Pink Auto Sought In Tampa Robbery

TAMPA, (UPI)—Police sought two men in a pink Oldsmobile today who were believed to have robbed a branch office of the Tampa Federal Savings and Loan Assn. of \$3,376.28 in an armed holdup.

The FBI said witnesses saw a late model pink Oldsmobile drive away from the scene of the robbery in southwest Tampa early Tuesday afternoon and that it was believed to be the getaway car. The two armed handits walked into the office in early afternoon, forced Manager Robert E. Adams and teller Mrs. Gladys Denham into a rest room, and then took the money from a cash drawer and the safe.

They were described as being in their middle or late twenties. One was about six feet tall, the other about six inches shorter. They appeared nervous and were dressed in cheap leisure jackets and dark trousers.

Purge Predicted Of Iraqi Leaders

LONDON (UPI)—Diplomatic sources here today predicted a major purge of the Iraqi army and the government to remove all potential opponents of Premier Abdul Karim Kassem including anti-Communists and Nasserites.

They said pressure also was building up in Baghdad for the speedy execution of Gen. Abdul Salam Aref, former number two man in the Kassem regime now under sentence of death for plotting against the premier.

Reports from Iraq said anti-government bitterness by army field commanders in the provinces was a major factor in the current revolt. They said the commanders were jealous of the quick promotions given officers closer to the capital and in the personal confidence of Kassem.

In addition, the reports said, the field commanders disapproved of the government's failure to cooperate with President Gamal Abdel Nasser's United Arab Republic.

Med Center Burns; 11 Firemen Hurt

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—A fire swept through a doctors' medical center early today, causing \$100,000 damage and sending 11 firemen to the hospital.

The firemen were overcome by escaping chemical fumes, believed to have been from sulfuric acid. All but three of the men were treated and released.

Admitted to St. Vincent's Hospital were Capt. A. E. Van Landingham, who complained of chest pains, and firemen Frank Lester and J. T. White.

Fire Marshal E. C. Melmeron said cause of the pre-lawn blaze was undetermined. Firemen were still on the scene at 9 a. m.

Melmeron estimated damage to the contents of the one-story building at \$93,000 and to the structure itself at \$20,000. Four engines and two hook and ladder trucks were sent to the scene and firemen battled the blaze about one hour before bringing it under control.

Flight Crews Given Warm Welcome On Sanford Arrival

Tears and laughter greeted the brave sons of Sanford yesterday afternoon when the first of VAH-5's men and planes swooped to a landing at Ramey Field.

Dependents awarmed to the foreground as the men stepped from their planes and disappeared behind welcoming arms. Twenty-eight officers and men were greeted by Capt. James Ramage, commander Heavy Attack Wing One, and Capt. Lionel A. Arthur, commander of the Sanford Naval Air Station.

The squadron, Sanford's first heavy attack group, has returned from six months in the Mediterranean aboard the USS Forrestal. Preparations for their arrival have been completed, even to the painting of officers by the men of VAH-5, long-time rivals.

Nine were relieved by VAH-6 last September after a nine-month cruise with the Sixth Fleet.

Local dignitaries took a back seat to families during welcoming ceremonies, but John Krider, Mayor of Al Wilson and Andy Carraway were present, nevertheless.

At 6 p. m. today, another contingent will arrive in a huge cargo plane. During the wee hours of the morning, the entire squadron will be present and accounted for, as the remainder of the men are deposited on the field.

The Forrestal docked early this morning in Norfolk, Va.

Brookfield Plans Higher Production

When York Manufacturing Company moves to its new location in May, Brookfield Mills will begin expansion.

The manufacturers of Alox of Miami swim wear have been sharing the building on North Elm Ave. with York.

Alix Schneidman, president of Alox of Miami has announced expansion plans, and predicts that within eight months, Brookfield Mills will double its present personnel and machinery. "Operations may even be tripled," he said.

In a personnel change, General Superintendent Abe Gassow has replaced Joel Aberbach as manager. Gassow is a native of New Jersey, he has had wide experience in both manufacturing and merchandising of clothing.

Gassow already has introduced several new methods of merchandising products, that have resulted in increased production and profit for employer, Schneidman said.

Brookfield Mills is one of four textile plants located in Sanford. It is the third to announce plans for expanded operations.

Brookfield Mills' negotiator, York Manufacturing Co., will break ground on its new plant at 10:30 a. m. Saturday. The site is between Allen of Orlando and HarCar Aluminum on Highway 17-92. York produces fish landing gear and television antennas.

Another textile plant in Sanford will have open house at a new building Saturday afternoon from 24. Piero Manufacturing Co. has moved into the new structure on Pecan Ave. and Fourth St. Pagamas and shirts are produced by the firm.

Oiga Loved Him, Paid, Lawyer Says

VENTURA, Calif. (UPI)—Dist. Atty. Roy Gustafson, the state's prosecutor and not a poet, says Oiga Duncan paid with her life for falling in love.

Gustafson made the observation in arguing for the conviction of 34-year-old Elizabeth Duncan on charges of bargaining for the death of the pregnant wife of her son, Frank.

Gustafson, a precise, methodical attorney, said intense love and hatred mixed in deadly quantities — motivated the "for hire" murder of Oiga, a 30-year-old Canadian-born nurse. He was deliberate as he faced a jury of eight women and four men Wednesday and examined a mass of testimony accumulated in the trial, now in the fourth week.

He pictured the motherly defendant as a "clever, clever woman" but not quite clever enough, whose 30-year-old attorney son was a "spineless jellyfish" and a "liar."

"It is obvious that Frank Duncan never did love Oiga Duncan," Gustafson said, "but Oiga loved Frank and she paid for it with her life."

Deadline Nearing For County Taxes

Last day on which taxpayers can pay 1958 taxes without penalty will be March 31, John I. Galloway, tax collector, said today.

Failure to pay taxes on or before that date, he said, will result in a minimum penalty of three per cent on real estate taxes and one per cent on personal and intangible taxes. He also pointed out that the tax laws require the additional charge of cost of advertising the property as delinquent.

Attention also was called to the fact that interest, advertising and other collecting costs are added to the tax and all become a lien against any property owned by the delinquent taxpayer.

Galloway said the longer the delay in paying taxes after March 31, the higher the penalty cost becomes, all of which makes it to the advantage of the taxpayer to pay any tax due on or before that date.

The interest rate on delinquent real estate tax begins at one and one-half per cent per month with a minimum of three per cent. On personal and intangible taxes the interest mounts at the rate of one per cent per month.

Tax certificates will be sold June 1, 1959, on each parcel of real estate on which the 1958 taxes have not been paid. At the same time, warrants will be issued against all personal property on which taxes are not paid. Sale of the property will satisfy the taxes and cost.

Executions also will be issued on all intangible tax items not paid. These executions will be filed with the Circuit Court Clerk and will become a lien against any real estate the taxpayer may own, Galloway stated.

A 16-year-old Volusia County youth sped through Seminole County last night at speeds clocked up to 110 miles per hour.

U. S. Would Test Red Blockade

Khrushchev Warns Force Would Bring Red 'Resistance'

BERLIN (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev warned the West today it would meet with "appropriate resistance" if it tried to solve any of the major world problems by force.

Khrushchev delivered the warning shortly before he flew home to Moscow from eight days of conferring with East German Communist leaders and visiting the Leipzig trade fair.

"If the aggressors should try, in spite of everything, to carry through their adventurous aims and—as they say—try to 'break through' anywhere, they would meet with the appropriate resistance," Khrushchev said.

"We would like to believe, however, that those on whom it depends will not permit any irresponsible acts and will take decisions, in the interest of all countries which fought against Hitlerite Germany."

Khrushchev repeated earlier pleas to the West to end the cold war on his terms—by signing a peace treaty with Germany and winding up the occupation of West Berlin.

He said Russia would "continue obstinately" trying to persuade the West to sign a treaty with both German states. He denounced as "irresponsible" those in the West who have charged him with increasing international tension and threatening war.

"Such statements can only be made by those who are deliberately distorting the Soviet Union's peace-loving policy," he charged.

Convoy Would Try Move Into Berlin; Might Use Tanks

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The U. S. has drafted a plan for sending a test convoy through a Berlin blockade if the Communist impose one.

The need for a test convoy would arise if Russia abdicated its Berlin responsibilities, signed a treaty with East Germany and gave the East Germans control of traffic routes to Berlin.

It can be reported that blueprints for the test convoy and for putting America's 330,000 military men in Europe on increased alert now exist. Further, they can be adapted to whatever needs emerge from Allied conferences.

The plan at it now stands apparently calls for sending a normal size unarmed convoy of four to ten trucks over the 10-mile road from Helmstedt in West Germany through East Germany to West Berlin.

If the convoy were stopped, it might then be strengthened with tanks and go ahead. What would happen if it drew fire from East German guards was not known.

It can be said that there are plans for Western military forces to establish control of the highway through East Germany if high police dictate.

The increased alert presumably would apply to French and British forces as well as to U. S. Army and Air Forces in Europe.

Experts Say Germs Could Defeat U. S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—This country is ripe for a biological warfare Pearl Harbor.

Russia obviously has what it takes to wage germ warfare.

It is possible that many hours and even days might elapse before the U.S. even knew it had been subjected to a sneak attack.

The first intimation might well be an influx to doctors' offices and hospitals of patients suffering from debilitating or incapacitating maladies defying immediate diagnosis.

These conclusions stem from lectures on biological warfare given at the Naval Medical Center Bethesda, Md. in connection with a current course for armed forces medical officers on "the medical aspects of special weapons."

The lecturers, including some of this country's foremost authorities on germ warfare, agreed that:

—No advance warning of a BW attack is currently likely.

—All of the major nations are actively engaged in manufacturing new agents of infection which will defy quick diagnosis, immunization, and treatment with antibiotic drugs.

—BW provides the most effective means of subduing an enemy population without killing it off or destroying its economy.

The most effective way of waging BW against a nation is by means of clouds (or aerosols) of vapor impregnated with disease-bearing viruses, bacteria or spores. Aerosol generators may be delivered by any means — mines, submarines, planes, or missiles—used to deliver any other weapon.

The best BW is that which incapacitates, rather than kills, the greatest number of persons in the shortest possible time.

82 Died In February

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The Highway Patrol reported today 82 persons lost their lives in traffic during February, at an economic loss of \$10,250,000.

The patrol said highway accidents in February of this year were only one less than the month of February last year.

Seminole Clay May Key New Industry

The clay deposits of Seminole County have yielded a high quality material that may change the future of Florida's construction business.

The clay has been found excellent for the manufacture of light weight aggregate for concrete. In Florida, use of the aggregate has been limited since the material must be brought from north Georgia or Tennessee. Concrete blocks and structural concrete made from the aggregate have proved competitive in price, with no sacrifice to strength through less weight.

A plant producing the aggregate soon will start construction southeast of State Road 415, about two miles northeast of the Osteen Bridge.

The firms of Burnup and Sims Inc., West Palm Beach; Florida Crushed Stone Inc., Ocala; and McNeill Brothers, Bridgeport, Fla., will establish the plant and hope to begin production next year. General manager, and one of the principals of the company is Victor H. Hutchins Jr., Orlando.

The company will employ approximately 60 people. The clay will be fired and expanded in rotary kilns. There will be no air pollution problem, Hutchins said.

The deposit lies southeast of State Road 415, and starts a mile east of the bridge. It is now under lease by the company. Raw clay will be trucked over a private road to the plant. The finished product will be freighted by truck.

Hutchins said that a lack of suitable raw material in Florida has hampered the production of light weight aggregate used in concrete.

More than 60 per cent of the nation's concrete block and structural concrete is now made from the aggregate, although the industry is only 19 years old, he added.

The only flaw in the plan is the present condition of the Osteen Bridge. Hutchins explained that trucks bearing an economically feasible load of aggregate could not pass over the Osteen Bridge even within the weight limit.

Trucks would be forced to haul loads around the north side of Lake Janitor to Enterprise, then south on Highway 17-92 to Orlando. Use of the lake shore road by heavy trucks is questionable, Hutchins said, "and we might have to deliver by way of New Smyrna."


The general manager asked commissioners to support the request for reconstruction of the wooden bridge. "It's not just an economic factor—I was just giving you one side of the picture—the bridge is dangerous to the public."

Hutchins pointed out that the consumer would pay the ultimate cost of the long haul. "But the primary reason for replacing the bridge would be safety," he said.

The Osteen Bridge is on top of the list today as Commissioners go before District Chairman Rufe Davis in DeLand. And, as Hutchins says, the primary factor is not economy, but safety.

The wooden span has seen many accidents, and has even collapsed on occasion when weights became too much for its frail beams.

Junior High Taking Secrets Along

The old Sanford Junior High School is coming down. Wrecking crews are tearing the heart out of the library where the girls used to giggle. Crowbars are wrenching the whippers from the classrooms and stifling forever the sound of singing in the auditorium.

A thousand memories are hidden in the rubble on the grounds. How many proud smiles, tearful promises, prompt answers and stinging voices could resurrection evoke?

The school at Ninth and Palmetto was the most modern in Central Florida when built in 1910. Seminole County was still Orange and students wore middie blouses and stockings.

Total cost of the plant in 1910 was \$30,000, a tremendous sum. In 1922, a domestic science room

was added in the basement. In 1923 a six room, one-story addition enlarged the student capacity. This was Seminole High School. In 1928, the new building on French Ave. was completed, and the school became the Sanford Junior High.

The younger crowd of seventh and eighth graders were not interested in romance and "spooning." The courtly steps of prim seniors gave way to the lively tramp of fun-hungry twelve year-olds. The many defense of wrestling fell before an art rarely seen in the dusty school yard before—lighting.

As Sanford grew, so did the enrollment. Classrooms became crowded. Floors shook as the recess bell rang, and several hundred feet pounded down the stairs of the three-story building. Principals came and went. Teachers

married, had children, came back to the same school—different pupils.

The plays became more elaborate; the glee club more enthusiastic.

In 1947, engineers inspected the building. Retaining walls had weakened, timbers were eaten by termites. Their decision: condemn it as a school.

School board members were confronted with a problem. Other schools were needed. The Sanford Naval Air Station had attracted new people; industry was looking. The building had to be used.

Although the Air Station opened, closed, and reopened within a few years, the school was full. The school board fell behind with the every day responsibility of maintenance on other aging plants.

In 1957, 100 of the 500 students enrolled went to the "little red school house" on Palmetto. The Sanford Junior High could not hold them. Repeated warnings were issued by engineers. Fire escapes could not be fastened to the weakened walls.

Last fall, the school board stood behind the engineers. A new bond issue was in the offing, and chances could no longer be taken with precious lives. Authorities had warned that the building might begin to sway and tumble if all students jumped to their feet at the same time, a natural reaction to the dismissal bell.

When Junior high students registered, they were assigned to Seminole High and the Pinecrest School. At Pinecrest, seventh graders are in double session.

The \$3,200,000 school bond issue was passed. The bonds were sold,

and the check came back to Sanford last week.

Within days, and maybe sooner, an announcement will come about a new Seminole High School. In the past, the present high school will become the Sanford Junior High.

History repeats itself, they say—and children are no different now than in 1910, 1920 or 1930. The memories that lie crumpled beneath the trees at Ninth and Palmetto are lived again in the lives of children and grandchildren of former students.

And one day, residents will pass by the former site to see the new Sanford Vocational School, a paved parking area, and students emerging from the doors.

Secrets? Every old building has them. But only the big oak trees have seen it all, and their murmurs fall on deaf ears.

Ingrid Must Share Kids With Roberto

ROME (UPI)—A Rome judge today ordered Ingrid Bergman and Roberto Rossellini to share their three children temporarily pending a final ruling on custody.

Judge Alberto Virgilio issued a temporary order in response to the Italian movie director's request for urgent procedure. The order was similar but not identical to one passed by a Paris court referee earlier this year.

Virgilio set a hearing for April 17 to start discussing a final decision on the custody issue.

Neither Rossellini nor Miss Bergman were in court at the hearing. The Swedish star lives near Paris with her new husband, impresario Lars Schmidt.

An appeal by the Italian state against annulment of the Bergman-Rossellini marriage is still pending in a Rome court.

The children are to stay normally with their mother and attend Italian schools in Paris. Rossellini can have the children every Sunday and holiday, picking them up at the mother's home in the morning and taking them back in the evening.

Captain 'Beached' For Hitting Ship

NEW YORK (UPI)—The captain of the liner Constitution was beached today on charges by the Coast Guard that he was negligent by going too fast in fog when his ship rammed the Norwegian freighter Jalanta.

Capt. James W. La Belle will be given a hearing on the charges March 23 to determine whether his shipmaster's license should be suspended or revoked.

The charges stemmed from a Coast Guard hearing into the collision. Capt. La Belle said at the hearing he was going 12 to 16 knots with visibility limited by fog when he struck the Jalanta shearing off 100 feet of the freighter's bow.

No one was hurt in the collision, which occurred outside New York Harbor.

American Export Lines said the 49-year-old shipper will remain ashore until the charges are disposed of. The Constitution sails Friday for the Mediterranean with Capt. Hugh L. Switzer on the bridge.

Wednesday was the warmest day of the year with a high of 86, bringing thousands of Angelenos out into smog-free air to bask in the unseasonably warm sun. The early heat wave extended as far as San Diego, 120 miles south, where the thermometer hit 84 degrees.

Ike Warning Seen As Helping Allies

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower's grim warning of the danger of nuclear war was viewed today as strengthening the Allied hand in negotiations with Russia on Berlin.

Officials said the President brought into sharp focus the disastrous possibilities of the Kremlin's course when he declared Wednesday he would not fight a ground war in Europe if the Berlin crisis led to hostilities, but would resort to "other means."

These officials said they hoped the blunt statement finally would convince Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev that the U. S. is determined to hold Berlin against any Russian threats.

Another indication was the disclosure that the U. S. has drafted detailed plans for putting its 350,000 military men in Europe on increased alert and sending a test convoy through any Berlin blockade the Communist impose.

Airman On Roof With Girl; Gets 15 Days In Jail

SEMPACH AIR BASE, Germany (UPI)—Airmen Alexander J. Cummings, 21, was fined \$35 and sentenced to 15 days imprisonment Wednesday for spending the night with a German girl on the roof of his barracks.

Freshmen Finish Legislative School

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Twenty-eight freshmen lawmakers were ready today to face the upcoming Florida legislative session after a thorough briefing on how to act and what to expect.

The two-day school for new House members ended Tuesday, during the mock session, the first termers went through the motions of parliamentary procedure, learning how to handle legislation, how to get the floor, and what to do when one of their pet bills runs into trouble.

Among the teachers was House Speaker-Designate Thomas D. Healey, who outlined a plan for speeding up the handling of bills dealing with finance and taxation.

Healey told the school he will ask the House to allow the Speaker to decide whether a bill "materially" affects general spending or taxes. If it does not, it should not be sent to two committees, he said.

At present, any bill which touches on appropriations or taxes must be referred to the committee on appropriations or taxation as well as the committee having jurisdiction over the general subject matter.

Healey said such double committee reference can delay passage of legislation and even result in the death of certain measures.

Parents Get Blame For Youth Crimes

WASHINGTON (UPI)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover charged today that delinquent parents are largely to blame for the growing menace of youth crime.

In a caustically worded editorial in the FBI's law-enforcing bulletin, Hoover noted that the public only thinks of criminals who lead youngsters into thievery and immoral activities as "corrupters of youth."

In truth, said the bachelor FBI boss, "large segments of the adult population are also among the guilty."

"Countless adults escape the stigma," Hoover wrote, "although by their negligence, indifference, personal greed and bad example, they are in fact responsible in large measure for juvenile criminality."

He asserted that a "major factor" in the youth crime problem "is our present society which has substituted indulgence for discipline, pleasure for duty and money for morals."

He said the time has come for "decisive action." Hoover predicted that based on the "alarming present rate" more than one million youths in the 10-to-17-year age bracket will be arrested in 1962 and in each succeeding year.

Arthritis Hits Rep. Joe Martin

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Joseph W. Martin Jr. (R-Mass.) is suffering from a non-crippling form of arthritis in his right leg.

Physicians examining Martin Tuesday, made public their diagnosis of the ailment which sent the former Republican House leader to Bethesda Naval Hospital early last week.

They said the 74-year-old congressman would have to stay in the hospital for a few more days in order to receive treatment and assure complete rest.

Washington Calling

WASHINGTON—What President Eisenhower made abundantly clear to the Congressional leaders was that his view of the Berlin crisis is quite different from that of almost everyone else. He sees it as another effort by the Communists to force the United States to spend itself into bankruptcy.

Prodding on the need for more military spending or at the very least the rescinding of the cuts in the size of the Army and Marine Corps got the men from Capitol Hill rowers. The impression was of a President with his mind firmly made up and with no intention of changing it.

Reviewing their discussion with the President, the Democrats believe that in view of this attitude there is little that they can do in preparation for a showdown on Berlin that might require the use of at least limited force. It is an executive responsibility, and the legislature cannot force the hand of the commander-in-chief.

The Congressional leaders, and later the committee chairman who heard the President expound his views more forcefully than he has done in a long time, point out that perhaps as much as one billion dollars appropriated over and above the White House request of a year ago has been held back. Editorial criticism of the Democratic majority for failing to take the initiative is beginning to cause resentment. Disagreeing sharply with the Eisenhower thesis that the nation cannot afford to spend any more for defense than it is in the Administration budget, they nevertheless fail to see what they can do about it.

The President, it was evident, got a jolt when a large portion of an issue of long-term government bonds offered a month ago failed to sell in the normal commercial channels. Secretary of the Treasury Robert Anderson, on whom a heavy responsibility rests, took fright and he communicated his fears to the White House.

This served to underwrite the strong feeling the President already had about the need to balance the budget if any additional indoctrination had been required it

was supplied by George M. Humphrey when the President went quail shooting in Georgia with the former Secretary of the Treasury. As one participant in the White House talks put it, the voice of Eisenhower but the words of George Humphrey.

On the question of more money for missiles the President spoke forcefully and at length. He said that within a year the Atlas might be obsolete and large additional sums put into fixed sites and missiles would be wasted.

He gave every appearance of being completely unmoved by the growing demand to make an effort to close the admitted missile gap—a ratio of three to one for the Soviets in ICBMs within two to three years. And this was the President himself and not his secretary of Defense, Neil McElroy. As in his rather sad performance on TV's Meet the Press, McElroy gave the impression of one who might have had other ideas if the line had not been so narrowly drawn by his superior.

In the course of displaying more conviction than most of those present had seen in a long time the President read Senator Richard Russell of Georgia, sitting on his left. A lecture Russell, chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, is opposed to foreign aid, and Eisenhower gave him a verbal spanking that was good-natured but nonetheless emphatic.

The President repeated what he has said several times recently—that if it was a question of economy he would rather see it in his military budget than in foreign aid. This presages the major conflict of this session of Congress as the Democrats shake more and more willingness to cut deep into the \$3.9 billion Eisenhower (U) requested for foreign aid.

There was just one exchange that may in the end see the President reversed. Representative Carl Vinson, the venerable chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, put to the President the question about foregoing reductions in the ground forces. He got a firm no, but he believes it is possible to fix the size of the Army and the Marine Corps law at their present levels so the chief executive will have no option. Vinson has been muttering impressions ever since he heard that the Pentagon was breaching Congressional orders to retain at least the framework of the three separate services under last year's unification law.

Often in the past under our system of divided power the executive and the legislature have been at odds, but never before perhaps on an issue so critical at a moment so vital for the nation's future.



Ghost Comes Back To Haunt Germany

FRANKFURT, Germany (UPI)—A ghost of Germany past has come back to haunt the people of Germany present.

German courts are not exactly full these days of cases involving anti-Semitism, but there are enough of them to disturb both government and Jewish leaders alike.

There is not even proof that there is more anti-Semitism here than in many other places in the world. But because of the past, the recent rash of anti-Semitic occurrences in West Germany has sent a chill up the German spine and brought new guarantees from Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

Adenauer declared that German people had reacted with disgust to events of the Nazi era and this could not be invalidated by isolated acts of anti-Semitism.

He added that the policy of the Nazi regime toward the Jews had brought disgrace on "all of us" and would not be repeated.

Adenauer's reference was to the six million Jews who died in the gas chambers or by worse means under the regime of Adolf Hitler, and to the government's present determination to re-integrate West Germany's remaining 30,000 Jews into West German life.

Most West Germans seem to approach the problem today with the grim fascination of a man drawn irresistibly to the edge of a cliff. He doesn't want to go there, but he doesn't want to forget the atrocities of the Hitler regime.

There is no chance that the West German will be allowed to forget the atrocities of the Hitler regime. In the pleasant little town of Dachau a few miles from Munich, the gas chambers still stand as a grim memorial, as do others throughout Germany.

He posted \$2,500 bond and walked out arm-in-arm with Elvera Unruh, 30, second woman he married, to live with her parents at Newton, Kan.

Rockefeller Wins Tax Hike Battle

ALBANY, N. Y. (UPI)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's political fortunes rose today with the passage of his two billion dollar budget in the state Legislature.

The Rockefeller balanced budget, including 234 million dollars in new taxes, was pushed through the state Assembly Wednesday night by a vote of 187 to two more than the required 76 votes needed for passage. It had passed the Senate earlier.

Supporters of the governor said his victory over rebels in his own Republican Party in the first major political battle of his term had strengthened his chances for the 1960 GOP presidential nomination.

The budget bill puts New Yorkers on a pay-as-you-go income tax program to start April 1. Income taxes for 1958 were cancelled. Under the governor's program taxes were increased on motor fuel, cigars and estates.
