Delayed Legislation

After nine and a half months the eighty-second Congress finally managed to adjourn its first session in the customary flurry of speeches and last-minute legislation. Three important appropriations, under discussion for months and totaling over thirteen billion dollars, were passed in the waning hours of the session. Many other important pieces of legislation were shelved and remain to be considered, if there is time, when Congress meets again.

For several reasons legislation passed at the last moment may be unsatisfactory. The tendency to hurry grows stronger as a session wears on, and in legislation as in any other business hurry encourages error. Appropriations should be made before the start of the fiscal year, so that the agencies which will use the money can know where they stand and plan accordingly. By being held up until the last minute many worthy bills are killed.

Congressmen do not like to approve legislation which may cost them votes, and sometimes they deliberately delay issues because they want to avoid facing them. But the machinery of congressional operation in its own ponderous slowness is responsible for much of the last-minute trouble of every session, and it lends itself remarkably well to the purposes of a small minority which wants to delay some proposal

The legislative procedures and machinery which are supposed to assure that first things will be done first no longer work in Congress. The fact becomes more plain with each session. The whole government would be benefited immensurably if Congress would adopt reforms which would enable it to complete, in each session, that session's
