## Geologist Has Not Been Seen By Searchers

**Ashley Went Into Cave Last Monday Prepared To Stay Two Days But Has Not Yet Been Heard From Or Seen**  
Friends Organize A Searching Party

Lost Man's Lanterns Found And Also Initials Cut In Mud; Was Cave Explorer  
SHELLMOUND, Tenn., Aug. 19.—(INS)—On the trail of phantom adventure which lured Lawrence S. Ashley, dauntless geologist-explorer of these parts, into the pitch black recesses of Nickajack cave, miles into the heart of Sand Mountain, through noisome infernos of bat-ridden chambers, up a mysterious stream of stygian chill and darkness, across treacherous slides where a breath may release tons of boulders, to the brink of an unplumbed lake of ghostly echoes, his comrades who dared not heretofore follow him found, desperate courage today to seek signs of him.

It was last Monday that Ashley's old friend, Claude McElree, accompanied the geologist three miles into the cave and helped him through the opening to an unexplored chamber beside the dismal echo lake. Ashley carried food to last through Tuesday and two carbide lanterns with fuel sufficient for two or three days of light.

McElree returned to the base which he and Ashley had established in the cave a mile from the granite arch of its entrance. He waited until Wednesday, and then, at no sign of his friend, organized five searching parties of farmers and guides who live near the cave. Not until the exploration of their lanterns yesterday afternoon revealed the message, "L. S. A. 1927," scrawled in a mud deposit, six miles from the entrance, was there sign of the missing man.

The letters bore unmistakable signs of having recently been made, and McElree declared there was no doubt but that they had been made by Ashley not earlier than Tuesday. It was the only trace, aside from two discarded lanterns and footprints leading into the underground stream that had been found by the searchers.

McElree said that the message was probably a sign left by Ashley for his own guidance in finding his way back. He had no idea what the figures 1927 meant, but said the line indicated that Ashley had gone farther back into the cave in the direction it pointed.

Deeper, ever deeper, into the mysterious Nickajack had always been Ashley's resolution, his friends said the geologist had formed a theory that the cave was an outlet to Trenton, Ga., on the other side of Sand Mountain.

With discovery of the two lanterns, it has been established that Ashley, if he is alive, is lost in total darkness. But, now that for two days there has come no answer to the reverberating shouts of his searching comrades, the fear is felt that Ashley has perished in the icy depths of Echo Lake or in a cold, unheated chamber beneath a crushing avalanche of boulders.

## Louisiana Is Badly Damaged By Flood, Talbot Declares

A desolate picture of conditions in Louisiana where recent floods did damage amounting to millions of dollars, was drawn today by Frank W. Talbot, Sanford manager of the Sinclair Oil Company, upon his return from a motor trip through the affected region and part of Texas.

Leaving there three weeks ago in their car, the Talbotts took the southernmost route to Texas, passing through Louisiana where the flood damage is said to have been the heaviest. Northern Louisiana, visited on the return trip, was no hard hit but not quite as badly as in the southern section. Despite the conditions and the losses that they sustained, people of Louisiana are optimistic, Mr. Talbot declared.

## Airplane Carriers Join In Search For Missing Dole Fliers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—(INS)—All of the tricks learned during the World War in spying out the dreaded submarines were called upon by the navy today in its search for the missing Hawaiian flight planes.

More than 250 pairs of keen eyes, aided by powerful binoculars, are scanning the horizon of the Pacific from vantage points on forty odd warships for traces of four brave men and an equally courageous girl, according to reports to the Navy Department.

Working in two hour shifts, because the strain on the eyes is said to be severe, the lookouts can see from 13 to 19 miles in each direction, with the ship ploughing along at 15 to 20 knots an hour.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 19.—(INS)—False reports that the Dole plane "Miss Doran," carrying the Michigan school teacher, Augy Pedlar, pilot, and Vilas Knope, navigator, had been rescued off the island of Mal, with all on board safe, left the San Francisco Bay region chilled in gloom today as the hope of rescuing the fliers faded.

## Incas Captured

LAPAZ, Bolivia, Aug. 19.—(INS)—Twenty-four Inca Indian chiefs, who are believed to have been the ringleaders in the recent country-wide uprising of the Incas, have been captured by federal troops and will be held for trial by regular courts, it was announced officially today.

## Aliens Deported

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Aug. 19.—(INS)—Nine aliens were today enroute to Philadelphia after having been apprehended in various parts of Florida by members of the United States border patrol. From Philadelphia they will be deported to their native homes in Spain, Assyria and Greece.

## Bomb Explosion

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 19.—(INS)—Hundreds of inmates of the Mayview Insane Hospital near here were thrown into panic today when a Pennsylvania Railroad coal train passed over a nitroglycerine bomb planted on a bridge over a branch of Chautauque Creek. No one was injured, but scores of windows in the hospital were broken.

### States High Court Refuses To Grant Reds A New Trial

English and partly in Italian.  
"Who's making all this noise here, my head is buzzing," shouted Vanzetti, "Noise, noise."  
The full bench of the state supreme judicial court, in a decision awaited in every corner of the world, turned down all moves by chief defense counsel Arthur D. Hill to save the lives of the two prisoners and secure them a new trial.  
With the present respite ending at midnight, Aug. 22, a new move to obtain a stay of sentence and a review by the highest federal tribunal will be made.

The full bench of the state's highest court overruled exceptions to denial of motions for a new trial by trial Judge Webster Thayer and for revocation of sentence.

All action hinged around the alleged prejudice of the trial judge against Sacco and Vanzetti because of their radical beliefs. This was brought to light in a series of affidavits given to Governor Alvan T. Fuller and his advisory review committee of three distinguished citizens. President A. Lawrence Lowell, of Harvard, President Samuel W. Stratton, of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Judge Robert Grant. They found Judge Thayer "indiscreet" in conversations about "reds" outside the courtroom but fair and impartial while on the bench.

The full bench, which handed down the decision today, consisted of Justices Vryzik, Hralay, Edward P. Pierce, William Cushing, and James B. Carroll.

The full bench also dismissed a petition for a writ of coram nobis, which had been filed on the conclusion of the hearing on the various exceptions.

The court held that the issuance of a writ of error rests solely within the discretion of a single justice in capital cases. The full bench made no attempt to pass on the alleged prejudice of trial Judge Thayer.

The writ of error coram nobis was addressed to the full bench but the court stated that such a writ had become obsolete in view of the "plain intentions of the legislature" as manifest by recent statutes, stating that a writ of error shall not issue unless granted by a single justice. ### Michigan U. Has An Enviably Record In Branch Of Athletics

ANN HARBOR, Mich., Aug. 19. (INS)—Michigan, an acknowledged leader of inter-collegiate athletics in the Western Conference, will enter its 1927-28 varsity program next month with a record of having scored victories 71.43 per cent of the time over its opponents in the four major sports of football, baseball, track and basketball. No school in the conference can claim the distinction of having defeated Michigan more times than it has itself been forced to accept loss at the hands of the Wolverines in the four major sports and in each of the branches. Michigan holds a decided advantage over all except Indiana, Chicago and Ohio State in basketball.

First indication of Michigan's subsequent success on the gridiron occurred in 1890, when the Wolverine gridder of that year turned back Purdue by a 34 to 6 score. Up to and including the 1926 season, Michigan proved successful in 80 contests out of a total of 709 which were played against Big Ten opponents, four of the games resulting in ties while 25 were chalked up on the wrong side of the ledger.

Baseball added considerably to Michigan's prominence in western conference major sports. On 122 occasions, the Maize and Blue Ball players were returned winners, three games resulted in ties, and 63 in defeats. On the track,

### New Crystal Control System Used By WDBO

ORLANDO, Fla., Aug. 18.—(INS)—In order to keep within its assigned wave length, radio broadcasting station W D B O of this city has installed what is technically known as the "crystal control system" of maintaining constant frequency.

The "crystal" used by W D B O is a small, wafer-like disc about one inch in diameter and three-eighths of an inch thick, scientifically ground from piezo-electric quartz.

Under the new arrangement, which is believed to be the only one in the south, the frequency of the station will be held within 1-1/100th of 1 per cent accurate.

### Orlando Municipal Heads Are Stumped

ORLANDO, Fla., Aug. 19.—(INS)—Orlando municipal officials are stumped. They cannot decide whether to equip a recently formed mosquito patrol with bells, as is the policy of police patrols, or to furnish buzzers whereby the wily mosquito may be lured from his lair.

The patrol was adopted by the city to eliminate breeding places of mosquitoes and is scheduled to cover each week a route that includes all possible mosquito-breeding places within the city limits.

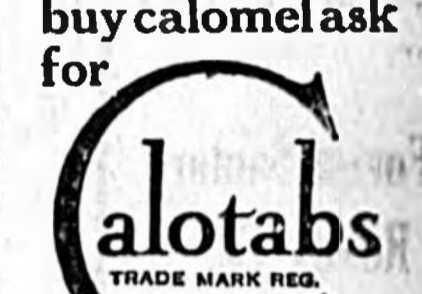
