed Chief of Police Inspector, Roberto Cruz, 'Excelsior' still said what it thought. It did not regard the prisoner's failure to move toward the relatives who first came to see him as due to 'lack of ordinary human emotion' nor his statements that he had not been tortured as made without the pressure of fear of worse to come.

"That freedom at length is gone. The paper's offices have for weeks been haunted by both the police and the military. It has been struck hard financially. Its editors probably are aware that they can follow the prudent course of 'El Universal' after former proprietor Palavicini's release from threatening confinement had been secured by vigorous effort.

WEST FLORIDA SPEAKS PENSACOLA JOURNAL

The Journal sees one way in which this territory's loyalty and support could be recognized by Governor Carlton. That is in the appointment of a west Florida man to the post of chairman of the state road department.

West Florida voted for Carlton because it believed him the best man for governor. It was not in hope of reward or patronage; the suggestion is not made just in the hope that west Florida will get a slice of the patronage.

Staunch supporters and friends of Carlton stood pat against the propaganda launched against Carlton in the closing days of the campaign. This propaganda showed its effect in South Florida but didn't make a dent in this section.

Editor's note.—The "home county" of Mr. Carlton to which the Journal alludes as having gone for Howey is Hardee, in the territory of which he was born. Hillsborough, his real home county, gave him several thousand majority.
