

SEATTLE, Sept. 29.-Six United States Army aviators, who completed the round-theworld flight here Sunday from Eugene, Ore., were prepared today to receive wel-come arranged by appreciative citizenry.


Elapsed time of the fight, according to figures today was 175 days; total mileage, 27,584; days actually in air, 66; actual fly-ing time, 531 hours 11 minutas; average speed 76 36-100 miles per

Automobile Dealer Learns Lesson In Trading Machines

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Sept. 29. There is at least one automobile dealer in Florida who hereafter will demand a title certificate for second hand automobile before he takes it in trade for a new car. Reasons for this are shown in records in the state comptroller's office describing operations of the state's anti-theft law.

Less than a month ago the dealer in question was confronted with offer of a trade which he readis accepted, taking a used autonobile in trade as part payment for a new car. In closing the deal, however, he overlooked the all-im-portant little title certificate disc require the title certificate to be that the antomobile laws require shall accompany each car for which a license tag is issued. Nor did he require the title certificate to be turned over to him,

A few days after taking the old car in exchange for the new one. the dealer found a purchaser for the used car, making a quick turnover in both cases. But here his troubles began. When the purchaser of the used car applied to the comptroller for a license tag it was found that the car in question had been stolen only a few days before the dealer accented it as part payment for the new machine. Notice of the theft reached the capitol only a day or so prior to sale from a man in the town where the theft was made.

The only thing the comptroller could do in the matter, therefore, was to notify the original owner of the car where he could locate his automobile.

The dealer, under the circum stances, had to stand the loss of the allowance made on the machine as part payment for the new one, as he was forced to turn it over to the rightful owner.
