Near East Relief Has Graduated Over 15,000 Orphans From Homes

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 27.—The Near East Relief graduated from the various American Orphanages under its supervision in the Near East countries 15,000 orphans during the last year, according to Dr. E. H. Curtis, state director of the organization, who in a general letter to Florida people tells of the work accomplished and of the work ahead in the field. Each one of these orphans, boys and girls, were released from the orphanages able to take up their place in life and skilled in some kind of work by which they will be able to earn a livelihood. There are still a large number of the children, over 40,000 remaining in the orphanages, according to Dr. Curtis and those must be cared for for some time as many are under the age of 12. To care for them the same splendid response that the people of Florida have shown in the past must be continued, he says.

Herbert Hoover Will Talk On Government Ownership Over Radio

It was learned here today that Herbert Hoover, war-time food administrator of the United States, will speak over radio Monday night on "Government Ownership vs. Private Ownership." The address will begin at 9 o'clock, it is said. Mr. Hoover's message, it was pointed out, will be broadcasted from WCAP at Washington which, on that night, will be tied together with five large radio stations extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific in the greatest single broadcasting effort ever made. It is stated that the question is an important one—private vs. government ownership of public utilities—and one in which the Sanford radio fans and their friends should be interested. The public is reminded to be ready to tune in on WCAP at 9 o'clock.

"Big Tim" in Jail Is Out for Re-Election

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—"Big Tim" Murphy, who is serving a penitentiary sentence for participation in the Dearborn Station mail robbery is a candidate for reelection as president of the Gas Workers union which he had headed since he formed it in 1919.

Train Schedule Gets Approval Commission

TALLAHASSEE, Sept. 27.—The State Railroad Commission today approved the revised schedule train service on the Seaboard Railway between Sarasota and Plant City which will give an additional through train in each direction between these two points effective Oct. 12.

Southern Bell Buys 4 Other Companies

TALLAHASSEE, Sept. 27. The State Railroad Commission today made public orders approving the purchase by the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company of four independent companies involving an aggregate price of \$20,000,000. The Broadview Company, Florida Telephone Company and Palm Beach Everglades Company were bought.

Business of State About To Outgrow Present Quarters

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Sept. 27.—Florida's state business shows signs of outgrowing the present quarters provided in the Capitol. The first indication in this direction is disclosed in preparations being made by the state controller's forces to take care of the automobile license tag business of the forthcoming rush season, beginning in November. It has been discovered that the two carloads of license tags which are expected to reach Tallahassee about November 1 are beyond the storage capacity available in the Capitol building, and the controller is making arrangements to store the tags in a new building being erected across the street for a private printing plant. In ordering the tags for next year, provision was made for an estimated increase in the number of automobiles that will be registered of from 15 to 20 per cent over this year which will run well toward the two hundred thousand mark when licenses of all classifications are taken into account. Ample provision also has been made for the increased volume of business expected from the winter visitors. An initial order for 20,000 non-resident metal tags has been placed with the tag makers. It has been estimated in different quarters that at least 60,000 automobiles will visit the state this winter, but whether they remain beyond the 30-day limit in which license tags of other states are valid, remains to be seen.

Roosevelt Will Make Vigorous Campaign

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—Assisted by Charles E. Hughes, the secretary of state and other national Republican leaders, Theodore Roosevelt will make a vigorous campaign for governor of New York, beginning next Wednesday and continuing until election day, it was announced today at Republican headquarters.

Zanni Hops to Fuchow En Route to Shanghai

FUCHOW, China, Sept. 27.—Major Zanni, Argentine world aviator, arrived here from Hong Kong whence he hopped off early today for Shanghai, planning to pause here en route.

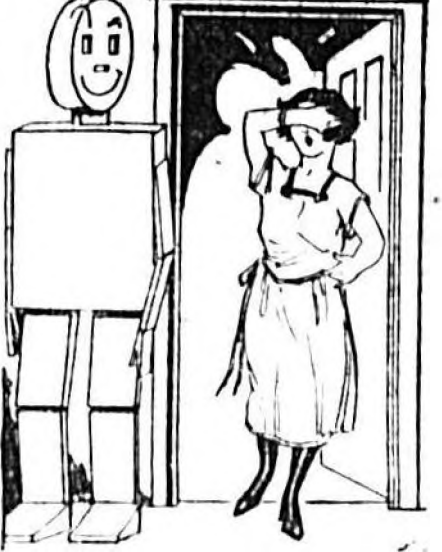
