Coal Strike Fact-Finders Finish Probe

Board Chairman To Report To Truman On Hearings Aimed At Ending Dispute

CHICAGO, Feb. 9. (AP) — Members of two operating railroad unions have voted to strike for a 40-hour week, the unions announced today. A spokesman, however, said that does not mean a strike is imminent. He said that under procedures of the National Railway Mediation Act a strike could not possibly occur before late spring. The two unions are the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and the Order of Railway Conductors. Together they represent a total union membership of about 200,000 railroad workers.

New York Importer Loses In Stamp Deal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9. (AP) — Hendrik Wannerfeldt, New York importer of stamps, today in a stamp deal that brought the forced resignation of Harold Ambrose as a Postoffice Department official. Max O. Trull, Washington attorney and son-in-law of Vice-President Barkley, said Wannerfeldt has retained him in the Ambrose case — a case postal inspectors have called "fantastic." Trull declined to tell a reporter how much Wannerfeldt may have lost or what he thinks the prospects are for getting back any losses. Postal officials said that so far the deal has not broken any federal law in persuading people to invest in commemorative stamp issues.

Korean Naval Bases Acquired By Russians

Soviets Develop Pacific Sub Fleet; U. S. To Hold Exercises In Area

BERLIN, Feb. 9. (AP) — American, British and French military commanders here are reported to have agreed to handle an influx of 50,000 Communist youths from eastern Germany late today. The three commanders, who conferred here today, agreed to let the Communist youth to see what West Berlin is like — but under strict rules. This would forbid marching, flag-waving, political demonstrations or disorders.

Senator Taylor Proposes World Government As His Peace Plan

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9. (AP) — Senator Taylor today offered the Senate his own plan for ending the cold war with the Soviet. Taylor bolted the Democratic ranks two years ago to run for Vice President on Henry A. Wallace's Progressive Party ticket. He was bitterly opposed to President Truman's cold-war moves. Now Taylor wants Mr. Truman to call a general conference of the United Nations to adopt a constitution for a "true world government." He placed his proposal before a Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee which is studying several resolutions designed to strengthen the U.N. If the general U.N. conference should not be called within a year after his resolution is approved, Taylor proposes the President should then call a world constitutional convention of delegates from all nations for the purpose of adopting a world government constitution.

LONDON, Feb. 9. (AP) — Winston Churchill blasted Britain's Labor government today as an ungrateful Socialist regime kept alive by "dollops of dollars" from capitalist America. Labor Prime Minister Attlee called Churchill's attack a scab on his own "wild whirling wind." The Conservative leader warned the campaign for the national elections Feb. 23 by holding out a promise to austere weary Britons of an early end to gasoline rationing if the Conservatives are victorious at the polls.

The Third Time The Anti-Trust Lawyers Were Wrong!

This was the time Federal Judge C. C. Wyche directed the jury to bring in a verdict of "not guilty".

It was the time he said to the anti-trust lawyers:

"I have studied this case from the very outset. In my opinion there is no testimony produced from which it can reasonably be inferred that the defendants entered into a combination to depress or lower the price of potatoes."

"I might say that I never tried a case in my life where a greater effort, more work, more investigation had been done, combing almost with a fine-tooth comb to gather evidence, as was done in this case."

"But, as was said a long time ago, you can't make brick without straw, and you can't make a case without facts."

So here were two cases in which the anti-trust lawyers made seriously damaging charges against A&P, in which the judge decided that there were no facts to support those charges.

Today, we want to tell you about the third time—this time in Dallas, Texas—the court decided against the anti-trust lawyers.

Judge Atwell also said to the anti-trust lawyers:

"If the indictment is not good then it is better to find out before an expensive trial than it is after an expensive trial. I do not think it is good, and thinking that, it is my duty to sustain the demurrers and motion to quash."

In short, Federal Judge Atwell threw the anti-trust lawyers and their case right out of his court.

So that makes three times that the anti-trust lawyers made damaging allegations against A&P. In two of these cases federal judges said they were all wrong. In the third case a federal judge said the indictment was inflammatory and he would not even permit the case to be tried.

The anti-trust lawyers were not satisfied with the Dallas decision. Neither were they satisfied with the two other decisions in which federal courts administered stinging rebukes to them.

They were still determined to destroy A&P.

Former Supreme Court Justice Owen J. Roberts said the subcommittee yesterday he is opposed at this time to any moves toward a world federation.

Roberts, who is chairman of the Atlantic Union committee, said the only federation with a chance for success at this time would be a union of the Atlantic democracies.

"I would oppose a world federation at this time," Roberts said. "And, referring to Russia, he added: 'I could not agree to federate with a nation which is not a democracy.'"

Roberts said the development of a hydrogen bomb will make it imperative for the United States to seek an Atlantic union.

Dr. Harold C. Urey, one-time atomic scientist, testified that the only way left to meet the atomic threat is to extend law and order through an expanded central government.

"A union of Atlantic powers, he argued, would give the western nations a balance of power — economic, military and political — which would be with Russia. And he said this would discourage aggressive moves by the Soviet Union."

Clarence K. Streit of Missoula, Mo., author of the book "Union Now," also gave his support to the Atlantic Union proposal sponsored by Senator Kefauver (D-Tenn.) and more than 90 other senators.

At a session in Augusta, Me., the State Senate voted 18 to 10 to rescind Maine's previous support of the World Federalist movement after an opponent said it "stinks of Communist government."

"Some sources behind the World Federalist movement," said Sen. Cleveland Sleeper Jr., "have been found to be non-American, Com-

"We prefer to leave them in that position," he said.

He never did say just what were the points of difference or what seemed to be the big snag in reaching an agreement.

Spokesmen for the operators did not share Cole's view that yesterday's bargaining sessions had improved prospects for an eventual agreement.

Joseph E. Moody, president of the Southern Coal Producers Association, got out a statement saying:

"We view it to the point to say frankly that the operators' position is less so far as any progress toward a settlement of the coal controversy is concerned."

"We are, as we have been for many months, hopelessly deadlocked on the issues involved," Moody said that the only possibility of an agreement seemed to be through a "surrender to the union" — a course which he said the operators could not take in fairness to the coal industry and the public.

Harry Moses, spokesman for the "captives" mines owned by steel firms, shrugged off a question as to whether he shared the board's optimism with the answer:

"The board's optimism is its own."

The southern producers presented to the board a bulky sheet of statements and statistics to supplement in tone and directly opposed to anything we call American."

Of 27 states which sent Congress memorials supporting the movement, Sleeper said, 17 have recalled them.

Harry Bridges Denies Being A Communist

Head Of Longshoreman's Union Says He's Not Guilty

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Harry Bridges says the answer to the \$64 question is: no, he never belonged to the Communist Party. Further, he testified at his federal trial on perjury charges yesterday, he never paid dues to the party, never signed an application to join and the Communists did not dominate or dictate strategy in the 1934 waterfront strike.

It was that west coast strike in which Bridges' newly-formed International Longshoremen's Union emerged as a power and propelled the Australian-born Bridges into a career as a controversial union leader, a man whom the government twice before has tried unsuccessfully to deport.

Conviction on the present charge, that he committed perjury when he told his citizenship hearing in 1945 that he had never been a Communist, could lead to his deportation.

In trial with him, charged with conspiracy, are Henry Schmidt and J. R. Robertson, two union officials who testified for Bridges at the naturalization.

Bridges acknowledged he had consulted with Communists and accepted their help, but he insisted he had never joined them. "I was not so much that I disagreed with their program as that I knew membership would subject me to deportation."

He said what he and his fellow unionists wanted was an answer to their immediate problems—"how we were going to get steady work, how we were going to stop racketeering, the kickbacks, and so forth."

The idealistic, revolutionary program of the Communists, he said, could not correct the things the longshoremen felt were wrong on the waterfront.

Bridges conceded he had been solicited to join the Communist Party, that his attitude was well-known. "I didn't see any need for my joining, and I had enough sense to know that as an alien it would subject me to the risk of deportation."

He recalled he had been through two previous deportation hearings and an administrative hearing, and expressed the opinion the current charges "are old stuff—old stuff that's just hogwash, a smoke-screen, and a way of attacking the union."

The bill would provide more revenue for the postoffice from these sources: Post and postal cards, \$58,000,000; second class matter, \$16,000,000; third class, \$24,000,000; fourth class, \$40,000,000; registered mail, \$4,000,000. The rest of the \$130,000,000 would come from services not extensively used.

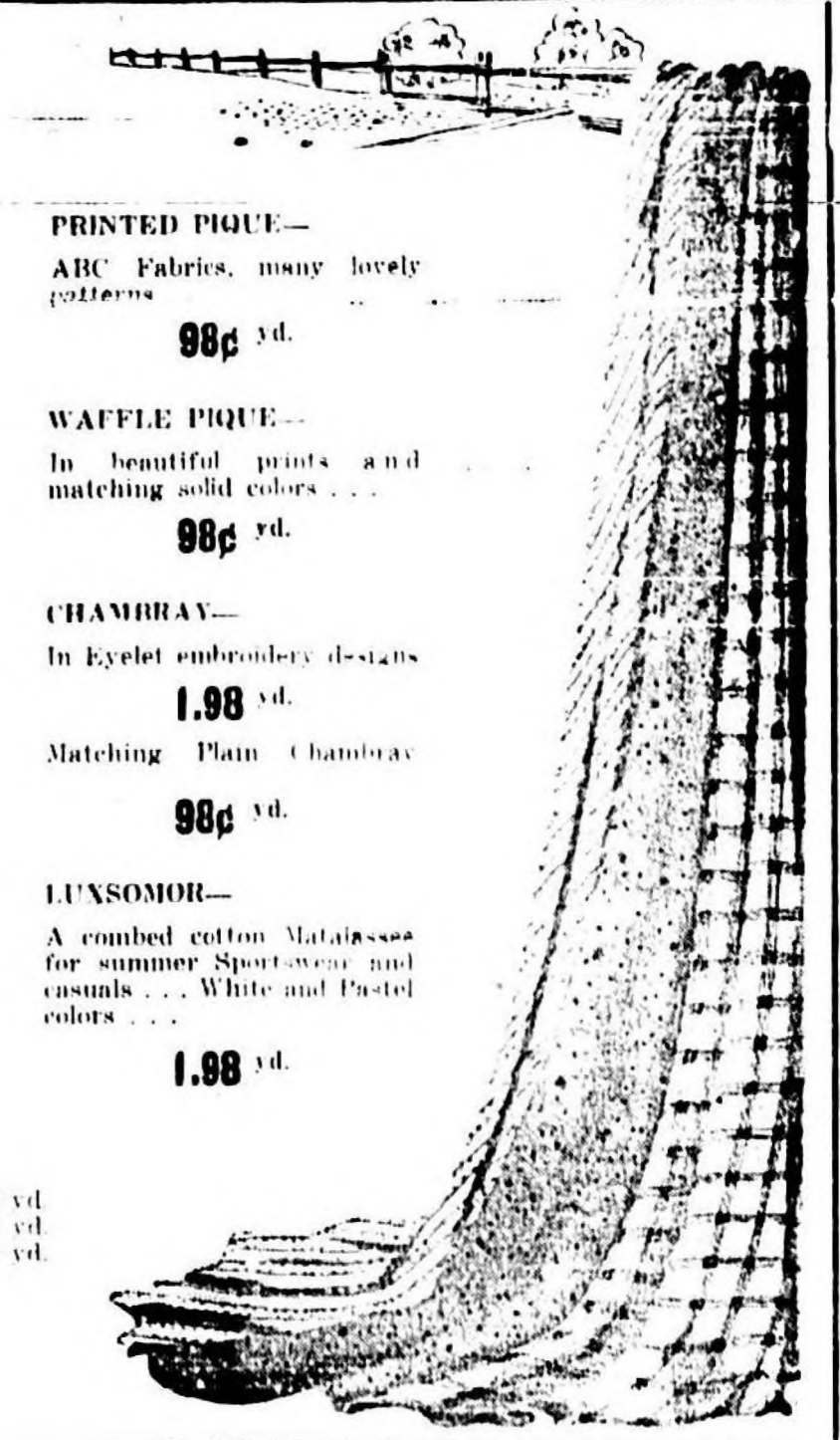

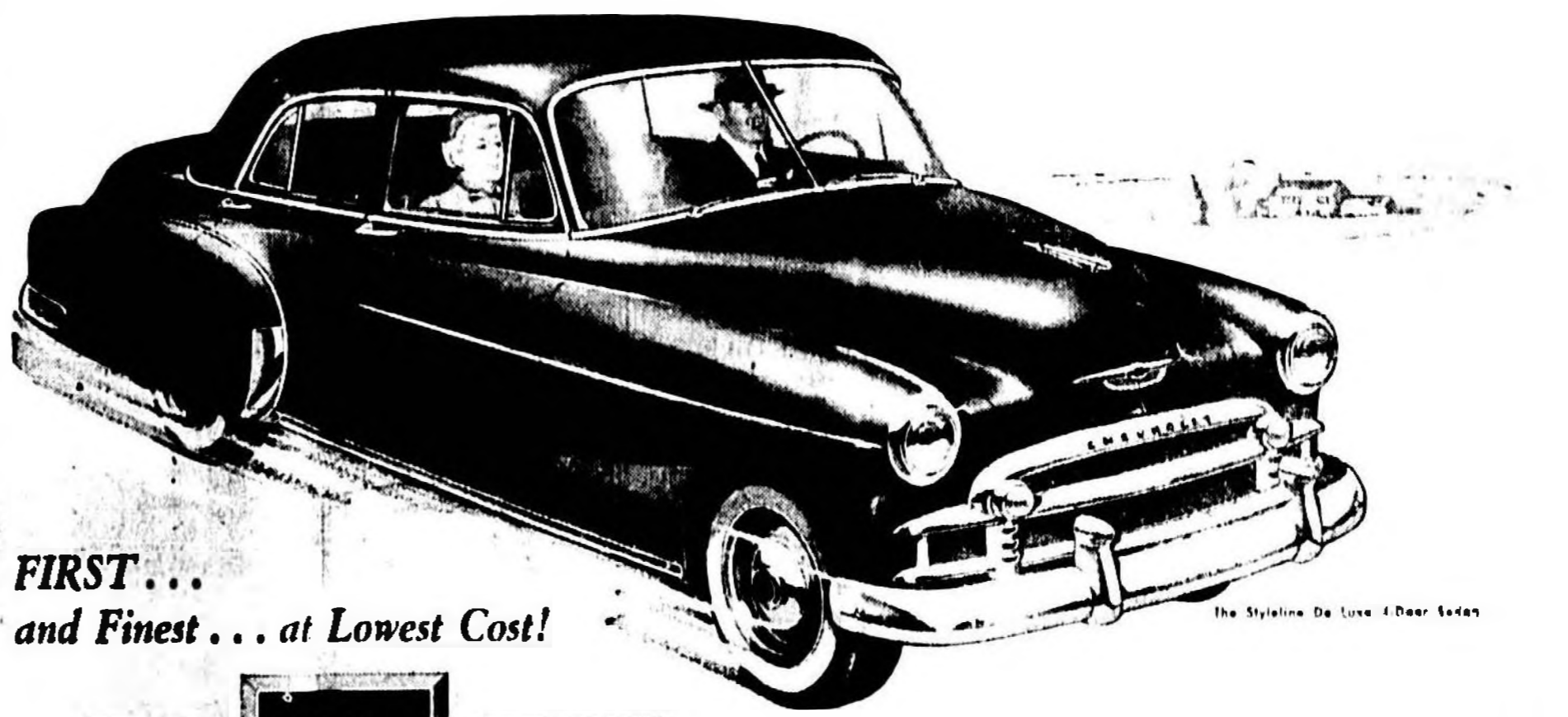

The job pays \$5000 a year.

Under the new setup of the university's athletic policy, Justice would be head coach only. The job of athletic director will be separated from the coaching duties, Nance said.

Paul Myers, a former Tampa U. griddier, who has three degrees from Stetson, will move up as head of the athletic department from his job of athletic business manager. Myers took the business manager's job last fall.

Dr. Nance said that Miller Adams would continue as director of intra-murals and physical education.

Gaddis took the coaching job at Tampa two years ago and his team last season failed to win a game. Before going to the university, he was coach at South High School. During the war he served overseas as lieutenant (jg) in the Navy.

He is a former Colgate athlete.

Citation's Jockey For San Antonio Event Undecided

ARCADIA, Calif., Feb. 9. — (AP) — The burning question around the race track today was whether Steve Brooks or Eddie Arcaro will ride Citation in the \$50,000 San Antonio handicap at Santa Anita Saturday.

Last report from trainer Jimmy Jones was that he hadn't decided which jockey will get the call for Big C in the mile and one-eighth stake, first major step in Citation's comeback.

Arcaro stepped in when Citation's former great little rider, Al Sinder, was drowned in Florida in 1948. Eddie piloted Citation to the triple crown and horse of the year honors.

Brooks, however, is currently the regular rider for Warren Wright's Calumet out here and presumably will get the chance to make his own choice.

He has the reverse record of having been astride Citation in two of the horse's three defeats in his 31 races. He was aboard when the Calumet stablemate, Be-

witched, defeated Citation as a three-year-old. And last month it was Brooks at the reins when up last Saturday when Citation in a head-to-head duel in the stretch and whipped him by a neck over the seven furling distance.

On the other hand, Brooks was up last Saturday when Citation drilled between races at Santa Anita. This was taken as an indication that he'd take the ride this Saturday.

As far as the jockey fee is concerned, the two riders will split whatever rewards come from whatever money Calumet wins in the San Antonio, and the stable will have two and possibly three horses in the race — Ponder, possibly Belmont and almost surely Citation.

Brooks gave Ponder a good ride in winning the \$100,000 Santa Anita steeplechase for four-year-olds Jan. 25. But Arcaro was handling the stable's crack filly, Two Lea, and many are convinced Eddie would up with Two Lea to enable Ponder to go ahead and win the race.

In any event, the San Antonio, something of a measuring stick for the field for the \$100,000 Santa Anita handicap Feb. 25, promises to be a hot horse race.

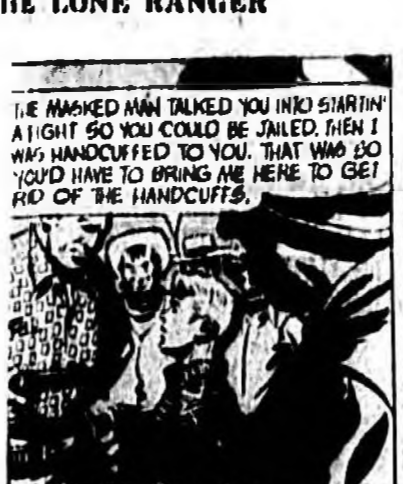
