Accidents waiting to happen

Anyone who has driven by the intersection of State Roads 434 and 436 in Altamonte Springs knows it's hardy Hollywood & Vine.

What it is is the second worst intersection in the state of Florida for dangerous crossings according to a study released Wednesday by State Farm Insurance.

The Altamonte Springs crossing came within three accidents of making the 10 worst intersections in the nation. State Farm estimated that there were 201 accidents at State Roads 434 and 436 last year.

There were 187 crashes at State Roads 50 and 436 in Orlando and 182 at Goldenrod Road and University Boulevard in Orlando.

Food stamp violations

SANFORD - Two Sanford stores have been barred from participating in the food stamp program because of program violations, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) reports. Kim's Food Store, 1229 W. 13th St., owned by Chang Soo Yoon, was disqualified for one year based on evidence showing that store personnel sold towels, trash bags and other ineligible items for food stamps. Southwest Food Market, 1920 Southwest Road, owned by Gary Bell, was disqualified for six months based on evidence that store personnel sold soap, toothpaste and other ineligible items for food stamp benefits. Ann F. Wages, of the Food and Nutrition Service's Tallahassee office, said food stamp benefits can be used legally only to buy food or seeds and plants to be used in gardens to grow food. Before being authorized to accept food stamp benefits from customers, store owners must agree to abide by food stamp program rules. Violations of the rules result in stores being disqualified from the program for periods of time ranging from six months to permanently. USDA encourages the public to report violations of the food stamp program by calling: 1-800-424-9121, the toll-free number for USDA's Inspector General in Washington, D.C. The number is posted at participating grocery stores. Also, violations can be reported to FNS' Tallahassee office at (850) 942-8315.

County cracks down on road rage

SANFORD — Seminole County drivers with a propensity to speed and run red lights took a hit at the hands of the county's law enforcement agencies Tuesday.

The latest phase of "Operation Aggressive Driver" resulted in a one-day total of 188 traffic citations handed out by officers representing every municipal police department in the county plus the Seminole County's Sheriff's department.

The latest crackdown is in response to complaints by citizens and the increased numbers of traffic crashes caused by aggressive drivers. Law enforcement teams were out in force Tuesday at selected signalized intersections throughout the county, attempting to heighten awareness by drivers of the continuing problem.

During the course of the day-long crack down, 63 citations were handed out to drivers for running red lights, 86 citations were given for speeding, 11 citations were

given to drivers for failing to obey local seat belt laws, five people were cited for driving with suspended licenses, and three others were cited for failing to have a driver's license while operating a motor vehicle. There were 20 other miscellaneous tickets handed out as well, mostly for equipment violations.

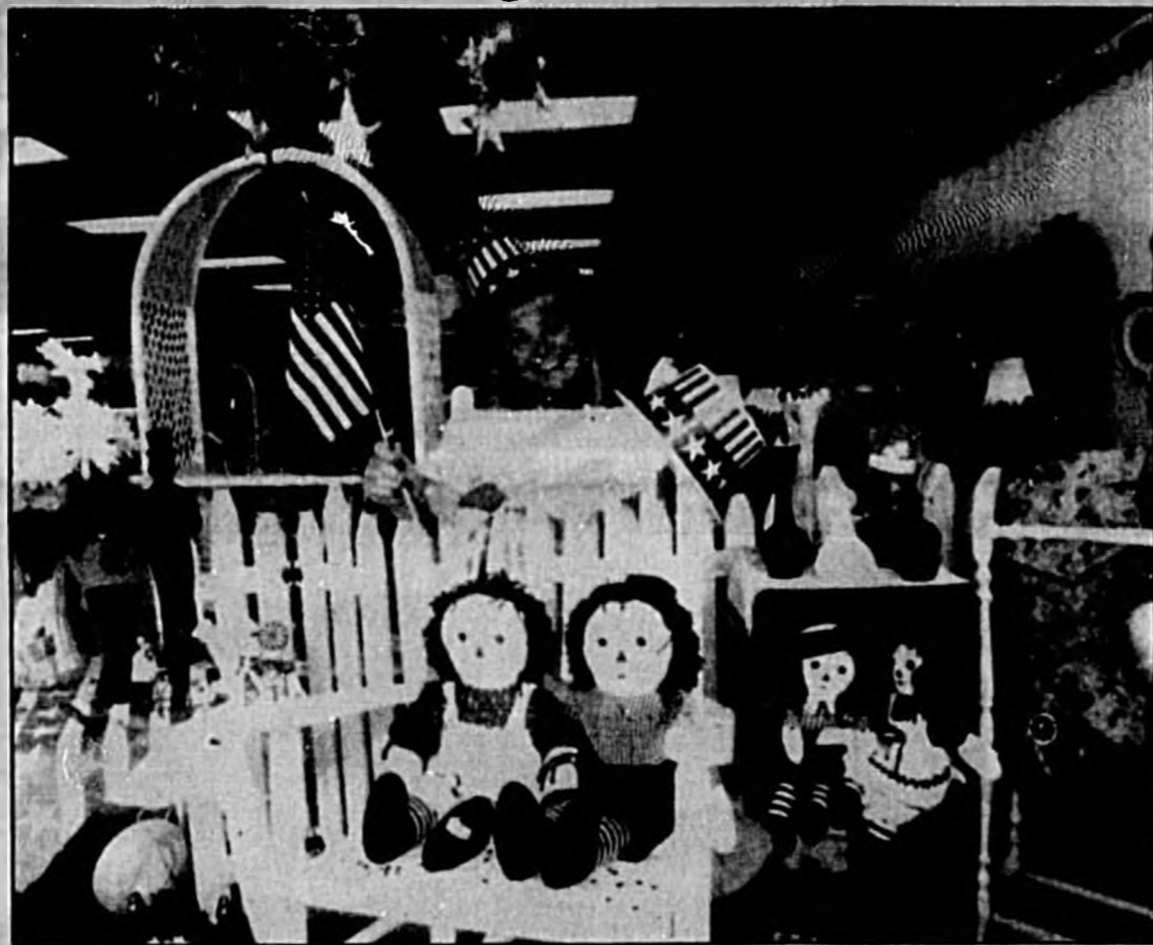
"Red Bug Lake Road and 436 along with Wekiva Springs Road and 434 were two of the heavy spots for running red lights," said Deanna Brown, Public Information Officer for the Seminole County Sheriff's

Department.

The department spokesperson said speeders were cited all over the county but were particularly targeted in the traditional speed areas of Interstate 4, and State Highways 436 and 434.

"This is an ongoing effort to let drivers know of law enforcement's intentions to reduce speeding and running of red lights she said." She added that another combined effort by Seminole County law enforcement agencies is scheduled for sometimes in July.

Fire officials tout safety for fireworks use

SANFORD — Local fire officials and the State Fire Marshall's office are heralding a battle cry for safety as the Fourth of July weekend approaches. The message: Enjoy traditional fireworks, but leave the bang to the experts. Statistics show their concern is well warranted.

According to statistics released by the Altamonte Springs Fire department, 12,000 Americans are injured each star-spangled holiday, up to 200 a year die, and property damage associated with fireworks approaches \$35 million.

A year ago in the Sunshine state, there were 143 incidents of fireworks accidents that fire departments had to respond to,

resulting in four serious civilian injuries and property damage of \$15,715 — in a year where fireworks sales were strictly limited due to statewide brush fires across Florida.

The statistics indicate that youthful inexperience plays a significant role in who is injured and how often. More than 55 percent of all fireworks injuries involve children under the age of 15; another 24 percent of injuries happen to victims between 16 and 24 years of age; and 18 percent of victims are over the age of 25.

The range of injuries runs parallel to the risk of lighting incendiary devices. Thirty-five percent of fireworks victims suffer hand and finger injuries, another 29 percent suffer head injuries, 16 percent have eye

DELAND — He's a happy youngster with stars in his hazel eyes and a skip in his walk. Few would suspect Cory Coleman's courageous 6-year battle against Muscular Dystrophy.

He plays basketball in the backyard, he's on a Little League baseball team. He swims, and romps with a dog named Roxie, given to him last week.

But Cory must be careful not to overextend — knowing he will always be challenged by a cruel neuromuscular disease that he wants to eliminate.

Cory Coleman, 8-years-old,

is the Central Florida Goodwill Ambassador in a campaign to help cure Muscular Dystrophy (MD).

In recent years, Cory and his parents (Wayne and Linda Coleman) have attended more than a 100 fund-raisers and MD awareness programs

throughout Central Florida. Cory takes pride in his ambassador's job.

"He's a unique little boy," Linda Coleman said Wednesday. "Cory's very

loving. He gives a lot without asking for anything in return. We marvel at what he's doing. He's on the honor roll at school. He had perfect attendance last year."

The State also cited Seminole High School's active involve-

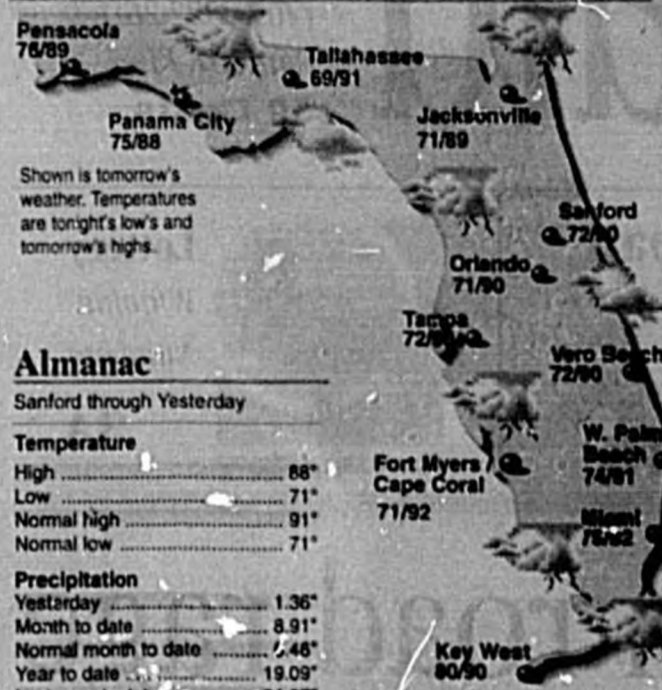
ment with the community. "Volunteerism is big at Seminole as is the role of business partners in helping students with transition to careers via internship and mentoring," Gallagher said.

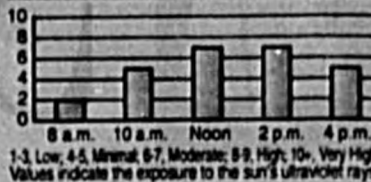

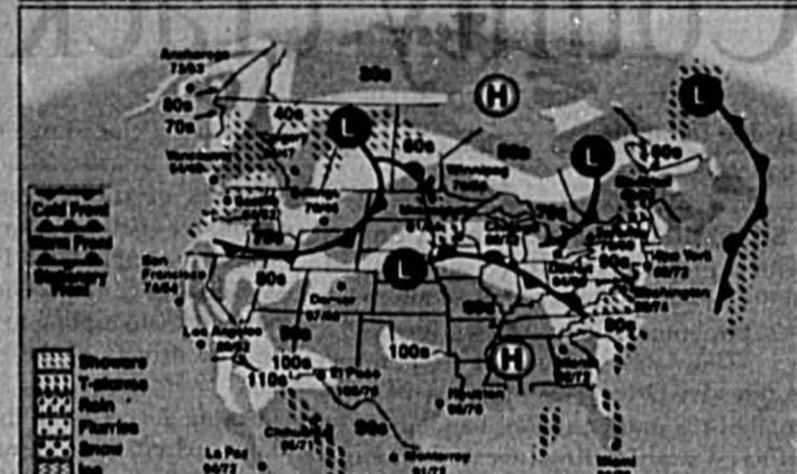

Maloy primed for Round Two

Since he has been a county commissioner, Grant Maloy has fathered two children. No other commissioner can match this productivity.

Maloy's supporters say they believe he's been equally productive as commissioner.

As he vowed to voters, Maloy has not supported taxpayer subsidies to large corporations — even though he always gets voted down, 4-1. He helped pass a strong public decency ordinance that have cut into the profits of the remaining adult business establishments.

He also has refused to accept a generous pension and continues to donate 25 percent of his \$60,000-plus salary to charity. He has fought against any tax hikes unless there is a public vote.

Nearly three-quarters into his four-year term, Maloy has begun making preparations to gain re-election. No longer just a new kid on the block, he'll be judged on his performance more so than promises the sec-

ond time around.

At 33, Maloy says he is more politically savvy than he was in 1996. He realized at the start that his perception of government was different than those he joined on the board.

He admits being rattled by barbs hurled at him by the County Commission Chairman Randy Morris. Throwing up his arms, Morris often accused Maloy as being "anti-government." Morris fumed that Maloy would never learn the nuances of being a county commissioner.

"If it that is true that I'm anti-government, wouldn't it be logical to say Randy Morris is Big-Government," Maloy asked Wednesday. "If there is one lesson that I learned at the start it was that logic just doesn't matter in politics."

From the start, Maloy has been a boy bulldog on handouts to large corporations. He calls the practice, "corporate welfare." He doesn't feel it is necessary for government to be entic-

ing companies to come to the area.

Maloy says that if a company wants to come, fine. He's all for that, but he doesn't think it is right to use taxpayer's dollars as bait. Even if certain numbers showed it was profitable because of tax returns, Maloy disliked the concept. He said county monies can be put to better use — say, in blighted areas.

No one was more upset two years ago than Maloy when Morris led an effort to hire Shutts & Bowen, an Orlando law firm, to defend the county in cases with the adult entertainment industry. Maloy, galled by what he called "back-room politics," said the county was offered free legal aid by the American Center for Law and Justice.

"If that wasn't acceptable, at least we should have welcomed other bids," Maloy said Wednesday.

Maloy encouraged a group known as the Seminole County Citizens for Decency to put an anti-nudity referendum in place. He thrilled at the referendum's passing and at the appointment of Carlton Henley to the Board. Henley immediately succeeded

Morris as Chairman.

"The board is a lot more civil today," Maloy said. "Carlton Henley has put an end to most of the sniping. It used to be frustrating. It's a lot better now."

Because of his youth, Maloy isn't always recognized as a county commissioner. He says those who know him best are the ones he met while campaigning for office or for votes for the decency referendum. He said he is counting on them — and others — to be on his side in the 2000 election.

No opponent has filed to run against Maloy in District 1 but he said Wednesday that Seminole County Chamber of Commerce Director Wayne Weinberg is being encouraged to do so.

"I've kept my campaign promises, and I'll keep doing so for the time I have left on this term," Maloy said. "Yes, I'll be running on my track record this go-round. I intend to put as much government as I can into the people's hands. That's a promise."

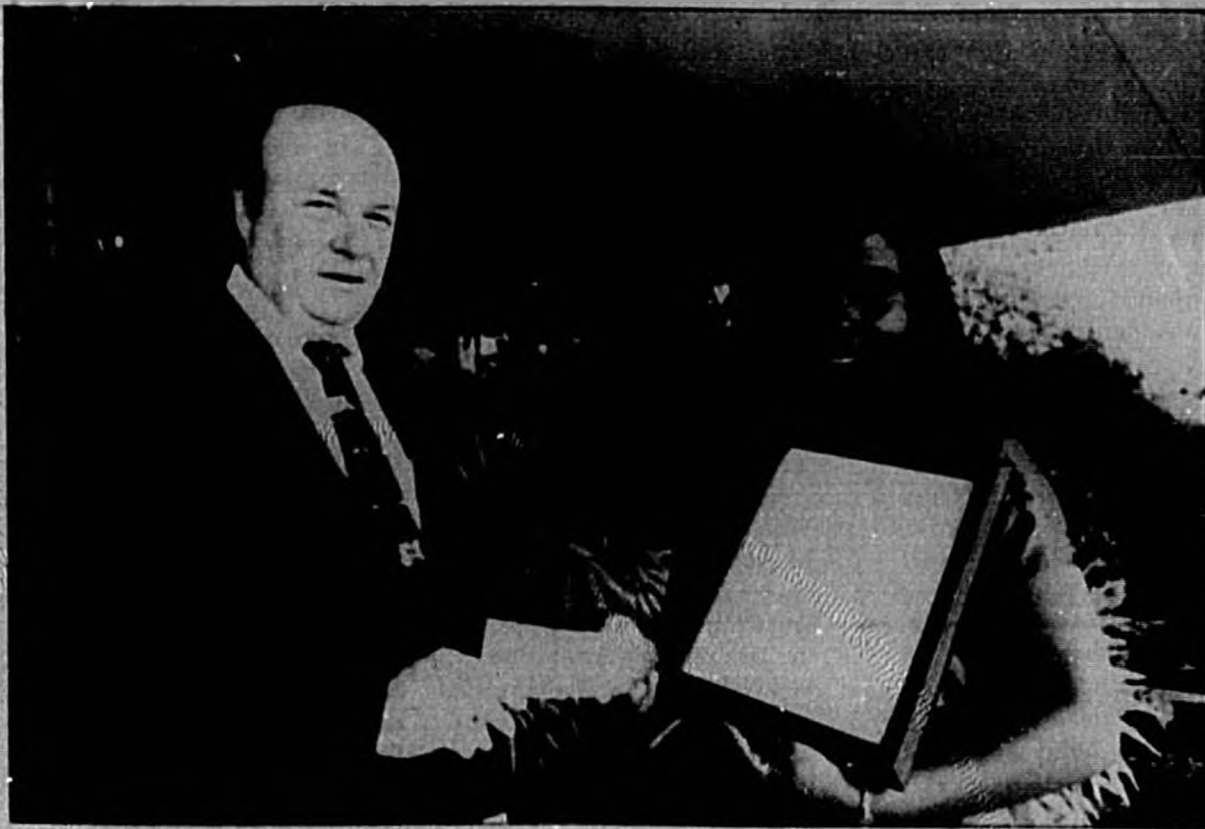

injuries and another 20 percent suffer skin, torso, or other limb injuries.

Fire and safety officials offer a number of common sense tips to reduce the chance of injury. Among them:

- Avoid sparklers, fountains, or other products without clear labels. Each item should include a manufacturer's name, and instructions for use that should be followed carefully. Even sparklers can reach temperatures as high as 1,400 to 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Avoid illegal explosives commonly known as "M-80s," "M-

100s" "quarter-pounders" or "blockbusters." These items, banned by federal law since 1966, still account for one-third of all Fourth of July injuries according to the National Council on Fireworks Safety.

- Don't try to make or alter fireworks at home, or purchase kits designed to do so.
- Look for reliable, licensed dealers. A list can be obtained on the State Fire Marshall's Web page at www.doi.state.fl.us.
- Keep young children away from fireworks, even sparklers.
- Store fireworks in a cool, dry place.

• Keep water close by in case of unexpected combustions.

Current Florida law allows for the sale and use of sparklers and novelties approved by the State Fire Marshall, but outlaws the private use of products that either explode or launch. The sale or use of illegal fireworks can result in a one-year jail term and a fine of up to \$1,000.

The best advice from local fire officials on how to enjoy a fun and safe Fourth of July is to take friends and family to any one of the number of fireworks displays officially sponsored by a city, municipality or theme park.

next year. Gallagher also cited Seminole High School's credit recovery lab and low dropout rate.

"Seminole has earned its good reputation thanks largely to Gretchen's skills and leadership," Gallagher said.

The winners were selected through an evaluation that included increased student performance levels at their schools, student test scores, an ability to manage and utilize financial resources effectively.

Each district in Florida nominated an outstanding principal for the elementary, middle, high school, and adult levels of schooling. One winner was chosen from each of the five Department of Education regions.

"Principals are the instructional leaders of our schools," Education Commissioner Tom Gallagher said. "The outstanding principals named (Tuesday) represent the best of Florida's school leaders in a time of increased student performance expectations."

Seminole High School, with 2,200 students, established an Academy of Health Careers in 1993 that has been recognized

as a Best Practices Model for the state for preparing future health care professionals. The academy, with 309 student enrolled last year, provides a curriculum for students planning health careers.

Nearly 99 percent of the academy graduates continue with post-secondary education, according to school records.

Seminole High School also has programs for at-risk students. Operation Yearn is a program designed to increase students' reading levels by using a multi-sensory computerized reading program.

For 11 years prior to being named principal at Seminole High School, Schapker was an assistant principal at Lyman High School in Longwood. She was a teacher the previous four years in Ft. Lauderdale.

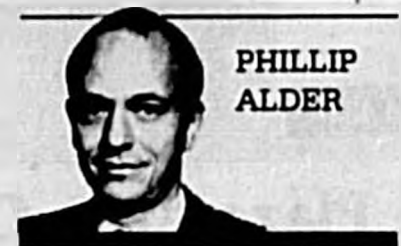
Ruff in the dummy, mark three

By Phillip Alder

Mark Twain claimed, "It usually takes more than three weeks to prepare a good impromptu speech." Well, it has taken three days to cover the basics of ruffing losers in the dummy. Here is the last stage. In this deal, how would you plan the play in six spades? West leads the club king.

South starts with a strong, artificial and forcing two-club opening bid. North's three-spade raise promises something useful, with a useless hand he would either jump to four spades (which ought to include four-card support) or start with a double negative of two no-trump for three clubs, if he is a tournament player). South drives to slam via Blackwood. Aggressive bidding, but the final contract is good.

Check those losers. You have one in clubs, and a problem in hearts. This will be no difficulty if the six missing hearts divide 3-3, but what if they are

4-2, which is almost twice as likely according to the percentages table? It is unlikely you can safely ruff two hearts in the dummy.

You get home with a loser-on-loser ruff-transference play. After winning trick one with the club ace, cash the ace-king of hearts and ruff a heart with dummy's spade king. If the hearts split 3-3, draw trumps and claim. Yet when East discards, play a diamond to your ace, then lead another heart and discard dummy's remaining club. This serves two purposes. First, your last heart is established, and second, you can ruff the club five in the dummy with no risk of an overruff.

ASK DR. GOTT

Bad breath has many sources

DEAR DR. GOTT: Why do some people have bad breath? My uncle is meticulous; he brushes his teeth and flosses twice a day, doesn't drink or smoke, yet his breath is horrendous.

DEAR READER: Halitosis can result from a variety of diseases that affect the liver or kidneys. It can be related to diet, particularly to certain spicy foods. It can also reflect dental disease or sinus infection. Your uncle needs a thorough checkup and, if he is in good health, his dentist should be consulted. Although bad breath may tend to occur with age, it is a treatable, albeit challenging, condition.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 14-year-old daughter's hands tremble when she holds them outstretched in front of her. She has no bad habits or diseases and does not consume excessive amounts of caffeine-containing beverages. Is this normal?

DEAR READER: Tremors of the outstretched hand can have a variety of causes, ranging from an over-active thyroid gland to benign essential tremor (tremulousness of unknown

cause). To complicate matters, some adolescents tend to be shaky because of just plain nervousness.

Most people's fingers tremble a little during forced extension. I cannot tell from your question whether your daughter's condition is normal. To some extent, the degree of tremor will determine if the situation could be helped by medication. For example, low doses of beta-blockers (atenolol and others) often reduce benign essential tremor.

Very slight trembling is of no particular concern. However, if your daughter is truly upset by her symptom, a medical evaluation is in order. Encourage her to be examined by her family doctor.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Is fasting harmful?

DEAR READER: It's a question of degree. A day or two of fasting now and then will not harm you.

However, prolonged fasting (of several days or more) can be dangerous. You will slide into a medical state called negative nitrogen balance and will rapidly lose muscle protein, as well as fat. Your system may become too acid and you will experience dis-

turbing symptoms, including light-headedness, weakness and loss of concentration. You may even become dehydrated.

Millions of the world's poor involuntarily fast each day. They don't like it, but they have little control over the food supply.

Short periods of voluntary fasting may symbolize religious convictions or — for some people — may serve as a first step toward needed weight reduction. But extended fasts are not healthful.

Remarkably, 4-foot, 61-pound Cory is proving he is bigger than MD.

"We were terribly afraid when doctors found the problem six years ago," Linda Coleman said. "The first needle biopsy indicated his MD might be much worse than it has turned out to be, that he might have had a form of MD known as Becker."

A second biopsy was better news for the Colemans. Cory had MD and would be challenged. He would have good days but there would be bad days. In the early stages, he had four or five bad days in succession. Now, his problems go away overnight.

"They had a field day at St. Peters where Cory goes to school, and he went on until he collapsed," Wayne Coleman said. "The other children know his condition. They try to help him by giving in back rubs. Coaxing him to take it easy. They are a great support. So are his teachers."

"We've found out that Cory has to be careful on cold days or when he goes swimming," his dad said. "Cold definitely affects him."

Sometimes, when he realizes he is having an episode and his hands have curled up and he doesn't want anyone to see him that way, Cory quietly tucks them in his front pockets. "He tries to do the best he can in any situation," his mother said.

Surely, the Coleman home is a happy one. Linda and Wayne Coleman love their son and encourage him each day.

"We're cheerful, we feel very blessed," Linda Coleman said. "And we want Cory to stay as cheerful as he is."

"Cory knows what he is facing," his mother added. "He knows more about Muscular Dystrophy than most everyone."

He has decorated the playroom wall of the house with pictures and posters from the Muscular Dystrophy Association."

There are a half dozen pictures of entertainer Jerry Lewis, whose annual telethons raise money for MD patients. Cory and his parents will appear on the Fox-35 local telecast later this year.

Cory smiled when he was asked if he had met Jerry Lewis. "No, he's pretty busy. Maybe one day," Cory said.

Cory said he also would also like to meet Baltimore Orioles third baseman Cal Ripken. Cory has a picture of Ripken in his room, near several Little League baseball trophies he has won. "I'd like to be a big-leaguer someday," Cory said.

Anyone who knows Cory Coleman will tell you he's already a Big-Leaguer.
